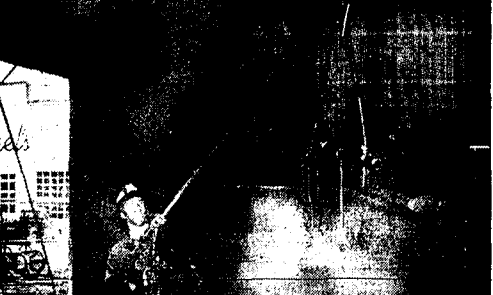

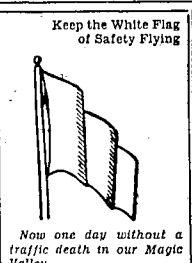

LONDON, March 9.—When William Dalton was a small boy his father took him into the depths of a rat hole and showed him how to match wits with a rat.

It is part of the 348-year family history that young Will got his rat and he has been getting them ever since—alive!

Now a brisk and cheerful 65, Dalton is the nearest thing to a hereditary Wild Piper in these accepted rat holes. What's more, there are 16 other Daltons active and William briefs them nightly in the drafty offices of the clan as Big Ben booms midnight.

Scatter to Work

Then they scatter, sons, brothers, nephews, cousins, to meet again at dawn and recital the adventures of the night over cups of tea. The catch is tallied—living, because the Daltons are rat catchers, not rat killers.

"Make that clear," scowled William. "Anyone, even you, could scatter poisoned potatoes or apples and maybe kill a rat or two. But we Daltons catch our knowledge every night against a rat's inviolable traps, no poison, no dogs, no ferrets."

He raised reverent eyes to the family coat of arms on the wall, the days of Queen Victoria for cleaning the rats out of Buckingham palace.

Shows Pictures

"We been in the profession since 1710," he said. "My ancestors caught live rats for the fighting pits where they used to match rats against ferrets and dogs. The last of the pits was an old print of a dog in hot pursuit of half a dozen rats. The caption read:

"Billy, the celebrated rat killing dog, performing his wonderful feat of killing 100 rats in five minutes and a half, April 22, 1823."

The Daltons send most of the rats to laboratories for experiments.

The Burley office reported that favorable weather conditions have permitted some construction work to get under way. Some early requests for farm hands for work to begin some time after the middle of March are being received.

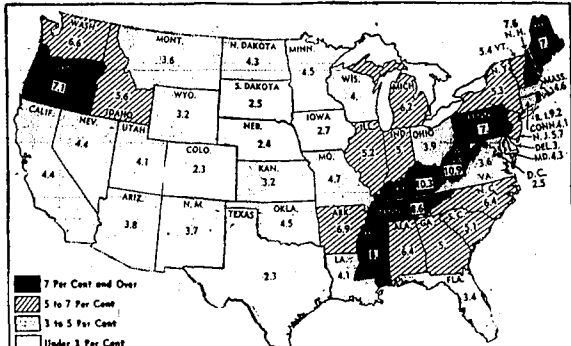

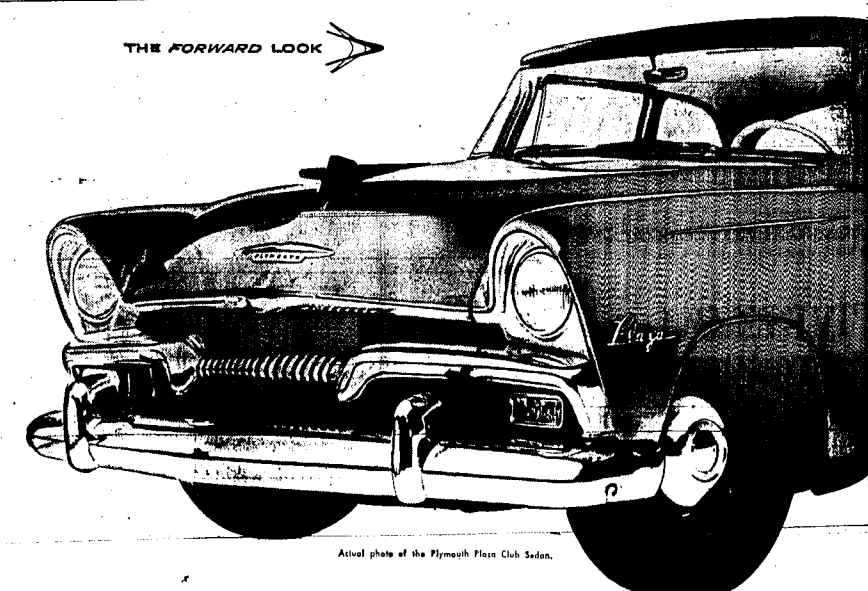

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Federal Tax Chief Gives Details, Data On Deductions, Illness and Dividends

