Hawaii Volcanos Grow as Quakes Hit 2 Per Minute

Hawaii, March 10 (UP)—Rumbling earthquakes Kiluaea volcano area every 30 seconds today. The residents of Pahoa prepared to evacuate their moment's notice. The two-minute quakes have lasted 24 hours, and led Volcanologist Gordon to predict that new volcanic eruptions may be on the Hawaii island.

"In fact, it looks like there's going to be another eruption, but still, the eruptions don't prove it," MacDonald said. The quakes "closely resembled" the rumblings that preceded the eruptions of Monday. The new lava flow is about 25 miles from the Kiluaea crater.

Smoke and steam were still rising from the Puakohi, which built up to a 10-foot wall of steam. Convoy of trucks stood by to carry out the evacuation of Pahoa, if necessary. The new quakes also prevented 200 evacuees from their own coastal hamlets from returning to their homes.

Three hundred evacuees from Kapoho village, which miraculously escaped destruction, probably will be the last to return to their homes. Their own is practically no rift which could explode any time.

Seven days of volcanic activity in the Puua region subsided Sunday night after causing an estimated three million dollars worth of damage to homes and land crops in Hawaii island.

The total area covered by the 20 mile wide lava flow is still undetermined, but it was estimated that 2,000 acres of sugarcane were either inundated by lava or browned by ash.

The main flow, which spread lava over an area almost three miles long and as much as one mile wide in some places, stopped last night. The total forest about 200 feet from the ocean.

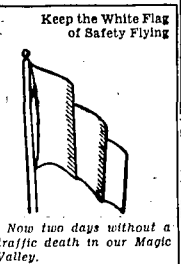

If Princess Weds Townsend, Queen Could Not Attend Rites

LONDON, March 10 (AP)—Should Princess Margaret marry Group Captain Peter Townsend, it is almost certain that her sister, Queen Elizabeth II, would not attend the wedding.

It is also probable that the 24-year-old Margaret will have to wait almost a year and a half longer if the marriage is consummated. The 40-year-old divorcee, stationed in Brussels as British air attaché since 1933, has decided to wed.

Whether Margaret wants to marry Townsend only she can say—and she has been silent.

Sections of the London press are speculating again on the romance. This much is known: Margaret did have a deep affection for Townsend when he was an equerry at Buckingham palace. She is a strong-willed girl. She is not in love with anyone else.

But while the rumors fly, one thing remains certain and unchanged: That is the religious aspect of a marriage between the princess and a man who has been through the divorce court.

Townsend was the innocent party. He won custody of his two children. But in the eyes of the established Protestant Church of England he cannot be married again so long as his former wife lives.

Elizabeth, at her coronation, took an oath as defender of the faith, head of the Church of England. She, above all, must uphold the canons of the church. So although she is very close to her sister and may sympathize with her privately, she may not—as queen—sanction such a marriage.

The royal marriage act of parliament provides that Margaret cannot marry without the queen's consent. But there is a loophole. Margaret can, under the act, wait until her 25th birthday next August, and then give 12 months' notice to parliament that she wishes to marry in her own right. That would mean the princess could not be married legally until she was 26, in August, 1936.

Water Death For Columbia Basin Feared

BOISE, March 10 (AP)—The soil conservation service and weather bureau warned yesterday that a dry spring could create critical water shortages in some areas of the Columbia river basin.

A moist spring, they added in their monthly snow report, "could alleviate many of these shortage problems."

With the mountain snow pack far below normal—particularly in the northern section, they recommended that plans be made for conserving water in case shortages developed.

Below Average Reported

The northern portion of the basin in the Pacific Northwest is average, while all the major rivers to the south—in Idaho, western Montana, Oregon, Washington and southeastern Oregon—are expected to flow only 40 to 65 per cent of normal average.

Mountain snow was about normal in February, but failed to make up for shortages built up in the preceding months, they said.

With only two or three weeks left, it added, the chances of significant improvement in water supply are low.

Now May Help

The unusually heavy snow at the Snake river and the tributaries of the soil, it said, and makes any subsequent rainfall more effective. Reservoir storage ranged from fair to good in the southern watershed.

The report rated snow cover on the Snake river and the tributaries at the following percentages of average: Above Jackson lake, 70; Jackson lake to Hise, 65; Hise to American Falls, 60; southern tributaries, 68; Big Lost Lake, 47; Big Wood river, 44; Boise, 52; Owyhee, 67; Payette, 54, and Malheur, 72.

