Senator Asks For Details of Talks at Yalta

WASHINGTON, March 16 (UP)—Senator Knowland, R. Calif., said yesterday he "doesn't make sense" for congress to get its information on the Yalta conference second-hand. He said it was "high time" to get the facts direct.

Knowland was commenting on the current controversy over just how to release the official record of the 1945 meeting. This was the meeting in which the United States, Great Britain and Russia agreed on the terms under which Russia would enter the war against Japan.

Secretary of State Dulles said yesterday the official papers will be published some day—but it's a question of when. He repeated the state department's offer to let high-ranking members of congress, including certain committee chairmen, read them now on a confidential basis.

Chairman George D. G. of the senate foreign relations committee rejected the offer, saying he did not want to be held responsible for almost certain leaks. He also said he didn't want to know what was in the papers if the public couldn't be told.

Knowland, the Republican leader, commented that his committee will have to make its own decision "but these records should be made available to the proper committee."

Knowland said those scheduled to get copies if they want them. He said he didn't think the leaks would be serious because the Yalta meeting was held in secret.

Talking to reporters, Knowland said there was no sense in congress relying on the press for news of such persons as Prime Minister Winston Churchill, former Secretary of State Edward R. Stettinius and General George Marshall, son of the late President.

Still in Korea Knowland and congress, even 10 years after, is still making decisions which relate to what went on at Yalta and could very well do its work without knowing all.

The Yalta meeting deal with such things as the coming occupation of Germany, the future of captive countries like Poland, and bringing Russia into the war against Japan.

Chiang Says Dulles Truce Bid Rejected

TAIPEI, Formosa, March 16 (UP)—The Republic of China government today rejected President Chiang Kai-shek's bid for a cease-fire in the Korean Strait in talks with Secretary of State Dulles March 3.

Foreign Minister George Yeh, who attended the talks, also told the lawmakers that the national government would "definitely defend" the offshore islands of Quemoy and the Matusus.

Reds Also Talk Dulles had expressed hopes before his meeting with Chiang a cease-fire might be worked out through the United Nations. But he told a news conference yesterday that "so far there has been no evidence that the national government of China would accept."

Dulles said a renunciation of the cease-fire by both sides would "meet the immediate requirements of the situation."

Dulles also indicated that if Red China makes a misr effort to take Quemoy and the Matusus—and the attack was clearly aimed at Formosa—U. S. air and sea forces equipped with tactical atomic weapons might intervene.

Yeh said a communist attack on Quemoy and the Matusus would signal the launching of an invasion of Formosa and declared: "We shall exchange blow for blow."

Premier O. K. Yeh, questioned by the press, insisted the nationalists would fight for the islands as "part of the defense chain of the free world."

Press reports said the Matusus, 100 miles northwest of Formosa, are being steadily reinforced. New fortifications are being built.

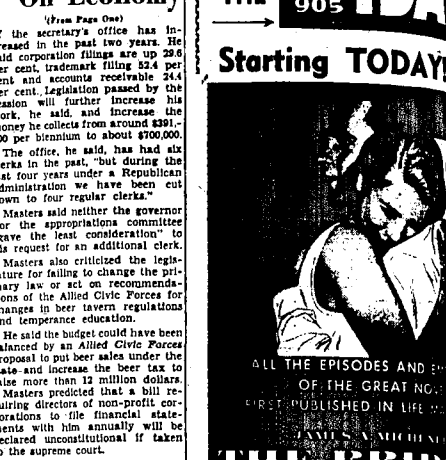

# Bevan Ousted From British Labor Group

LONDON, March 16 (AP)—Left-wing laborite Aneurin Bevan, this nation's most persistent critic of the United States, was expelled today from Labor party ranks in parliament in a major British political upheaval.

His fellow socialists reaffirmed their confidence in the party leadership of former prime minister Clement Attlee, a moderate who steers clear of left-wing policies which made Bevan the most controversial figure of British politics.

It was punishment for Bevan's trash and bawling long-time challenge to Attlee's command—a challenge which culminated two weeks ago in a public scene on the floor of the house of commons. Bevan, in public, showed contempt for Attlee's leadership.

**Sent to Wilderness**

The majority vote cast the silver-tongued but impetuous Welsh laborite into political wilderness—a lone wolf in parliament, without a party. It may start his slide into limbo, or it may spur him to greater efforts to win solitary re-election.

The party struggle for Bevan's fate was a severe one for labor and neutral politicians say it may take British socialism three years to recover from the deep chasm between Bevan and his followers and the moderates who back Attlee.

**May Have Good Effect**

British voters may suspect that if labor cannot keep Bevan in its own house it should not be allowed to run the nation.

