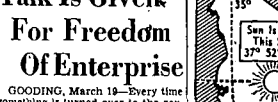

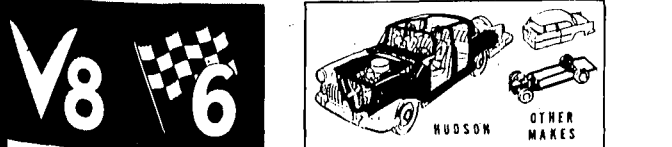

HELLS CANYON ORATORY

Now that Oregon's Sen. Wayne L. Morse and 33 other cosponsors in the senate and house of representatives have introduced identical bills to have the federal government build a high dam in Hells canyon, the scene of hostilities shifts once more in a knock-down and drag-out political battle.

It is significant that all the cosponsors except two are willing, at this critical juncture in the Idaho delegation joining forces with those carrying the fight into congress.

Now it should be crystal clear to everyone why those favoring a government controlled dam have tried to prolong the hearings before the federal power commission. When it became apparent they could not win their fight through the FCC, based on the merits of the project alone, they decided to make a political fight in congress, before the FCC could hand down its decision NEET fall.

To be made through all the Hells canyon oratory placed in the Congressional Record since these identical bills are introduced in Congress and Washington, usually new so far as the proposed dam itself is concerned.

From the political standpoint, there was one highly significant suggestion, coming from none other than Senator Morse himself.

"I wish to say for the Record," he said, "that I should be perfectly willing to see full discussion in the state of Idaho, to have the issue go to a referendum. I think the Senator (Dworak) will discover that when the people of his state come to understand the issue as the people of Oregon and Washington understand it, they will join forces in insisting that Hells canyon dam be constructed."

The Times-News has advocated such a referendum from the point of view of the people of Idaho who have an opportunity to speak for themselves. That would be the only effective way of challenging the "Congressional Record" that has been made up by Idaho who are in favor of a government dam in Hells canyon, and that the only real opposition is coming from the Idaho Power Company.

It was suggested by the suggestion or merely a subterfuge, the people of Idaho should hold Senator Morse to his statement "for the Record," that they would be glad to see the Senator as he sits as a public figure should be decided by referendum.

But in seeking such an election, the people also should be on their guard against the type of "all-out" methods Morse and his cosponsors may have in mind.

For such "all-out" procedure, for instance, Oregon's constitutional power of congress that are involved, proposed that the series of congressional hearings on the new Hells canyon dam be held in Portland, Ore., Pasco, Idaho, and Lewiston, Idaho.

Why Lewiston? Because the Hells canyon dam is in Idaho, why not Boise, Twin Falls, Idaho Falls, or any other part of the state where farm organizations are so numerous?

Senator Dworak emphasized that all Idaho is not for a high Hells canyon dam by any means. He pointed out that more than 1,000 water districts in Idaho would be affected by the dam and that many of them have voted unanimously in opposition, time and time again.

Give ALL of the people of Idaho the opportunity for an all-out election, Senator Dworak said, and then let them the opportunity of a referendum. We predict a statewide vote would give Hells canyon dam a beating that would embarrass the Idaho Power Company, we doubt seriously, the pro-Hells canyon advocates in Idaho would ever favor an such statewide referendum.

I don't think that the ordinary Russian, the worker and peasant, are so stupid as we are. Every bit of worth-while evidence suggests the contrary. But no matter how they feel, it is vitally impossible for them to stage a revolt in such a police state. They are a red army and party forces have arms. There is a red army in every block and factory, Base hands and bikes are no match for tanks, machine guns, mortars, planes, etc.

 Shrew Tiniest Animal, Beetle Largest Insect

Of the 4,000 or so species of insected animals, the smallest is the shrew—a six-legged creature weighing but a ounce—and the largest is the African elephant which weighs several tons. Quite a contrast!

But a much wider range separates the pinworm and the giant of the insect world which weighs more than a million pounds.

