Home Tax Cuts Arguments Rage; To Set Tuesday

BOISE, March 14 (UP)—Democrats and Republicans are engaged in a fresh barrage of arguments for and against a new income tax cut today.

The Treasury Department has issued a tentative plan for a \$20-10 tax cut as "unwise" because it would hurt the "little people" and talk so much about "the big business" as to cause a loss of confidence in the nation's economy.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D., Minn., and Eisenhower administration spokesmen are also engaged in a legislative battle.

Gem Bills Are Inked By Smylie

BOISE, March 14 (UP)—Gov. Robert E. Smylie today signed 15 bills approved by the 33rd legislature, including those to reduce the state tax on boxing and wrestling events from 10 to five per cent and to establish a 75-cent-an-hour minimum wage law.

Other measures which received the governor's signature today are:

1. To impose a service charge for handling special state funds.
2. To transfer the old state home from the state hospitals board to the veterans welfare commission.
3. To allow the state board of health to remove effective.
4. To raise to two cents the advertising fee on potatoes and onions.
5. To make it mandatory that a driver prove financial responsibility after an accident before he could receive a license.
6. To allow temporary restricted driving permits for those drivers whose licenses are suspended but who need their car in their business.

Australia and U.S. Meet on Asiatic Issues

WASHINGTON, March 14 (UP)—The United States and Australia held talks today to discuss Asiatic issues. The talks were held in the State Department and were attended by Australian Prime Minister Ben Chifley and U.S. Secretary of State A. J. Acheson.

The talks centered on the question of the Quemoy and Matsu islands in the Taiwan Strait. The United States has a military base on these islands and has promised to defend them. Australia has expressed interest in the islands because of their strategic importance.

Abolishment of U.S. Loan Offices Asked

WASHINGTON, March 14 (UP)—The Hoover commission recommended today that many of the government's 104 lending and insuring agencies be abolished or forced to support themselves under the free enterprise system.

These and other proposed actions—the commission said—would result eventually in return to the treasury of capital funds totaling \$6,217,943,000. And, it added, they would free additional possible future treasury investments totaling \$1,110,000,000.

Soviet Atomic Blasts Cause Japan Fallout

TOKYO, March 14 (UP)—A Japanese scientist reported today that radioactive rain which fell in Japan last fall resulted from Russian atomic tests held in Siberia at a time a typhoon moved over the ocean and a cold air layer moved across Japan from the north.

Dr. Haruo Miyake of the weather research institute said weather observation data proved the radioactive rain which fell in Japan in mid-September and late October.

He said that an analysis showed the radioactivity particles in the rain were of the same type as those of atomic tests held in Siberia.

Nationalists Insist Tanker 'Aruba' Be Seized, Destroyed

TAIPEI, Formosa, March 14 (UP)—Nationalist newspapers demanded today the Finnish tanker Aruba be sunk if the navy is unable to seize it before it can deliver 13,000 tons of jet plane fuel to Red China.

The pro-government United Daily News urged seizure "even if it may cost us something" but demanded the tanker be sunk if the communists protected it with military force.

Volcanic Explosion Rocks Hawaii Area

PAHOA, Hawaii, March 14 (UP)—A new eruption in the Kilauea volcano field exploded yesterday, before the startled eyes of newsmen and photographers on a tour of the area. The spectacular explosion and lava flow came as volcanologist Gordon MacDonald was briefing newsmen on eruptions which have terrified residents of this area recently.

Report Says Bulk of Fund Goes to Asia

WASHINGTON, March 14 (UP)—President Eisenhower reported to congress today that the United States has set up a \$3-billion fund to help foreign nations economically.

The report said that the bulk of the fund would go to Asia, particularly to the Philippines, Indonesia, and the South China Sea area.

Russ Gunman Forces Entry Into Embassy

MOSCOW, March 14 (UP)—A Russian gunman shot his way into the British embassy last night, seriously wounding a Russian police guard who tried to stop him.

The gun-farmer Russian intruder was captured and taken to the embassy where he was held for several hours. He was then released and taken to a hospital.