Others, suspicious of Bevan's revolutionary fervor, counted it as a cancer operation that may help the socialists. The influential Times of London suggested last week that the labor party minus Bevan would gain strength by attracting the floating voter.

Today's meeting was a dramatic closed-door confrontation in the oak-paneled room of chamber 4 of the house of commons. It was next door to the main commons room where Irish Nationalist Charles E. Parnell was expelled from the leadership of the party in an other major political power struggle.

**Skipper Named**

BREMINGTON, Wash., March 16 (AP)—Rear Adm. William A. Dolan will succeed Rear Adm. Homer N. Wallis as commander of the fleet's sound naval shipyard April 1. The navy department announced yesterday.

Dolan presently is serving as director of planning for the bureau of ships in Washington.

# Irrigation Boon Foreseen in Cheap Power of Atomic Fuel

NEW ORLEANS, March 16 (AP)—Reclamation Commissioner W. A. Dextheimer said yesterday cheap power from atomic fuel will bring "one of the greatest expansions of irrigation the world has yet experienced."

In a speech prepared for the Associated General Contractors of America convention, the directing head of the government's reclamation program for the 17 western states declared:

"Critics of reclamation have rather pessimistically forecast that the dawn of atomic power will render hydroelectric power plants obsolete and infeasible.

"They contend this would put an end to a source of income which has made possible many reclamation projects which probably could not otherwise have been built.

"I cannot agree with this thinking at all. It will be many years before nuclear fuels can compete with other fuels. Hydroelectric plants will continue to be built as long as the need for energy exists and generally as long as they can be constructed as a part of multiple projects from which other benefits will be derived."

He said only the cost of pumping water is keeping millions of acres of land from production under irrigation.

The commissioner forecast that "the pattern of small irrigation projects, both publicly and privately developed, which is the key to western agriculture, will ultimately be repeated in other sections of the country as the need develops," Dextheimer added.

"The refinement and reduction in cost of sprinkler irrigation systems has overcome many of the difficulties which rolling land presented in the development of gravity irrigation systems.

"Consequently, irrigation which was formerly pretty largely confined to the western states, is spreading all over the country. It holds out real hope here in the south for a breaking away from the boom-or-bust economy of a one-crop agriculture."

### Tycoons Eat Hastily, Says Restaurateur

CHICAGO, March 16 (AP)—Restaurateur Alvin Hollander munched toast, sipped coffee and complained that businessmen don't know how to eat.

Hollander, who runs a downtown restaurant, conducted a survey of the eating habits of 10,000 executives throughout the country.

His conclusion: "They're ruining their stomachs."

He found that meal time is "ideal time" for 63 per cent of the businessmen polled.

"They relax," he said, "they live the lunch hour to swing big deals."

**Observes**

Hollander reported, from personal observation, his place caters to lawyers and businessmen from downtown office buildings.

His questionnaire showed that 80 per cent of the executives eat no breakfast. The few who do gulp it down in five minutes or less.

Lunch usually takes less than a half hour—a sandwich on the run—90 per cent of the executives eat at their desks, unless they have a business appointment.

Usually the only meal a busy businessman has time for is dinner. He eats at home under his wife's watchful eye. But if he stays late at the office, he frequently skips the evening meal and settles for a snack from the box when he gets home.

**Ulcers Reported**

Hollander found that advertising and public relations men about 70 per cent reported they had ulcers or some other gastric ailment.

Building and construction men eat most sensibly. Only 16 per cent reported any stomach disorder. And meal time is "rest time" for them.

Of 23 per cent reported transacting business at meals.

Hollander believes most builders came up through the ranks and got accustomed to knocking off when the whistle blew.

**Steak Is Liked**

When it comes to favorite foods, business tycoons are no different from just plain people. Steak is the number one choice of 88 per cent, with hamburgers the second choice by 77 per cent.

Apple pie and coffee is the favorite dessert.

Hollander said a restaurant owner's eating habits are different from almost anybody's. He averages 60 cents a year in his own restaurant.

His wife has to tempt his palate only on Sundays.

