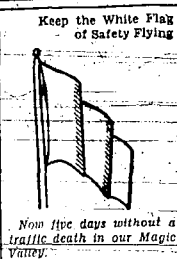

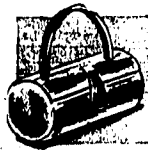

Leader of German Delegation Will Be Lord Mayor of Town

A handsome, tanned-haired lawyer, born 47 years ago in Radolfzell, Germany, will be an official visitor to Twin Falls April 11. He is Theodor Diez, lord mayor of Sigen, the leader of a group of five German citizens coming to Twin Falls to study a model American community in action.

Mayor Diez, whose avocations as a lawyer and municipal administrator are well known, has studied law at four universities: Freiburg, Berlin, Munich and Heidelberg. Later he spent three years as a junior barrister in the public prosecutor's office, the district court, the county court and other courts in his native state.

In 1934 Diez commenced private law practice in Sigen. From 1940 to 1945 he was in military service. In 1946 was elected Sigen's lord mayor, a position he has held since.

Communists Say American Planes Violate Boundary

TOKYO, April 2 (AP)—Peking radio today accused the U. S. of violating Red China's air boundaries with the clear intention of increasing tension in the far east.

A broadcast heard here said 13 U. S. planes in four waves today violated Red China's air boundaries. The broadcast said the planes were flying over the Kiangling peninsula and circled an area 40 kilometers east of Kiangling.

Fourteen U. S. navy planes, the Red radio said, flew over Red China's Hainan island. Four American planes, the broadcast continued, were flying over the Kiangling peninsula and circled an area 40 kilometers east of Kiangling.

Red radio said the U. S. Air Force Headquarters said the air force operations flew showed no record of U. S. planes flying such sorties.

Reason Given For Approval Of Paris Pact

WASHINGTON, April 2 (AP)—The German government tonight approved through the senate "probably in faster time than any major treaty in recent times," a staff aide said.

Dr. Franz Volke, chief of the foreign relations committee staff, gave that appraisal of the four-treaty pact which saw the committee start hearings Tuesday, complete them Wednesday, and bring the senate to a smashing 76-2 approval by the senate after three hours debate Friday.

German Sovereignty

The two pacts give the West German republic sovereignty, the right to remain and membership in the North Atlantic Treaty organization. They also play a very significant role in the future.

Why, then, did the senate dispose of the pact so quickly?

The answer lies in the senate already had recorded itself as disinterestedly in favor of a resumed Germany before the war—never before.

Hearings in 1952

Back in 1952 the senate had lengthily hearings on somewhat similar treaties known as the Bonn convention.

Hearings covered six days in two separate weeks and approval came July 1, 1952. These pacts were "brought to the European defense community treaty which France had just rejected. That meant finding a new solution to the long-sought goal of a united Germany—preventing military power against possible Soviet aggression. The new solution was found in the treaties just approved by the senate.

Effect in Europe

Another reason for speed was the Eisenhower administration's hope for quick and lopsided senate approval to show Western Europe that the U. S. was committed to the Western European defense system.

Wages raised and continuing inflation in the nation whose approval is required now have accentuated expected without delay are final actions by Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxembourg and Denmark.

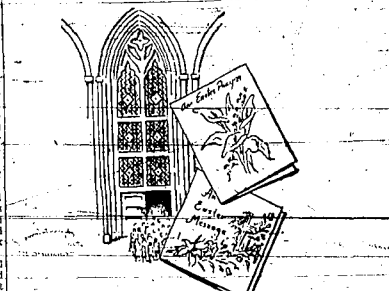

Flexible Supports to Get Try Despite Democrat Opposition

WASHINGTON, April 2—Farmers' support for the flexible system of farm price supports is catching up with demand.

Under the wartime program in effect through last year, prices of the so-called basic crops—cotton, corn, wheat, rice, peanuts and tobacco—were supported at a fixed rate of 90 per cent of parity. Parity is a standard for measuring farm prices decided by law, to be fair to farmers in relation to prices they pay for goods and services used in production and family living.

The flexible program permits support to range between 85 and 90 per cent of parity this year and 75 to 90 per cent thereafter. The law sets up a "sliding scale" formula for determining the minimum level of support under this system.

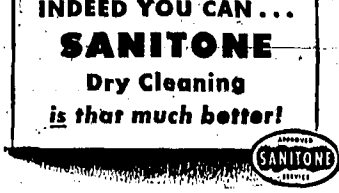
The sliding scale is geared to the size of the supply of a particular crop and to the prospective market demand.