Considered in a broad way, the shrew is the largest of living insects is shared by two of the African beetle and the elephant beetle of South America. The latter measures more than four and one-half inches from tip to tip of forward-projecting horn to extremity of abdomen. Of course, one shouldn't overlook the male Hercules beetle, the largest from South America. Its over-all measurement may be six and one half inches—but the huge pointed prong springing from its thorax may exceed almost half its length.

Among the scale-winged insects are not so bulky—the largest known is the Atlas moth of India, some

trophies measuring 12 inches from tip to tip of extended forewings. But imposing as this may be, they are not equalled by the great orb-weaver spider, which is not uncommon in many parts of South America.

Butterflies come smaller—yet the six-winged butterflies of New Guinea and the adjacent islands are the largest and insofar as the male are bulkier—the largest are the handsome with their glossy green or orange or gold colors. The russet and brown females, however, are large exceeding their mates in wing expanse by an inch or more.

Although not quite as large as these beetles, many of the tropical American morpho butterflies are truly magnificent in their dimensions and coloring—varying in shades of lovely iridescent blue, through with palest purple.

Smylie, Jordan Use Different Systems To Figure Cost of State's Government

BOISE, March 19 (AP)—Gov. E. C. Smylie's statement that the cost of state government has been reduced five per cent represents still another difference between him and his predecessor, Len Jordan.

Smylie's figures, it is being estimated, are based on the cost of operating the state in the next biennium, rather than Smylie's estimate of only \$32,525,000 more.

Smylie maintains that the only accurate way to measure the cost of government is to figure the cost of operating the government in the next biennium, without regard to what they are spent.

He did this during the week in which he estimated that the total increase for the 1953-54 session over the 1951-52 session was \$12,225,000.

This year's legislature appropriated \$49,410,643, a difference of \$12,225,000.

In the total appropriations figure for this session it is added three million dollars of support for public school education.

"In reality then, this session has reduced all other costs of government in this session by approximately \$2,900,000. This decrease is slightly in excess of a 5 per cent reduction in the over-all cost of government, education excluded."

Asylum Hinted For 20 Seamen Of Soviet Ship

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—The United States has decided to grant asylum to about 20 Russian seamen who deserted their ship after it was seized off Pomors by the Chinese Nationalists.

Secretary General Brownell, it was learned, is ready to lift present immigration barriers and recent legislation to admit them.

This move, however, is virtually certain to provoke a hot protest from Russia, which has been demanding return of the men along with their ship.

The defectors are part of a 48-man crew captured last June 22 by Nationalist destroyers along with their ship, the tanker Tuapse, as it sailed for Red China.

It is understood that the Tuapse, along with the 28 crewmen who had been chosen to stick to the Russian flag, will be turned over to Soviet authorities within a few weeks.

Under an asylum plan now being developed, the crewmen will be permitted to make contact with their families and to secure visas to the United States.

The decision to admit them climaxes six months of vigorous behind-the-scenes debate among government departments involved in the problem.

Secretary of State Dulles is reported to have urged in favor of the move, with cold war repercussions in mind, he felt accepting the seamen would encourage other Soviet sailors to desert.

Brownell, on the other hand, at first opposed the asylum plan, fearing among other things it would add to the already heavy workload handled by the federal bureau of investigation.

After numerous conferences, Brownell is understood to have relaxed his stand and is ready to grant temporary visas to the men, making it clear the length of their stay depends on their behavior.

The defectors presumably have been questioned by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, intelligence agents, including the hush-hush central intelligence agency.

Chinese immigration laws bar U. S. entry by communists and former communists. Brownell, however, has the right to waive these restrictions when he believes it would serve the government's security interests.

'Fake' Nurse Takes Infant

BEADWORTH, Tex., March 19 (AP)—An infant girl less than a half-hour old was taken from a hospital here this afternoon by a woman disguised as a nurse.

The mother of the child was still in the delivery room when the baby was taken, hospital officials said.

G. H. Dyalpinski, administrator of the hospital, said the nurse was born at 12:55 p. m. She was taken from the second-floor nursery by an unidentified woman about 1:15 p. m.

Dyalpinski said no one saw the woman enter or leave the hospital.

Mrs. Helen May Beaman was on duty at the nursery at the time.

