### Region Court Decision Has Reversal Bid

BOISE, April 7 (UPI)—The Idaho supreme court in a 3 to 2 decision, today reversed a circuit court decision which had granted the Jerome Cooperative Creamery and one of its employees, the defendant in a damage suit resulting from a fatal accident.

District Judge D. H. Stupp was ordered to grant a new trial.

The district court had been filed by Mr. and Mrs. Willis Larson, Boise. They sought to recover damages for the death of their 9-year-old son, Clifford, who was fatally injured when he was run over by a backing truck two years ago.

The Larsons had alleged negligence on the part of Floyd Swindler, driver of the truck.

Justice E. B. Smith, writing the majority opinion, held that the record failed to show evidence of contributory negligence on the part of the boy.

Donald B. Anderson and in a dissenting opinion that the jury verdict for the defendant was reversed for reasons of negligence were in a large part determined by circumstantial evidence.

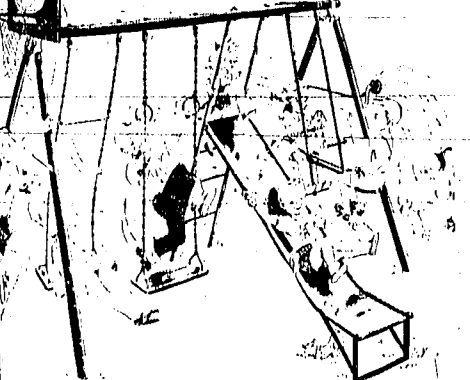

**New Fireball Seen in Area of Southwest**

**ALBUQUERQUE, N.M., April 7 (AP)—**A third mysterious fireball flashed across New Mexico and plunged to earth in the southwestern corner of the state yesterday, a leading scientist said the chance the object was meteoric was very small.

The scientist, Dr. Lincoln E. Peters, noted director of the University of New Mexico's institute of meteorology, could offer no explanation, however, for the objects.

No fragments.

Observations at Tuleton, N.M., reported that a fireball 100 miles from the earth a few miles east of there near the Texas and New Mexico state line. Searchers sent to the scene could find no fragments.

Civil air patrol pilot, a plane which apparently crashed and exploded yesterday in the Texas mountains near Lomburg in the western corner of the state aimed the glow of "intense white heat."

**Green Fireball**

At the same time this plane was flying over a mountain range fireball "flashed" over the southeast part of the state yesterday and was seen in the north as bright red-orange streaks.

The Pao added he had "unconfronted" reports of a fourth fireball near the mountain range.

He said the fireball "flashed" was seen last night at about 8:30 p.m., about seven hours after the first one in the Bureau mountains.

The Pao, who has worked with the air force since 1948 on the problem of green fireballs, said he simply meteoric falls.

**Spread, Top Goal**

A meteoric seldom-ranges more than 10 to 15 miles, according to the data from the 1930s sightings in the Southwest. He noted that the chance of having two meteoric falls in the same area was "infinitesimal."

The fireball believed to have landed in the Bureau mountains region was described by those who saw it as "falling so fast we couldn't make out its size or shape" according to Civil Air Patrol Lt. James M. Huggins. He said the object left a vapor trail.

### Truck Driver Union Erects Great Edifice

WASHINGTON, April 7 (AP)—A truck driver's union is pulling up an edifice that rivals the government's own marble palaces in architectural splendor.

The multi-million dollar structure—built of the same marble as the supreme court—is being financed by the dues of 1,300,000 truck drivers and warehouse workers who make up the great International Brotherhood of Teamsters (AFL).

When it is completed, sometime this year, it will provide a sumptuous headquarters for Teamsters President Dave Beck, a former laundry truck driver who has worked his way up to one of the most powerful posts in organized labor, among other national officers of the union.

The building is equipped with a penthouse, a private chessroom, theater, a six-level garage. Its interior will be finished in imported marble and mosaic tile, paneling of walnut, mahogany and oak.

The building also boasts a series of new conference rooms, the largest of which has a concealed bar. There are several executive offices, each with its own private room, "lounge" and "palm-tree-lounge."