Flier Down in Primitive Area

BOISE, March 10 (AP)—Veteran bush pilot Bill Woods crashed-landed on a frozen gravel bar in the middle fork of the Salmon river yesterday, and another Boise flier swooped towards the scene after aerial searches failed.

State Aeronautics Director Chet Moulton said it was believed Woods may have landed on a log in the Indian creek landing strip.

Moulton and other fliers, including a pilot from the Boise Army Airfield, scanned the area from the air. Moulton said Woods could have landed on a log in the Indian creek landing strip.

Woods was flying supplies to the Flying B ranch near the developed engine trouble. He radioed that he was making an emergency landing about 110 miles northwest of Boise.

Woods radioed later that he was not hurt, and the plane which was flying over the area, the plane was not badly damaged.

Broker Slaps Cash Plan for Stock Market

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—The world's biggest broker disagreed sharply yesterday with a recommendation that stock buying be put on an all-cash basis.

Such a step, Winthrop H. Smith told the senate banking committee, would "dry up the market" and block the issuance of new securities.

Smith is the managing partner of the far-flung brokerage firm of Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner and Smith.

As to whether stock prices in general have gone too high, Smith said he doesn't know, adding, "And I don't believe anybody knows."

"Whether there is too much speculation in the stock market, Smith said, is a matter of opinion.

Cash Basis Urged

"I don't grant yet that there is too much," he said.

The suggestion that the federal reserve board take steps to put the stock market on a "100 per cent margin" basis, meaning the buyer must put up all cash, came Tuesday from John Kenneth Galbraith, professor of economics at Harvard university.

Would "Prevent" Bust

Galbraith, an historian on the 1929 stock market crash, said he believed a "precautionary measure" to prevent a similar bust at the end of the present boom would be a good idea.

Smith said he doubted very much that the committee hearings of Galbraith's testimony had anything to do with Tuesday's sharp decline in market prices.

Confidence Important

"Some days it sells up," Smith commented. "Some days it sells down. What made it sell off yesterday, I don't know."

He told the committee that "confidence is the all important factor which moves a person who has money to invest to take action if he believes that sound values are available."

"This confidence in our future growth and in the stability of the economy seems to have increased," he commented.

Ohio Man Drowns As Elevator Falls

CINCINNATI, March 10 (AP)—The first death in the Cincinnati area as a direct result of the nine-day-old Ohio river flood occurred yesterday when a man drowned here in a submerged elevator.

He was Trenton Harlow, Jr., 27, who, fellow workers said, lowered a freight elevator into a warehouse while checking the depth of the overflow. The elevator failed to stop when it reached the water level.

Parley Eyes SCS District In Minidoka

RUPERT, March 10—A meeting to secure information regarding the organization of a soil conservation district in Minidoka county was held Tuesday at the courthouse with O. Youngstrom, Boise, secretary of the state soil conservation service, presiding.

Various northside farmers gave evidence in favor of the formation of the northside district but opponents to the plan objected on the grounds of expense to farmers and the fact that now they are getting good service from the Minidoka county agent's office.

The minutes of the Tuesday meeting will be reviewed by the state SCS to determine if enough interest has been shown to merit forming a district. If enough interest was shown an election to that objective will be held with at least a 50 per cent majority needed to carry the measure.

The district would include all of the county except the village of Minidoka and the gravelly section.

Among the 46 persons attending the meeting were R. N. Irving, Boise, state supervisor of the SCS; Lester Jones, Twin Falls, district supervisor; L. Spence, Boise, extension service conservationist; and William Young, manager of Burley PMA office.

Bids Asked in School Work For Minidoka

WENDELL, March 10—Bids were called for Tuesday by the Minidoka county school board for the remodeling of the Rupert and Paul schools. The bids will be opened at 8 p.m. April 19 at the school office.

The work at the Rupert high school calls for adding 20-foot extensions to the gymnasium and auditorium and the installation of rest rooms and a steel fire escape. The school, which will house the upper elementary grades after the erection of the central high school, will be renamed Washington school.

Remodeling plans for the Paul school call for extensive reflooring, installation of two showers and locker rooms, a stairway, rewiring the lunch room and moving partitions to make three classrooms out of a present set of four rooms. Bids also were asked on laboratory and home economics equipment for the new high school.

The coaching jobs in the various high schools were declared non-existent by the board inasmuch as the high schools will cease to operate with the opening of the central high school.