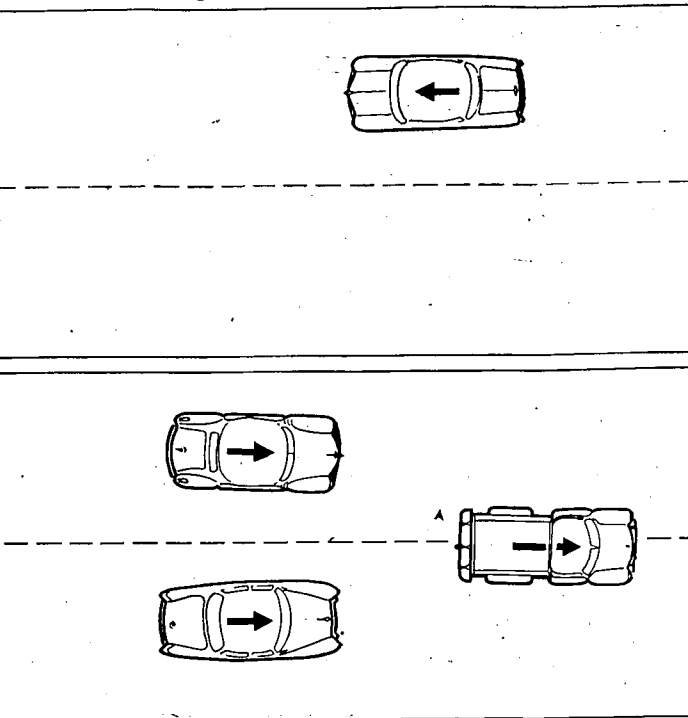

### Lane Straddling Delays Traffic, Becomes Street Hazard



Car "A" must not use portions of two lanes at the same time. The law specifies that all vehicles must be driven within a single lane. The driver who straddles between lanes holds up traffic and is a hazard.

### Traffic Lanes Are Painted on Streets; Law Forbids 'Straddling' of Two Lanes

The way some drivers operate cars in Twin Falls, it would seem that painting white lines on major streets to separate lanes of traffic is a total waste of labor and money, asserts Police Chief Howard Gillette.

"Drivers who regularly travel along Addison avenue west, Main avenue and Shoshone street will verify that a large number of careless drivers seem to think the roadway is their sole property and pay no attention to the white lines and what they mean.

The city vehicle code specifically states that a vehicle never may be driven in two lanes at the same time. Furthermore, a vehicle shall not be moved from one lane to another, for passing or turning purposes, until the driver first has ascertained that such movement can be made with safety.

As far as choice of lane is concerned, the code states that regardless of the established speed limit, any vehicle proceeding at less than normal speed of traffic shall be driven to the right-hand lane or as close as practicable to the right-hand curb.

In addition to the foregoing, courtesy, safety and the law demand that a driver must not drive so slowly as to delay traffic and thus add to traffic congestion.

The last point particularly applies during busy shopping days in the downtown area when scores of drivers move along at a snail's pace, thus creating an additional traffic problem, Chief Gillette stresses.

These drivers are as much in violation of the traffic law as are speeders, he says.

The chief also stresses the importance of keeping a proper distance between your own car and the vehicle ahead of you. The law states that a car must not follow another closer than is reasonable and prudent; with consideration for speed, traffic and the condition of the roadway.

Two hazards are created by following too closely: Danger of running into the vehicle ahead, in the event of a sudden stop or deceleration and the danger of being struck in the rear if you are forced to make an emergency stop.

GOODING, March 16—Henry J. Rodermacker has been granted a divorce from Freda M. Rodermacker in district court here on grounds that he had lived apart for five years. They were married in Boise April 24, 1921, and have four children who are all adults.

A property agreement was ratified by the court. Rodermacker was awarded an undivided interest in grazing lands situated in Camas county, all personal effects in his possession, \$1000.00 and personal property inherited by him from his mother. Rodermacker is to pay Mrs. Rodermacker \$4,000.00 plus \$200 for past due support money and \$250 attorney fees.

### Utah Symphony Presents Brilliant, Enjoyable Show

The Utah Symphony hit top form in support of a brilliant rendition of Mendelssohn's seldom heard "Piano Concerto in G Minor" by Gladys Gladstone, and rose to near perfection in the evening's longest number, Dvorak's "New World Symphony," at the last of two performances Tuesday in the high school gymnasium.

Before a large audience which Maurice Abramson, the orchestra's conductor, described as "massive," Gladstone played the concerto finale, *molto allegro e vivace*, with a prototypical virtuosity that would have given pleasure to its exacting composer.

Dvorak's "New World Symphony," primarily an ethnic expression of the impact of old world culture on the new, was interpreted by the Utah Symphony with extraordinary color and poignancy, from the symphonic opening theme to the mournful final E minor concert of the woodwinds. But it was Don Muegge, playing the English horn, who set the standard the orchestra was to maintain throughout the symphony's four movements.

In a completely appropriate opening of the concert, the Utah Symphony played von Weber's overture "Der Freischutz" which was written in England in 1822. In contrast was a symphonic picture arranged by Robert Russell Bennett for the 1947. Its haunting melody is born by muted strings which are joined in the middle section by the full orchestra.

The concert ended with the ever-popular and rousing "Semper Parvum" by John Philip Sousa. Large orchestra gave an account for 3:50. Mozart's Italian school studies, featured were selections from Handel, Mozart, Beethoven, Schubert, Wagner and Rimski-Korsakov.

