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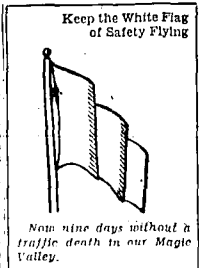

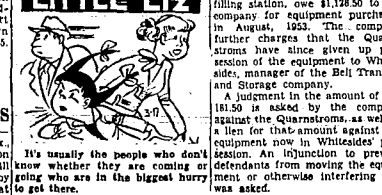

**TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG**

WASHINGTON—The continuing lack of a big, popular anti-Eisenhower issue for the 1956 campaign has forced the Democratic opposition on Capitol Hill to pitch their appeals to the voters on a wide-range, pocketbook level.

Advocates of the "little fellow" are stressing lower taxes and larger handouts for the so-called "little fellow" as a stirring and vote-getting issue. The Democrats first sought to brand the administration "anti-labor" (anti-labor) on tax and anti-labor prosecutions, private power, etc. But these largely technical problems did not catch the public's fancy. The so-called "little fellow" is not unpopular when times are as good as they are now.

The attempt to indict the White House for "McCarthyism" failed miserably with that punch until the senate measure delivered his blow. The Democrats have picked away at certain points, but a single overture that they have supported its major tenets, chiefly because it carries out Roosevelt-Truman concepts of collective security. Indeed, it leans too far in that direction to suit nationally minded GOP'ers of the middle west.

**SENATE DEMOCRATS NOT DISTURBED**—Thus, with the 1956 test only 20 months off, the Democrats have not been disturbed by the administration's victorious gain against the administration. Politicians generally agree that they must do better between now and November, 1956. The so-called "little fellow" is not unpopular when times are as good as they are now.

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**ADLAI'S DILEMMA**

Again and again Adlai Stevenson must privately chide the peculiar fates that have dogged him since 1952. Life in politics has offered him few easy decisions, and the choices ahead look just as tough for him.

In the spring of 1952 he was running for a second term as governor of Illinois. Pressures built up to make him Democratic nominee for President. All the evidence indicates he honestly fought the idea, though he never quite closed the door.

Nevertheless, he was sufficiently reluctant to discourage some of his most ardent backers, right in the thick of the convention struggle. Perhaps only Big Labor's decision to scuttie the venerable Alben Barkley of Kentucky brought Stevenson back into the picture—through a genuine draft.

In any event, he had the poor luck to draw Dwight D. Eisenhower for an opponent. This and other factors sent him tumbling to defeat by some 6,500,000 votes. Yet Stevenson managed to emerge from this rough combat a strong national figure and unquestionably powerful within his party.

From that moment on, it was said he could have the 1956 nomination if he wanted it. They're still saying that, and very likely it's true. No real challenger looms on the horizon.

But this hasn't made Stevenson's life any easier. For the question he faces in 1956, as in 1952, is not whether he can get the nomination but whether he wants it.

Most political sages think Mr. Eisenhower will run again. And since his popularity is now near its all-time high and seldom has fallen far short of that peak, the prospects of beating him are viewed as slim.

Frequently these days one hears the report that Stevenson would like to run for the senate of Illinois against the Republican incumbent, Everett Dirksen. Should he decide to do this, he would not, of course, forsake later chance to accept the presidential nomination again. Still, having already abandoned a governorship nomination once, it seems plain Stevenson would be strongly inclined to stick to his original choice another time.

If we suppose he did jump into a senate race and stay there, then the experts agree he would be incurring the party's full wrath. It would be a very bad thing for him in the presidential berth. Most observers feel it would be risky for him to reject a presidential bid in 1956 on the assumption he might run at some more advantageous time (after Mr. Eisenhower has retired). Party leaders usually turn elsewhere once a man has shunned their overtures.

So Stevenson, who no doubt hopes furiously he'd never have had a choice like that he faced in 1952, is pretty much back in the same old boat.

**"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS**

WASHINGTON—A straggling effort to go on behind the scenes here to try to get agreement on a new and dramatic move in the atomic field is the anticipation of the barrage of anti-American propaganda that will be laid down by the Afro-Asian conference in Indianapolis next week.

