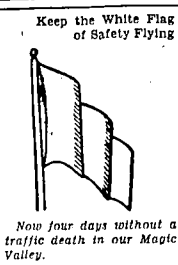

John W. Davis; Democrats' '24 Nominee, Dies

CHARLESTON, S. C., March 25.—John W. Davis, the Democratic party's presidential nominee who lost to Calvin Coolidge in 1924, died yesterday.

The broad-shouldered, white-haired New York constitutional lawyer succumbed to his third attack of this winter of pneumonia.

Davis, a native of West Virginia, was hospitalized two weeks ago when he suffered the attack at Yeoman's Hall, a nearby resort colony.

Long Legal Career

The body of the 61-year-old attorney will lie in state at a funeral home here Friday. It will be taken by train to New York City Friday night for funeral services Monday.

A long legal career had seen him represent a number of corporations in major legal battles of the last three decades.

He reached the heights in the judicial field in 1910, when he was appointed solicitor general by President Woodrow Wilson in 1913 and held that office until 1918.

Davis was a member of the American delegation to a conference with Clemens at Bern, Switzerland, in 1918 on treatment and exchange of prisoners in World War I, then in progress.

He was ambassador to Great Britain and appointed Davis to the most important diplomatic post in 1921.

Returning to private practice to recoup his personal finances, he was longest convention.

Davis' nomination for President came in New York at the joint convention ever held in William C. McAdoo and Alfred E. Smith, respectively, defeated through many ballots.

The country was enjoying unprecedented prosperity under President Coolidge, and Davis' vigorous campaign was in vain.

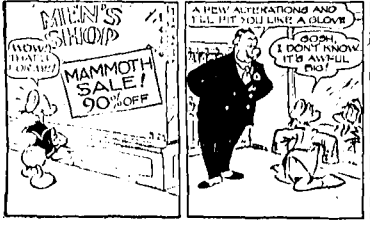

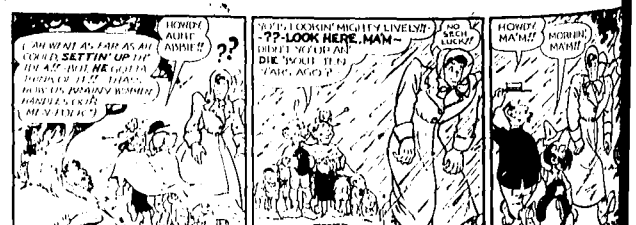
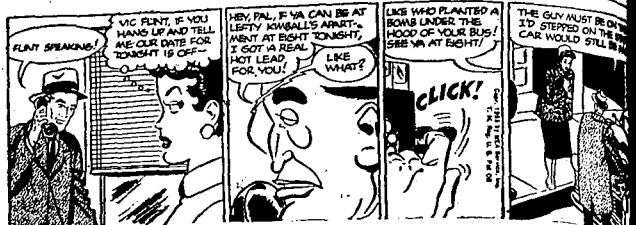

New Truck Is Displayed by Local Garage

A new heavy-duty "Tank Force" Chevrolet truck, with wheelbase length of 130 inches, was on display Friday at the Glen G. Jenkins Chevrolet garage in Twin Falls.

The standard rear axle of the "4000 series" model of the new truck has a larger housing with a rated capacity of 11,000 pounds. The diameter of the axle housing has been increased 14 per cent for greater strength and stability. The axle's gear ratio is 6.17 to 1.0.

The standard single-speed rear axle in the "4000 series" has a rated capacity of 10,000 pounds with a 6.17 to 1.0 gear ratio. A special heavy-duty single-speed rear axle with a rated capacity of 11,000 pounds is optional in the "4000 series."

The two models are equipped with 31-inch, heavy-duty chassis and four-speed "synchro-mesh" transmission. A new rubber cushion at the proper shaft position and support bearing of long wheelbase trucks is said to reduce the transmission of shaft vibrations up to 80 per cent.

The new engine for the "4000 series" delivers 123 gross horsepower. The "4000 series" engine also delivers 123 gross horsepower and is equipped with chrome-plated compression rings. The engine is optional in the "4000 series."

Optional in all "4000 series" trucks is a 140-horsepower engine which provides greater displacement, high-lift cams and heavy-duty engineering. All the engines have an exclusive feature of the new short-wheelbase "5000 series" is a newly designed V-8 engine. Engine displacement is 365 cubic inches, with a 4-inch stroke and a 3.75-inch bore. The ratio is 7.5 to 1.0.

The maximum gross vehicle weight of the new trucks has been increased to 18,000 pounds. Rear axle ratios for normal service are 5.83 and 7.25 to 1.0, and, for heavier service, 8.40 and 9.75 to 1.0.

The new trucks come in 13 solid exterior colors, including crystal blue, empire blue, granite gray, sand beige and russet brown.

Reformed Gangster to Speak At Youth for Christ Meeting

Phil Thatcher, founder and director of the Youth for Christ Camp and a one-time hoodlum who learned about Christianity in prison, will speak at a Youth for Christ rally at 9 p.m. Saturday at the First Church of the Nazarenes here.

As a boy, Thatcher lived in the Oak Park district of Sacramento, Calif. His first crimes were stealing pennies from his mother's purse and roller skates. Breaking into a garage sent him to reform school at the age of 11.

Released, Thatcher returned to Sacramento and became a member of the notorious "Oak Park gang" of the 1920's. He was soon back into the penal institution, this time the Whittier state school for boys. He broke out and was later caught and sent to the Oregon state school of industry. After a year in the Sacramento county jail, he was arrested for armed robbery and sent to San Quentin where he served four years and was paroled.

Thatcher tried, more or less, to reform but was soon involved in a series of armed robberies with saved-off strongmen, was apprehended in Fresno and ended in Poison State Prison with a ten-year-to-life sentence.

In his small cell in Poison was a book that he had formerly ignored even though he remembered his father, a minister, and his mother reading to the family. One day in his cell Thatcher picked up the Bible and decided to read. He was fascinated by it. Thatcher accepted the Christian way of life in the little cell in Poison Prison in 1928.

Due to the outstanding change in Thatcher's life, the state parole board granted him a parole in 1941 upon the recommendation of responsible officials of the prison. In Los Angeles in Oakland termed him "the most rehabilitated man in the history of the Alameda county courts."

Shortly after this Thatcher became acquainted with the work of Youth for Christ.

He was placed on the staff of the organization to help reach the boys of the street in a new camping program that has since spread throughout many states.

Gov. Earl Warren just before he left the governorship of California and look on the robes of the chief justice of the United States, granted Thatcher a full and complete pardon.

The public is invited to hear Thatcher tell his life story. There will be no admission charge.
