Safety of 'Falouts' Stressed

Attacking "reckless and alarming" predictions on the possible effects of the weapons tests in Nevada and the Pacific, Strauss said:

1. "Medical and biological advisers of the atomic energy commission are of the opinion that the possibility of serious genetic effects from the small amount of radiation produced by the testing program is remote."
2. We find no data to suggest our weapons testing program has influenced general conditions."
3. "Generally speaking, the exposure conditions for the American people from the current Nevada tests has been less than the normal background radiation received every few days from the sky."

Testifying before the joint congressional atomic energy committee, Strauss said the safety of the atomic tests is dependent upon the nuclear tests in Nevada and the Pacific. The tests are being conducted in a safe and controlled manner.

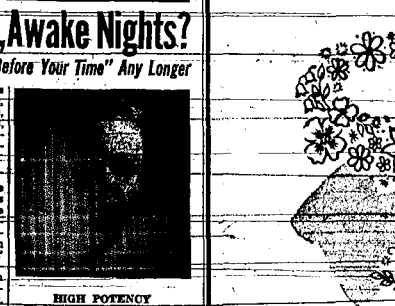

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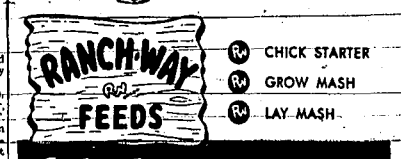

Solons Study Plan to Boost Minimum Pay

WASHINGTON, April 15.—The Eisenhower administration is expected to propose to raise the minimum wage to \$2.00 more workers and raise the minimum from 75 to 90 cents an hour.

Secretary of Labor Mitchell related all efforts by Senator Douglas, D., Ill., chairman of a Senate labor subcommittee to put the increase in order as personally favoring an increase to \$1.00.

Wage Higher Floor

Strong sympathy has been expressed by northern members of congress for the \$1 figure. Some senators of both political parties are supporting a \$1.25 wage floor, the amount which the AFL and CIO are fighting.

Hearings on the politically warm issue started today and will continue before the Douglas subcommittee for three or four weeks.

Mitchell, choosing his words carefully, said it was the administration's "aerobic recommendation" that congress consider extension of coverage to multi-state retail establishments, such as chain grocery stores; to multi-state chain hotels; to motion picture theaters; and to some 150,000 employees engaged in wholly intra-state work but whose employers are principally in the interstate field.

The present 75-cent minimum applies to 24 million workers, Mitchell said. A 15-cent boost would mean immediate higher pay checks for 1,300,000 workers, making less than 50 cents an hour.

Living Costs Rise

Mitchell said the cost of living since 1950, when the 75-cent floor was set, has increased 13 per cent. A new minimum of 90 cents, he testified, would more than compensate for that cost-of-living increase.

Principal opposition to an increase in the minimum wage comes from the south, from southern Democrats. Wages in the south are generally lower than those paid to northern workers.

Youth Legislature Events Set Today

BOISE, April 15.—The annual Idaho youth legislature opens today with about 170 young people from throughout the state expected to attend the two-day session at the University of Idaho.

Federal Judge Fred Taylor will administer the oath to the young legislators and state officials, and Gov. Robert E. Smylie will address the opening session in the house chamber.

Bills will be introduced and considered by committee the first day, and debated and voted upon Saturday.

Southland Threatened Now by High Crests in Swollen Rivers

Southland rivers, gorged by three days of torrential rains, rose toward flood-crests today in Alabama, Mississippi, South Carolina, and Louisiana.

No new storms threatened Dixie, but tornado weather which raged across the "nation's southern half" today, and the Mississippi valley, killed and maimed thousands of dollars' damage.

In Mississippi, the Pearl, Pascagoula, and Leaf rivers threatened to spill over thousands of acres today. Alabama was warned to prepare for the worst floods since 1948 on the lower Alabama, Coosa, and Tombigbee rivers.

Elsewhere in the nation, for still third day of torrential rains, rose the abandoned New York City white American tanker and a British ship collided in the mist yesterday. No persons were injured, but the British ship "Patola" was "terribly gored," officials said.

In Texas and Oklahoma, workmen repaired miles of bridges, and communications and power lines in summer-like temperatures. Ice, heavy snow, and 70-miles-per-hour winds had snuffed the fires and temporarily marooned hundreds of motorists, but the eight-foot drifts were melting, and melted away today. Farther west, more blowing dust.

Care of Your Children

Loving parents have great pleasure in watching their little ones grow. They delight in each sign of development. That is one of the joys of parenthood, one that vanishes all too soon.