Mrs. Beaman said a woman, dressed in a white nurse uniform and wearing white hose and white shoes came to her at the nursery about 1:15 p. m. and said Mrs. Beaman was wanted at the business office of the hospital on the first floor.

The woman said she would relieve Mrs. Beaman while she was in the office.

Mrs. Beaman said she went from the nursery about four minutes. When she returned, the child and the woman were missing.

Manual Reveals Secret Codes; Signals Used by Reds in U. S.

SEATTLE, March 19 (AP)—Communist party big chiefs from using flower pots for window signals (the cops are wise), but they recommend the use of onion juice and water for writing secret messages.

This and a lot of other cloak and dagger information was gleaned from a handbook of house and American activities subcommittee obtained from a witness Friday.

The manual, among hundreds of documents stuffed into four cartons, was supplied by Eugene Hennek, a collector and former Communist official testifying before the subcommittee.

Bennett had the records because he ignored orders from the party to destroy them in 1947 when he was asked to drop membership for "de-nationalist Trotskyism."

Tavernier said the records are the most voluminous ever turned over to the committee by a former Communist.

He said the handbook, written by V. Vassiliou, a former communist strategist, goes much more into detail of Communist party mechanics and "a much plainer in its purposes" than anything in the extensive files of the committee.

Not only were the cops wise to the flower pots, Vassiliou wrote, they were even doublecrossing the communists by putting pots in the windows themselves.

"Comrades were instructed to use the latest inventions of chemistry" in writing messages not intended for bourgeois eyes. But if the chemicals weren't handy, mix onion juice and water, they were told.

Cops were viewed as bad places for meetings. "There always are spies in cafes and in countless numbers, and it is difficult to get rid of them."

An ordinary, indiscriminate spy was recommended. Instead, passwords for getting into that flat were mandatory, and of varying complexity as an official rank increased. A member who could ask and respond to three questions could be "addressed with full frankness."

Codes were specified, too, ranging from ordinary word juggling to real mysterious stuff about book pages and posters. They were to use 20 pounds of type for the printing press.

There were official instructions for infiltration of unions, industrial enterprises and professions like law, medicine, education and writing.

Yes, even color that manual was printed in.

ADA Hits Ike, Own Party for Lacking Unity

WASHINGTON, March 19 (AP)—American for Democratic Action struck sharply today at what they called "complicity and confusion" in the Eisenhower administration.

They also said the Democrats too often sacrifice principle "to a mythical party unity."

In a published policy statement adopted at its annual convention, the ADA said its own organization could help the nation by acting independently of both major parties to cut through the "complicity and the apathy that have paralyzed us in the face of danger."

The statement said the central political issue today "is the shocking contradiction between the magnitude of the problems confronting us and the weary apathy with which they are being met."

Calling attention to threats of communist tyranny, the "H-bomb" and "slings unemployment" the statement said: "These are unprecedented challenges. They require unprecedented responses."

Rap Administration... "Indeed, we have only the image of ability, complicity and confusion presented by the Eisenhower administration, reinforced by the most reactionary elements among the Democrats in congress—of drift, disunity, and distrust in the congress."

"We could perhaps have afforded the 1880s or even perhaps in the 1920s. We could have afforded, too, an opposition party without vigorous leadership or a fresh program. Formed in 1947

"The Democratic party, in opposition has too often handicapped itself by sacrificing principle to a mythical party unity."

"We cannot afford these indulgences in 1955."

"The ADA was formed in 1947 and describes itself as an independent, anti-Communist organization espousing 'liberal' principles.

Space Travel Desire Is Not Yet Possible

From the hillside we watched Venus, resplendent gold in the blue twilight as she sank slowly toward the skyline of the western mountains. "It is just too bad," said one of our group who has viewed this beautiful planet from widely separated lands, "that we cannot somehow go to that other world and learn what it is like there."

This urge for interplanetary travel has so far prevailed as nothing. Until recently, our vehicles for ascending to the skies—balloons and propeller airplanes—were good for only a few miles of altitude since they were dependent upon the presence of relatively dense air for their movements.

Jet planes and rockets, which can travel outside the atmosphere, now offer better opportunities for getting out into space. They operate on the principle of Newton's third law of motion, that "to every action there is an equal and opposite reaction."