A union pamphlet refers to the structure as a "monument" and it is "the finest front wall in green-heat-resistant glass, with two sided walls of light Italian marble and a rear wall of black marble. Spaced near the rear wall are pillars of imported lavender mosaic granite and a bronze screen that adorns each check room.

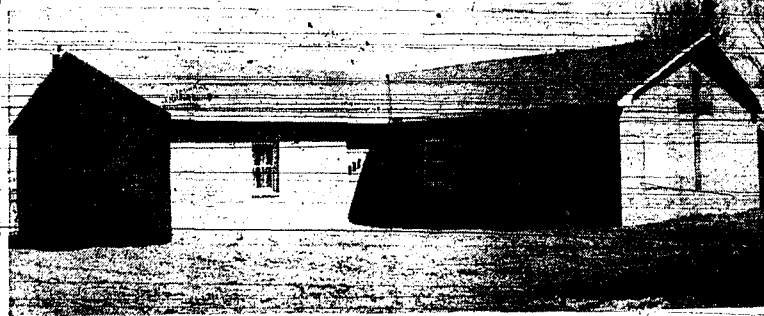
The first-floor conference rooms, with the same oak outside walls, are completely paneled with mahogany. The top executive offices also are paneled with mahogany, oak and walnut and were designed to be well-ventilated.

The penthouse is divided into a glass-walled "coffee lounge" for employees and an open-air roof garden.

Other unions, including the parent AFL, are building new headquarters in the city. The "Palace" is by far the fanciest, now and to come, says this is as it should be. He says his union is the biggest and should have the best headquarters.

The four-story and -panehouse building was originally estimated to cost \$25 million, but other sources put the figure at only \$10 million to \$15 million.

### Efforts Made To End Long Paper Strike

LONDON, April 7.—One of Britain's top labor negotiators predicts today a "settling" of the biggest newspaper-redding strike in the world.

The strike, which has deprived most of Britain of vital news at an historical time, is the changing of prime minister and the general election. The Daily Worker, London's most widely read newspaper for the first time in its checkered career.

The negotiator was Sir John Porter, 67-year-old ex-artilleryman, former secretary, permanent assistant to the board, chief clerk and general manager, and chairman of a special court of inquiry to settle the press strike.

Porter opened hearings yesterday in Church House in the shadow of parliament. He said, "The duty which we see before us is one of urgency, and it is one of public importance."

Almost 14 days old

Porter was asked "What will happen in two weeks?" "The strike will drop," he predicted. "I think it will be settled in 14 days."

He said the government-owned British Broadcasting corporation, which has expanded its radio program to include television, has a total of \$5,000,000 for the year.

The effect on business has been incalculable. The strike has kept the Easter market closed. The stage and film theaters reported a drop in box office receipts. Strike shams in the hotel during the strike are selling freely.

Spring sales were going slow in the big shopping centers of Oxford street and Regent's Park.

### On Way Required

Flowermen and vegetable vendors who usually wrap up their goods in old newspapers put up notices yesterday to bring their own wrapping papers.

The BBC has added two extra news bulletins to its 15-minute evening newscast to a full hour each.

But Britain was still suffering from a lack of news. The strike has cut off the flow of newspapers, after a two-day newspaper and 11 Sunday papers.

Only two daily newspapers of national circulation are still in circulation. One is printed in Manchester, and the Daily Worker, which is not a member of the paper publishers' group. It alone has agreed to negotiate separately with the strikers.

### Refuse Increase

Both the Guardian and the Worker joined the provincial papers in refusing to increase their rates to meet a 15 percent increase in newspaper costs.

The publishers are offering \$123.11 circulation. They are demanding a 15 percent increase in newspaper costs.

