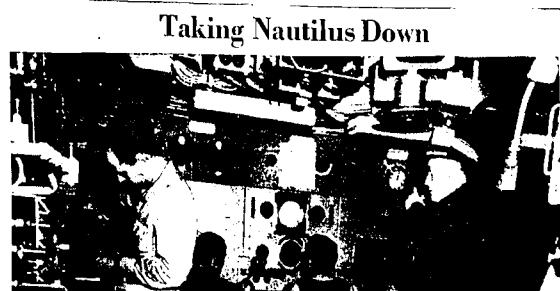


Traffic Death Scoreboard table with columns for location, date, and number of deaths.

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—About 1,700,000 members of the armed forces were virtually assured today of a pay raise starting tomorrow.

White House Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said he expects President Eisenhower to sign during the week a bill which would grant an administration request, it would add primarily career servicemen.

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—The government revealed today that the loyalty of the United States' wild ducks is subject to question.

The Russian embassy has reported that some two dozen pintail ducks and a few snow geese and brant have been detected in the Soviet Union. The Russians made the report to the U. S. national museum of natural history two months ago. The museum passed the news on to the U. S. fish and wildlife service where the information was disclosed only today.

Ike Rebukes Top Admiral On War Hint

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—President Eisenhower today rebuked a top admiral for suggesting that the United States might be going to war with Russia.

Admiral Robert B. Carney yesterday with a declaration that too much emphasis is being placed on the possibility of a nuclear war. Carney, chief of naval operations, has been named as the source of the information never yet obtained by a country that was not attacked.

The president said he cannot say, because he doesn't know, that there would be an attack from April 15 onward on the Nationalist-held Malak islands, off the Chinese mainland.

"But I do say," he added, "that if anyone is predicting it will be that soon, they have information that I do not have."

While Eisenhower told a news conference that Carney was not to be rebuked, he also said: "I do not believe that the peace of the world, the tranquility of the seas, or the well-being of our people by talking too much in terms of speculation about such things."

Spring Vacation Planned by Ike

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—President Eisenhower will go to Augusta, Ga., April 12 for a spring vacation, the White House said today.

He will stop en route at Charleston, S. C., to accept an honorary degree from the Citadel.

Gen. Mark W. Clark, world war II comrade of Mr. Eisenhower, is president of the Citadel, one of the oldest military colleges in the nation.

Press Secretary James C. Hagerty said he expects Mr. Eisenhower to arrive in Augusta during the late morning of April 12, make a "very short" speech in acceptance of his degree and then fly to a spring vacation spot in the mountains.

Negro School Gives Student Top Facilities

ATLANTA, Ga., March 31 (AP)—Betty Leach, a Negro girl, changed schools this week and for her it was like going into another world.

Betty, one of the 2,000 Negro public school pupils in Henry county, a farming section a few miles south of here, had been attending school in a two-room shack with no plumbing, no library, no lunchroom and no light save that which filtered in through a few small windows.

Sees New School

On Monday, Betty boarded a school bus that took her to the county seat at McDonough where the new consolidated Negro school had been built at a cost of \$850,000. It was one of four constructed to replace 24 small and dilapidated Negro schools in the county.

Betty's new school finds that anything available in the county's 1,900 white pupils. It has a sparkling cafeteria, two libraries, a music room, audio-visual education equipment with new sewing machines, industrial shops for boys and a vocational agriculture laboratory.

Betty's new school is one of hundreds built in the segregated south in the past few years since the U. S. supreme court first began deliberating five cases demanding an end to public school segregation.

Gambles Suez

The south gambled a fabulous sum—some estimates go as high as a billion dollars—that the court would hold to the traditional concept of separate but equal facilities. They got busy equipping.

The court's decision last May 17 to cast out segregation on grounds that race barrier was wrong in principle—regardless of the equality of educational opportunities—caught the Negro school building program at full stride. It's still going strong, although at a somewhat reduced pace pending final outcome of the court's enforcement decrees.