Two proposals are being considered by the Atomic Energy Commission. The first is to offer a strategic atomic attack. The second is to offer a strategic atomic attack. The second is to offer a strategic atomic attack.

Proposals No. 1 is for American initiative to get approval of a conference with the United States, study the effects of fallout of radioactive material in the aftermath of explosion of atomic weapons. Such a commission also might be empowered to appraise the consequences of radioactivity in the atmosphere as the result of the tests of atomic and hydrogen weapons by the Soviet Union, Great Britain and the United States.

Proposal No. 2 is for American leadership outside the U. N. in the first steps essential to harness the atomic energy for peaceful purposes in Asia. This might take the form of a commission of American atomic scientists to study the potentialities of power reactors in areas where fuels are scarce and costly. Hydroelectric power is unavailable.

It is increasingly evident that Red China's delegates to the Indonesian conference will seek to propagandize the threat of nuclear warfare launched by the United States. Among Asian neutrals and even in supposedly friendly countries such as Japan.

The official government newspaper in Moscow has just denounced the Atomic-for-peace plan that President Eisenhower proposed to the United Nations. It is also reported that the plan is being rejected everywhere in the world.

This line is believed to be the one that will be taken at the conference by the United States. It is expected that the conference will meet with no representative of any western power attending. Nationalist China, the Philippines and Thailand, will speak out against the Communists and fellow-traveling efforts to brand the United States as an aggressor and warmonger.

The effort will be linked, it is believed here, to American policy toward Formosa and the forces of Chiang Kai-shek. There is, in fact, a growing belief that the conference in Indonesia will be directly tied to the conflict over Formosa and the offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu.

The red regime in Peking goes right on repeating its intention of attacking Formosa this week. This may, of course, be merely empty bluff. But those who take the threat seriously see a relationship to the conference as follows:

China will not launch an attack on a scale that would bring American intervention prior to the meeting. That is, the United States will be directly tied to the conflict over Formosa and the offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu.

MOSCOW, March 17 (UP)—Idahoans were urged yesterday to be citizens of the world as well as citizens of the United States.

Dr. Quincy Wright, professor of international law at the University of Chicago, said that the qualities that everyone has an understanding and an active concern in world affairs.

Addressing an opening session of the eighth annual Borah conference on the causes of war and peace, Dr. Wright said "it seems doubtful in the atomic age whether Americans or nationals of any other state, can live alone and like."

Dr. Ronald B. Lyndon, head of the philosophy department at the University of Idaho, said that the speaker at the conference on the University of Idaho campus, said the idea of outlawing war must await its application in the actual world.

"Man is unable to achieve his genuine good through reliance on force," he said, "but through achieving harmony with his fellow men, morals and politics are allowed to fall apart," said the son of the founder of the Borah conference, Chicago attorney Salmon O. Levinson.

Continues Wright said, "If we assume that inventions will continue to make the world smaller and the nations more vulnerable to nuclear war, without a more adequate political and judicial organization of the world."

"Yet the settlements of national and state sovereignty are such that a new international organization adapted to the situation is not likely to be accepted, and even if accepted, may cause movements of reaction and judicial organization of the world."

"International organization cannot, therefore, progress more rapidly than the sentiment of people throughout the world is prepared to sustain it."

**SELF-ANALYSIS NEEDED?**

Relief rather than gratitude is the response one feels on hearing that the senate judiciary committee has at long last approved President Eisenhower's nomination of Judge Marshall Harlan to the U. S. supreme court.

The committee's performance in the last couple of years hardly excited admiration. Last year it put on an undignified display while it foolishly hounded and hawed over the nomination of Chief Justice Earl Warren, who had been accused of "leftist" sympathies by some irresponsible folk.

This year it has permitted long delay on the Harlan nomination, in full knowledge of the fact the supreme court is swamped with work and badly needs another hand.

The contract in another direction revealed an alarming tendency on the part of some senators to try to predetermine what Harlan's views might be on important cases coming before the court. Obviously, any flat statement by him in advance of actual study of the issues would not only be presumptions but very likely would disqualify him from taking part in the cases when they arose.

