Wiretappings Probes Begin In Two Cities

NEW YORK, March 7 (AP)—Telephone wiretapping which Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes called "dirty business," even when legal, is under investigation in New York and Washington. It is the "illegal" kind of wiretapping which concerns investigators of the New York legislature and the senate permanent investigations subcommittee. But the spotlight has fallen, too, on wiretapping by federal agents, police departments and private detectives who carry on their electronic eavesdropping under hazy and conflicting federal and state laws.

OPERATION CANDOR

The atomic energy commission, not an agency that often talks freely to the American public, turned dramatically candid in its first official estimate of the danger from the radioactive fall-out that would follow a hydrogen bomb being exploded.

More than a year ago, the Eisenhower administration, deeply impressed with the shocking facts on nuclear weapons then at its command, planned what came to be known as 'Operation Candor.' The American people were to be told enough of the grim story to shatter their complacency, if any, but not enough to frighten them needlessly.

The thing never came off. Other counsels prevailed, and the administration shifted its attention instead to the admirably conceived proposal for peaceful use of the atom.

Since then, the famous Bikini tests of the H-bomb have been conducted, and the facts today are far more astounding than those which prompted the original idea for 'candor.'

The AEC decided to tell this bigger story primarily as a basic service to Americans who need to understand the magnitude of the peril, and what elementary steps they might take if suddenly caught in an enemy H-bomb's lethal zone.

When the agency reported that the Bikini tests showed that all life would be endangered within a 7,000-square-mile zone, it was assuming that no one within the area would take any protective measures. But it was quick to point out that many simple and yet highly effective things could be done by individuals to ward off the radioactive peril.

Obviously, those in the immediate target area would be annihilated. But for those 100 to 200 miles from the center, the AEC said it often might be enough simply to get down into basements and other underground spaces. That would be some advantage even in being able to see the sky on the first floor.

At the outer limits of the lethal zone, about 100 miles downwind from the bomb blast, radioactivity would in fact be so reduced that only 5 to 10 per cent of the people would be seriously affected, and then only if they remained out of doors continuously for the first 36 hours.

While there can be some comfort for us in the knowledge that quite simple steps may help to avert death or permanent injury, as some distant areas of the blast, there can be none at all in knowing that we and the Russians have a weapon which can spray radioactive poisons over a swath almost as big as New Jersey.

The AEC reported obviously is an important contribution to public knowledge of the biggest single factor in the world's life today: The colossal destructive power of nuclear weapons.

It should provide a spur to our lagging civil defense programs. But it should also provide fresh inspiration for all those world leaders, including President Eisenhower, who believe there must never be a war fought with such weapons, who feel peace and civilization's survival are today synonymous.

air-to-air, ground-to-air and other smaller missiles through the hours that can be hurled from offshore submarines, or even across oceans when such missiles are prepared.

The explosion gave off what appeared to be the "biggest" fireball in many previous detonations. After the five-second flash of light, an orange, purple-tinted fireball held upward for 20 seconds with a diameter estimated at more than a mile. Normally, the fireballs are visible for five seconds or less.

The fireball rose from the water and climbed to 20 feet in less than five seconds, appearing white-hot, inside it climbed rapidly to 20 feet, trailing its dirty, brown-yellow stem of radioactive dust and disintegrated steel from above. At 20 feet, the familiar mushroom cap began to ice up along its edge.

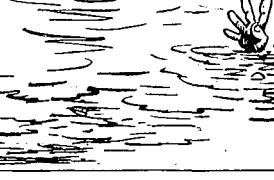

Top Federal Tax Official Writes Five Articles on U.S. Income Tax Returns

By T. COLEMAN ANDREWS Commissioner of Internal Revenue (First of Five)

WASHINGTON, March 7 (AP)—It is time for millions of U. S. citizens and residents to file their federal income tax returns for 1941.

This year there are new benefits almost everywhere, enacted by Congress, and the federal income tax code a complete overhaul.

The internal revenue service has compiled a list of questions that taxpayers are asking about the law as it stands now, with particular emphasis on the changes which have been made since last year's tax law.

In answering the most-asked questions here, I hope to save many of you the trouble of waiting to find out how your problems are solved by our staff of taxpayer assistants.

Without doubt, the most frequently asked question is: "When do I get my return?"

That is one thing the new law did not change. The answer is: Just as soon as you can get your return and mail your check; it may take a few weeks, but sometimes it can be a matter of months.

If you get my return, you want your refund in a hurry, to file your tax return early. The internal revenue service has a staff of one million person income tax returns this spring, plus more than twice that amount on other taxes, such as estate, gift, and the like. The pile of returns to be processed ahead of yours. It's "first come, first served."

The best advice I can give you is to get your return in as early as possible. The basic fact of who must file a return is unchanged from last year. You must file if you are a citizen or resident of the United States, under 65 years old, and your gross income was \$400 or more in 1941, you must file for more wages and salary workers, gross income is the same.

Reds' Loss in India Amazes Asia Region

The communists in the Indian state of Andhra are asking themselves what happened.

A couple of months ago there seemed to be a serious threat that they would win control of the little state on the Bay of Bengal in southern India.

The communists had managed to unseat the Andhra government, administered by Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru's Congress party, on a vote of no-confidence. A general legislative election was called.

Red Victory Predicted
A communist victory was freely predicted. It looked as if Nehru might have a chance to try out on his own territory that policy of co-existence with communism which he so strongly recommends to the western allies.

Well, the election has been held. Results now coming in show that the communists have suffered an amazing defeat.

With returns for 149 out of 196 districts in, a coalition led by Nehru's Congress party already had won 117 seats, 18 more than an absolute majority of 99. The socialists and independents won 22 and the communists 10.

Old Hold 45
In the last Andhra state legislature, which totaled 140 seats, the Congress party held 46 and the Communists held 45.

Indian political experts are trying to figure out, so far without much success, what caused the big overturn.

The communists themselves make no attempt to minimize the extent of their defeat, and confess they are unable to explain it.

In introducing the bill, Henshaw praised President Eisenhower's cabinet committee on energy supplies and recommended that the removal of natural gas production from federal price commission jurisdiction.

CHICAGO, March 7 (AP)—A prominent new skyscraper is arising on Chicago's lake front. It has concrete conditioning, new-tanned aluminum siding and no mortgage.

The Prudential Life Insurance company, one of the nation's biggest mutual firms, is paying an estimated 40 million dollars cash for the 41-story building.

A Prudential spokesman said the company regards the skyscraper as an investment for its policyholders. The firm will occupy a third of the building and rent the rest.

Killer's Reasons Remain Mystery

THERMOPOLIS, Wyo., March 7 (AP)—Law officers and grief-stricken relatives gaped today for the reason why a mild-mannered ex-miner went on a killing and kidnapping rampage Friday which ended in his own violent death.

They also pondered why the gunman, Charles Billings, 25, took the name of an ex-convict several years ago.

Billings shot three men in cold blood early Friday, killing one, after he had been surprised during a burglary at Kemmerer, Wyo. He later kidnapped a 17-year-old Evanston, Wyo., service station attendant and held him hostage for eight hours.

After the youth had been released unharmed, officers cornered Billings at Green River, Wyo., and shot him out with him. A deputy sheriff was wounded fatally before Billings caught a shotgun blast in the chest which collapsed, smothering, "I'm dead, damnit. Come and get me."

Billings had been working in western Wyoming oil fields for the last two years under the name "Melvin Gray." He was driving a car registered to Gray, an ex-convict, and wearing articles bearing his initials during the gun spree.