Under this system, price guarantees to farmers are geared to the size of supply. The larger the supplies, the lower supports may be and vice versa. Advocates of the system contend that in times of surplus low supports would discourage overproduction and encourage greater use, and that in times of shortage high supports would encourage greater production and Rayburn is reporter.

Road Asphalt, Oil Purchased By T. F. Panel

A \$55,000 contract for 325,000 gallons of road oil and 100,000 gallons of cut-back asphalt has been awarded to the Phillips Petroleum company, Salt Lake City, by the Twin Falls highway commission.

Meeting here Saturday, commissioners agreed to purchase three new V-8 two-ton Dodge trucks. Two travel vans—on three—1946 trucks, which will be traded in for the two-tonners, will be transferred to the new trucks. Estimated price of the trucks, including the trade-in, is \$25,750.

The commission also authorized the installation of a guard rail on a road south of Kimberly where it crosses Rock creek canyon. The cost of the guard rail is approximately \$500.

Because of continuing cold weather, the commission decided to retain county road load limits indefinitely. The load limits, 550 pounds per inch of tire width, have been in effect for the past 30 days.

Stuart H. Taylor, commission secretary, reported that present collateral for commission funds is \$55,000 in the Fidelity National bank and \$16,000 in the Twin Falls Bank and Trust company.

V. E. Morgan, chairman, presided at the meeting.

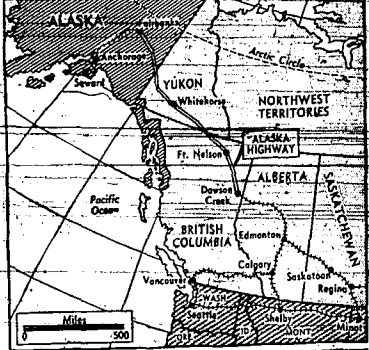

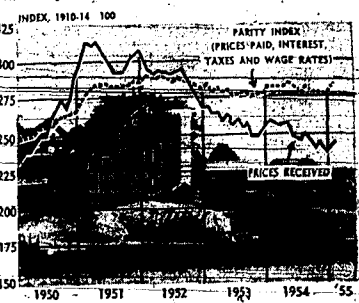

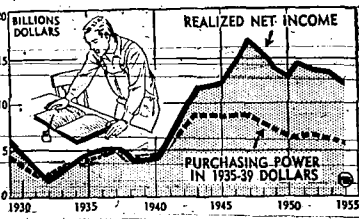

Farmer Not Faring too Well

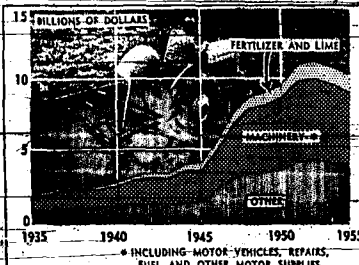
Things are not too rosy for the nation's farmer, as indicated by the news items below. They show that he is caught between a squeeze of lower earnings and higher costs.



The beginning of 1955 found the nation's farmer at a standstill economically. Although the chart above indicates a rise in the price he received in the month ending Jan. 15, it also shows he paid more for his own needs, so the parity ration was unchanged. Data from department of agriculture.



The American farmer's income, as graph shown, has been steadily going down since its 1947 peak. What's worse, the value of the dollar he does make has been sinking since inflation set in around 1948. So, in 1955, he not only earned fewer dollars but he bought less with the ones he did make, because the purchasing power of the dollar dropped 11 per cent from its 1933 value. Data from department of agriculture.



Farmers spend more than 12 billion dollars annually for the goods and services they need for farming. This includes feed, seed, etc. This is more than four times as much as they spent annually for such goods and services in 1935-38. 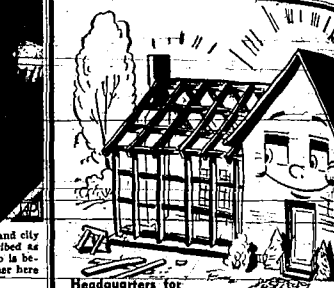

Chief Gillette Marks 22nd Anniversary As Member of Twin Falls Police Force

A police department is no better in its service to a community than the cooperation it receives from the citizenry. Police Chief Howard Gillette said Saturday, marking his 22nd anniversary as a member of the Twin Falls police force.