The Utah Symphony will complete its season on April 8 when it

participates in the "Oratorio from the Book of Mormon" by LeRoy J. Robertson in the Salt Lake City Tabernacle. The season opened October 24. Since that time the orchestra has given 46 concerts.

**Statistics Shown On Solon's Work**

BOISE, March 16 (AP)—Assistant Chief Clerk C. A. Bottolfsen of the state house of representatives yesterday said that only about half the bills introduced in the 1935 legislative session made their way to the governor's desk.

A total of 571 bills were introduced, and 284 were passed by both chambers.

Of the 349 bills introduced in the house, 56 were withdrawn, 15 were killed, 39 were held in printing committee, 28 were held by other committees, 11 were killed by the senate, and 22 were ignored by the senate. Only 188 passed.

Of 223 introduced in the senate, 28 were killed by the senate, 13 were withdrawn, 35 were held in committee, one was held on the table, and 119 were killed by the house. Only 116 were passed.

### Financing of Sewage Disposal Plant, Lateral Sewers Outlined at Meeting

The feasibility of financing a new sewage disposal plant and lateral sewers in Twin Falls was demonstrated to the city commission Monday by George Denton, Salt Lake City, a representative of the First Security Bank of Utah.

Denton submitted several alternative plans to the commission.

Although no final action was taken, a general plan was formulated to finance the project.

Joseph H. Latimore, city manager, said that it is probable the disposal plant and the laterals can be constructed for \$1,100,000. Financing would be a bond issue to be submitted to voters next winter.

Amortization of the disposal plant, Latimore said, would be in the form of a service charge of 20 cents per month per house for 17 years. The laterals would be paid for by connection fees of \$25 per year per house for 10 years. Lateral sewers now service all but 10 per cent of Twin Falls houses.

Latimore also announced city council action whereby the state highway department will be made responsible for the maintenance of city streets designated as highways.

Under the present agreement between the city and the highway department, the city is reimbursed for maintenance costs incurred on the center 20 feet of the highway designated as highways. The reimbursement amounts to about \$1,700 per year.

Under the proposed agreement, which the council authorized Latimore to make with Earl V. Miller, the highway engineer, the state will be responsible for all surface maintenance and the city will be responsible for snow removal, flushing, sweeping and storm drains.

### Idaho's Lambing Season Near End

BOISE, March 16—Early lambing operations in Idaho have been nearly completed and indications are that a larger percentage of this year's crop will be saved than last year, the secretary of the Idaho Wool Growers association said yesterday.

Mel Clair noted that last year's lamb crop totaled nearly 100,000 animals.

He said no date had been fixed for turning herds out to graze, normally done about March 15, because of the late spring.

He said about 50,000 sheep had been sheared, compared to an average of 200,000 at this time of year. The market outlook, he said, is about the same as last year's.

NEW YORK, March 16 (AP)—Whoever thought Adolf Hitler would solve America's traffic problems? But in a small way he is nearly 10 years after his death.

All this because of "the Beetle."

That is the nickname for the Volkswagen, the small mass-produced motor car which Hitler once promised every German family would soon be able to afford.

Most German families can't buy one yet. But last year more Americans bought Volkswagens than any other kind of imported automobile.

"Some 29,181 foreign-made cars were sold in the United States in 1937," said Arthur Stanton, "and 6,241 were Volkswagens."

Stanton, a tall, lean 37-year-old ex-navy officer and husband of the president of World-Wide Automobiles corporation. He distributes the Volkswagens in five eastern states.

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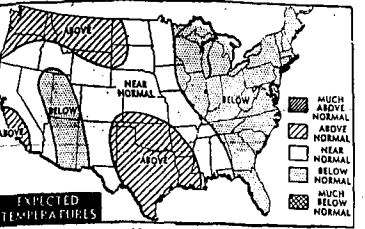
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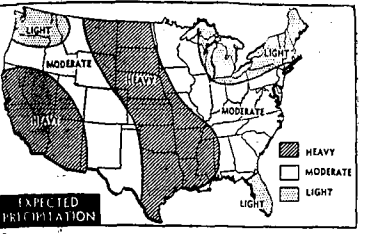

### Russian Guns Shelled Quemoy

TAIPEI, Formosa, March 16 (AP)—Giant Russian-built siege guns shelled Quemoy Island sporadically yesterday and nationalist naval sources said there was "considerable" communist naval activity around the island just off Amoy.

Nationalist China's top leaders, including Premier O. K. Yang, pledged again that Quemoy and Matsu, 150 miles to the north, would never be given up without a fight. And all official sources denied widespread reports civilians were being evacuated from Matsu.

Unusually reliable military sources said communist long-range siege guns shelled Quemoy, but described the shelling as light. No activity was reported around Matsu, but naval sources said communist junks were increasingly active in the Quemoy area.