"It" was attention is not given to the ways little children indicate growth through results can appear. When a baby slips his mother's face in innocent endeavor to stroke it lovingly, everybody smiles and his mother takes hold of the tiny list and kisses it. So far so good.

"The" baby becomes a rumbler and his mother says, "No, no," to something he tries to do and he calls, "Till hit you," or "Shut up," or "I will see if I can't hit you." It is too young to understand that this won't do but he must be told there and then that it won't so that he learns in time how to obey cheerfully and how to talk to his mother or any other grownup person.

The wayward antics of little children must be promptly checked and not laughed at. The little ones take smiles and laughter for applause and repeat the action that will not be acceptable when they are a year or so older.

Nobody wants to nag children so it becomes necessary to decide on what is important and what is not. This idea carries all the way from childhood through adolescence. The important matter is to be attended to promptly and the lesser on allowed to pass. A good measuring rule is, "Will this behavior be acceptable when he is older?"

On that basis we won't laugh when a child uses bad language. We won't tell his grandmother how smartly he outwitted the lady who asked him whose little boy he was. That really was not funny and when you tell it so gaily he just loves himself for it and will repeat "her rudeness" until one day you are greatly embarrassed by it and punish him.

Rudeness, selfishness, bad language, destructiveness, are expressions of an untrained intelligence. We expect this in little children. That is not to say that we encourage it. It should get no applause. It should meet with quiet disapproval. That usually settles such demonstrations. If it does not and the child continues to be at fault we tell him impressively that he is making a mistake.

Children ways are amusing in childhood but they have a way of continuing on past the place where they are acceptable behavior. For the children's sake we should be watchful concerning this.

Mothers will find life much easier if they have a routine for taking care of their children. 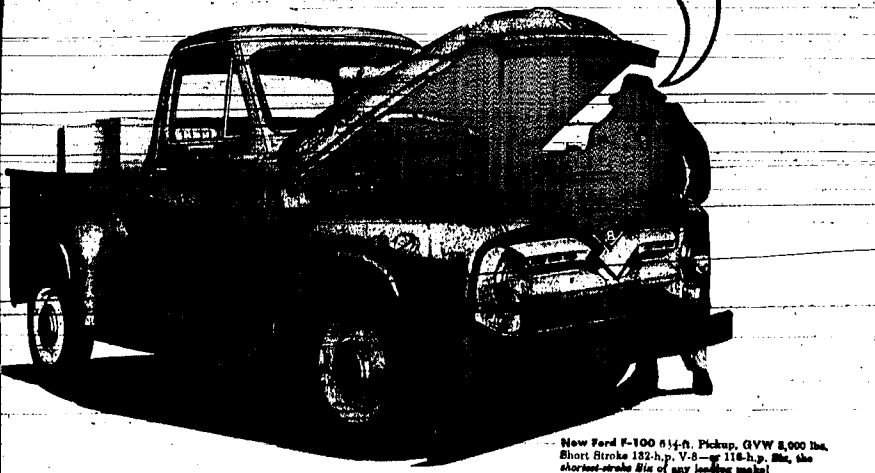

Doctor Outlines Plans for Polio Shots for Club

JEROME, April 15—Tentative plans for the administration of the Salk polio vaccine for Jerome county were outlined by Dr. Cecil Reinstein, Twin Falls, director of the state central public health unit, Tuesday afternoon for the Jerome Civic club.

Dr. Reinstein gave a history of polio and the vaccine, relating the many tests made and the progress made with each test. He explained that the first and second grade pupils in Jerome county are eligible for the vaccine and that 95 per cent of the parents agreed to receive the vaccine. He further stated that it is planned that the first dose will be given April 19 and the second one week later. The third shot is planned for a month later.

Dr. Reinstein stated that the arrangements for the shots are being completed by Mrs. Overfield and the clinic will be set up in the high school auditorium. The shots will be given by local physicians during the morning hours. Room mothers will assist with the program.

Peterson also spoke of the vaccine and the vaccination program on the state level. He stated that the state is in readiness for the program to be carried out as soon as the vaccine is made available. He stated that the Idaho national guard will fly the vaccine to pick-up stations. Peterson stated that 90 and 95 per cent of the children, grade school blanks had been signed.

Peterson also discussed the department of public health and the findings of the 15 man committee which spent the past two years investigating the department. The committee's recommendations made by the committee included the need of preventive measures especially in the school health program. The committee also recommended the need of a modern rehabilitation program and the need to completely revise the statutes covering the care of the indigent.