WASHINGTON, March 8 (U.S. Press)—The federal tax law which takes effect when you are sick or injured, and which allows you to deduct from your income the amount of your medical expenses, is being explained by the tax chief in a series of articles.

On the basis of questions which taxpayers have been asking at all parts of the country, I shall try to set the picture straight.

Sickness and Injury

Accident or health insurance payments, and amounts you receive as compensation for your injury or sickness, are exempt from tax.

The new law also permits you to exclude from your income up to \$100 a week of pay you receive while you are sick or injured, if the sickness or injury caused you to be absent from work. But there is a special rule for sickness. The pay you receive for the first week of absence from work cannot be scratched off your total income unless you have been hospitalized at least one day of the absence. The hospitalization does not have to fall within the first week of absence, but sometime within the period of absence from work. This first-week proviso does not apply to absence from work.

The amount you may exclude from your income is limited to the amount your employer continued to pay you for your absent time, but in no case may you exclude more than \$100 a week. Even if you earned \$1,000 a week, you may exclude only \$100 a week.

A few examples:

If you are sick at home for seven days or less, the pay you receive is fully taxable. If you are sick at home for more than seven days, the pay you receive for the time after the first week has run out may be excluded from your income—one-fifth of your weekly pay (but not more than \$20) for each day missed. If you're on a five-day week, one-sixth (but not more than \$16.67) for each day if you're on a six-day week.

If you are hospitalized at least one day of your sickness, you may exclude from income the pay you receive for the entire period of sickness, up to the \$100 a week limit.

If you are absent from work because of injury, your pay for the entire time may be excluded from your income, again, up to the \$100 a week limit.

If you make any exclusion from your income for sickness or injury, be sure to attach a statement to your return explaining the circumstances.

The official descriptions of sickness and injury under the new law have not yet been drawn. If, when they are drawn, it turns out you are entitled to a sick-pay exclusion, you did not claim, you may then claim it and the government will refund your money, plus interest if interest is owed.

On the other hand, if it turns out you were not entitled to exclusion, you did claim, the government will collect, with interest.

Dividends

The 1954 law cut taxes on your income from dividends in two ways. It allowed you to knock off the first \$50 of dividends you received during the year, and it allows you a credit of \$50 against your tax on the dividends above \$50.

Generally speaking, this liberalization applies to dividends paid on the capital stock of U. S. corporations.

It does not include the so-called savings accounts at savings and loan associations, those paid by a mutual life insurance company, nor veterans' administrative payments to veterans who hold GI life insurance policies.

A few examples:

A stockholder received \$40 of dividends last year. He reports this on his tax return, but he does not pay tax on it, because of the \$50 limit.

A stockholder received \$100 of dividends last year. He reports the \$100, but he does not pay tax on the \$50 he excludes. If the second \$50 was paid to him after July 31, 1954, he can take four per cent of it as a credit against his final tax liability.

A man received \$80 in dividends and his wife received \$40. He reports \$80, excludes \$50 and pays tax on \$30, and takes the four per cent credit on the taxed amount if it came after July 31. She reports only \$40, excludes her entire \$40. She may not apply her unused \$10 worth of exclusion to her husband's \$10 over-allowance.

Retirement Pay and Annuities

Provisions for this type of income are somewhat like those for dividends; you need not pay tax on some of it, and you may be able to claim a tax credit for some of the amount you do pay tax on.

You need not be retired to enjoy these tax benefits, but in some cases you must be 65 or older.

Generally speaking, any contributions you made toward a pension plan through the years come back to you tax-free.