Two football coaches and two basketball coaches, all on an equal status with the principal, would handle the track team.

The board accepted the resignation of Sherman Fox as principal of the Pershing school. He will remain as a fulltime teacher. Teaching contracts will be let in the near future and the board has no intention that religious background will not be a factor in the hiring of teachers.

China Leader Won't Change Formosa Plan

LONDON, March 10—Chinese Communist Premier Chou En-Lai is pictured today by authoritative diplomatic sources as totally unyielding on his determination to attack Formosa despite the grave danger of war.

The outbreak for a cease-fire was described as "bleak."

The diplomatic sources said Chou could hardly have turned down all appeals for a negotiated Formosan settlement, and has rebuffed third party mediation efforts by Britain, the U.S. and Moscow as interference.

Sources quoted Chou as saying: "The Chinese are not 'flexibly uncompromising' and 'seemingly unyielding' to negotiate at all."

This is the grim story behind the terse statements by the Chinese Communist Premier Tuesday by Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden that the necessary conditions for a cease-fire for solving the Formosa conflict through a conference or other discussions.

Eden said he had maintained contacts on this problem with Moscow as well as with Peking, and it was learned that only last Friday British charge d'affaires in Peking, Humphrey Trevelyan, conferred with Chou. It was understood that the visit discouraged hopes for negotiation.

Meeting Declined

The sources said the communists firmly declined any meeting on the Formosa crisis in which Nationalist China would be represented. This is one of the west's conditions for a conference, and there was no indication Chou is ready to change his mood.

The sources said Peking is also not prepared for any formal or informal commitment on a cease-fire. In the light of this attitude, Indian Premier Jawaharlal Nehru was said to be biding his time in trying to persuade Peking to compromise.

hardship on an individual or family, the Red Cross makes a grant.

Answering the question whether Red Cross disaster services duplicates government aid, Mrs. Mather says the government and the Red Cross have separate functions in disaster relief—and each pays its own way.

Why does the Red Cross consider it desirable and necessary to conduct a separate fund campaign?

Mrs. Mather says that the Red Cross, unlike any other voluntary welfare organization, has a congressional charter that is not merely a license to operate, but a legislative statement of definite responsibilities to the American people. Two of these responsibilities, she says, are to raise funds and to distribute them in national in scope and emergency in nature.

Funds to finance these national activities are derived from local sources. Control of the Red Cross budget by local fund raising groups outside the Red Cross would destroy the financial flexibility required to operate the Red Cross national programs.

Mrs. Mather concludes by stating that the current drive will be ended this week. "Sunday is Red Cross Sunday, which will be observed nationally, and it is our aim to have our door-to-door solicitations completed by that time. We won't harp on people longer or more often than absolutely necessary," she says.

Persons also say that the Red Cross won't give help in disaster to those who have jobs or own their own homes. This is not true, Mrs. Mather says. Employment or ownership of property does not prevent the Red Cross from assisting an applicant. If meeting his disaster-caused needs without aid would work undue

Bodies Taken From Area of Plane Wreck

MARCOCA, Mexico, March 9—Authorities reported today the 25 bodies of Mexican worst plane crash were burned beyond recognition and that it probably would take days to identify them.

(The Mexico City newspaper Ullima—Noticias—speculated the plane crash may have resulted from sabotage or military abort) by four Mexican "dangerous forgers and drug traffickers" being flown to Cuudajuarsa for trial.

The bodies, including those of four Californians, were brought down last night from fire blackened El Cebro, a 9,000-foot peak of the Western Sierra Madre near Mexico's west coast.

28 People Killed

The 23 passengers and three crew members were killed Tuesday afternoon when a twin-engine Mexican airliner crashed into the peak and exploded 20 minutes after it left the coastal resort town of Puerto Vallarta.

Two rescue crews, hampered by brush fires started by flaming gasoline, took more than 15 hours to reach the scene and bring the bodies to this village 12 miles away. They reported the bodies and the wreckage scattered over a wide area.

Not All Identified

A spokesman for the airline said the "identifications" were "not yet official." District Attorney Javier Michel Vera said it probably would take days to complete the official identifications.

Bodies of the four Americans probably will be returned to California for burial, the officials said.

Tape Records Sounds; Jobs In New Ways

NEW YORK, March 10 (AP)—This is a tale of tape—a new kind of tape that's beginning to take the measure of us all.

