Propose High Dam Project

Ore, April 6 (UP)—Govs. Arthur B. Langston, Oregon, today joined Idaho, in opposing a bill to authorize construction of a high dam at Hells canyon on the Snake river. Republican governors testified today before a subcommittee which is winding up hearings in the Pacific northwest on a bill to build a dam at Portland State college auditorium. Smylie expressed his opposition at a hearing in Boise Monday.

The Oregon governor cited figures to show that total plan investment of a high dam would be \$27,000,000 compared to a total investment for three low-head dams proposed by Idaho power company of \$18 million dollars. He said the Oregon dam would cost \$13,500,000, compared to \$1,600,000 on the low dam. The Oregon dam would produce 425 mills compared to 1.86 mills on the low dam, he said.

Sen. Charles L. Neuberger, D-Ore., acted as chairman today. Neuberger asked Langlie if the Oregon dam would be a private power company project. Langlie said they came from neither private nor public funds. He said the state of Washington had its own engineers and was using its own figures.

York Bank Is Robbed of \$350,000

April 6 (UP)—Four gunmen robbed a Queens bank of \$350,000—the largest cash haul ever in a bank. The loot earlier had been reported at \$300,000.

Statements of the bills were not announced. Apprehensions were small because they were intended for actions at the tellers' windows.

One man, carrying a machinegun, herded 11 employees of the Queens Manhattan branch of the Wood's Island branch into the rear and made a getaway.

The branch is five miles east of Times Square, across the East river to largely residential Long Island City.

Almost simultaneously with the Queens robbery three masked and armed men seized a jewelry firm in neighboring Manhattan and escaped with \$75,000 to \$100,000 worth of loot.

The gunmen first waylaid Henry Bardenhagen, 24, the bank's chief clerk, in his automobile.

Bardenhagen had stopped at a traffic light on route from his home to the bank at about 8:35 a. m. A man with a gun stepped up beside the car and forced him into the back seat.

Three accomplices of the gunman jumped into the car. They drove to the bank and, holding guns on Bardenhagen, followed him in.

Employees Flee

The robbers fired their guns and other employees into a vault and fled through a door. They were seen running away from the bank.

Robbery was reported injured.

Police in Queens arrested a man who collected the loot.

All four fled through a back door Monday because of Bardenhagen's automobile.

Car Found

The car was found abandoned at about distance west of the Franklin National bank branch in Floral Park, on Long Island, in 1953. It was then listed as the personal property of a bank.

Seven men were arrested in 1953. The bank of \$350,000 was in cash, but only \$20,000 of it was in cash.

Eden Takes Top Positions in New Big Assignment

LONDON, April 6 (AP)—Sir Anthony Eden, who once walked out of the government rather than appease continental dictators, became Britain's prime minister today.

He is the 42nd man to hold the nation's highest political post, and the youngest in three centuries. The 57-year-old diplomat—first divorced man in history to be named premier—kissed the hand of Queen Elizabeth II and accepted her appointment to succeed his longtime political mentor, Sir Winston Churchill, who retired yesterday at 80 because of his age.

Trumps of the horse guards sounded in the distance, the herald of the new political era, as the handsome, debonair statesman moved out of Buckingham palace under pale skies to drive back to his new duties.

The gray capital, with all its newspapers on strike, got news of the historic changeover in a palace communique read over the British Broadcasting corporation system.

"The Queen received the Right Hon. Sir Anthony Eden, MP, in audience this morning and offered him the post of prime minister and first lord of the treasury. Sir Anthony Eden accepted the offer and kissed hands upon his appointment."

Churchill's political crown prince of more than 15 years, who retired recently with his tie and frequently smoothed his gray hair as he arrived at the palace 12 minutes earlier for his 11 a. m. appointment with the sovereign.

Eden, who has been in the cabinet since 1951, returned to office after his 40-minute interview in the queen's private apartments. He was surrounded by a crowd of 3,000—many unaware, because of the newspaper strike, of what was going on—watched his first major duty as prime minister was to pick the cabinet and select important members to be expected.

Eden, like Churchill's friend and successor, was certain to carry out many of the policies of the late prime minister worked out together in the years of their close friendship. That association began at far back as 1938, when Eden—then 41—quit the government of Neville Chamberlain, a dramatic protest against appeasing the Axis dictators.

