SHOSHONE, Mich., April 12 (AP)—The Salk anti-polio vaccine today was pronounced safe and effective. The long-hailed immediately by the American Medical Association as "one of the greatest events in the history of medicine."

Water Group Sets Election On Thursday

HAILEY, April 12—Directors of the Upper Wood River Watershed association will be elected at a special stockholders meeting Thursday. Directors who terms are expiring are James Wheeler, Kenneth Beecher and C. W. Gardner.

The directors were to have been elected at a meeting April 2 but there were insufficient stockholders present to constitute a quorum. At the meeting, however, E. L. White, area engineer for the Snake river development office, and Keith Anderson, regional ground and water geologist, reported on progress made by the bureau of reclamation and the U. S. geological survey in the water surveys in the area.

Nearly four years ago the government started surveys first to determine if a dam could be built in the Big Wood river and to ascertain the quantity of underground water. The surveys showed the cost of a dam would be too high in proportion to the savings in water, the speakers said.

To drill the observation wells and one test well, \$10,083.82 was appropriated. Later, another contract for \$2,025.50 was let to run tests at one of the wells.

The study so far has included an inventory of all existing wells, determination of the ground water levels, observation of the fluctuation of the water table during the year, estimates of the amount and availability of ground water, permeability of the ground water and an appraisal of the possible effect of additional ground water pumping on the flow of Silver creek.

The geological survey will complete its part of the work in July after which the bureau of reclamation will analyze and appraise the

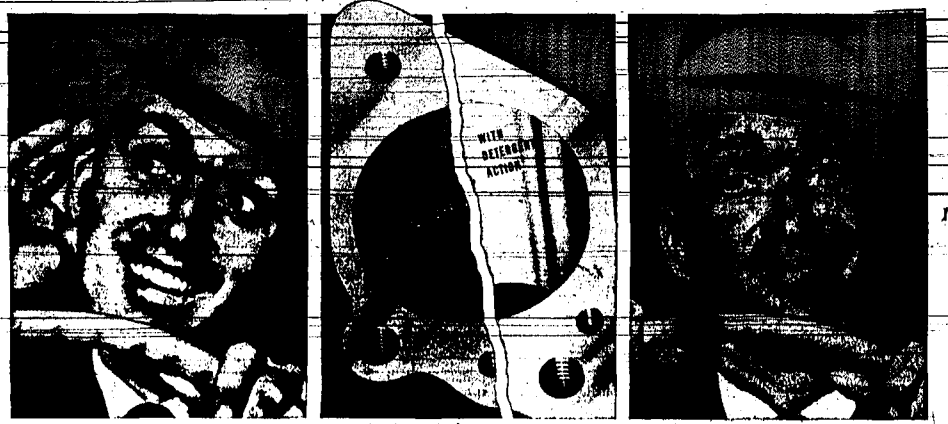

Road Jobs in Valley Getting In High Gear

SHOESHONE, April 12.—Road construction jobs in the district are getting into full swing. J. H. Cairns, district engineer for the state highway department, announces:

Among the jobs are three bridge jobs over Snake river. In the Burley area contractors are working on the Montgomery bridge over Snake river on highway 30 east of Rupert. Work was suspended on surfacing and oiling highway 22 for a few days because of the weather. Oiling and surfacing there and from Challis to Clayton will be resumed when weather permits, Cairns said.

Rehabilitation Is Main Hope For Those Who Have Polio

By ELIZABETH TOOMEY
NEW YORK, April 12 (U. S. A.)—These are the children who will live to remind us what it means to present paralytic polio.

They are in a bright, cheerfully cheerful room today trying to learn to walk. They are the luckiest ones, full to young to realize it, who always will be crippled.

Bobby, a solemn, handsome boy 3 years old, already is being "rehabilitated" by the doctors and nurses here. His legs and arms are partially paralyzed, but he has learned to swing his legs, the braces covered his blue jeans as he hanged onto two side railings in the crutches that resembles walking.

He is one of 275 polio victims who now are being rehabilitated at the Institute of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation here. They have passed the one-year convalescent period. Now they are learning to live with what they have left.

"At the end of one year what has been damaged is damaged," Dr. George Becker, director of the child's division of the institute, said. "Then the rehabilitation begins. We must tell a mother that her child will never get more muscle power back, but that he will develop new uses. We teach them tricks. They use strength in one part of the body to make up for weakness in another."

Bobby and his brother both got polio at the same time a year ago. His brother recovered completely, but doctors know now that Bobby always will walk with braces and crutches.

Dr. Deaver, walked among the children who came to their afternoon exercise session in the sunny room. Some had just arrived with their mothers for a regular checkup.