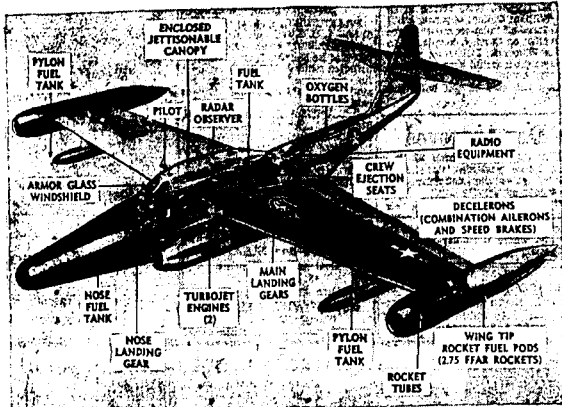

City's "Evacuation" Teaches Civil Defense Survival Plan

DENVER (NEA)—It was only a paper test—but Denver played it to the hilt.

Result: The first test of the evacuation of an American city theoretically struck by a hydrogen bomb has now been analyzed by officials and officially pronounced a success by Civil Defense Administrator Val Peterson.

The family of George Swallow is typical of those who participated in the great civil defense exercise. Here is how the mock H-day, staged last Dec. 5 and just brought to the nation's attention by Peterson, came to George, his wife and his two children.

The earth-shaking explosion of a hydrogen bomb "blasted" the early Sunday morning slumber of George Swallow at 2310 South Ogden street, shaped the ominous mushroom-shaped cloud, trade mark of an atomic explosion, billowed upward, darkening the sky.

His experience as a combat major on Iwo Jima helped Swallow plan through the first period of crisis. Within minutes his wife and two children were loaded in the car. They joined 150,000 theoretical refugees streaming north from Denver.

At the same time 25,000 persons were fleeing southward, from the evacuation of an atomic bomb dropped on Cheyenne.

By noon Sunday the 176,000 refugees were sheltered in town and rural homes, with the injured hospitalized.

The evacuation was divided into two phases. Phase one was completed without panic, and civil defense termed "Operation Welcome," a success, although below "live" expectations.

The mass movement took place on paper, with the exception of 40 people from Denver, including Swallow and his family. The bomb detonations also happened only on paper.

The project—first test of its kind in the United States—was undertaken to "analyze the ability of . . . evacuees from a large city." A. C. Tillet, regional administrator of the federal civil defense administration, said.

Denver residents were evacuated to the north because prevailing winds would cause contamination from radiation to blow south.

The operation was divided into two phases. Phase one was completed on paper and included movements of the evacuees from Cheyenne and Denver. This phase progressed smoothly with the exception of a hiccup in communications.

It is indicated that West county, north of Denver, could feed and shelter 150,000 refugees for one month.

Phase two was an actual rehearsal. It included 470 Denver persons took part. They drove in 127 cars and a bus to a meeting point at nearby Brighton.

From there, under the direction of civil defense officials assisted by eight air policemen, three civil air patrol planes and four mobile sound units, they were sent to eight dispersal centers.

The Swallows, like the other people taking part in phase two, arrived Brighton at 9 a.m. They were assigned to the dispersal center at Johnston, to which they were directed by civil defense workers. They registered at a schoolhouse.

West German Airline Trade Has Approval

BOONN, Germany, March 31 (AP)—Germany takes to the skies again tomorrow for the first time in 10 years.

A new American-built Convair 340 bearing the blue griffin emblem of the German airline, "Deutsche Lufttransport," takes off from Hamburg and wings south on a passenger flight to Dusseldorf, Frankfurt, and Munich.

In May, Lufttransport begins flying to other European capitals—Paris, Madrid and Rome. And on June 6, the German airline will open its trans-Atlantic service to New York.

Historic Moment
Tomorrow will be a historic moment in West Germany's heralding resurgence back to a place in the sun.

Not a single German plane, not even a Piper Cub, has left the country since those fateful days of May, 1945, when Hitler Germany surrendered unconditionally and the old Lufttransport, the Hermann Goering's Luftwaffe, was grounded indefinitely.

Reappearance of German military aircraft will mean await the final approval of the Paris rearmament treaties. And even then, West Germany will be limited to planes no larger than fighter-bombers.

Go-Ahead Given
But the three western powers have given the West German government a go-ahead on revival of her civil airline which first started operations in 1926 and blazed a trail in aviation.

