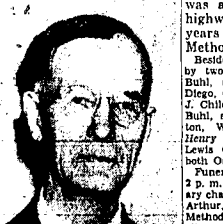

John B. Keith, district range manager, said the carrying capacity of a range is not a scientific figure following a range survey made by qualified technicians. He said the carrying capacity is not based on guesswork.

In establishing the carrying capacity of the range in question, he continued, the elements set the date between which they wanted to use the public range.

Cuts, he added, could have been taken in the amount of time the range would be used, permitting more cattle to be grazed.

So far, all of the protests on the cuts have been received from cattlemen but Keith said the department is expecting protests from sheepmen. He said he understands their protests will be to allotment and season of use rather than carrying capacity.

Weed Control Application Is Topic of Meet

BOISE, March 23 (AP)—Weed control men of the west got together yesterday to discuss problems which range from ridding lands of weeds to eradicating "undesirable" trees and brush from the path of power lines.

"They were told that the science of weed control may have 'passed' up the practical application and it is flourishing around in the dust."

Roger M. Blouch, research chairman of a two-day western states weed control conference, replied he believed it to be true in some cases, but it is not entirely the fault of the research men.

"Have you experts become so engrossed in chemicals in ecological procedure and application," state agriculture commissioner Harold Brundage asked you have forgotten about the everyday farmer back there with his weeds?"

"I'm certain," Blouch charging that you do not have the farmer in mind with all of your experiments, but have you got it across in the fellow with the weed?"

West said "thousands of farmers are not aware of what the weed will do for them if they do not control it."

He said scientists should try to develop chemicals and procedures which farmers can use.

Blouch, a biologist at Colorado A. and M. college, Fort Collins, Colo., said there needed to be "spread" getting the results of research to the farmer. He said it is often hard to get farmers to accept new weed control methods.

Ike Cites U. S. Need to Have World Trade

WASHINGTON, March 23 (AP)—Unless the United States makes it possible for the free-world to trade more freely, President Eisenhower said yesterday, "we are not going to win the ideological contest" with communism.

He sounded this note of warning as the senate finance committee resumed hearings on his controversial proposal for a public sector program. Eisenhower said a trade pact with the reciprocal trade agreements act with expanded tariff-cutting powers.

In an informal talk to the Advertising Council, a group of private businessmen who are the government's public sector program, Eisenhower said a trade pact doesn't just mean opening American markets to people from other countries. "Like all other foreign policy, its genesis is the enlightened self-interest of the United States," he said.

"But it is recognition of this fact, that if the United States itself is to prosper, it must have means by which it can sell its products, and therefore it has to buy others."

In addition to extending the trade agreements act, Eisenhower said he is pending in congress would give the President authority to cut tariffs by 50 percent over the period in return for foreign trade concessions.

The house passed the bill 395-110 Feb. 10 after a two-day fight. An even tougher battle is shaping up in the senate.

Italy Chief Risks His Political Life

ROME, March 23 (AP)—Premier Romo Scelba staked the life of his government today against a last-minute attempt by non-communists to thwart his departure tonight for the United States.

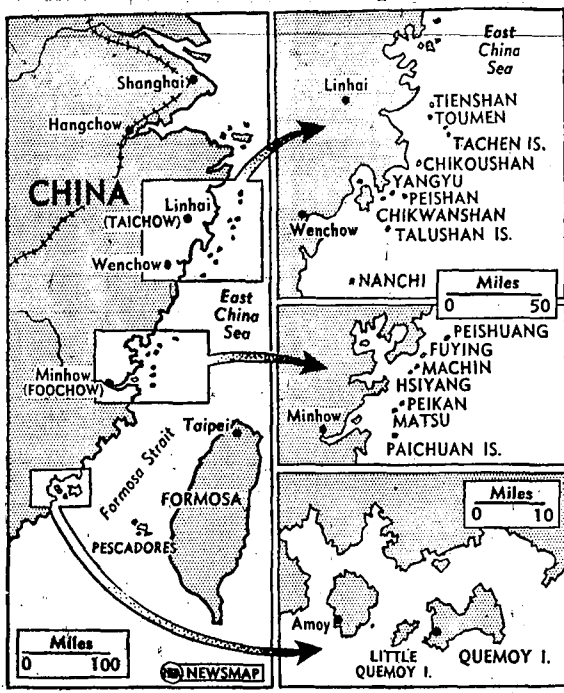

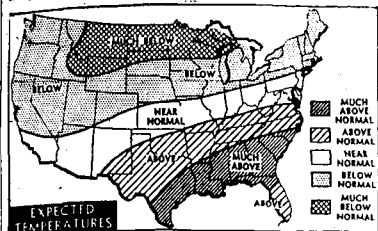

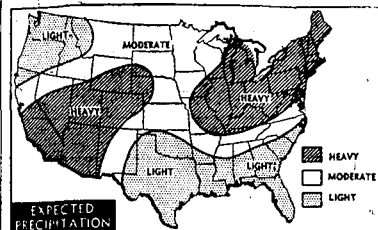

East Germany, Other Russian Satellites, Feel Hunger Pangs

A serious food shortage has hit communist East Germany and red satellites seem to be getting worse. Factories workers have started to protest. Agriculture Minister Paul Scholtz has lost his post.