"You know perfectly well you can't wear braces," a thin, pretty mother said firmly to her son, who stood in his stocking feet for his examination. One leg gradually has become shorter than the other since the boy had polio five years ago at the age of 2. He must wear special shoes.

APPOMATTOX, Va. (AP)—Mrs. George P. Abbott, Jr., proudly held out the report card of Peyton, one of her 13-year-old twin daughters. It was a long string of nothing but A's.
"She hopes to train to be a teacher," Mrs. Abbott explained. "She's such a help now to her twin sister Penny, and Nancy Jane, 6, with their lessons."
In Peyton's case, it's the blind leading the sighted, for she has been sightless since she was 18 months old. And the fact that her family learned to make her adjustment to everyday life right in their own home undoubtedly is one big reason Peyton now stands in the top bracket with an intelligence quotient of 150.
When Peyton's sight began to fade the effects of top eye expert in the nation, the Abbotts found themselves faced with the difficult problem of raising girls who were twin in every way except for the big difference of vision.
Most advisers urged them to place Peyton in a school for the blind.
"But we couldn't bear the thought of being separated from her," said Mrs. Abbott. "We loved her too much. And we thought it would be harmful for the twins to be separated."
Instead, they engaged a teacher to come to their home. Peyton could start learning to read and write in Braille before she was ready to enter the first grade. She learned fast. When the twins started school, Peyton was already so far ahead that she was promoted to the second grade. Now in the third she has a grade ahead of Penny ever since.

Without sight, it seems makes it easier for her to concentrate, Mrs. Abbott.
"But we couldn't bear the thought of being separated from her," said Mrs. Abbott. "We loved her too much. And we thought it would be harmful for the twins to be separated."
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She's twice won the championship in the Appomattox county spelling bee—holds a number of school offices, and as a Girl Scout holds 14 merit badges (her twin penny, is even with her in Scoutling).

Mrs. Abbott looked once more at Peyton's all-A report card, and added: "The only place to solve a vision problem, such as ours, is right square at home."

Tip Booklets Are Out; Diet Has Top Spot

WASHINGTON, April 19—The agriculture department said today it is going to stop putting out tips to homemakers on such things as clothes and household appliances.

From now on, the department's research service is going to concentrate on ways to improve America's diet.

There is no thought of discontinuing research in homemaking altogether, said the service's director, Byron T. Shaw. But I believe it is more important to do research on what the human body needs and what foods are best.

Shaw said dropping the tips on clothes and appliances will save taxpayers \$146,000. He said all of this will be switched before July to research and the issuance of pamphlets on "human nutritional requirements" and "nutritional requirements of foods we eat."

Among the things being discarded are pamphlets on washing machines, dryers, home freezers, and clothes. Also a publication entitled "Took for Food Preparation and Dishwashing."

This pamphlet became famous during the 1952 political campaign when President Eisenhower's candidate called it a "symbol of shameful wasting of tax funds."

Bill Printed

After Mr. Eisenhower became president, the department printed 15,000 copies. Shaw said this was routine since the supply had run out.

Pamphlets on affection, care, and use of clothing will also be discontinued.

Shaw did not close the door on resumption of all bulletins in which research has stopped. For example, the "Safe" pamphlet on water removal from fabrics will be revised, brought up to date, and reissued because of demand.

Other pamphlets may be reissued in some cases where research has been stopped if "there continues to be a strong demand" and the information is timely.

Regulations Given In Atomic Energy

WASHINGTON, April 12 (AP)—The atomic energy commission today tentatively issued three basic regulations to govern the private use of atomic energy in this country.

The rules—first issued under the liberalized atomic energy act of 1954—provide a detailed guide for the licentiate's control, the release of nuclear materials, and the handling of confidential and secret information.

AEC Chairman Lewis L. Strauss said the regulations will "open the way to all who are interested in engaging in research and development of commercial activities in the atomic energy field."

Radio Delegates Eye Ethics Code

LIMA, Peru, April 12 (AP)—Delegates to the fourth Inter-American radio congress are expected today to begin debate on the adoption of a "code of ethics" for radio.

The congress opened yesterday with representatives from 18 nations, including the United States and Canada, on hand. President Manuel Odría of Peru attended the opening session, presided over by Jose S. Casero, president of the Peruvian broadcasters' organization.

It was expected the congress would approve a code of ethics based on the concept that radio should inform the public and guarantee freedom of expression within democratic limits. The code also is expected to provide that radio stations maintain "good faith" in its relations with advertisers and the general public.

These conclusions were "consistent with a Japanese survey," the embassy said.