The committee is not living up to its responsibilities. Perhaps a little self-analysis might be wise before the next "patient" comes to its psychiatric couch.

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—The senate yesterday confirmed President Eisenhower's nomination of Justice John Marshall Harlan to be a member of the supreme court.

Harlan, 55, now a judge of the second U. S. court of appeals in New York, was nominated that November to fill the supreme court vacancy left by the death of Justice Robert H. Jackson.

The vote was 71-11. Harlan's nomination was approved after wide-ranging denunciations that hit the court itself and the United States.

Nine Democratic senators and two Republicans, Senators Lauger, N. D., and Walker, Ill., voted against confirmation.

Said Internationalist opponents of Harlan's nomination argued that he had an "internationalist" background. They said they feared he might hold that the United Nations charter or other treaties could override the constitution and domestic law.

Harlan himself testified, however, that he was "not a one-worlder" who believed in the surrender of American sovereignty to an international organization.

"I would enforce the constitution and laws made by congress," Harlan said.

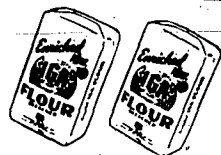

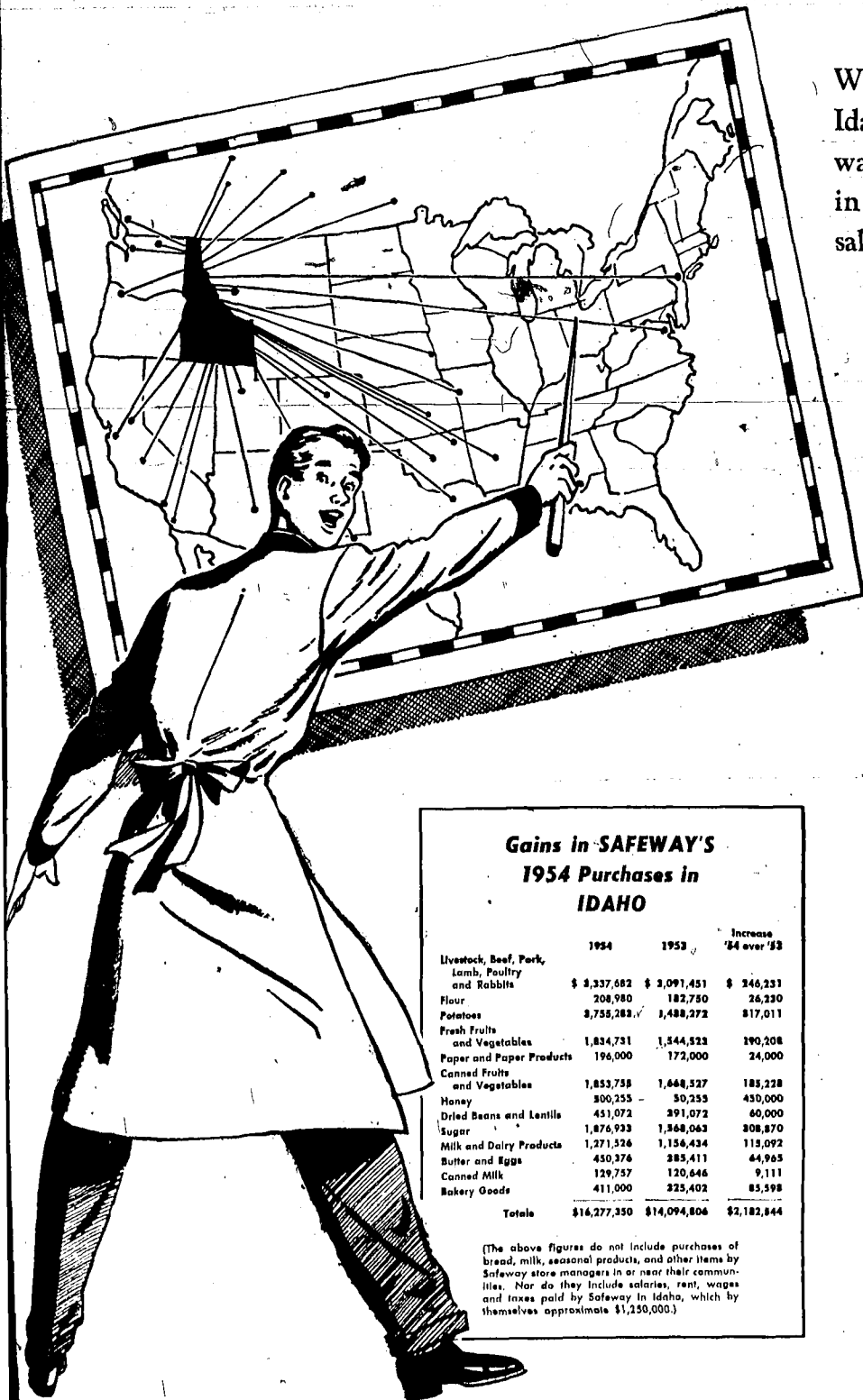

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### U. N. Strength Depends Upon East-West Tie

MOBOW, March 17 (AP)—A New York city newspaper said today the restoration of the United Nations to its full power depends to a great extent upon the restoration of friendly relations between the United States and Communist Russia and China.

Thomas J. Hamilton, chief of the New York Times press section at the U. N., made the remark in the final speech delivered during the concluding session of the eighth annual Bohari peace conference here. It was Hamilton's contention that unless the term "collective security" is broadened to include regional defense alliances, it does not exist in the world today.

Not in U. N. "We certainly do not have it in the United Nations," he said. Secret diplomacy is being resorted to more and more as a method of settling problems, the newsmen said.

Hamilton added that the centers of power actually centered for the U. N., now are found in the North Atlantic "Treaty Organization" for our side, and in the partnership of Communist Russia and China "for the other side."