Rockets without passengers have recently gone as high as 250 miles above the earth and have acquired terrific speeds, but far below the 25,000 miles per hour needed for first orbit above the earth without further propellants. Some believe that flying saucers actually are bringing us communicants from other worlds.

Signaling to the planets seems at present more practical than traveling. From 1924 until recent times many telescopes have reported seeing sudden flashes of light on Mars. Professor Lowell's confirmation of this phenomenon in 1904 gave impetus to the idea that Martians were trying desperately to signal to us. It is well known now that electro-magnetic waves come to us from far out in space. But few are advocating that these come from intelligent beings attempting to communicate with us.

The Martian signals are no longer very seriously considered. Since all the flashes appear in the regions of the polar snow cap, many believe them to be mirror effects from occasional unusually level areas of ice at the instant the planet's rotation brings these into the proper position to reflect the sun's light to us.

But suppose—the Martians are trying to signal us. How shall we answer? When we see Mars best we are between it and the sun. To "inhabitants" there the earth is then lost in the sun's rays, so our signals could not be seen. Someone has suggested that a few months later we illuminate Mars with a powerful beam of light. This might be a simple response from them, another has advocated that we direct a beam of ultra high frequency radio waves at Mars, trusting that proper receivers are in operation there. If we send three dots—indicating ours is the third planet from the sun—and they answer with four—meaning "Mars comes next"—we might be convinced we had established communication with highly intelligent beings.

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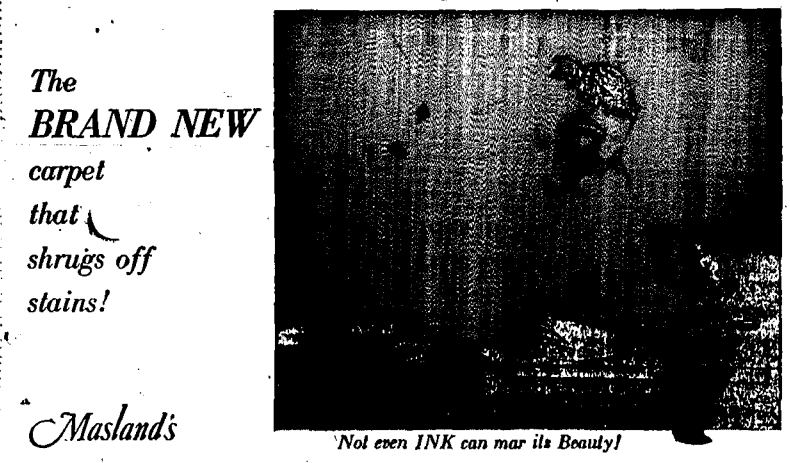

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Idaho Farmer Report Given On Job Totals

An estimated 48,600 farm operators, family workers and farm hands were engaged in Idaho farm activities during February, according to statistics released by the employment security agency, Boise.

The total includes 40,400 farm operators and family workers, 7,200 regular hired workers and 1,000 seasonal workers.

With agricultural activity remaining near the season's low, the agency report said, farm operators and family workers continued to furnish the bulk of the farm employment. The total increase in agricultural openings over the previous month was 700.

Non-agricultural openings continued to decline in the January to February period, with February employment estimated at 124,600. This represents a decrease of 800 from the 125,400 workers employed in January, but an increase of 3,400 over February, 1954.

Manufacturing employment decreased by 600 workers from mid-January to mid-February, with 20,800 workers reported employed in February, 1954, versus 20,200 in February, 1954.

Employment in mining, trade, service and government totaled 103,800 compared to the February, 1954, total of 102,000.

Display of Important Foreigner Plays Part in National Wildlife Week Plan

JEROME, March 19—Foreigners being raised at the Jerome game farm will be exhibited for the first time during National Wildlife week which starts Sunday, says William Gneini, superintendent.

As a feature of National Wildlife week, all installations of the fish and game department will be open for public inspection.

The "foreigner" is the chukar partridge which may be of major importance in the future of Idaho's upland game bird population. The bird is quite a bit smaller than the pheasant but larger than a quail. It originally came to this country from India, says Gneini.