Reminiscing about his work with the department during which he has seen Twin Falls double its population, Chief Gillette said that law enforcement really is a Christianly in action and the good police officer always is guided by the 10 Commandments.

Compared to other cities of its size, Twin Falls has a low crime rate, the chief points out. "I feel Twin Falls has a high-type of residents and is a good home town," he says.

"I'm not mad at anybody," the chief says. "But naturally, in my line of work it is unavoidable that I shouldn't have a couple of enemies. I'm proud of my friends and you might say I'm equally proud of my enemies. Law enforcement work really is like being in the boxing ring. You've got to be hit and imparted at all times and governed by fair play and common sense."

Chief Gillette was born Aug. 25, 1896, in Weiser. He spent the greater part of his boyhood in Prescott, Ariz., and attended both Buhl and Twin Falls high schools before his family's move to Buhl in 1910.

The chief did not get into police work right after school. He spent some time rock mining and doing construction work before volunteering for service in the army at the outbreak of World War I. "I spent the next two years on horseback in the cavalry," he explains.

After his discharge from the army, Gillette began working for a service station in Twin Falls and eventually acquired two stations of his own. Then the depression hit and he, like so many others, was forced out of business. He got married in 1930 and went to California where he operated a service station in Long Beach for two years before moving back to Twin Falls.

In the spring of 1932 the chief went to work for the city police department as a patrolman. That same year he was graduated from the National Police Academy in Washington, D. C. Within hours after the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor he was called to war. "I went again by FBI Chief J. Edgar Hoover. Following one month of intensive training he was assigned for duty with the bureau at Sioux Falls, S. D."

He resigned without prejudice from the bureau in 1935 and came back to Twin Falls to take over as police chief again. Gillette also is past president of the Idaho Peace Officers' association and the Magic Valley Peace Officers' association.

Comparing police work today with 20 years ago, he emphasizes the changes that have taken place. "In those days we patrolled the alleys on foot," he says. "We had no radio, of course, and had to depend upon light signals on Main avenue."

"Through the years crime became motorized and we had to operate from cars to keep up with the criminals. The type of violators also has changed," he says. "Twenty years ago most of our criminals were local men and they really used to run us ragged."

"Now a great percentage of crime here is committed by transients and they are more difficult to keep track of. On the other hand, we now are in constant contact with other communities in the valley and the state and the department works in a high degree of efficiency."

As a result of modern transportation we no longer are an isolated city and it's difficult for us to keep up with things coming and going all the time. Years ago we could spot a foreigner a mile away."

"Discipline—juvenile crime—and delinquency," the chief admits that in Twin Falls, in line with the picture for the entire nation, has more young violators to cope with than was the case earlier.

"Youngsters nowadays have little if any respect for their parents, school and church," he points out. "And many of them adopt a couldn't-care-less attitude toward the law and property of others."

"I think it is safe to surmise the increase in juvenile crime to a general change of life quite often both parents work, leaving children to their own devices. I don't believe any job is more important for a woman than to stay home and take care of her children."

The chief notes it took little to amuse children earlier. "Today there are no thrills left and at the same time the youngsters do not value a man's code of ethics and the way he lives. Success is measured by the slightly dollar and not how a man conducts himself."

Speaking about necessary qualifications in a police officer and stressing he received about one job application every day, the chief points to a list of rules which is hung in a frame at the station serving as a reminder for the officers

knowledge of human nature and enough schooling to be able to deal with bankers and murderers, preachers and tramps on an equal footing. We prefer a young, married man who intends to make Twin Falls his home. A good police officer must be a man of great self control, the kind of a person who can keep his head when everyone about him loses theirs."

Chief Gillette was honored on his 22nd anniversary at a potluck supper given by the department in the basement—Lipton—hall—Thursday night. His colleagues presented him a wrist watch, 50mg local police officers their wives and children were present.

The party marked one of the few occasions when the chief takes time out for some fun. He is on duty 24 hours a day. Whenever his time permits, the chief jumps into his working clothes and goes into the yard for a bit of gardening. He is proud of the fact he is about the first man on the force to show up with ripe tomatoes every summer. Gillette is the father of two grown children. His son, Grant, 22, recently was discharged from the army and is expected home soon. He was graduated from the University of Idaho before joining the army.

The chief's daughter is 20-year-old Mary Louise (Mittie) Gillette. Currently she is attending the University of Utah where she is in her third year of nurse training. The chief resides with his wife at 322 Blue lakes boulevard, their home for the past 20 years.