#### Outlines Views

Earlier, Dr. Carl Pavlov, former president of Chile and now secretary-general for the Organization of American States, outlined his views on the role of regional organizations in keeping peace.

Yesterday, Dr. Ronald B. Levinson, professor of philosophy at the University of Maine, said man could only hope for the outlawing of war, although he thought that such action may be realized eventually when mankind and the world is ready for it.

IDAHO FALLS, March 17 (AP)—Dean Dixon, Idaho Falls, and Gordon Toevs, Aberdeen, have been re-nominated to the Idaho-Eastern Oregon Potato Control committee. Nominations were made by potato growers here last evening at a meeting of District 2 of the Idaho Potato Producers' association.

### Brooklyn Paper Closes Its Shop

NEW YORK, March 17 (AP)—The publisher of the Brooklyn Eagle, which soared from a political sheet to a crusading, Pulitzer prize-winning daily during 114 years of continuous publication—says the newspaper's presses have been "alleged forever."

Publisher Frank D. Schroth announced yesterday that the Eagle, struck last Jan. 29 by the CIO American Newspaper Guild over a wage dispute, would never publish again.

### Increase Seen

OTTAWA, March 17 (AP)—There has been a slight increase in radioactivity in Canada since the start of the latest series of atomic tests in Nevada, Defense Minister Ralph Campney told the house of commons yesterday.

He added that this increase does not constitute any hazard to human, animal or plant life in this country.

### Tax Cut Vote Reason Given

WASHINGTON, March 17 (Special)—Sen. Henry C. Dworak said today that he voted against the tax cut because it would reduce income derived from stock dividends.

"I voted against the tax cut now," said Dworak. "Just as I voted last year against any tax reduction on income derived from stock dividends."

"I think our primary duty should be to balance the budget," said the senior Idahoan, "and until we do balance it we must borrow funds to support any income tax reduction."

"When we have balanced the federal budget, then we can afford some honest tax reduction," he said. Dworak has consistently followed the principle of a balanced budget before any reduction in federal receipts should be considered.

His vote against the recent congressional pay raise was backed by the same thinking, and he has been one of the strongest advocates of reduced government expenditures wherever it was safe and reasonable.