Idaho got its first chukars from Oregon around 1928. "Two birds did not propagate in the field," Gneini says, "and they looked like a loss. We were particularly interested in them because they are docile, tame and require little cover. They actually can live where you wouldn't believe anything could stay alive."

"About four years after the first birds were planted, we experienced a noticeable increase in their numbers near King Hill. That, apparently, was only a flash in the pan because for years after that we thought they were dying out," says Gneini.

Gneini says that during the past four years chukars have increased in numbers.

"Fish and game department officials feel that the signs of increased population among the chukars are encouraging enough to warrant an all-out attempt this year to establish the birds," Gneini adds.

Charles S. Blake, bird biologist for the fourth district, says the chukar population is estimated at about 4,000 in the portions of Blaine county and Gooding county north of King Hill. He reports 970 birds were planted in the rough region from 1950 to 1954. Other plantings included 1,150 birds in Twin Falls county in 1954 and 800 birds in Cassia county from 1946 to 1954.

Blake says the chukar requires a rough, open terrain with good elevation changes. He says rock outcrop and tallus slopes are as much a part of chukar habitat as grain fields are for pheasant. The birds apparently have become established in the Dry creek area of Twin Falls county, he notes.

The first chukar season in Idaho was held in 1953 in portions of Gem, Payette and Washington counties. During the day and a half season, 130 hunters were checked. They had 153 birds, "roughly" the best chukar hunting in Idaho.

In 1954, the season was opened in the eastern portion of Elmore county and the west part of Gooding county between King Hill creek and highway 46. The two-week season included three week-ends. What was believed to represent 85 per cent of checking covered 50 hunters with 76 birds.

Coinciding with the observance of National Wildlife week, the Jerome game farm and the Hagerman wildlife refuge are preparing to release a total of 3,000 chukars to be planted in eight Idaho counties.

Currently 250 of the birds are kept

Officials Deny Report on Big Red's Buildup

TAIPEI, Formosa, March 19 (AP)—Nationalist Chinese and American sources Saturday discounted an unfounded report of a big Communist buildup on the mainland opposite Matsui Island.

Reports which now are regarded as baseless included one that the Reds had moved jet planes to bases in Fukien province, off which both Taiwan and Quemoy islands are situated.

There appeared to be greatly increased confidence that under present circumstances the Nationalists would be able successfully to defend both Matsui and Quemoy, 180 miles to the south.

Observers conceded, however, that the situation could change quickly. But for the moment there seems to be no imminent threat to the offshore islands that the Nationalist defenders could not handle.

Nationalist sources have said repeatedly that the defenses on Matsui are being strengthened by sizeable reinforcements. The original garrison was about 5,000 troops and guerrillas. Official sources have indicated the number has been increased to about 20,000 men.

The Nationalist air force said Saturday patrol planes sank a 150-ton communist gunboat, 175 miles north of Formosa Saturday. No other action was reported.

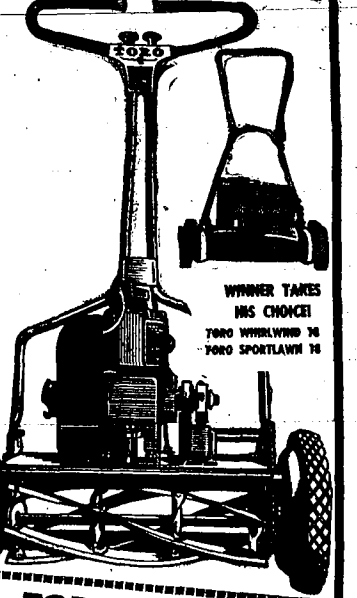

Preview of Huge Bus Given Residents; Many New Features Include Washroom

A two-decker, 43-passenger monster of a bus, complete with lavatory, was previewed by Twin Falls residents Saturday when Greyhound demonstrated and exhibited the new bus.

The bus, powered by two 150-horsepower diesel motors, is 40 feet long, exceeding the length of present transcontinental buses by five feet. It also carries four more passengers than the older single-deck type.