Sailors Die in Rescue Work On High Seas

TARANTO, Italy, March 14 (UP)—Twenty-four seamen were feared drowned today in a rescue operation in which a Greek tanker sank off southern Italy and a British lifeboat capsized while pulling survivors.

The British Peninsular and Oriental steamship Stratheden picked up the lifeboat and rescued 42 men, including a lifeboat crew member.

Charges Filed After Jerome Auto Crashes

A 1955 Chrysler was damaged to the extent of \$700 and its driver charged with negligent driving when it crashed into a car on highway 74 two miles south and 60 miles west of Twin Falls, Saturday night.

The driver, a 32-year-old man, was charged with negligent driving and was held in jail for 24 hours.

Danger Cited For Nation in Stock Fever

WASHINGTON, March 14 (UP)—The chairman of the federal reserve board today said the nation is in danger because of the current stock market boom.

He said that the stock market is moving at a rapid pace and that this could lead to a sharp decline in the near future.

Storms Off for Valley

When the friend returned to the sheep camp he found Javo with the chest. Sheriff Anderson said the 25-35 caliber bullet had entered Javo's chest near the heart, missed the right lung and struck out Javo's back. Javo was taken to the hospital and the sheriff notified.

and commitments such as mortgage and bank deposit insurance totaled \$14,272,315.00 last June 30—nearly counting hidden subsidies which the commission said should be disclosed.
The commission specifically recommended liquidation of programs involving 12 production credit corporations, the agricultural market act revolving fund, the federal farm mortgage corp., and loans for college housing.
It also recommended self-supporting status for the federal housing administration, federal intermediate credit banks, banks for cooperative credit, the interest of administrative efficiency and economy, the commission urged that the REA, the small business administration, veterans life insurance, and the housing and home finance agency be brought under the government corporation control act.
It also recommended that the export-import bank be restricted to making long-term export loans for the development of foreign resources and that changes be made in the farm price support program to cut down the cost to the government.

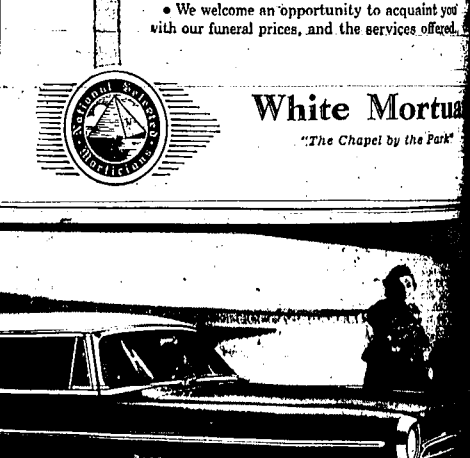

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG POT SHOTS

WASHINGTON—Winston Churchill's eloquent appraisal of the world's postwar situation is a sobering reminder that the United States refuses to enter into full partnership with Britain in this field. Therefore, reduction to diplomatic advice from London will develop the A and H bombs and new-style delivery planes at a vast expenditure of money and scientific effort—and duplication.

Only the fear of endangering the Anglo-American alliance according to Congressional opinion from London, prevented the prime minister from betraying his disappointment about bitterness over the continued lack of American co-operation in dog-in-the-manger attitude, he reminded his people that only our atomic superiority had kept Russia from overrunning Western Europe at any time since World War II.

But British sources make clear that Churchill is not so unscrupulous a villain as his World War II friend, President Eisenhower. In fact, it is understood that he may make a special trip to Washington for a final and personal entreaty at the White House to adopt a program that will ask his country's resources.

HOW THINGS APPEAR FROM PEGLER'S ANGLE

We Americans lately have been confronted with an arrogant proposition that persons professing to be themselves intellectuals, and particularly those who call themselves scientists, are a superior cut above the rest of humanity. They are called scientists by the press, and even some of the men from the communitia. The "scientist" is endorsed for special privilege under a new set of moral laws and public rules of personal conduct which are binding on us inferior.