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

"My Experience"

BY LEE CARNEY
(Pastor, Filer Avenue West Church of God)

My thoughts turn back to two years ago this Palm Sunday while on a tour of the world. I identified myself as a Protestant in Paris, France, the only one of the kind. To the best of my knowledge and belief that I could find in that large city.

I had arrived at the Paris air terminal on a Thursday, noon before French Sunday had gone to the Ambassador Hotel by taxi, which was a little English-made auto smaller than an Auk.

It was there I saw my first meal in France, which was quite an experience as the waiters couldn't talk any English and I couldn't talk any French. But since they only had two choices, I could point and make a choice. I did enjoy the meal.

Friday's breakfast was a most interesting sight and many of the large church buildings and cathedrals.

Saturday evening I inquired about the hotel for a Protestant church that I might attend upon the London day. After several hours of search I was able to locate a Protestant service which was to be in English. Ten o'clock Sunday morning found me there in an old but beautiful apple church. But the real challenge was as I looked over the city where I could see millions of people without a Savior and the scripture came to me with a ringing challenge. "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature."

Surely Jesus is just as much concerned about people today as he was then when he made the triumphant entry into Jerusalem.

April's Views Show Shining Stars Aplenty

The gorgeous planet Venus, which since the first of the year has been such a splendid sight glowing in the dawn sky, can still be seen near the southeastern horizon shortly before sunrise. However, it has lost some of its lustre and is no longer seen in the dark sky. Mercury is also in the morning sky but too near the sun to observe. The little messenger of the gods will be the most behind old Sol on April 22.

For evening star and planet studs, let us observe at about the standard time. Mars is still in the evening sky as a reddish object near the Pleiades cluster above the western horizon. It is getting so distant that it is hardly brighter than the Big Dipper stars. A little southwest of the zenith—Jupiter is brilliant. Saturn will rise in the east-southeast about 10 p.m. It is a yellow, non-twinkling object of considerable brightness.

Aids from the moon—now approaching the full phase—all the other luminaries in the heavens are real stars; intensely hot, glowing suns, many far larger than our sun but appearing small only because of their inconceivably enormous distances from us earth dwellers.

Low in the southwest, the finest of all stellar lights, Sirius, the Dog star, glitters vividly. This is the principal star in the Big Dog, the follower of Orion, the Hunter. Dimmer stars in this locality complete the group. Sirius is often pictured as the jewel hanging from the dog's collar. Higher and toward the zenith we find Procyon, of lesser brightness, which marks the location of Orion's Little Dog.

Orion himself now hangs low above the sky line in the west-southwest. A short horizontal line of three stars of equal brightness, the belt of the Hunter's belt, a large four-sided figure with prominent stars in each corner surrounds the belt and outlines Orion's body and legs. The red star in the upper left is Betelgeuse; the white flasher in the lower right, Rigel.

A little southwest of the zenith in the direction of Orion note the Twin stars, yellow and orange. Lower and almost due west, orange Aldebaran and yellow Castor. Much lower and almost due west, orange Arcturus and red Antares. The small V (Venus) is in the sky. To the right of the Hyades, the red star, the tip of the Pleiades catches the observer's eye. Power Situation Is Not Improved

BORELAND, Ore., April 2 (AP)—There has been no marked improvement in the Columbia river basin system's power situation, the Bonneville Power administration announced yesterday.

BPA said the system, which represents more than half the power generation in the Pacific northwest, obtained temporary relief by some scattered rains and snow over the region, and warmer temperatures. Federal system loads have been reduced by about 150,000 kilowatts by the lessened demand, but the demand is still well above the late March average.

BPA said it was scheduling all Federal and power operations for the integrated system on a "critical stream flow basis." It said flows of Columbia and Snake river basin streams continued at near critical levels last week.

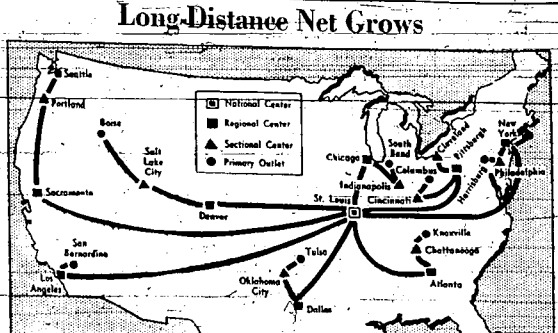