The current Lufttransport "fleet" consists of four of the two-engine Convairs and one Douglas DC-3. The airline will not be able to fly to Berlin. Four-power agreements with the Soviet allow only U. S., British and French planes to fly the corridor from West Germany to Berlin. Isolated 110 miles behind the Iron curtain.

Watch Tariff Case Comes To Forefront

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—The administration, it now develops, picked tariffs on Swiss watch movements last year for national defense reasons despite a defense department finding that no special treatment was necessary for the domestic watch industry.

This apparent conflict came to light recently with disclosure of the defense department position on the matter, kept secret for a year.

At the time of the tariff boost—which was protested by Swiss watch makers and U.S. firms which import Swiss movements—the administration justified its action on grounds that continued domestic production of jeweled watches is essential to maintain skills and facilities vital to national defense.

Question Asked
The question being asked is—how come?
How did the government reach a decision, based on defense needs, in apparent conflict with defense department views?
Why was the defense department report kept secret so long?

Critics Note
Special treatment for the domestic jeweled watch industry was subjected to critical scrutiny by critics who noted that:
Gen. Omar Bradley, a close friend of President Eisenhower, is an executive of Bulova Watch Company, one of the four domestic producers. The others are Elgin, Waltham, and Hamilton.

Commerce Secretary
Weeks is from Massachusetts, a center of the domestic jeweled-watch industry.
The decision came during the reelection campaign of Sen. Leverett Saltonstall, R. Mass., whose chances might be affected by the depressed condition of the watch industry.

The Washington Post and Times-Herald declared editorially that disclosure of the defense department's report justifies the complaint that "political considerations were dominant in the decision to raise the watch tariff."

Islands Defense Vagueness Has Definite Virtue for U. S.

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—It is fairly certain President Eisenhower hasn't decided whether this country will fight to defend the Malaita and Quemooy islands from Red Chinese attack. He's been vague on it. The vagueness has a virtue.

What isn't clear is whether the vagueness is deliberate or the result of putting off a decision on an unpleasant problem until it occurs.

An individual high in the administration—he's been named by some newspapers as the President's press secretary, James C. Hagerty—told newsmen this week at an off-the-record dinner the decision hasn't been made but probably would be before an attack.

There is no doubt about this country's determination to help Chiang Kai-shek and his Nationalists defend Formosa. It is pledged by treaty to do so. But it is not committed to defending the two small islands.

This is the virtue of vagueness on the islands: The Reds have threatened to take the islands. A warning from Eisenhower that they'd have to

already whether Red Chinese possession of Malaita and Quemooy would endanger Formosa.

But if the vagueness about defending the islands is merely a reluctance to make a decision until the moment of crisis, the United States could find itself in the same embarrassing position it did in Indochina.

The war there, between the French and communist-led Vietminh, lasted for years. Both the Truman and Eisenhower administrations had time to make full plans in case the communists began to crush the French.

If such plans were ever made, there was no evidence of it when the French began to totter. In that moment of disaster Secretary of State Dulles went dashing off to Europe to see if Britain would join the United States in intervening to stop the Vietminh. Britain wouldn't.

This country did nothing and the communists got half of Indochina.

CHEYENNE, Wyo., March 31 (AP)—The federal land office here has been swamped this week with veterans' applications for land in the Jackson Hole area, recently opened to public entry.

The land, in about 22 parcels of about 1,942 acres, was set aside by executive order in 1929 and 1930 for an elk refuge. It was restored to the public domain Feb. 25 with the explanation it was not needed.

Veterans have preference for the land, northwest of Jackson over a 10-mile radius, until July 1, after which others also may file.

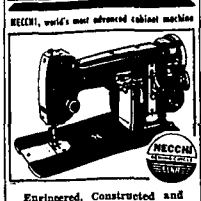

Old Flintlock Replica Made For Occasion

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—Robert E. Anderson, deputy secretary of defense, is going to get a replica of a weapon that helped us out in two wars.

This beautiful hand-made firing piece will come in mighty hands if Bob Anderson happens upon charging buffalo along Pennsylvania Avenue.

The National Rifle Association of America is presenting to Anderson an exact copy of the flintlock. This was used by our forebears in both the Revolutionary war and the war of 1812.

The rifle people are holding their sixth annual meeting in the capital since months back. Maj. Gen. Merritt A. Edson, USMC, retired, decided that a suitable memento for the guest speaker at the big banquet would be a flintlock rifle.