The case of J. Robert Oppenheimer, invariably described as "doctor," is forwarded at this time. It is an aggravated example of this impudence. This man was a liar under the most formal conditions. He was by choice a friend and associate of a Communist. He married one and she was so partial to his loathsome persuasion that she attacked up with another female of the species. And when he was exposed he proved to be, under punishment, a whitener.

CONGRESSIONAL OPPOSITION—It is congress rather than the White House, which however, opposes any integrated and co-operative arrangement with Britain in the atomic realm. In unofficial discussions, members of the House and Senate have declared that the British should be let in on our secret developments only in event of war. Eisenhower dare not back this sentiment.

CALLS FOR ANOTHER MEETING—Prime Minister Churchill's mediation of the A-H-bomb agreement on possible use of the A or H-bomb also seems to necessitate a meeting between the British statesmen and President Eisenhower. Labor members of parliament and certain capitol hill legislators think that this question should be clarified first, it cause misapprehension among other allies and neutrals like India.

SECOND TERM PRESSURE

Now that President Eisenhower is getting used to the beds at his Gettysburg farm, some Republican partisans are losing a little of their assurance that he will run for another term next year.

And the White House correspondents, who never let the subject rest anyway, find that this farm business gives them a fresh angle from which to play their probing game.

Mr. Eisenhower recently tried to fend them off for a while by proposing that they "make their inquiries until about this time in 1956. There are no more likely to be his plea than he is to answer their big question.

Meanwhile, it's perhaps useful to see what modern history shows on this matter of presidents seeking second terms.

Since 1880 we have had 17 Presidents, not including Mr. Eisenhower. Two—Garfield and Harding—died before completing their first terms, and so never faced a decision about a second.

Out of the remaining 15, a total of 13 either were elected for two terms, served part of a second term, or tried to win a second nomination or election.

The only two who do not fall into these categories are Andrew Johnson and Rutherford B. Hayes. Hayes, who was elected in 1876, simply refused to stand again in 1880. Johnson, a Democrat who succeeded to the presidency upon the death of Lincoln, never got any consideration from his party in 1868. He was under a cloud because of his narrow acquittal that year on impeachment charges.

Thus, with the exception of these two men, everyone who has occupied the White House in the past 75 years has either served more than the basic four-year term or tried to try.

This history undoubtedly measures several things. It's a gauge of the ambitions of men. It measures the nature of the job, which seems to repel many men at the outset, and then slowly to win them, until finally they become convinced that the carrying on of "useful" national programs is safest in their own hands. And it measures, too, the pressures that build up to continue a popular President in office as the keystone of party success.

Those who know Mr. Eisenhower well say ambition never will bite him. And they doubt that mere party arguments will persuade him. What they count on is convincing him that it is necessary to the country's welfare, especially to its quest for lasting peace.

The point may not be easy to put across. He doesn't believe the men. But the record of history is impressive. The pressures and influences that take a man beyond a single term are surely powerful. And they will be working full tilt on President Eisenhower between now and the spring of 1956.

WILSON'S CONFERENCES

Defense Secretary Charles E. Wilson continues to have the liveliest press conference among cabinet officers.

Endangered by reporters on the possibility of resigning from his top job in the Pentagon, someone asked Wilson if it would take an act of God to get him out of office. He replied:

"People blame God for a lot of things. Don't blame that on Him."

When pressed for comment on Army Chief of Staff General Matthew B. Ridgway's opposition to proposed cuts in the size of the army, Wilson observed:

"Now don't forget that I have a boss who knows something about the army too."

The secretary was then asked whether the department of defense planned to rent land on which the army would hold its maneuvers. He admitted this was under study and explained:

"You get into complicated problems because you're always breaking down a fence and letting the bulls into the wrong field—or something."

Reporters' guttural cut off any further amplification of that remark.

WEIRD VIRTUE

Word comes that Douglas Stringfellow, the ex-congressman of Utah who confessed last year he had faked a glaucoma war record, is now lecturing on morals.