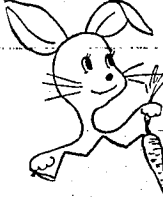

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### Movement for 'Drafting' Ike Is Shaping up

WASHINGTON, March 16 (UPI)—Behind the draft-Eisenhower accepts confident Republic strategists in talking 1956 campaign plans and methods of making of life more comfortable for the President and Mrs. Eisenhower. There is considerable evidence at hand that the Eisenhower women-folk are not enthusiastic about a second term for the subject of a second term. To them it is a somewhat doubtful White House visitors he has said that he did not want another four years.

Nevertheless, the plan to run him again are developing from day to day. And if there is any White House rebuke to Vice President Richard M. Nixon for the statement that the party cannot win without the President in 1956, a great many persons here will be surprised, even shocked.

That would be almost too much. Most surely it would recall the incident in the middle of Franklin D. Roosevelt's second term when Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace began the third year of boom. The ensuing draft-Roosevelt movement was the best organized spontaneous activity heretofore seen in these parts. It flowered, finally, with Wallace in second place on the third-term ticket.

Kept 'Em Guessing  
Mr. Roosevelt kept Democrats guessing until the 1940 Democratic national convention actually met. Then he released the word for the party for him and promptly was nominated again, there having been no time for the angry anti-Roosevelt minority to build up more than a shadow opposition candidate. Mr. Eisenhower has promised his opponents a better deal than he did in the early spring of next year whether he will be a candidate for renomination. If he steps down, which is the likelihood, there will be a Republican free for all. In the judgment of most top Republicans, the Democrats then would elect a president.

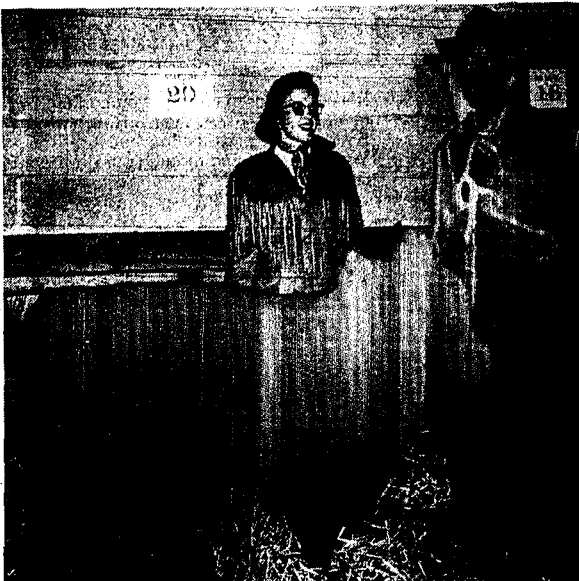

### U. S. Dollars Used to Give Aid to China

BERLIN, March 16 (AP)—American dollars helped finance a West Berlin company charged with selling artillery sights to the Chinese Communists during the Korean war. U. S. authorities disclosed today. A state department spokesman identified the firm as the Askania Works, manufacturers of optical instruments, and said it sold the sights that directed Chinese artillery fire on American soldiers. Harald Quilitsch, former general manager of Askania, and two assistants, were on trial before a West Berlin court today accused of selling \$2,000 worth of instruments to the Peiping government during the war. The shipments were discovered when American troops in North Korea captured an ore mine and found theodolites—surveying instruments used to measure angles—bearing the Askania trademark. A state department spokesman said Askania received \$1,200,000 defense contracts plus the same grant in marks as German counterparts funds—a total of \$2,400,000—during the Korean war. American officials said Quilitsch and his assistants had agreed to abide by U. S. rules forbidding strategic trade with the iron curtain countries and specifically with Red China which was at war with the United Nations.

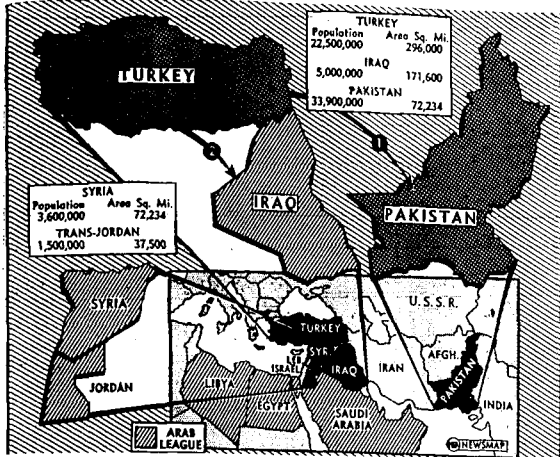

WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)—The air force has unveiled a whole family of new guided missiles that is designed to "destroy any enemy bomber in the world" and an ocean-spanning missile that will be "incredibly" hard to defend against. First official details of the fantastic new air weapons were announced by the air force here and by Assistant Air Secretary Trevor Gardner in a speech in Dayton, O. Gardner said that the air force has three intercontinental missiles "under accelerated development" for the strategic air command. They are the Navaho, Shark and Atlas. 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### Veto Reasons For Immunity Bill Are Told

**BOISE, March 16 (AP)**—Saying "we need fewer curtains against full disclosure of the facts," Gov. Robert E. Smylie yesterday vetoed a bill that would have given employees of attorneys, clergymen, priests, physicians and surgeons the right to keep silent under questioning in civil court cases.