Babies cry for it. They also laugh, grow, gurgle, and burp for it. And it laughs, gurgles, and burps for them. Like a perpetual sound-mirror, it will hold those baby-talk sounds forever. It's called "magnetic tape" and it's being used in a new way.

Machines move at its beck. Tapped telephones spill secrets onto it. Autopsy surgeons deliver into it causes of death speak their notes onto it. While their hands keep on the job, husbands slurping their morning coffee find muffled wives hurling heavy hubby-stories at them from the night before, from this same all-encompassing tape.

Some mothers even record their children's tantrums on it. Later they play them back so the children can hear how ridiculous they sounded.

The magnetic tape industry—and recording in general—could itself be about seven years old. But it's growing like a giant.

There are some 1,500,000 tape recorders in America today. Home entertainment is the biggest use for the device right now. Educational use is second.

Sales Boom

A source within the industry said sales of tape recorders in 1942 were 25 million dollars last year. He said they should hit 135 million dollars within a year. The Wall Street Journal says sales of all types of tape recorders, plus tapes, totaled about 80 million dollars last year, up 20 million dollars from 1933 and nearly double the volume of 1932.

Tape also picks up information in guided missiles and sends it back to earth, records the sounds of heart disorders, helps search for oil by recording vibrations from explosions, gives doctors a better view of the arteries as they drive their cars on long calls, stores information for the new brain-like electronic calculator.

The tape used in all this is a thin plastic strip coated with iron oxide powder emulsion. Sound waves etched on the recorder are changed to electric pulses that remain as a magnetic pattern in the iron. The sound will stay there until a degree of quality unless the tape is brought near a strong magnetic field that will wipe out the pattern.

Internal Revenue Commissioner Tells How to Claim All Deductions Allowed

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—May I take a deduction for my loss on less damaged by fire? How do I report deductions for medicine? How do I compute deductions for interest on my child's mortgage? How much credit am I entitled to for interest on the TV set I am buying by installments? These are the questions you should ask about the standard deduction and item-by-item deductions.

These and others are questions taxpayers have been asking at internal revenue service offices this year. Many of the rules for deductions were changed in the 1943 overhaul of the federal tax code, so you will be wise to give attention to the allowances which are available to you.

The new law makes no change in the standard deduction. This standard deduction allows you approximately ten per cent of your income for such things as charitable contributions, interest on state and city taxes—even if you did not spend that much of your income for those purposes.

The standard deduction in no case permits you to deduct more than \$1,900 for these items. In some cases, less than \$1,900. For example, taxpayers who file a return on the card form 1040A or the short form 1040 automatically deduct their medical and dental contributions and expenses more than the standard deduction allows, your best deduction will be the amount provided on page 3 of the long form 1040. Listing your deductions item-by-item removes you from the automatic deduction and makes you subject to more liberal limitations.

Medical expense deduction top limit questions which taxpayers ask year after year. The new law gives taxpayers a bigger break than before in this category, as in most others.

Basically, you are now allowed to deduct medical and dental expenses if they run higher than three per cent of your adjusted gross income. That first three per cent portion, but you do deduct the amount above that.

There's an important exception to this: If you are 65 or older, you may deduct all your medical expenses.

There is an upper limit, too. Married couples filing a joint return may not deduct more than \$5,000 for medical and dental costs in one year; not more than \$7,500 if they have one dependent; and not more than \$10,000 if they have two or more dependents.

Medical and dental expenses include such things as: Payments to physicians, surgeons, dentists, optometrists, qualified psychologists and Christian Science practitioners; diagnosis, treatment, prevention of a disease; hospital expenses, nursing, laboratory services; eyeglasses, hearing aids, drugs; to the extent you pay out more than one per cent of your income for your total drug purchases; medical and dental supplies (including artificial teeth and limbs); ambulance hire; and health insurance plans which cover the cost of medical care.

Note: If you receive payments from a health insurance plan, or are otherwise repaid for your medical and dental expenses, your deduction for these expenses is reduced accordingly.

Hurricanes Carol, Edna and Hazel of last year have prompted a tremendous number of questions about deductions for losses.

First of all, the amount to deduct for such losses is a difficult thing to calculate. Secondly, remember to

reduce your deduction claim by any amount of insurance you receive on the loss.

Generally, the deduction you may claim for hurricane damage to your property is the difference between the value of your whole property immediately before the storm and its value immediately after the storm (before you clean it up).

