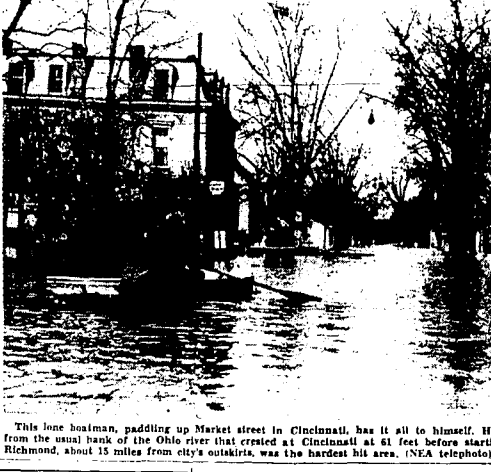

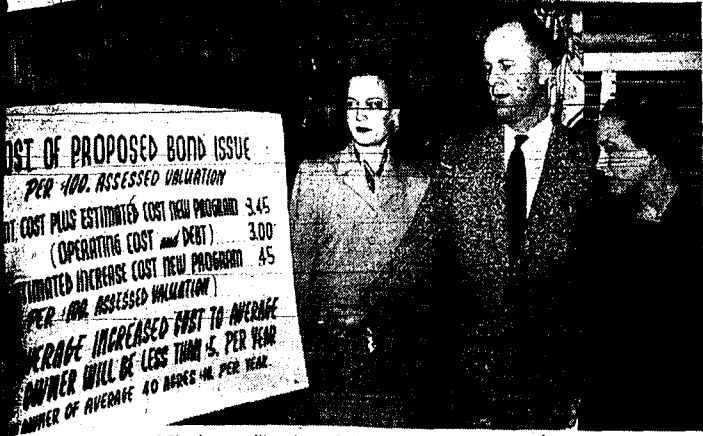

# More Vessels Set In Grain Storage

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—The government has obtained an additional 105 freighters from the maritime fleet for emergency storage of 24 million bushels of grain in the Pacific northwest. The agriculture department said today that 78 of the vessels will be docked at Astoria, Ore., and 30 will be based at Olympia, Wash. The government already has 20 million bushels of wheat stored in 87 ships at Astoria and 10 million bushels in 43 ships at Olympia. There is an urgent need for the additional ships because the government soon must start taking over surplus wheat from the 1954 crop.

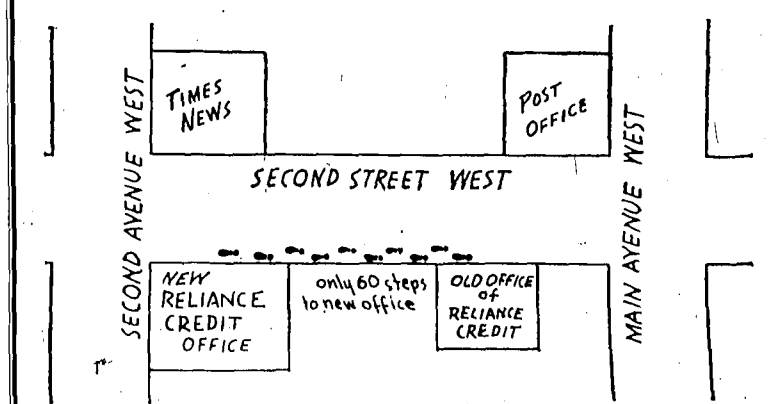

### Admiral Says Ike Has Final Word in War

TOKYO, March 11 (U.P.)—Admiral Felix S. Stump, Pacific fleet commander, said today U. S. forces were ready to defend Quemoy and the Matsu Islands but only on order from President Eisenhower.

Stump told a news conference he did not believe a new conference would be held in Washington. He said he wanted a major war at this time and "I don't believe they will start one."

"And we won't start one — and neither will our allies," he said.

Asked if the situation in Formosa Strait was dangerous, Stump said "whether this is a dangerous period or not depends on decisions made in Washington."

The admiral returns to his Pearl Harbor headquarters tonight after a first-hand look at the Matsu, Nan-Shan and other islands within sight of the communist mainland. He also conferred with President Chiang Kai-shek on Formosa.

