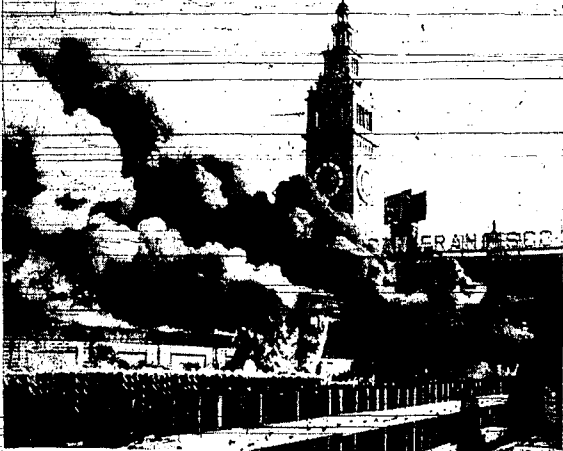

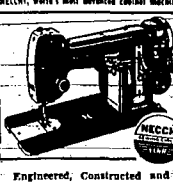

AMERICAN ECONOMY Walter Reuther, president of the CIO, who is never happy unless he is unhappy about something, says the American economy is in serious straits.

There is a considerable body of evidence to suggest that economic conditions are a good deal better than they were at the low point in the 1933-34 decline. And even at the low-point level, a man like Sen. Paul Douglas, who surely did not take the optimistic view, stepped away from describing the situation as a "depression."

But Reuther never has allowed himself to be hampered by the evidence. If figures do not agree with what he thinks they should, he simply discards them and gets a set of his own. For some years now he has waged a consistent campaign to discredit all labor statistics which do not bear his personal stamp.

Reuther professes to be chiefly troubled by unemployment. In the way most of us know something about the problem, it has not been in recent times and is not now as good a matter as he proclaims it.

This does not mean that any citizen or any public official should take any amount of joblessness lightly or casually. To a man out of work it is no comfort to be told that unemployment is dwindling and is now "in hand." Effort to employ all the employable should never let up.

But, as suggested, a good many economists look ahead in the present prospect as reasonably bright and getting brighter. A few even dare to forecast that within a few years the United States may actually be suffering a labor shortage rather than a surplus.

They hang this prophecy on a freak of the U. S. population structure, which is expected to bring fewer new people into the working force, proportionately, than will be added to the total population in the next 10 years.

According to this view, we will not have enough manpower to satisfy the expanding needs of our swelling numbers. If we are not merely to maintain but lift our standard of living in the years ahead—as we have always managed to do—then they say we must have "improvements" in machinery and business techniques on a huge scale. This we can do, however defensible.

There's been a lot of talk about "automation" or push-button factories as a possible "grave menace" to employment. But if the men who foresee a labor shortage are right, obviously we'll need all the automation we can get.

Of course we have no proof that these particular forecasters will turn out to be right. But if they are perhaps extremely optimistic, many other economists are at the least moderately so.

Very few share the special reservation Walter Reuther has established for himself, where the economy is always in trouble and all the colors are dark.

### Atom Science Aids Farmers In Big Battles

Atom science radiation can be used to combat two of the farmers' biggest problems— insects and fungi. Spraying of potatoes, onions and other tubers, a stomic research specialist said today.

Chamberlain said "several independent research groups have established that insect pests can be destroyed, or made sterile, and that sprouting or germination of potato, onion and other tubers can be prevented without any damage or change in flavor and appearance."

Chamberlain said preservation of certain foods by exposure to nuclear radiation appears to be one of the most immediately promising applications of atomic energy to our everyday life.

He said preliminary studies indicate that irradiation can be used to destroy the insects in grain cheaply and effectively.

"Since irradiation of grain involves no chemical treatment, there can be no residue to alter the odor or color," he said.

Chamberlain said studies at Brookhaven laboratory showed that very small radiation doses were sufficient to make potatoes stable for long periods under normal storage conditions.

### Civilian Mask Developed for Filtering Dust

CINCINNATI, April 4 (U. S. AP)—A mask developed by the army is being tested for possible use in protecting civilians against inhaling poison gas, germ weapons and radioactive dust, two army scientists announced today.

The researchers, Bernard Stuedgen and Frank Shanty of the army chemical center, Maryland, reported that their mask meets protective requirements for use in the event of a nuclear war.

The low cost of the mask—figured at between \$1.50 and \$2—compared with \$15 for the standard military mask and \$2 for a previously developed mask for civilians, they said.

Key to the cheapness of the new one, they explained, is the elimination of a relatively high cost metal "canister" for absorbing "noxious gases of filtering out airborne germs and radioactive materials."

Instead, much of the face piece of the mask itself constitutes the "filter"—a fibrous mat forming a pad and containing an absorbent chemical. The face piece is attached to a cup-filling plastic material which makes the mask cling to the face and the cup-filling material is made of plastic lenses are used for eye pieces.

Because after two years in retirement, Robinson is trying to come back, too. And all that he has proved so far is all the great truth of the old adage that "they never come back."

Sure, he has won two of his three bouts. But the "who" and the "how" pile up to tell the same old grim story.