He said he felt the privilege ought to apply to clergymen and their assistants, but felt the bill as a whole was unwise.

Under present law, members of these professions may not be questioned in civil cases about information imparted to them in official confidence.

The senate amended the law to include their "assistants, stenographers, law clerks, accountants, nurses and other employees."

But Smylie criticized the bill in a letter transmitted to Secretary of State Ira Masters, as one which would "unduly limit the scope of desirable examination and cross-examination in our courts in matters which may be of exceptional public interest."

"We need fewer curtains against full disclosure of the facts," he said, "and in my opinion should not enlarge the number of grounds on which a witness may refuse to testify."

Smylie said he regretted that the veto "requires me to also disapprove the proposal to enlarge the scope of the privilege accorded to ministers of the several faiths in relations to their clerical work."

"However, my belief that this bill taken as a whole would not contribute to the sound administration of justice in our courts makes it necessary that I disapprove the entire measure."

### Presidential Visit to Sedate Flower Show Turns Place Into Big Disorder

**WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)**—Flower shows normally are sedate, tranquil affairs conducted in leisurely calm. That is, until a President of the United States comes to call.

Then brick walls collapse, photographers fall into gleaming garden pools, garden club ladies get their corneas crushed and men with live shotguns above their alleged posts at the chief executive.

Such was the case here yesterday when Mr. Eisenhower, rubbing for his wife who was back at the White House getting over the flu, visited the national flower garden show at the huge District of Columbia armory.

Until the President arrived, the armory was a bit of floral paradise as well-dressed matrons moved between the displays, admiring the flowers and plants and wishing their garden at home could look the same.

When the word passed that the President was on the premises, however, the place took on all the hallmarks of a department store for a dime a pair.

The President went first to see "Mamie's Garden," a striking plot of chalk white tulips, boxwoods and blooming dogwood trees set with a serpentine brick wall and flagstone terrace. The garden will be given to the Eisenhower farm at Gettysburg, Pa., by the Allied Florists association.

Here the first difficulty developed. One man insisted on giving the President a huge vase brimming with two dozen happiness roses. Mr. Eisenhower wanted to see the rest of the show and he wasn't about to be tripping through the aisles hauling the vase of flowers.

### Secrecy Bans Attacked by 2 Demo Solons

**WASHINGTON, March 16 (AP)**—Two Democratic senators feel the administration has imposed "an unnecessary lid of secrecy" on information which should be made available to the public.

Sens. Hubert H. Humphrey, D., Minn., and A. S. Mike Monroney, D., Okla., also said congress is contributing to government secrecy by classifying too many of its committee meetings to the public.

To help break down the secrecy wall, Humphrey suggested that measures be established in the administration for the periodic review of classified material to determine whether it should be made public.

Chairman of Group

Humphrey is chairman of a senate government operations subcommittee which is investigating whether the administration's security regulations are being used to put news about government activities under a secrecy label.

The subcommittee has invited as a witness J. R. Wiseman, managing editor of the Washington Post and Times-Herald, and head of the committee on the American Society of Newspaper Editors. He will testify Friday.

The Friday hearing will concentrate on President Eisenhower's executive order of November, 1953, overhauling the controversial Truman order on classification of information.