Stump said the Chinese fleet was ready to defend Quemoy and the Matsu Islands. He said he would not be surprised if the communists were going to strike — to the aggressors," Stump said. "The communist buildup on the mainland opposite Quemoy and the Matsu is 'not too expensive,' he added.

Stump said the Chinese nationalists had reinforced their garrison on the Matsu. "I was favorably impressed with the quality of the troops on the Matsu and what they are doing," Stump said.

He said he considered the islands defensible without use of nuclear weapons, but added: "We have the capability of atom-bombing them, but we don't tell where they are stored."

The talks were between Garrett officials and representatives of local 222 of the AFL Teamsters union, which the office workers joined last September.

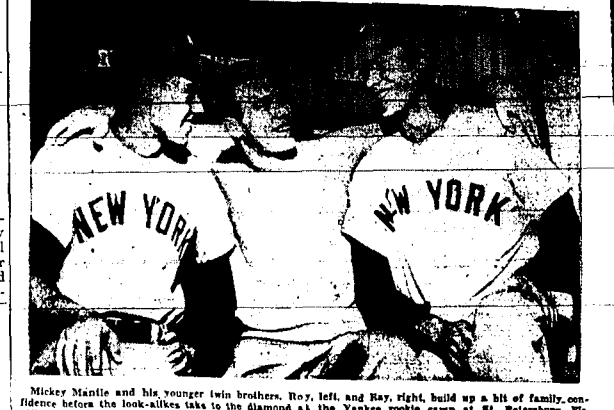

## Tax Commission Chief Analyzes Pros And Cons of Joint Income Return File

WASHINGTON, March 11 (AP)—A perennial question among taxpayers is whether to file a joint return with a spouse, or separate returns.

The standard answer is: Figure out how much each would owe both ways. File your return and pay your tax by the method which costs you less. Joint filing is generally it.

You may file jointly on any of the three forms for individual income tax returns: card form 1042A, short form 1040; or long form 1040.

If you and your wife filed separate returns last year, there is no bar to your filing jointly this year. Similarly, if you filed jointly last year, that does not mean you must always file jointly.

There are a few situations in which you may not file a joint return, but they apply only to a relatively small number of married couples. You may not file jointly: if you were divorced or legally separated on or before Dec. 31; if you are married to a non-citizen who does not live in this country; or if you and your wife report your income on the basis of different taxable years.

There are other prohibitions which

I shall come to. But first, the argument for filing jointly. When you file a joint return, you add both the husband's and the wife's income—minus deductions and exemptions—into a single total in which you pay the tax. The tax you pay in this way is generally less than you would pay if you filed separate returns and paid the full rate on the husband's income and the full rate on the wife's. This is particularly true where the wife has little or no income.

Yes, you may file a joint return and use its income-splitting provisions even if your wife had no income at all.

If she had income of \$1 to \$599.99 last year and wants the refund to go to you, you may file a separate return as a claim for that refund. But you would do that only if you were sure you would be better off than filing jointly.

If your wife does have income and files a separate return, you may not claim her as an exemption on your return. Nor may you claim

her as an exemption if someone else is claiming her as one—such as if you are in the service and she is living (and being supported) by her father.

When you do file a joint return, it must be joint all the way to the bottom of the page. That is to say, you must sign the return in the spaces provided for their signatures (even if the wife had no income).

If you and your wife file separately, and one of you itemizes all your deductions, the other must also itemize. It is not permissible for one to take the standard deduction and the other to list deductions one-by-one.

Marriage on New Year's eve is just as good as marriage in June for tax purposes. Regardless of when you were married during 1937, you may consider yourselves to have been husband and wife for the full year, and you may file a joint return.

Where does one file a return? With the director of internal revenue for the district in which he lives.

When? By midnight April 15. When will you get your refund? As soon as your return can be checked and your refund check mailed to you. But the sooner your refund will arrive, if you are entitled to one, because your internal revenue service treats all taxpayers alike which means as to refunds, "first come, first served."