We haven't heard how he's doing, or what kind of audiences he's drawing. But it wouldn't be surprising to learn that he's getting good crowds. Americans have a peculiar fondness for people who are wrong before they are right.

We would be quite chastened, however, if we were ever to hear that Harvey Matusow, the self-confessed "ex-communist" liar, had managed to make one more dollar on the lecture platform. He found being wrong so exciting and attention-getting that he eventually decided to make it a permanent way of life. But it is doubtful that he merits the spotlight every time he confesses a new batch of sins.

It's one thing to forgive error, as Americans may be doing when they listen to Stringfellow. It's another to endorse it with a kind of weird virtue by following a man like Matusow with pencil and pad as he makes his outlandish trips to the confessional.

It isn't unusual at all for a youngster to step into his dad's shoes when the old man gets tired of them.

Refugees said the threat of famine is worst in the region south of Haiphong once one of the main "rice bowls" of the far east.

They said that at Phat Diem peasants are getting only one meal a day from communist political officials who already have reduced the monthly rice ration from 15 to 12 kilograms. (A kilogram equals 2.205 pounds.)

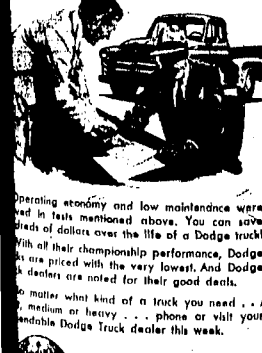

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)— "I am warning to all squirrels—stay away from President Eisenhower's private putting green on the White House lawn or you'll find yourself away from the president's private putting green in a box and abandoned on a forest miles away from the lush green meadows and other easy picking around 1600 Pennsylvania avenue.

For some weeks, a secret "operation squad" has been at work around the executive mansion. It seems that the President noticed that squirrels were scratching up his velvet-smooth golf green which is just outside the southeast corner of his office. Steps to discourage the furry little rodents were ordered.

Experts Fall First, an expert in electronics was called in. He suggested the use of extremely high-pitched sound which would annoy the squirrels and scare them scattering. They didn't scatter. Labor Unions Harmony Can Split Asunder

WASHINGTON, March 14 (AP)—Hard feelings run deep among some top union leaders despite the aura of harmony growing out of the agreement of the AFL and CIO to merge.

There are enough smoldering feuds and rivalries, some old and some new, to indicate that when the merger comes about next fall, as is now expected, a good deal of conflict will continue within organized labor.

An explosion, for example, could develop soon, even before the merger is consummated, between AFL President George Meany and Dave Beck, head of the Teamsters Union.

Beck's union has 1,200,000 members and is the largest in the AFL. He is going ahead with plans to absorb the 60,000-member International Longshoremen's association, the east coast waterfront outfit ousted by the AFL nearly two years ago on charges it was dominated by racketeers.

The AFL chief, due to head the combined AFL-CIO organization, is not likely to accept without a scrap Beck's plan of returning the ILA to the AFL by the back door by making it part of the Teamsters.

There is speculation that Meany may counter with a move to throw Beck's Teamsters out of the AFL. Such a step would split the close-knit AFL hierarchy wide apart and thereby even endanger the AFL-CIO merger.

While this is the most talked-about controversy developing in the AFL, there are other things that are plenty of other. They involve leaders of rival unions, and even rival leaders within the same union.

They include such figures as John L. Lewis of the Mine Workers, David J. McDonald of the Steelworkers and Walter Reuther of the CIO and Auto Workers.

Smith has put centimes in each of the restaurants he manages, so that customers can contribute their small change. And he is opening an account at the bank here in the name of the "St. Agatha emergency school fund."

High secret service chiefs were sent to Nagpur to investigate the incident and determine whether it had a political motive.

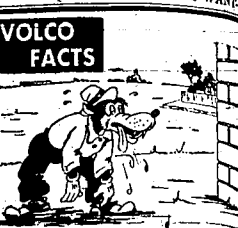

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Construction Shows Boost In Twin Falls