The new bus weighs 39,000 pounds empty; the one-decker weighs 28,000 pounds. Its cost is \$52,000, compared to \$33,000 for the one-decker.

The upper deck, which is eight feet above ground level, seats 33 passengers. The forward part of the bus, at conventional level, accommodates 10 passengers and the bus driver.

Riding on the upper deck creates some unusual sensations. Crossing the Perrine Memorial bridge Saturday, passengers got the feeling of looking down at the canyon from an airplane. The view was sensational and disconcerting.

Special features, which the bus lacks but which are soon to be installed include wipers for the upper-deck windshields and a combination radio and public address system. No immediate plans have been made to install a kitchenette, so rest stops are still necessary.

The new buses, of which 500 have been ordered, first went into operation last September. Like the older type, they have governors which keep engine speed down to 1,900 revolutions per minute, or 64 miles per hour.

Waste water from the wash basin drains out the exhaust pipe. The toilet has a chemical unit similar to that used in aircraft.

The new bus has six wheels with dual tires on all four rear wheels. The engines are mounted in the rear of the bus. Springs have been replaced with two rubber bellows to each wheel.

All the new buses are air conditioned, and a new ventilator above each seat draws tobacco smoke directly out of the bus without permitting it to circulate through the interior.

Doctor Gives up Practice to Continue Medical Corps Work

Dr. Malcolm Sawyer has given up his practice in Twin Falls to accept a commission in the air force with the medical corps. He was not recalled as a reservist but will serve with the military for an indefinite time.

He has been a resident of Twin Falls since 1940 with the exception of five years of military service with the medical corps during World War II. Dr. Sawyer maintained offices in the Medical Arts building, 1215 Madison avenue east. He closed his office Friday.

Dr. Sawyer will report for duty April 4 at Gunter air force base in Alabama for a three-week induction course. He will then attend the air force school of aviation, medicine, at Randolph field, Texas, for three months.

Mrs. Sawyer and their three daughters will remain in Twin Falls until he completes his courses in Texas.

On completion of his medical courses he will be assigned to Wheeler air force base, Tripoli, Africa.

Prior to coming to Twin Falls, Dr. Sawyer was with the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn., for three and one-half years. He is a graduate of Northwestern University and did his interne work at St. Luke's hospital in Chicago, Ill.

Dr. Sawyer is a member of the Blue Lakes Country club and the Elks lodge here.

Before reporting for military duty he plans to do some skiing at Sun Valley with his family.

Burley Man Offers His Ideas For Twin Falls School Plans

Editor, Times-News:

I was interested in last Sunday's forum page by two letters signed Claude Cheney and Mrs. Turley. They both made sense from beginning to end.

It seems to me one look at the maps shows clearly South Park is the most "separate" portion of the city. It seems very undesirable for three children or any other to have to cross that canyon, go through the whole of the whole, industrial and business sections of a farmstead town, and then still have to go as far as to the other students.

And that holds regardless of whether they are transported or not. And transportation really costs, a fact which seems to have been pretty well overlooked in this whole reorganization mess of recent years by the famous Peabody report.

What if there are only 154 students. Is that not enough for four rooms? All these schools do not have to be the same size. Let them fit the conditions. I should like the logical thing would be to put a four, six or eight-room school, whatever is required, over these rooms down to 12 or 13 (thereabouts) for the time being. Probably small schools are more economical anyway.

In the good old days, we used to build a one-room school for a hundred or two hundred dollars. Avhille back, we of Cassia county decided to build a couple of six-room affairs at \$45,000 to \$30,000 or about \$4,000 per room. Isn't that silly and pitiful!

Now you folks are contemplating \$600,000, divided by 22, that comes to \$10,928 per room or about \$300 for a place to set a chair. And I look special nose before I write this that neither the land or the furnishings were included in that figure.

Truly the sheep will follow the goats and, like Walter Winchell, that is not an untrue statement.

I have been paid many an elementary school of 16 rooms and down, at a legal rate of speed, while the children were at play and never saw one yet with a city block of two to three acres that looked even a little like it did not have sufficient room. If I had been driving faster, you might say I did not have time to look.