The cost of repair or replacement is not a factor. Nor is sentimental value. And the loss to be claimed may not exceed the cost of the property.

The final deductible item I shall deal with is interest—the interest you pay on a mortgage, on an installment plan purchase, on a personal loan, or on back taxes.

In most of these cases, the interest is clearly designated and easily reported.

In the case of many purchases on the installment plan, however, there is no interest fee, as such, but it is part of the so-called carrying charge.

The new law tells you how to figure interest in such a situation: Calculate how much you still owe on your purchase at the beginning of each month; add three amounts: divide by 12; take six per cent of the answer and report it as interest. But the deduction, thus calculated, may not exceed the total carrying charge for the whole year.

One thing to remember on all these deductible items: You may not claim them unless you list all your deductions, one-by-one; you may not claim them if you take the standard deduction or if you file your return on form 1040A or short form 1040.

Your instruction booklet has a list of typical deductible items for husbands and wives.)

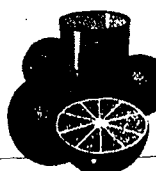

The rare otter is far from abundant anywhere in the United States, but has been increasing well along some Idaho streams, indicating that under proper management this species can continue to produce a substantial annual crop of superior fur.

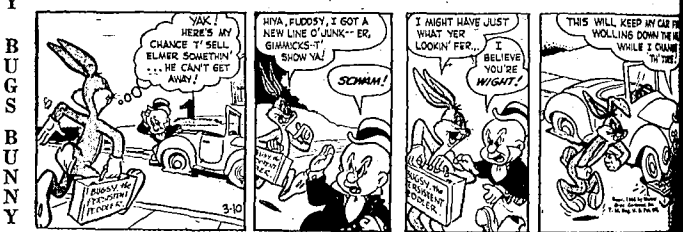
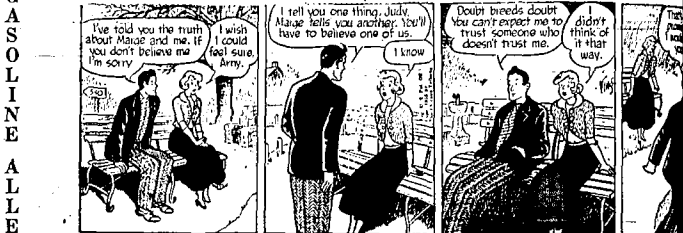

WASHINGTON, March 10 (AP)—An American-British-French conference in Washington on Indochina was reported in the works yesterday. March 28 was mentioned as the possible starting date.

The meeting would seek primarily to eliminate big three policy on scheduled elections to unify Indochina.

High Level Talks It was considered unlikely—that the parley would require the presence of British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault.

One major question is a strong difference of view between the United States and France over French efforts to reach economic agreement with the communist rulers of North Viet Nam.

Secretary of State Dulles, it was reported, took French representative Henri Bonnet to task at Bangkok, Thailand, on the issue. Dulles said he is informed that Bonnet went this way.

Red Leader Ho Chi Minh is having considerable economic problems in North Viet Nam.

Yet the French, through a quantitative commission, are negotiating with Ho for a business-administrative operation of French holdings in territory taken over by the communist.

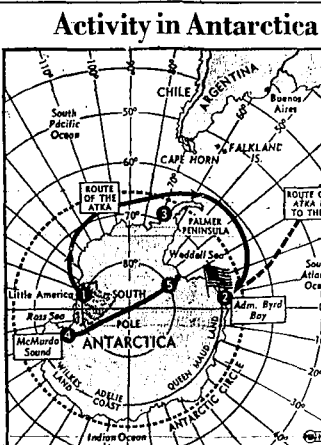

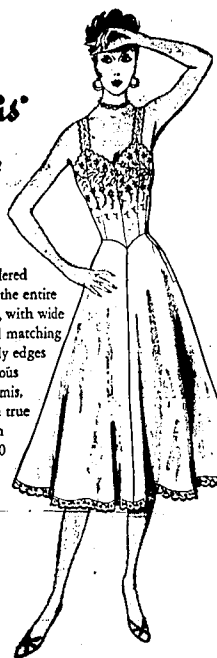

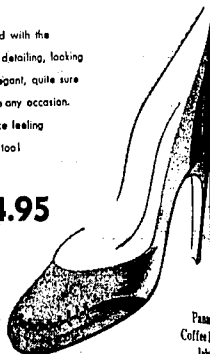