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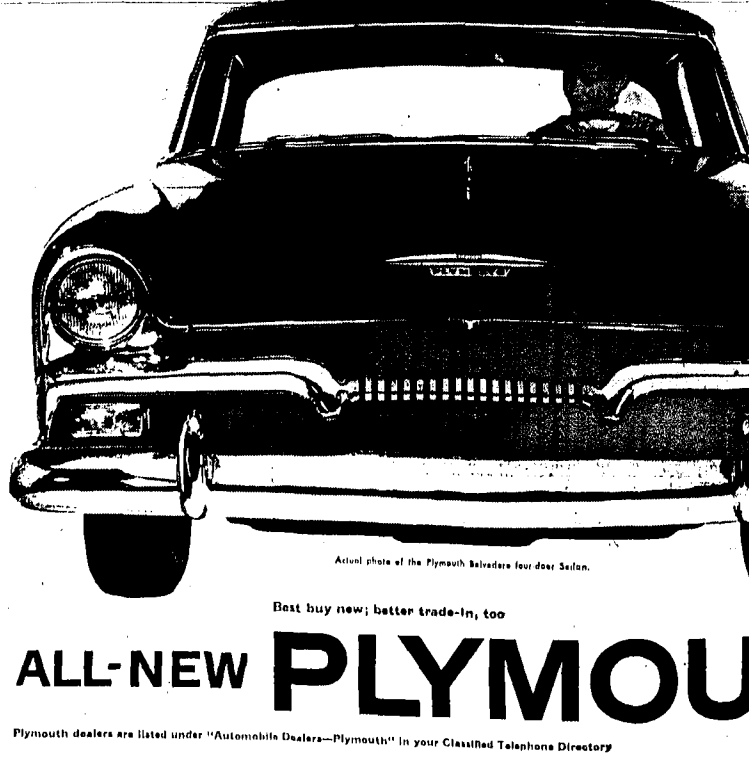
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# Starts Uranium; Is Used

**By LEON DENNEN**

ISTANBUL, Turkey (NEA) — In all the middle east's two million square miles of strategic oil-rich lands, we have only two staunch friends, Turkey and Israel.

We may need them badly before this critical year is ended, for Russia's agents are busy stirring disaffection and revolt among 40 million Arabs. Only a miracle can prevent an explosion this year.

I have just finished a survey of the area. In visits to Egypt, Cyprus, Israel, Lebanon and Turkey I talked with peasants, politicians and businessmen, revolutionaries and high government officials.

This correspondent came away with these conclusions:

1. A revolt against feudal slavery, hunger, poverty and disease may come at any time. Social and economic unrest make the area especially vulnerable to red propaganda.
2. Barring a drastic change in existing conditions, not a single Arab population would come to the aid of the west in the event of armed conflict with Russia.
3. Everywhere the consensus of qualified middle eastern observers was: The Soviet rulers—having suffered a slight diplomatic setback in the west—are preparing a series of expulsions in the Arab world.

The two notable exceptions in this otherwise dark picture, Turkey and Israel, are pro-western—certainly pro-U. S. Both Turkey and Israel have strong armies ready to fight should the reds attack.

However, Turkey is in the midst of a major economic crisis. The Turks also are strongly opposed to becoming involved in "Arab intrigues," despite their pact with Russia which in view of the state department is to serve as cornerstone for a middle eastern defense system.

Turkey has kept aloof from the sinister machinations of Arab politicians ever since Kemal Ataturk, the founder of modern Turkey—turned his back on the Arab world. He called the Arabs the cause of "Turkey's misfortune."

Israel is in a similar difficult situation with the Arabs. The youngest republic is history, Israel is indeed a modern miracle.

The leaders of Israel, in five short years, have succeeded in creating a disciplined pro-western and industrialized state which could serve as a spring-board for the development of the backward middle eastern areas.

The young state is clearly destined to play an increasingly important role in the middle east.

However, Israel is still surrounded by a wall of Arab hostility. The U. S. and the NATO powers—obviously in an effort to win over the Arab politicians—have as yet been unable or unwilling to help crack this wall.

It is difficult to realize the tense atmosphere which exists in the Holy Land—particularly along the ill-defined frontier with Jordan.

Most of the frontier settlements are garrisoned by companies of young Israeli boys and girls and at night the whole area looks like an outpost in the last war, with houses barricaded and sentries posted.

Arab raids are countered by the swift-acting Jewish patrols.

In the spectacular development of the army thus far, the greater part than is usual in a modern industrial country—especially in a young and tiny country. The reason for this is clear. The citizens of Israel live always at the back of their minds the threat of another Arab offensive.

The Arab economic blockade is virtually strangling the young state.

The ordinary Israeli—literally fighting with his back to the Mediterranean sea—is particularly bitter at the U. S. decision to send arms to the Arab states. He is convinced that the arms will eventually be used not to fight the reds but to attack Israel.

Repatriation of the 900,000 Arab refugees ramping on Israel's borders and peace between Israel and the Arab states is what the U. S. will have to justify in 1956—if the middle east is not to be a fertile field for red propaganda.

Every day new attempts are made by the Kremlin to cement economic and cultural ties between Russia and the Arab states.

Soviet-Moscow pilgrims recently went to Mecca and red trade organizations sent exhibits to Izmir in Turkey.

In return, delegations from all Arab countries, including for the first time Saudi Arabia and Yemen, attended Moscow's agricultural exhibition.

She said that more than 5 billion board feet of timber valued at 10 millions dollars are threatened in the Boise and Payette forests, with some stands in the Nez Perce forest infested to a lesser degree.

A \$13,854 fund was allocated by the 3rd Idaho legislature to match federal funds for budworm control.