Symphony Theme Original Dvorak, Says Burley Man

In the Times-News program notes about the Utah symphony performance there are some misleading and inaccurate statements concerning the Dvorak symphony No. 5. The writer

up states that the work includes such familiar Negro melodies as "Goin' Home," "Massa, Dear," and "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot."

"Massa, Dear" and "Goin' Home" are the same melody. But the main point I wish to make is that this well-known passage is an original theme by the composer and has more or less been adopted by us as a folk song.

So far as "Swing Low, Sweet Chariot" is concerned, it does not actually occur at all in the symphony. There is a theme containing a brief reference to this spiritual. This is the only reference in the entire score to Negro music, and it is a matter of conjecture whether or not Dvorak actually copied this melody. Dvorak himself said, "Omit the nonsense about my having made use of Indian and American motifs. It is a lie. I tried only to write in the spirit of these national melodies."

Windbreak Plantings Made in Wood River Pilot District

SHOSHONE, March 19—Seventeen windbreak applications have been approved by the Idaho fish and game department and the soil conservation district for the Wood River pilot district. Stress is being placed on need for closer coordination of wildlife production and private land management.

The applications are from farmers who have expressed agreement in cooperating in wildlife habitat improvement. The trees and shrubs will be furnished by the fish and game department and will be planted by matching at no charge. The soil conservation district will supervise the plantings and care of the trees and shrubs. The farmer will maintain the area according to requirements laid to him.

The kinds of trees that will be used will be the moderately-tall Russian olive and tall black locust with the Siberian pea and bladder senna shrubs and a multi-flora rosebush will be used at some points. Evergreens to be used include blue spruce, Scotch pine and Norway spruce.

All windbreaks are expected to be planted by May 15. Between now and that date, farmers will plow the rows of trees, a recommended for the first year or two by the soil conservation district.

Purpose of the trees will be threefold: To provide food and protection to birds in the winter, beauty farms and eliminate land erosion.

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Study Shows New School Construction Can Be Completed Without Federal

WASHINGTON, March 19—School construction needs can be fully met at the state and local level without federal aid if annual expenditures continue to rise for just another five years at the 200 million dollar annual rate of the past nine years.

Figures supporting this contention were released today in a study published by the Washington research office of the Council of State Chambers of Commerce. The study, which was signed by Eugene F. Rinta, research director, was prepared for the 31 state and regional Chambers of Commerce in the council.

"The two billion dollar expenditure in the current year will provide 60,000 new classrooms as compared to 45,000 needed for increased enrollment plus 8,000 for annual replacement of obsolete buildings," the study notes.

"If the annual expenditures for school buildings continue to rise for another five years at the 200 million dollar annual rate of the past nine years and if costs remain at the 1954-55 level, the estimated present deficit of 300,000 classrooms will be reduced by 132,900 by September, 1960."

"If first emphasis were placed on eliminating overcrowding in existing classrooms in the continuing construction expansion projected above, the present estimated deficit of 20,000 classrooms which causes the overcrowding would be eliminated in the 1958-59 school year," the report continues.

"Then a substantial start would be made in 1959-60 toward replacing obsolete buildings. A leveling off of school construction at 3 billion dollars a year for the five years after 1959-60 would make possible the replacement by 1964-65 of all the 210,000 classrooms which are now considered obsolete as well as the 8,000 which become obsolete each year. At the same time this program would provide classrooms for the projected annual increase in public school enrollments."

Rinta pointed out that the substantial and steady increase in expenditures for school construction since World War II indicates that the need for more classrooms has been recognized and that a great job is being done at the local level, with state assistance in some cases, to meet the need.

Citing the argument of the advocates of federal aid that the states and school districts have just about reached the limits of their financial capacities, the study said:

"This argument presupposes that the tax and borrowing resources of local and state governments are now being fully utilized and that the treasury of the United States is better positioned to meet the school construction needs than are the treasuries of the states and the localities."

1. Statutory limitations on borrowing capacities are too low to meet the needs.

2. Unreliable revenues are the result of a number of factors.

3. More state and federal government revenue is needed to meet the needs.

4. Local and state governments are not fully utilizing their resources.

5. Federal government revenue is not being fully utilized and that the