On the other hand, if your employer fooled the bill, you are probably taxable for the payments as you receive them now. However, if you paid taxes on the contributions or if you otherwise paid part of the cost, you may now receive tax-free the share you paid in.

Those are the general rules for pension or annuity income for which you are not taxable. The new law also provides new rules for the amounts on which you do pay tax. Under certain conditions, it allows you a credit against your tax. The credit is 20 per cent of your retirement income, up to a maximum of \$240 per person.

To be eligible for this credit, you must have reached 55 by the end of the year unless you were a civilian employee of the federal, or a state or local government, and are receiving income under a public retirement system.

If you are 65 or older, retirement income, for the purpose of computing your tax credit, includes pensions, annuities, interest, dividends and rent. If you are under 65 and are a retired government worker, your only retirement income is that which you receive under a public retirement system. In neither case does retirement income include money you are earning now, and it may be necessary to deduct current earnings in figuring out your retirement credit.

One further qualification: You (or your deceased husband or wife) must have earned more than \$600 in each of any ten years before 1954. The ten years do not have to have been consecutive.

There are two corrections you

must make on the tax form 1040 before you start to calculate a retirement income credit.

On page 4, schedule K: line 2 should read "enter here \$1,200" instead of "enter here amount shown in line 3" or \$1,200, whichever is lesser.

And line 5 should read "balance (line 2 minus line 4)" ("Tomorrow" Our deductions and how to claim them.)

Atomic Cloud Splits, Takes 3-Prong Path

WASHINGTON, March 9 (AP)—Monday's big bang in Nevada produced the craziest and most mixed-up atomic cloud of the spring test series.

It went three ways at once. Meteorologists reported today. Part of it soared east from the proving ground and is now far out over the Atlantic.

Some of it drifted west and got sheared up in the mountain passes of California.

Texas East

Another bit steered northward for a while and then turned east to get dissipated in large areas over northern Nevada, northern Utah and southern Wyoming, and northern Colorado.

Mixed up as it was, there was no real harm in the cloud as far as the people below it were concerned. Neither the atomic energy commission nor the weather bureau has heard any interesting news concerning the cloud.

A few seconds after the explosion at 8:20 a.m. EST Monday, it looked as though the cloud might drop a little rain on the Nevada desert. The scientific and military observers observed more.

That was when a cross wind whipped part of the cloud atomic in their direction. The observers got out of its way in a hurry and no fallout was reported.

As the AEC has explained often, the gadsgets blown up in Nevada don't pack enough power to create a fallout hazard outside the test area.

After some Nevada explosions, there have been reports of radioactive hail or rain and fogged photographic equipment hundreds or thousands of miles from the proving ground.

While the atomic cloud winds have been far too slight to hurt anybody, Monday's cloud apparently didn't contain even a single raindrop anywhere.

Low Water for Jackson Lake Sets No Record, Report Says

While the average water content in the snow in the Jackson lake watershed is low this year, 14.9 percent, there have been other years when the water content has been just about the same or even lower. Lynn Grandall, watermaster for the Snake River Irrigation district, reports.

The shortest year was in 1931 when there were only 7.3 inches of water in the snow. Since 1919, other years have been 1919, 14.4 inches; 1924, 14.7 inches; 1926, 15.3 inches; 1934, 14.1 inches; 1944, 11.7 inches, and 1948, 12.8 inches.

On the Henrys fork drainage, snow depths and water contents are Valley View, 43 inches, 83 percent; River Junction, 39 inches, 81 percent; 62 percent of normal; Big Springs, 62 inches, 16.1 inches, 86 percent of normal; and Island Park, 59 inches, 12.4 inches, 84 percent of normal.

On the Salt river drainage, measurements are Alton ranger station, 19 inches, 41 inches, 85 percent; Grover park divide, 30 inches, 68 percent; CCC camp, 40 inches, 7.8 inches, 74 percent; and Salt river summit, 45 inches, 7.9 inches and 60 percent.

The Greys river drainage measurements are Blind Bull, 62 inches, 13.5 inches, 52 percent of normal; Deadman ranch, 25 inches, 5.3 inches, 52 percent; and Grey's boundary, 38 inches, 7.3 inches and 73 percent.