Will Get War Blame

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Secretary of State Dulles said yesterday the United States wants to deal with Red China in a civilized peaceful way in order to avoid war in the highly-dangerous Formosa area.

"We have made perfectly clear that we will not get involved in a war with China," he told a news conference.

"If there is any war it will be entirely due to the provocation and initiative of these (Red) Chinese." "If, in fact they are faithful to what they talk about—peace—then there will be no fighting in the area."

At the same time, Dulles emphasized the United States intends to help defend Nationalist Formosa and the "executors" against the attack if it should occur.

But, he said, the United States is committed to defend Formosa and the "executors" is the only one that has that right. "We have no commitment of any kind, sort or description, expressed or implied," he said, which brings the United States out of the picture.

Dulles' remarks still left the way open, however, for American forces to help defend the island territory of Quemoy and Matsu.

But the main emphasis of his comments was on the Eisenhower administration's continued efforts to bring about a cessation of the Formosa area and avoid war.

In talking about the Formosa crisis, he referred to the Formosa area in terms that the United States is in advance whether it will defend Quemoy and Matsu.

"Lie" Charge On Foe Made By McCarthy

WASHINGTON, April 6 (AP)—Sen. Joseph P. McCarthy today accused Dwight D. Eisenhower of "lying" in statements he made in the Senate when he was in the White House.

The Wisconsin Republican demanded that the foreign aid chief's statements be sent to the justice department for possible prosecution.

Senators just reacted at McCarthy's "Tells of Lie."

McCarthy said Eisenhower "lied under oath" when he told the subcommittee that two million dollars of money had been sent to the justice department for possible prosecution.

Exact Two-Thirds Okay Found in First Counts; Record Set by Balloting

Results of the Twin Falls \$1,163,000 school bond election hinged today on the official canvases of results to be conducted by Mrs. Doris Stradley, 244. The first count, completed early today, gave an exact two-thirds majority, 2,388 to 244. (Checking the tally, election officials at Washington school discovered two absentee ballots that hadn't been counted. Both were "yes" ballots, putting the count at 2,390 to 1,244, two more votes than the required two-thirds majority. Mrs. Stradley said it would be later this afternoon before she could complete the canvass of the election results. Ballots were being kept under lock and key as required by law.

The count of ballots started out on a gloomy note with Bickel district failing to give the bond issue even a majority. The district vote was 411 ballots favoring the bond issue while 428 opposed it for a total vote of 839.

When the ballot was reported from Lincoln school, the picture brightened somewhat, but even the vote at Lincoln failed to provide the necessary two-thirds vote. The ballot was 644 favoring the bond and 468 opposed.

But the tremendous turnout at Washington school, nearly equal to both the other precincts, turned the tide. The official count at Washington gave 1,435 votes in favor of the bond and only 948 opposed.

LAS VEGAS, Nev., April 6 (AP)—America's newest anti-air defense, an air-to-air missile with atomic warhead, was exploded six miles above Nevada today with a blast powerful enough to wreck a flight of enemy bombers even in a near miss.

The "big baby" missile, with a punch equivalent of perhaps 5,000 to 10,000 tons of TNT packed into its nose, was launched from an air force B-47 jet bomber. It exploded in a 20,000-foot colored burst.

Individual Responsibility Is Cited for Cancer Detection

By HAL BOYLE
 NEW YORK, April 6 (AP)—The most immediate hope of reducing the cancer mortality doesn't lie with science, it lies with you.
 "How can I cut down the death rate of cancer?" you ask. Simply by looking for it. It is the only way to see if you have cancer.
 "But why should I go to all that trouble?" most people inquire. "If I had cancer, wouldn't I at least suspect it?"
 In many instances, yes; in many—no. Causes are insidious. They give warning signals, but often they are masked. A thorough physical check-up, however, will usually disclose them.
 But are such physical examinations absolutely worth while for people who have no real reason to suspect they have cancer? The answer to that of course, lies strictly with the individual. How important is it to him to be sure he is free of cancer?
 Here are a few figures from the American Cancer Society that might affect your own decision:
 There will be about a half million new cases of cancer in the United States this year—and some 700,000 more than last year. American people will be under treatment for cancer.
 During the year 235,000 Americans will die of cancer, or about one every two minutes.
 But note this figure—every seven minutes last year an American died of cancer who might have been saved if properly treated in time. The estimated needless deaths for 1954: 75,000.
 An equal number—one for every seven minutes, 75,000 for the year were probably saved because treatment did begin in time. There are now an estimated 400,000 living Americans saved from cancer who have remained free of further symptoms at least five years.
 The situation now—Of every four persons stricken with cancer, two will die because science cannot yet cure them all, one will undergo treatment and survive, one will die who could have been saved if treated in time.
 Those are the bald unpalatable odds. But what are your chances of getting cancer increase? They used to be one out of five. The American Cancer Society this year says they are now one out of four.
 Here are a few estimates based on the current situation:

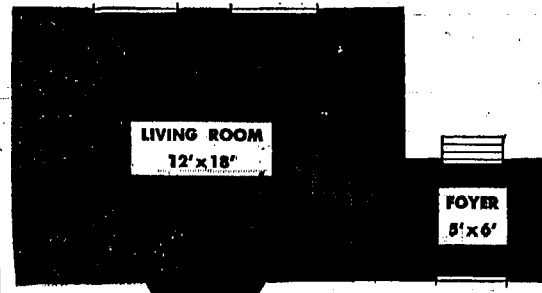

Knowledge of Issues Urged For Business

GOODING, April 6—Gooding businessmen are urged to inform themselves on the basic issues behind the President's multi-billion dollar highway program, the proposed minimum wage increase and state right-to-work laws.

H. J. Dollinger, international district manager for the United States Chamber of Commerce stressed the importance of these points at a chamber work shop Friday evening at the Gooding high school.

Dollinger said the highway issue is not whether we need better roads but how to pay for them. He pointed out that the President's program would quadruple—quaduple the federal highway aid, and thus increase dominance by Washington of federal-state relations.

The program would add \$25 billion dollars to federal debt for improvement of the interstate highway system, he said.

Turning to the proposed increase in the minimum wage, Dollinger warned that no general pay raise could improve living standards and productivity. He said that if employees earning the present 15 cents an hour are raised to 20 cents as proposed, employees now earning above the minimum also will demand pay increases. The result, he predicted, would be a general increase in costs which might well erase the benefits of the wage increase.

The National Chamber representative stressed the importance of developing spokesmen for the business viewpoint through the organization locally of Economics club by Chamber of Commerce, and the club now are operating in scores of cities, he said.

Another important way to prevent misunderstanding of business, he said, is through chamber sponsored business education days which have enabled more than 300,000 teachers to visit 36,000 business firms and so attain a better understanding of competitive enterprise. Equally important, he said, are education business days during which businessmen visit schools.

All of these programs are part of the national chamber's effort to focus business attention on the major problems facing the nation, he added.

Russian Meeting Idea Is Favored

WASHINGTON, April 6—Secretary of State John Foster Dulles told a congressional committee on Feb. 24 that the United States is ready to "meet and negotiate" with the Russians whenever they show that they will move to part-negotiate with the United States.

Dulles made the statement at a closed session of the house appropriations committee. The testimony was published yesterday.

"The secretary of state prefaced his remarks about his power negoti-ating with the Russians that 'many roadblocks to peace' still lie ahead."

Man Finds Ring In Frozen Food

DALLAS, Tex., April 6—Robert Wimberly, 50, first thought he had an old cracker jack style prize when he found a diamond ring in a package of frozen chicken.

But he contacted the firm where the chicken was bought and found that no prize was included in the regular packaging.

But Wimberly was happy yesterday. Detective Charles E. Burrows said, because the ring's owner delivered a \$200 reward for a cold diamond.

Steel Worker Union to Seek Pay Increase

PITTSBURGH, April 6 (U.P.)—The 200,000-member United Steel Workers union is putting heavy pressure on its leaders to press the steel industry for a whopping raise this spring.

The negotiations, beginning about June 1, follow the crucial contract negotiations already under way in the automobile industry.

The steelworkers' president is 53-year-old David J. McDonald. He succeeded the late Phillip Murray in November, 1952. McDonald is being deluged with resolutions from locals calling for a big boost in the industry's current average hourly wage of \$2.73.