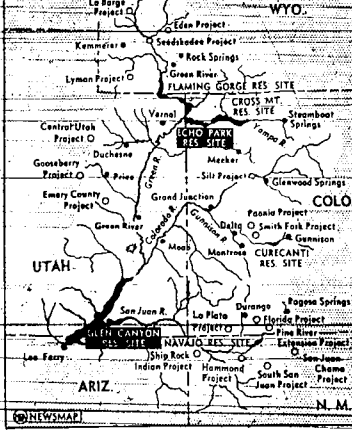

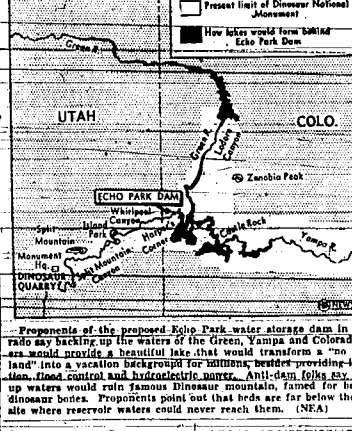

### Ham, Turkeys Favored High On Week-End

Smoked hams and turkeys for summertime dinners will be the favorite fare of the week-end.

At your local food store this week-end, you will find good value for your money. Smoked ham prices will be down as much as 20 cents a pound from a year ago, reflecting the drop in pork prices since the war. A spokesman for a major chain says prices haven't been as low in eight years.

### Report Shows Money Use in Cancer Drive

"Knowing where the money goes is the right of everyone who contributes to the American Cancer society, 1953 crusade to raise \$200,000 in Twin Falls county in the fight to control cancer," says Mrs. Harry Elcock, district commander.

"Of Idaho's cancer dollar, 50 per cent is spent for public and professional education centered at this time the most effective weapon for early detection and prompt clinical medical treatment."

"The 'little red door' on the fourth floor of the Continental Bank building in Boise is being used as a symbol of the American Cancer society's helping hand in Idaho. April is cancer control month during which the society raises most of the money to fight cancer with glowing hope of victory."

More than 6,000 Idaho men and women whose tuition in education and fund-raising has out-making state contribution to the cancer worker has information which may save your life should you be the one in four who get cancer, the commander notes.

Mrs. Elcock says informed volunteer workers for the Idaho branch who had surgery for cancer of the brain to be under the constant supervision of a neurosurgeon, made possible because the Idaho division had the funds to pay for transportation to the medical center where his physician practices, funds made available through April contributions.

The American Cancer society recognizes only three methods of curing cancer: Surgery, X-ray and radium. ### Details Announced for Top Scientific Antarctic Studies

WASHINGTON, April 7 (AP)—The United States navy will launch a 3-year expedition to the South Polar region on Nov. 1, when five ships carrying 1,300 officers and men sail for Little America under the command of Rear Adm. Richard E. Byrd.

The navy announced this and other detailed plans for the expedition yesterday. The surface vessels will be followed next year by seven aircraft which will be flown from Westington, New Zealand to snow-packed observation stations in the Antarctic.

The first objective of the expedition, scheduled to reach the edge of the Antarctic continent next January, will be to land supplies and equipment and to start construction

of the largest types of military transports, which will be used to air-transport supplies and equipment for the three observation stations which will be established as near as possible to the South Pole itself.

After the two southernmost stations are completed, the construction crews will be shifted out and the bases will be flown in.

Before the long expedition is completed early in 1958, the navy ships, officially designated as Task Force 33, will make four round trips to the Antarctic. The first group of officials will go south with the second trip, leaving the United States east coast in November, 1955.

Capt. George Dufek, like Byrd a veteran of polar expeditions, will be acting task force commander of the expedition and in direct charge of the navy operations.

### Substitutes for Sugar Flayed As Being Injurious to Health

WASHINGTON, April 7 (Special)—Chemical substitutes for sugar have been attacked in congress as "non-nutritive and injurious to health."

Rep. Edwin E. Willis, D-La., who comes from a state where a great deal of sugar is produced, made a long house speech on this subject. The basis for his argument was a little-noticed report made last fall by the food and nutrition board of the national research council for the U. S. food and drug administration.

The report urged that the use of Sucaryl, a sugar substitute, be banned in soft drinks and that both Sucaryl and saccharin, another sugar substitute, be segregated in stores and their container size limited so they would not be mistaken for foods sweetened in the ordinary way.

He quoted the report as follows: "The (Sucaryl) characteristics are such that its uncontrolled use might result in the exceeding of the tolerance limits by many individuals. It is only one-thirtieth as sweet as saccharin, which means that concentrations in foods in which it may be used as a sweetening agent is relatively high."