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### Union Battles Develop Over Crew "Plans"

**SAN FRANCISCO, March 15**—Harry Lundeberg, secretary of the AFL Sailors Union, the Pacific has denied charges by other maritime unions that he is "riding" their jurisdictions with his "cheap crew" plan.

"This is a new field and we were here first," Lundeberg said of his plan. "We are not taking any jobs away from any union. Instead, we are creating more jobs."

Lundeberg made this statement yesterday before leaving for Washington. It answered charges by leaders of two big maritime unions that his plan was a "sellout" and an attempt to "liquidate" other unions.

**Gives Warning**

Phil O'Rourke, international vice president of the CIO American Radio association, warned that shipowners collaborating with Lundeberg on the plan would be struck. He leveled his warning particularly at Pacific Far East and at the New York, Joe Curran, president of the CIO national maritime union, accused Lundeberg of a "sellout" and said his action is a "threat to every union and every seaman." He predicted every "legitimate" maritime union will fight the plan.

In essence, the plan would make American ships carrying bulk cargoes more competitive with foreign ships by lowering their operating costs.

**Crews Number**

Lundeberg would cut the number of crewmen from 38 to 31 and pay bolder seamen \$40 instead of \$30 a month, but would restrict overtime and premium pay work. Furthermore, all members of the crew would be GUP men, which is what has aroused the other unions.

The GUP recently signed a contract with the international shipping company of Seattle calling for the GUP to man bulk cargo ships. One of its ships, the Tossina, left Los Angeles last week for Japan with a load of coal.

Lundeberg said the Tossina would surely have been placed under Panamanian registry if he had not set up "special conditions" for it to engage in bulk trade.

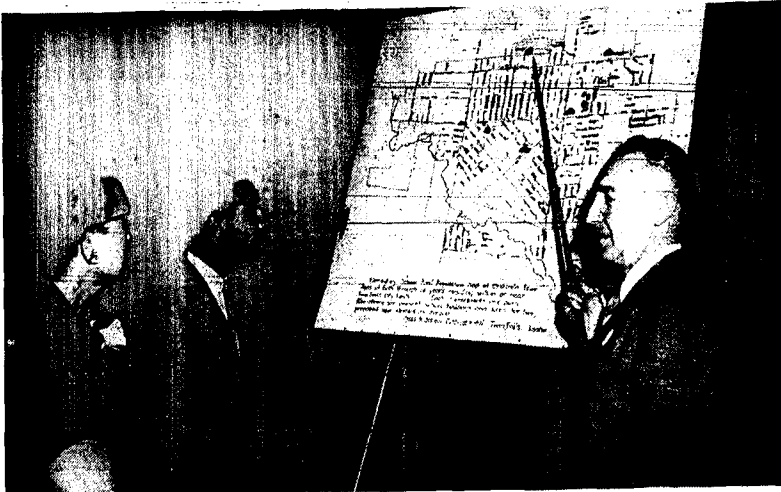

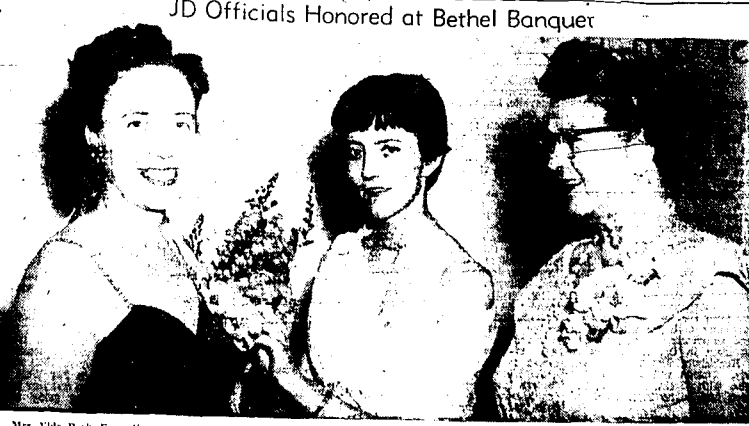

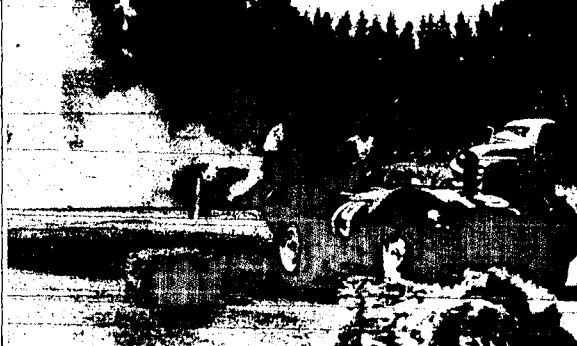