3 Reasons Given

Here are some of the reasons why the big CIO union is going after its particular big increase now:

1. The nation's steel mills are operating at about 83 per cent of capacity compared with about 70 per cent when the USW got a 12-cent-an-hour package last June.

2. Under terms of the 1954 settlement, any contract change this year will be confined to wages alone. Discussion of a guaranteed annual wage, cardinal target of the CIO Auto Workers, is barred.

3. McDonald's personal rivalry with CIO and IAW President Walter Reuther will goad him to seek a better settlement than any obtained by the auto workers in their negotiations.

Political Motion Looms in Japan

TOKYO, April 5 (U.P.)—The powerful leftist socialist today threatened a motion to confound the government for its "blunder" over plans for Foreign Minister Mamoru Shigemitsu's mission to Washington.

Masaburo Shiomi, chairman of the left socialist, charged Japan's international prestige was lowered by the U. S. rejection of the foreign minister's visit. He said the no-confidence motion may be introduced when parliament returns from its present recess.

Productivity Soars

Productivity of the individual steel worker has soared to a point where the industry now operates at 70 per cent in 1953 but with 70,000 less employees.

McDonald needs a membership settlement to head off rumblings of dissension among his own steelmen.

The steel industry is in the midst of a sharp comeback from last year's depressed operations. One marketing expert described the boom as "amazing" in the business community—including the steel makers and sellers themselves.

Japan Surprised At Russian Stand

TOKYO, April 5 (U.P.)—Japanese officials were stunned today by Russia's refusal to hold peace talks in New York.

Prime Minister Ichiro Hatajama said the latest Soviet note proposed the talks be held either here or in Moscow.

This was a reversal of the previous Soviet willingness to meet with Japan any place the Japanese wanted. As a result of a Japanese Soviet note expressing this attitude Japanese officials had almost taken it for granted the negotiations would be held in Moscow.

The prime minister said Japan will not send its answer until it gives the Russian note careful study.

Disaster

SAN FRANCISCO, April 6 (U.P.)—MAY Miller, a swimming pool cashier, injured a "long" blue streak on the side of a boy's leg yesterday as he climbed out of the water.

"How did you get that awful bruise on your leg?" she asked.

"Nothing wrong with my leg," the boy said. "It's my fountain pen. It broke."

Red China Admits 'Unrealistic' View

TOKYO, April 6 (U.P.)—Communist China today admitted setting unrealistic goals in its ambitious five-year-plan but placed some of the blame on its entry into the Korean war.

The official Peiping People's Daily gave an unusually frank picture of what was wrong with the much-publicized plan designed to cure Red China's economic ills.

The editorial was broadcast by radio Peiping.

Parole Given

TOKYO, April 6 (U.P.)—Former Admiral Shigemitsu will be paroled from the life sentence for war crimes because of ill health. It was announced today.

He is the fourth major war criminal to be paroled, leaving only Hirohito in Tokyo's Sugamo Prison.

LAS VEGAS, Nev., April 6.—Mario Lanza planned today to reject "the first trial" from this gambling paradise where he fished on a \$100,000 annual contract by failing to appear on stage.

The temperamental tenor lost the fastest contract he has had for six months when he left the Nevada city for his home in Rome, straggling and a star performer at the lush New Frontier hotel.

Lanza failed to appear for his opening night performance at the newly remodeled hotel and casino Monday.

Later yesterday the hotel announced it had canceled his contract.

Back to California

Lanza let it be known only that he would take his entourage of 11 back to California by the first possible train. Those who traveled to Las Vegas with him for the cancelled two-week appearance included his wife, four children, his makeup man, trainer and maid.

The announcement that the New Frontier had canceled Lanza's contract came after a tentative report from a doctor that he was "physically in shape to go on."

Dr. John R. McDermott, Jr. made the statement yesterday afternoon about the time the hotel announced cancellation of the contract.

Had Laryngitis

The official reason given for Lanza's failure to appear on Monday was "an attack of laryngitis and an upper respiratory infection" brought on by the change in altitude.

A similar reason was given last week when Lanza canceled his first appearance on television. It was learned after the appearance that Lanza only mouthed words in a voice which was dubbed in from his old records.

The television appearance was Lanza's first since two years ago when MGM Studios canceled his movie contract. In that incident the studio hired another actor to take Lanza's part on the screen but used Lanza's singing voice.