"Sugar is a fine food," Willis said, "and he in place in the diet along with other fine foods. Its consumption should not be threatened by chemical additives which may injure those who use them in quantity."

Willis said the U. S. government at present lacks authority to regulate the use of Sucaryl and saccharin and other chemical products used as substitutes for natural food. It can ban a chemical only if it can show that it is poisonous, but the burden of proof is on the government.

Willis have been introduced at this session to prohibit the use of new chemical additives in foods and soft drinks unless the additives have been thoroughly tested for safety ahead of time, whether or not the additives are poisonous.

The food and nutrition board made a series of recommendations with regard to both Sucaryl and saccharin. They would have them incorporated in the pending legislation.

The board feels the two should be restricted to artificial pineapple foods, the use of Sucaryl, except in soft drinks, should be prohibited because many individuals are likely to ingest Sucaryl in excess of safe limits, and that foods be labeled to show

the practical amount of the artificial sweetening agent and include the statement that the food should be used only in moderation to meet their intake of sugar.

Willis also quoted this part of the board's comments on the use of substitutes for sugar in dieting: "The use of artificial sweeteners in dieting is not a new development. It is a long-standing practice except as they are used in feeding regimens in which there is supervision and control of the total calorie intake."

Willis said that on the contrary, "Experiments at the Harvard school of public health have shown that the hungry persons are those with a low blood sugar level. The judgment of sugar before meals and during meals diminished hunger and prevented overeating."

Willis made his comments against a background of increasing domestic sugar production beyond the amount allowed to be sold in the U. S. under the international sugar act of 1948. The dollar figures in 1953 as compared with 1952 for representatives states are Montana, \$1,000,000 and \$1,100,000; Utah, \$5,500,000 and \$12,924,000; Wyoming, \$5,700,000 and \$ 2,242,000; Colorado, \$2,850,000 and \$22,000,000; Utah, \$5,200,000 and \$3,172,000; Washington, \$8,242,000 and \$5,503,000; Oregon, \$4,218,000 and \$3,905,000; and California, \$18,001,000 and \$22,000,000.

Willis are pending in congress to reduce Cuba's exports of sugar to the U. S. and increase use of sugar from domestic sources.

### Veneral Disease Increases Noted

BOISE, April 7 (AP)—The U. S. public health service has concluded that a "marked increase" in venereal disease in Idaho, it was learned there today.

Arch Clark, special health program representative with the service, was in Boise to discuss preliminary plans for a control program with State Public Health Director L. J. Peterson and with Dr. Stanley Lehman, director of preventive medicine.

Lehman said there have been four times as many venereal disease cases reported during the first three months of this year than there were in a corresponding period in 1952.

# Recruitment Will Be Big Topic at Athletic Meeting

BOISE, April 7 (P)—Idaho high school officials will decide later this month whether to take steps against rumored "athletic recruitment practices" by the state's football and basketball coaches.

They also will look into a proposal for setting aside the eligibility requirements for players in intercollegiate games in cases of "undue hardship."

They may have something to say about charges of poor sportsmanship and vandalism against two teams in the recent C.A. regional basketball tournament at Valley Falls.

One of them would enable the school to take certain action in class one semester before he can drop out of an interschool contest.

There have been rumors of unethical recruitment practices in the "undue influence" case, but there isn't anyone you point your finger at. There isn't any definite evidence.

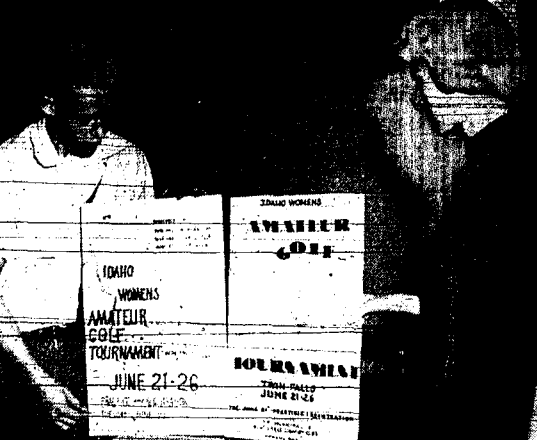
