HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

It is plain that the few honest individuals who think a worker has a moral duty to join a union of his fellows simply do not know what they are talking about.

It is not so much that I am a socialist as it is that I am a worker. I am so thankful for the freedom we share, for the brotherhood of men, for God's love help each to care and build better lives for him.

Then we can be thankful for our rights and boys. Who have learned the better way of giving to the world, peace and joy.

I read my comments to a hypothetical individual who has read of squallor in the coal mines and states of Pennsylvania, of the 12-hour day and bitter poverty, always in the presence of company police and company "influence."

So now this simple business-worker is engaged in weird international politics and promoting "socialism," exploiting the poor communists in many nations but subject to no interference on his part.

Well, who do you think? "Dubinsky has been president since 1922. John L. Lewis has been president of the miners since 1920. Dan Tobin was president of the teamsters for more than 40 years; Joe Morehead has been president of the boot carriers about 25 years and never was elected but just succeeded to the job in a racket which did not hold a convention in 32 years and has not held a valid election in almost 40 years; and Bill Maloney, the boss of the operating engineers, has been there for 12 years and will have the job for life.

How are elections run? The methods vary but in all cases the system is such that the powers re-elect themselves. I have a collection of a hundred Hiltner ballots of unions with no opposition candidates.

The American union is the most un-American institution that I have known. No loyal American has the slightest moral obligation, indeed he scarcely has an excuse, to join one of these organizations.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON - The prosecution of the Kansas City Star for alleged violation of the anti-trust statutes shows vividly how a vindictive President can use the law to obtain political revenge.

The Star was convicted recently by a jury of violating the anti-trust laws because of its low wholesale price for its morning, evening and Sunday editions.

The same issue has been raised by the government's combined advertising rate. In a sense, the government advertising rate is a newspaper's circulation, advertising and accounting structure.

In addition to the criminal case, in which the Star has been found guilty, there is pending a civil suit. Since the Star will be unable to pay, the government will pass upon the government's attempt to force and influence the press. It can be done to the Star, it can be applied to any newspaper.

TRUMAN'S YOUNGER DAYS - But the more important story here lies outside the courtroom. The Star has been found guilty of a crime, a crime which is a newspaper's mistake to clean up Kansas City, and a former President's mistaken loyalty to a political grater.

U. S. Grand Jury Ponders Perjury Against Matusow

EL PASO, Tex., March 8 (AP)—A federal grand jury goes into session today apparently with plans to take action against Harvey Matusow for his confessed perjury.
 Matusow admitted under oath yesterday that he gave perjured testimony when he identified labor leader Clinton Jenkins as a communist during a 1954 trial.
 Matusow was the only government witness at the 1954 trial who linked Jenkins with communist activities after Jenkins filed a non-cooperation affidavit required by law.
 Jenkins, an international union representative of the Independent Mine Mill and Smelter Workers union was convicted by an El Paso federal court of falsifying the affidavit. He was sentenced to five years in prison, but he has been free on appeal bond.

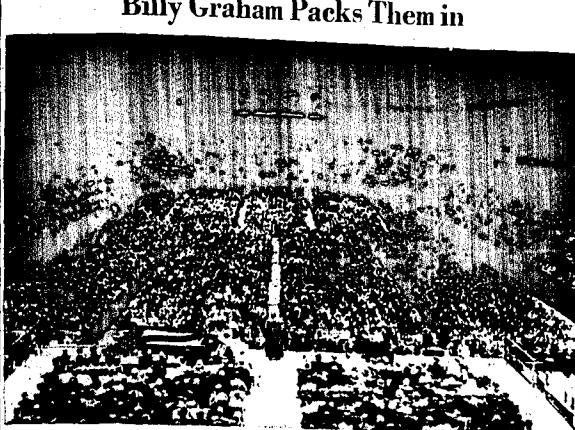

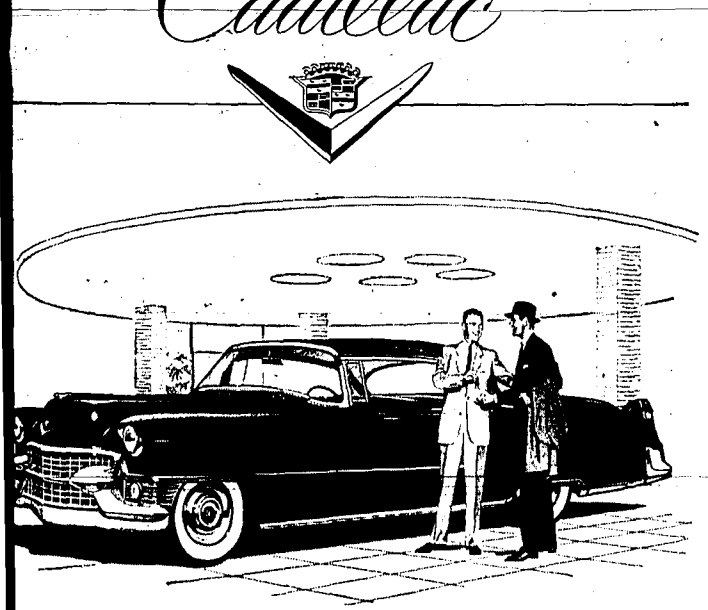

School Board Battles Group In Big Ouster

IRVING, Tex., March 8 (AP)—Irving school board members today condemned attempts by a citizens group to abolish their jobs as resulting from "mass hysteria," while ousted Superintendent Dr. John L. Beard scheduled a mid-morning news conference to get some things off his chest.