The Gros Ventre drainage includes Gros Ventre, 42 inches, 9.7 inches and 87 percent of normal; and Yellowjacket, 19 inches of snow, 2.5 inches of water and 58 percent of normal.

Measurements on the Snake river drainage are Moran, 34 inches of snow, 7.8 inches of water, 76 percent of normal; Moran canyon, 58 inches, 12.6 inches, 71 percent; Arizona, 51 inches, 12.5 inches, 81 percent; Buckleberry divide, 54 inches, 13.2 inches, 78 percent; Snake river, 55 inches, 13.8 inches, 80 percent; Lewis lake divide, 97 inches, 26.9 inches, 76 percent; Aster creek, 82 inches, 20.1 inches, 78 percent; Colter creek, 84 inches, 12.4 inches, 69 percent; Glade creek, 60 inches, 14.9 inches, 76 percent; and Snow King mountain, 31 inches, 5.8 inches and 56 percent.

Negro, White Students See No Big Issue

ST. LOUIS, Mo., March 9 (AP)—This borderline city, split down the middle during the Civil war, has integrated white and Negro students in its public high schools with surprising serenity.

School desegregation has now been in effect one month. It came off almost unnoticed in most schools.

There was serious trouble at one institution. A white student was stabbed and beaten in a melee outside Beaumont high on the city's north side.

Superintendent of Instruction Philip J. Hickey blamed the difficulties on "outsiders" in the fairgrounds park area where race riots occurred in the past over the public swimming pool issue.

An assembly of all students was called following the incident and the principles of racial equality were re-explained. Hickey expressed confidence there would be no more trouble if the students are allowed to work out their problems themselves.

Races Join
At Soldan-Blewett high school in the "melting pot" west end, the end of segregation was quite another story.

Conversations with Negro and white students in various schools developed the theme that most of them were surprised at how little friction there has been.

Two Are Injured In Big Explosion

SHELBY, Mont., March 9 (AP)—Two persons escaped death Monday night when a gas explosion ripped into kindling their one-story five-room house.

Police said Ann L. Greenup, about 70, was blown 40 feet into an alley. Her grandson, Jody Polter, was hurled a lesser distance onto the front lawn.

Mrs. Greenup was taken to a Great Falls hospital for treatment of a broken arm, shock and possible internal injuries. The boy suffered a broken leg and is in a Shelby hospital.

Authorities said the house was a "complete shambles."

History Is Made In Octopus Hop

SAN FRANCISCO, March 9 (AP)—A 40-pound octopus named Ariene Mavourneer made history yesterday by being the first octopus to fly across the country.

Accompanied by Dr. Earl S. Herold of San Francisco's Steinhart Aquarium, Ariene Mavourneer made the trip to New York in a plastic bag containing 10 gallons of salt water chilled to 45 degrees.

The bag was sealed and inflated with oxygen, then placed in a fibreglass drum aboard a United Airlines plane.

Ariene Mavourneer will be well-accepted, officially, in New York tomorrow on the National Broadcasting company's home show. She will take up residence at Bronx zoo.

Telecast in Color Eyed for Session

SAN FRANCISCO, March 9 (AP)—The National Broadcasting company may telecast all or part of the 1955 Republic national convention in color.

Davidson Taylor, New York, NBC vice president in charge of public affairs, said it will be possible to obtain the proper lighting in the mammoth Cow palace for colorcasts.

"Whether we go ahead with the plan will depend upon the availability of equipment and the camera locations and the cost," he said.

The convention will be held in August, 1955.

All-Winter Roads Said to Be Open

BOISE, March 9 (AP)—For the first time in many weeks, the state highway department yesterday reported all-winter roads open in Idaho.

But it warned motorists to proceed cautiously on some eastern Idaho highways, which are still soggy with melting snow.

The only roads still closed are mountain passes which the department makes no effort to keep open in winter. A spokesman said these would probably be opened 30 to 45 days early this year because of light snow.

Anslinger told the senate internal security subcommittee that heroin traffic, promoted by the Chinese Reds, is also a "disturbing problem" among U. S. servicemen in the far east, though he said addiction has not increased since 1952 because of airtight defense department controls.