His stand in this particular instance was taken by a senate majority of 50 over 44 to kill the Democratic-sponsored measure, which barely passed the house last week by a narrow margin.

### Onion Legislation Is Told by Budget

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—Rep. Hamer Budget, R., Idaho, said today the house agriculture committee will make a favorable report on the bill to bring trading of onions under control of the commodity exchange act.

The bill would place onions on a comparable basis with wheat, eggs and other farm commodities, Budget said. The Idaho department of agriculture recently took note of the practice of "board trading"—reporting the same lot of produce repeatedly on the exchange—and said it tended to hinder the normal flow of such produce.

Budget said there had been strong support from Idaho onion producers for such legislation.

### Professor Says Columbus Lost To Irish Sailors

REYKJAVIK, Iceland, March 17 (AP)—There may have been Irishmen aboard Leif Erikson's Viking ship which reached America 492 years before Columbus.

Prof. John Steffensen of the University of Iceland said today that Iceland was probably 30 per cent Irish in the year 1000 when Erikson set sail on the voyage that took him to "Vineland, the name he gave to North America."

Steffensen said some of the first settlers of Iceland were Irish monks, and that the Vikings who came to the islands later brought Irish slaves with them.

### Idahoan to Lead Big Hop to Guam

WASHINGTON, March 17 (Special)—An intercontinental RB-36 bomber wing will be led by a native Idahoan next month in a non-stop flight to Guam, the air force announced.

Col. Ariel Nielsen, Ammon, who is a commander of the strategic air command's 28th reconnaissance wing, will take his group to Guam for a three-month period of "mobility training exercises."

The 28th is presently based at Ellsworth air force base, South Dakota, to which it will return after its participation in the air force's routine system of rotation to the Far East.

Nielsen's wing will replace the fifth strategic reconnaissance wing now stationed at Guam and scheduled to return to its home base at Travis air force base, Calif.

### New Carrier

HANSEN, March 17—Vernon Smith took over his duties of rural mail carrier Wednesday at the Hansen postoffice. He takes the place vacated by the death of J. R. Hall.

Smith formerly was a city carrier at Twin Falls and has been transferred to Hansen, Mrs. Lena Calico, postmistress, said.

### Gem Teacher Cites Dangers From Fallout

CALDWELL, March 17 (AP)—A visiting professor of biology at the College of Idaho has expressed concern that radioactive fallout from atomic tests "will slowly and insidiously produce detrimental effects in human populations."

Dr. E. W. Pfeiffer, in a letter to the Denver Post, voiced agreement with two University of Colorado scientists, who said radiation in Colorado as a result of the Nevada tests might hold long-range danger for the state's inhabitants.

Pfeiffer told a reporter "the closer you are to the tests, presumably the more danger there is. He said he had done no specialized research in effects of radioactivity, but drew his ideas from scientific journals."

Pfeiffer, who received his doctorate from the University of California at Berkeley last year, said he had previously urged that the atomic energy commission halt the tests until their effects were determined and announced.

Asked for a resolution which failed to pass at a recent meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in Berkeley, Pfeiffer said he thought his resolution, and others like it, were responsible for appointment of a committee of the association to study fallout effects.

Pfeiffer urged the Denver newspaper to publish the "critical need to know what these tests may be doing to the health of our nation."

"As a biologist, I share the concern felt by increasing numbers of scientists over the possibility that the accumulation of radioactive materials resulting from repeated tests will slowly and insidiously produce detrimental effects in human populations."

Danger Called Grave He said the committee of scientists was being formed because "there are grave dangers of injury resulting from such tests and because the evidence is not generally available."

Pfeiffer enclosed an editorial from the December Bulletin of the Atomic Scientists discussing possible damage to the hereditary endowment of the human race and other species of life, caused not by a local and quickly passing accumulation of highly radioactive materials, but by exposure of whole nations or continents to a weak but widespread and persistent radioactivity.

### Double Protection Is Sought by Hen

POGATELLO, March 17 (AP)—Mrs. George L. Pile, Tybee, Idaho, has a hen that apparently doesn't want her eggs to be half-safe.

