Jaycees Give Their Report On Activities

Other Jaycees projects listed by the report were an Easter egg hunt; \$150; teen-age roadies, \$150; school patrol appreciation day; \$100; youth golf course, \$45; youth month, \$50; and a soil conservation center, \$25.

During the year the Jaycees also budgeted \$1,700 for a Camp Fire Girl cabin at the new camp in the south hills. Of this, \$1,100 was paid from the Jaycees operating fund and the remaining \$600 is to be paid at the rate of \$200 per year.

Also listed in the report were several self-supporting projects. Keep Your Credit Campaign, Voice of Democracy contest, distinguished service awards banquet, traffic and public safety programs, public health projects, benefit skating show, get-out-the-vote campaign and fire prevention work.

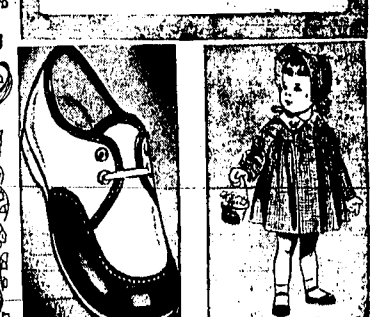

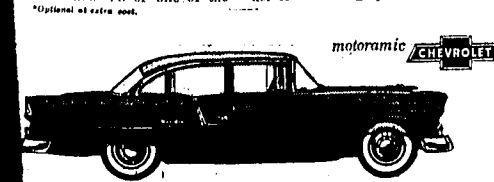

The union notified the national mediation service it would agree to let a mediator try to work out a solution. The company had agreed to mediation earlier.

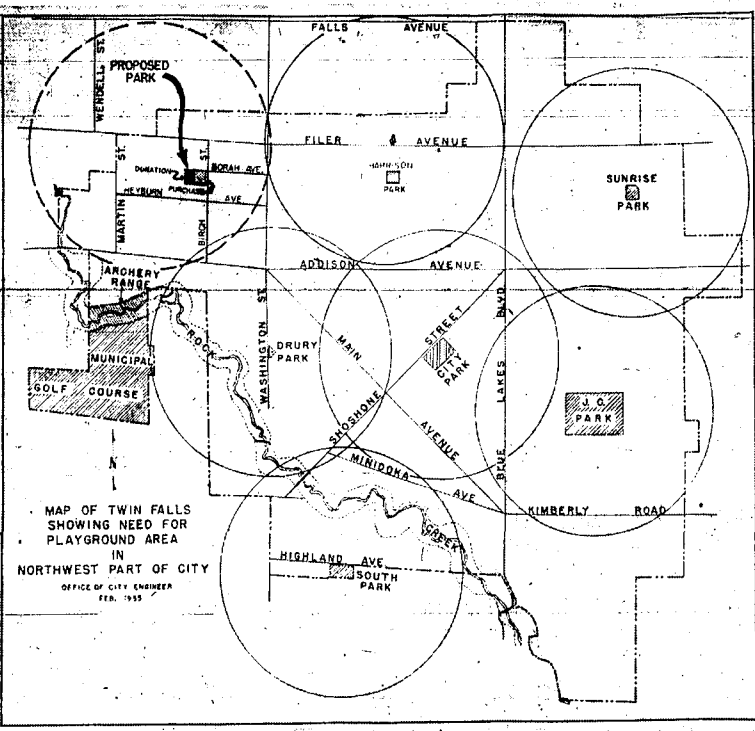

Early Hearing Is Expected on \$1,073,474 T. F. School Budget

A hearing on the proposed 1955-56 budget for class A school district No. 411 will be held within the next two weeks, it was reported Saturday by Supt. Ernest H. Ragland. He said the exact date would be announced later.

This item includes \$425,000 to pay elementary teachers and \$125,000 for high school teachers. Instruction costs under the present budgets are \$611,354. For the 1955-56 school year, instruction costs were \$470,612.22.

Administrative costs are budgeted at \$26,745.85 in the proposed budget. Plant operation comes to \$402,000, plant maintenance, \$32,800; utility expenses, including transportation, \$76,500; capital outlays for alteration and improvement of buildings and addition of equipment, \$64,477.50, and fixed charges for insurance and debt service, \$82,175.

4-H Activities Are Reported At Twin Falls

An impressive list of accomplishments by 4-H members in Twin Falls county has been released by Donald Young, assistant county extension agent, in observance of national 4-H week.

According to the summation report, 200 4-H members in Twin Falls county have been released by Donald Young, assistant county extension agent, in observance of national 4-H week.

The 184 girls enrolled in 4-H food projects. Young said, served 1,356 meals, canned 41 quarts of food and prepared 901 quarts of vegetables and 189 pounds of meat for their home frezers.

Young also reported that the 263 girls enrolled in 4-H clothing projects made 415 articles of themselves and their brothers and sisters and completed 783 accessories and articles of clothing.

In addition to production of animals and crops, 4-H members in the county kept records of costs and income on such enterprises as chickens at the Twin Falls county fair and in their own communities. Last year 4-H members sponsored 760 exhibits at the fair.

Among farm contests in which 4-H members took part were home economics, livestock, dress, butter, and identification and tractor operation. Other 4-H projects include agricultural, mechanical, and scientific, weed control, entomology, garden crop, landscaping, frezing, canning, photography and interior decoration.

A recently instituted project for 4-H members, Young announced, is a big chicken project. Over 100 members from 9 to 11 year old, older members may become junior extension agents.

Another project, Young said, is known as "outdoor food and fun," a contest in which 4-H members prepare meals. During the summer members may also attend camp at the Magic Valley camp.

Other 4-H projects include handicrafts, singing, nature hikes, handicrafts and swimming.

Young stated that 4-H youngsters in 61 clubs belong to 4-H. The total number of 4-H members throughout the U. S. is more than two million.

All boys and girls between 10 and 20 years old, who are citizens or residents, are eligible to join. Those interested should telephone the county agent's office. The telephone number is 345.

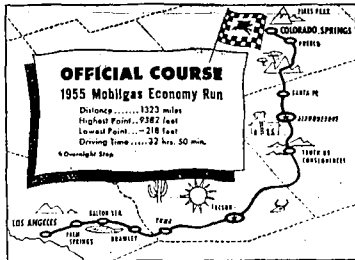

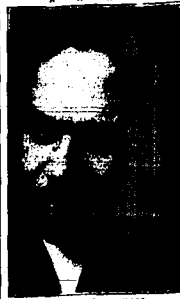