It followed yesterday's formal firing by Acting Superintendent Charles Langston, of 215 public school teachers, janitors, lunchroom workers and clerical workers who walked out March 1. He sent 41 identical letters saying their failure to return to work was reason enough for their dismissal.

The school board, meanwhile, issued a statement deploring a petition with 37 signatures filed by a citizens committee, asking County Judge W. L. Boretz for a special election on abolition of the Irving independent school district and the school board.

Statement Issued

The board called the shocking example of the lengths to which a determined minority will go to achieve its end. . . These few people who have been incited to mass hysteria at organized meetings would go so far as to vote out of existence the school system to which they profess to love and cherish.

Beard, 53, countered today by saying he heard the Irving citizens committee state in a meeting last night "they don't consider themselves anarchists or collectivists because the school board made that remark about them."

He quoted them as saying they did not represent mob violence, that they represented a good size of the community and that they were interested in democratic processes and Christian conduct.

Brief Filed

Beard's attorney filed before District Judge Sarah T. Hughes a relatively rare "proceeding to perpetuate testimony."

It was described as a means by which someone who plans to file a false testimony in court and give testimony that may later be used at the actual trial.

Beard previously appealed to the Texas state commission of education.

Others Fined

In addition to the 215 teachers and other employees and Beard's school board three principals in seven out of Irving's eight public schools, two of the school board acted before attorney Balford Morrison.

The teachers and other school employees met yesterday and announced "they still stand as citizens and trained employees" any time the "people in power at any time" would attempt to "take the time" want to take away from them.

But Langston said only 17 or 18 more teachers are needed to fill the vacancies and Irving's 6,000 students were back in school.

Revenue Official Explains Law For Income Tax Exemptions, Claims

have been married all year. The same rule applies if you were divorced or legally separated as of Dec. 31—you are single for the entire year for income tax purposes.

There are new rules on the tax liability of husband or wife whose spouse died during the year, or during the two preceding years. I shall describe them later in this article. Dependents are not the same as spouses. They never count for more than one exemption apiece on your tax return. One dependent counts no more than one exemption for you. Age and vision affect the exemptions of spouses but make no difference in the case of dependents.

Question: May I claim two exemptions (two times \$600, or \$1,200) for supporting my mother, who is 70? Answer: No. Just one.

For a person to qualify as your dependent, you must provide more than half of his or her support (except in a situation where several people support one person but no one provides more than half the support, which is explained in the third paragraph below). The dependent must be closely related to you, or be a member of your household living in your home.

A dependent must have less than \$600 income of his own, unless he is a child of yours (including stepchild or legally adopted child) who is under 19 years old, or is a student. Expressed another way: A child under 19 or a student may earn \$600 or more and still qualify as your dependent, if you provide more than half of his support.

Even though you may claim him as a dependent, if this child or student earns \$600 or more he must file a return himself. He may claim his own personal exemption. Thus, in such cases, the child or student will qualify as two exemptions; once on his own return and once on yours.

When several people combine to provide more than half the support for another person, one of the supporters may claim the supported person as a dependent, if the others

agree in writing. Any one of the supporters may claim the dependent as long as he contributed more than one-fourth of the support, and the dependent is closely related or a member of his household.

The new tax law provides new benefits for surviving widows and widowers who are still supporting their children, and for unmarried persons (divorced, legally separated, widowed or never married) who are supporting parents or other near relatives.

If your spouse died last year, you may file a joint return just as if the spouse were living, provided you did not remarry before the end of the year.

If your spouse died in 1953 or 1952, and you meet other specified conditions, you may qualify as a "surviving spouse," split your income in half and pay the tax on each half, just as if you were filing a joint return. You may not, however, take exemptions or deductions for the deceased spouse.

The new benefits for an unmarried head of the household are based on a table of lower tax rates applicable to their income. It works out to about half the income-splitting benefits enjoyed by married couples filing jointly.

To qualify as "head of household" you must be unmarried or legally separated as of the last day of the year. You may claim this special status if you are providing more than half the maintenance of a home for your dependent father or mother, even though it is not your own home. You also are entitled to "head of household" status if you are providing more than half the maintenance of your own home, and if your home is the principal residence of a dependent who is related to you, or of your unmarried child, grandchild or stepchild even though he or she is not your dependent (with certain qualifications).

U. S. Warned Of Big Soviet Naval Power

WASHINGTON, March 8 (AP)—Rep. Carl Vinson, D., Ore., warned today that Russia is building a major naval force which would help it launch Korean-type "brush wars" in the event of an atomic stalemate.

Vinson, chairman of the house armed services committee, told a report we know that Russia is far ahead of us in the latest type submarines."

"We also know that Russia is engaged in the development of a major naval force with the latest type of combat ships," he said.

"These facts support my contention that if we face an atomic standoff we may find ourselves engaged in brush wars. The growing naval power of Russia simply improves their capability to fight brush wars."

Must Have Forces

"We must and will have the naval power to meet that threat," Vinson said during a recess in hearings on the navy's proposed \$1,317,000,000 shipbuilding program for the fiscal year starting July 1.

Navy witnesses produced charts yesterday showing how the Soviet Union is far outstripping the United States in the construction of new combat vessels.

"The USSR has more ships in active service in commission than any other navy except our own," Adm. Robert B. Carney, chief of naval operations, said in a statement read to the committee by Adm. Donald B. Duncan, vice chief of naval operations.

Probable Size Told

"While we have no information that the USSR has built or is building aircraft carriers, the number of Soviet naval aircraft is upwards of 3,000," Carney said.

"This weakness in the lack of aircraft carriers is a weakness which we must exploit," Carney said.