Mrs. Pile reported to a local newspaper that the hen laid a king-sized five-inch round egg that afforded its yolk the double protection of two shells.

There was no talk between the first and second shells, although there was plenty of the usual egg white, Mrs. Pile said.

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### Yalta Papers Are Given to World Public

(From Page One)  
Have no part in post-war administration of occupied Germany—although France might, perhaps, have a zone of her own as a "kindness of Churchill's hands"—France resumes her place in post-war Europe. He said he had to think of the time when the Americans would come in "two years." FDR told him and Britain might need France again as a defense against Germany.

Publication of the Yalta papers promises some lively developments. The over-all Yalta story, the commitments and results, long have been known. But the details were secret. Much will remain so because the documents published last night admittedly were not complete, although they were certified as giving the most definitive and comprehensive picture possible at the time. The state department said it had deleted no matter of substance.

**Debates Foreseen**  
The documents cannot fail to whip up again debate whether FDR was justified in making, at the expense of China, political and territorial concessions to persuade the United Nations to join the war against Japan.

"They show" that Mr. Roosevelt thought breaking Germany into five or seven different states would be a "good idea."

He was deeply concerned about Poland at the Yalta conference. The President told Churchill and Stalin that the Polish vote was big in the United States and he wanted to see a creature of the six million Americans of Polish extraction. But Stalin and Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov, who had been the British-American plan to have the big three ambassadors observe the post-war Polish elections to insure free elections. Mr. Roosevelt backed down on that. The British protested to the last. Stalin also won on demands for a slice of eastern Poland.

"Aiger Hiss emerges from the papers as an occasional participant in discussions but with no discernible policy part in the show. His pencilled notes in a single file folder—reproduced in the Yalta papers—nothing as to the influence—great or small—which he may have had.

**Balked on Items**  
The British and Americans did not give Stalin all he wanted, but they got him more or less on German reparations and in the far east. Top revelation of the Yalta papers was the reprieve Aiger Hiss obtained Oct. 10, 1944, that he had obtained full agreement from Stalin for Russia to join the war against Japan. That report didn't give Stalin's price for making war on Japan. The price came later in Dec. 8 reports from Hiss that then U. S. ambassador to the Soviet Union.

It was nearly four months later on Feb. 4, 1945 that the Yalta conference convened and Mr. Roosevelt agreed substantially to the Russian conditions handed by Stalin. Some of these concessions were at the expense of Nationalist China, agreed without prior consultation with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

**Demands Listed**  
The Yalta conference met in that Crimean village Feb. 4-11, 1945. On Feb. 8 Stalin put demands for concessions to Mr. Roosevelt. The British were not present. Two days later Molotov gave Harrison a detailed, written outline of the Russian price for entering the war against Japan, as follows:  
1. Preserve the status quo in outer Mongolia where communism had a good hold.  
2. Treators to Russia southern Sakhalin and adjacent islands taken by Japan in the Russo-Japanese war.  
3. The Russians to have "possession" of Port Arthur and Dairen.  
4. Railroad rights through Manchuria without disturbing Chinese sovereignty.  
5. Cession of the Kurile Islands to Soviet Russia.

**Reason for Defeat Told by Chairman**  
SALT LAKE CITY, March 17 (AP)—The reason the Republicans will lose in 1950, the national Democratic chairman says, is because the GOP pass only the laws to doing something for the common man.

Paul Butler told 1,100 Democrats at a Jefferson-Jackson day dinner last night that Republicans will lose in every major field have favored the affected few.

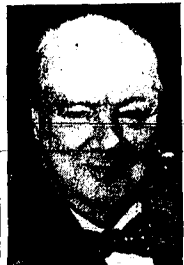

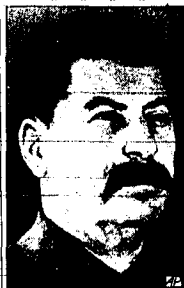

### Footnotes on Yalta Confab Made Public

WASHINGTON, March 17 (AP)—Footnotes to history in the newly-published Yalta papers:

The late President Roosevelt, in a secret message to British Prime Minister Winston Churchill before the Yalta conference, referred to the late Russian Premier Josef Stalin as "a little Joe." Churchill in his reply shortened it to "U. J." But when the big three met face to face, Roosevelt and Churchill always addressed the Russian dictator as "Marshal Stalin."