Edson is the executive director of the National Rifle Association. Everybody agreed.

So the general dropped a line to Cecil O. Brooks, Lowell, O., an expert in antique rifles. He got to building rifles. He told Brooks to get busy, Brooks studied up on what went into a flintlock rifle and got busy.

Weapon Now Ready
The finished product, which cost a pretty penny and is something to catch the eye of any lover of firearms, is now shining up and ready with a silver "presented to" imbedded in the Ohio curly maple wood stock.

Brooks worked hard to recapture the spirit. The rifle he has recaptured precisely in the best tradition of early America, measures 62 1/2 inches over-all and has a 46 1/2 inch octagonal barrel rifled with eight grooves. The bore measures 0.375 inch.

Developed by Germans
It was developed by German rifle makers who came here in the 18th century. The flintlock, indeed, was the finest firing piece of its day.

Inception introduced a new standard of deadly accuracy.

Actually, flintlock action was the prevailing ignition system for firearms from 1630 to 1830. A chisel-edge, rectangular wafer of flint was clamped between the face of a cock.

You pulled the trigger and released the cock under spring tension. The chisel edge of the flint scraped against the face of a steel battery making a shower of sparks which fell into the priming pan lighting the powder. The priming powder burned fast through the barrel vent to touch of the powder charge and send a bullet through the barrel.

Costs and Magnitude for Harnessing Peaceful Atomic Use Seem Staggering

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—Building the atomic bomb was a technically complicated process.

But it is beginning to seem like child's play compared to the problems of harnessing atomic energy to ordinary peaceful uses. The atom waits—so near and yet so far—a taunt and a challenge to private industry.

Take electric power as the object example. For many reasons, this may be the first great field where the atom goes to work. American power consumption tends to double every 10 years. The economy demands more and ever more electricity.

Technically, you could have atom-generated electricity in your home today. Engineers know how to hook a nuclear reactor to a generator and take off electric power.

Then why not do it immediately? Suppose you are the president of a big electric power company. The board of directors is in session. One of them asks you that question: "Why not do it now?"

"The simple fact is, gentlemen, that as of today, atom-generated electricity is just too expensive. It isn't yet competitive, in cost, with ordinary power."

"How big is the difference in cost?"

"Pretty big. Power rates vary all over the United States. On the average, however, I'd say that with present techniques, a ton-electricity would be at least twice as costly. That's only an estimate."

"We've been talking about costs, obsolescence, insurance and so on. But suppose we decide to go into the atomic business? Where do we start getting the information?"

"A. Mainly from the AEC. We would need a license. And we would have to get security clearance first for the engineers and everybody else who might be directly connected with building the reactor."

"As a broad, general question—would you say the government really wants private industry in the atomic energy business? Will we get any cooperation in Washington?"

"A. Everything seems to indicate it does. For instance, if we come forward with a workable proposition, the AEC will give us certain advantages—the issue of fissile fuel without charge, and making available their laboratories for specific research studies, and so on. Besides, the AEC has its own 200-million-dollar program of reactor-research from which will benefit. And most of the members of the

joint congressional committee sound as though they want business to come in as soon as possible.

Q. "Well, finally, do you think we should come in?"

A. "I don't see how we can stay out. Here's a big, new field with tremendous potentialities. Sure, the costs and the problems are staggering. But this isn't the first time big, tough jobs—and it won't be the last."

Administration Overhauls All Information Machinery, Aims

WASHINGTON, March 31 (AP)—Atomic submarine Nautilus Commander Eugene F. Wilkinson.

The directive ordered that all manuscripts for outside publication should be reviewed not only to prevent security leaks but to insure that they make a "constructive contribution to the primary mission of the department of defense."

Wilson said information should be timely and released "in a manner consistent with the ethics and procedures normally followed." But he also ruled that all speeches, press releases and photographs must be reviewed by his office not less than three days before publication.

He held all military officials personally responsible for seeing that information they give out is consistent with security and "policies and objectives" of his department.

Wilson's second directive ordered the army, navy, and air force to reorganize their public information activities, slashing information staffs by one-third to one-half and appointing civilians as their chief information officials.