But there seems to be no remedy for the situation. It is one which is affecting not only every Russian satellite but Soviet Russia itself and its ally Communist China.

What it points to is a failure of basic communist agricultural policies and of their application by communist bureaucrats.

The communists must be especially anxious over the situation in East Germany. The workers there have shown that they are not completely overawed by their red masters.

The communists certainly have not forgotten the riots of two years ago, in which the East German workers rose against the imposition of speed-up production quotas.

Reports of the food shortage in Eastern Germany started to reach West Berlin several weeks ago. Anti-communist agencies which get reports from East German provincial newspapers, refugees and agents maintained inside the red zone first disclosed the situation.

On March 9, it was reported, the East German Communist Central committee issued a directive to party workers confiding that normal supplies of meat, sugar and butter would not be available "for several weeks."

The party workers were told to explain in their propaganda that last year's beet sugar crop had been bad and that farmers had failed to deliver their full quotas of meat and fats.

Next came reports that the reds

started panic buying of flour, bread, meat and other foodstuffs, and of soap also. The official communist newspaper "Neues Deutschland" disclosed that workers of the great Leuna synthetic gasoline and rubber works near Merseburg had complained that workers could not buy the food they needed. Last Friday it was announced that Agriculture Minister Scholtz had been "relieved of his post" at his own request but that he would remain as a deputy premier. This was the technique used in the case of Soviet Premier Georgi M. Malenkov.

"The analogy has been drawn to board of directors made up of men habituated to thinking first—and rather exclusively—of the preferred stockholders. And no corporation or government ever does well on that basis."

Jazz Is Given Red Blessing, May Be "Hot"

MOSCOW, March 23 (AP)—Jazz has received the formal blessing of Russia's top newspaper for young folks, the Komso Pravda.

The new line taken by this organ of the young communists is one that there is no reason why anyone shouldn't enjoy jazz and dance music that is "lively and merry."

It indicated there are no problems—while it is not surprising to foreigners who witness the eagerness with which jazz is heard when ever available, usually watered down versions by hotel bands with occasional foreign broadens.

But the blessing had its reservations.

"No screaming should be heard in strange voices," said Komso Pravda. "This is bad."

The paper printed an article by Y. Gordinyuk, a "know and love music" Gordinyuk answered questions from readers about jazz music and dance music.

Gordinyuk said there was nothing to "prevent" jazz from flourishing after all, he said, the saxophones and guitars he heard in the streets of St. Petersburg in 1940 and the banjo used in jazz is an American Negro folk instrument with a "swampy, creaking."

Raps Technique

But Gordinyuk rapped the "the technique of playing." For example: "The saxophone is beautiful and full voiced when it sings," he said, "when it starts laughing hysterically in a jazz manner, it is terrifying, like an owl hooting in the forest, the screeching laugh of a jinx."

"What good is there in that?" But then follows the strongest link to the young Russians that jazz isn't sinful.

"However, why should we reject the rhythmic and melodic elements of jazz?" Komso Pravda. "Why should we reject all the danceworthy elements of jazz?"

Would Be Sin

"It would be a sin to reject the Argentine and Mexican songs and dances, the rich and varied Brazilian songs, because they are in the dance music."

Gordinyuk said the yardstick of jazz music should be whether it produces "real liveliness and true merit."

"The day may not be far off when Soviet citizens will be dancing the mambo from Estonya to Vladivostok, dixerland will reign in the southern provinces and it will be cool, real cool, in Siberia."

NEW YORK, March 23 (AP)—The people and organizations principally involved with the Salk vaccine are acting as though there was no question whatever about its ability to prevent children from catching polio.

The National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis has distributed more than 10 million copies of literature explaining the vaccine to parents of children in all three types of polio virus for only a few months. It will appeal the use of polio in all countries as well as the United States here and other medical services are highly organized. 'Tiger' Wants Raids Against Enemy Fields

TAIPEI, Formosa, March 23 (AP)—Gen. "Tiger" Wang Shu-ming, national air force commander, today said he would recommend air strikes against communist mainland jet air bases now under construction when they become a threat to Formosa.

Wang said in an exclusive interview he will urge the T'aipei government to destroy Red China's air strength before it can attack Formosa or the offshore islands of Quemoy and Matsu.

Wang said the communists may be ready within a month to move jet planes into two reconstructed fields within easy flying distance of KUNMING, China.

Tells Time "As soon as they move in that is the time for us to strike," he said through an interpreter. "We should hit them before they get off the ground."

Asked if he would seek top military approval for mainland attacks against communist air buildups, he replied, "yes, we will recommend that the government do that."

The 49-year-old air chief said the two major air fields under construction for the use of jet fighters and bombers were near the south China coast. From the fields to Formosa the flying time is barely 20 minutes.

Locates Fields He said one field is at Foochow, only about 30 miles west of Matsu island and about 150 miles northwest of Taipei. The second is near Luchow, about 32 miles west of the Tachen islands which were abandoned in February.

He said the concrete runway at Foochow had been lengthened "and we have seen evidence that the communists are building ground installations needed in combat operations." The installations include fueling tanks, fire-lighting equipment, ground shops and anti-aircraft artillery.

Luchow airfield is still under construction and probably will be completed in one month, he said. He added that some aircraft already had been moved into the bases but that the main communist forces had not yet arrived from the north.