Scrawled pencil notes by Alger Hiss were included in the documents. Hiss attended the Yalta conference in his capacity as deputy director of the state department's office of special political affairs. He later was convicted of perjury for denying that he had supplied secret government information to a pre-war communist spy ring.

His notes—reproduced verbatim with his own abbreviations and shorthand—were largely a straight-ahead stenographic record of meetings he attended with no outward evidence of pro-Russian sympathy.

The documents bore the official title: "The Conferences at Malta and Yalta, 1945." They were released as two bulky volumes totaling 83 pages. Both together were the size of the Manhattan telephone directory. Indicating that they later were published in great haste, the volumes given reporters were stamped "uncorrected galley proofs." They contained numerous typographical errors.

Two paragraphs of the printed volumes were carefully deleted before publication. One of the deleted paragraphs was a statement by the state department spokesman refused to say what was thus deleted, but indicated that it was "substance" was left out.

Roosevelt said he was optimistic that the end of World War II would usher in 50 years of peace. Stalin replied that as long as he, Roosevelt and Churchill were alive, he felt confident "none of them would involve their countries in aggressive actions."

But the Russian leader added that in 10 years all three of them might be dead. (Ten years later, Churchill is the only one alive.)  
The state department said the documents it made public, while a "partial record" of the Yalta conference, were "not so complete as might be desired." It said it had tried, but failed, to gain access to the "private notes" of the Yalta conference from the three leading U. S. participants—James F. Byrnes, then a presidential adviser and later governor of South Carolina; Averell Harriman, then ambassador to Russia and now governor of New York; and the late secretary of State Edward R. Stettinius.

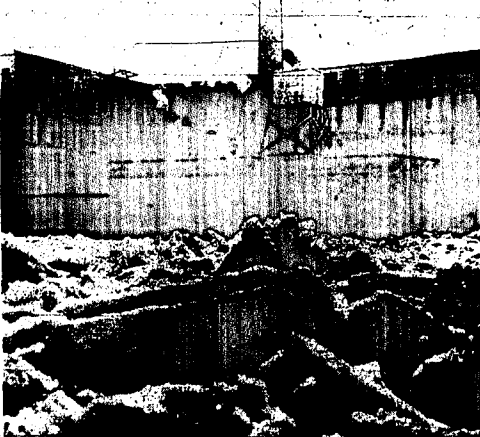

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### Dance Leader Finds TV Has Road to Fame

NEW YORK, March 17 (AP)—Television has painful obvious limitations that prevent it from being anything like an ideal showcase for a creator of dances—or for dancers—yet one of the hottest young choreographers today owes his eminence to TV.

Not that Tony Charmoll wouldn't have made it anyway, but having your work on those living room screens week after week is no way to remain anonymous.

**Large Audience**

In fact, it is entirely possible that this 32-year-old choreographer of NBC's "Your Hit Parade," who also stages all of the musical numbers of this Saturday night half-hour, has had his work viewed by more persons than any other dance creator outside of the movies.

Tony, who is small but about as sturdy as the iron range of northern Minnesota where he was born and reared, averages three dance creations per Saturday 30 weeks a year. He is now nearing the end of his fifth season with the show. He's approaching a total of 585 dance numbers. The program is estimated to have about 30 million viewers weekly.

**Each Challenge**

"Personally, I've never stopped to think about the statistics," Charmoll said. "Every week is a new challenge and I get a kick out of doing it."

"The toughest part of the job—and I'm speaking not merely as the choreographer but as the one who has to stage all of the numbers even when there is no dancing involved—is to come up with a fresh idea for presenting a song after it has been on the hit parade week after week. We have an idea man just for this purpose, but most of us in the production end can offer a suggestion. I won't say that I'm unhappy when a number that's been around a long time finally gives way to a new song."
