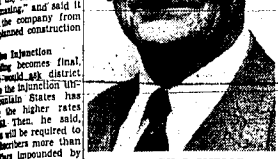

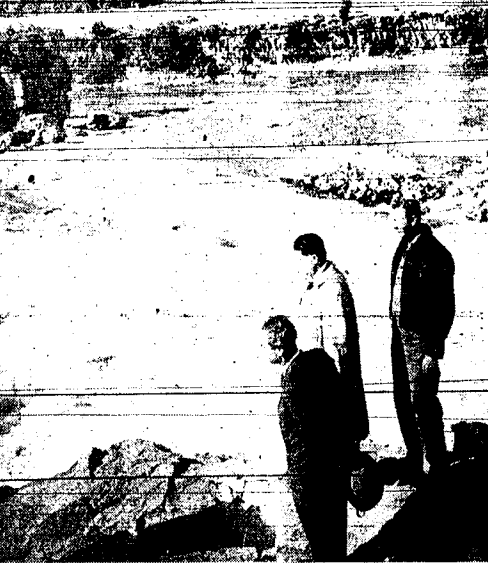

NEW YORK, April 16 (AP)—The National Commission for Infantile Paralysis says Salk vaccine orders will be filled from "the south up" in the same system used in field trials last year.

Taxes "Low," Avers Smylie

PARMA, April 16 (AP)—Robert Smylie said tonight that when the results of this year's legislative session in Washington, Oregon and Idaho are compiled, Idaho will have the lowest per capita tax burden of any state in the northwest.

Addressing the Parma Junior Chamber of Commerce, Smylie cited a recent survey which showed the per capita tax burden of Washington to be \$107.19, Oregon \$120 and Idaho \$81.34.

Warehouse Is Swept by Fire

NAMPA, April 16 (AP)—Fire destroyed a 60,000-gallon warehouse at the Louis V. Godek Produce company today, but firemen succeeded in keeping the flames from a supply of ammonium nitrate fertilizer stored in the basement of the building.

Hundreds of spectators were attracted by the large column of smoke and were forced back by policemen who warned, "Get back, the night has come."

The flames started in the warehouse used to store seed potatoes and out-of-season equipment, during the noon hour. It spread to the two-story brick building and heavily damaged the upper floor. Two carloads of nitrate were stored in the basement.

Fire Chief L. T. Lessinger said there was "real danger" of an explosion as fumes poured over the fertilizer to keep the flames from it.

Police were rushed to the scene to help the 21-man Nampa fire department. Firemen succeeded in keeping the crowd back. The property was insured by Nampa's three trucks and 18 firemen battled the blaze.

Lessinger said the blaze started in an oil splay which workmen had been preparing for orchards.

James Voder, vice president, said he was unable to estimate the damage.

American-Enterprise Gets Dissipated in Good Deeds

An acquaintance of mine, whose avocation is compiling vital statistics of all sorts, told me the United States could build at least one new atomic submarine every six months with the man hours lost resulting from precarious situations.

I doubted this statement until I plucked my curiosity by such an extent that I began keeping statistics of my own, and derived if he isn't right, or near so, I began to collect the papers for berries of stranded and bewildered animals, and now I have a filing cabinet bursting with material.

Just under "Cats—Strange Behavior of" I have enough material to prove conclusively that my acquaintance wasn't jesting. 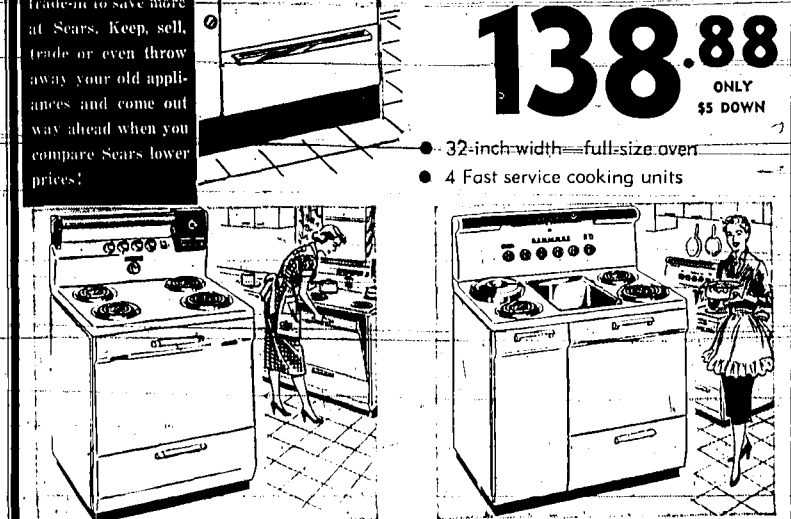

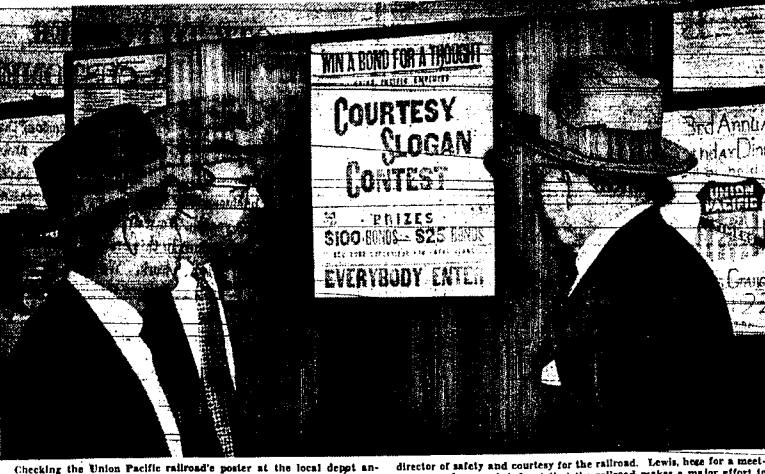

\$750,000 Annual Safety Costs for U.P.

Pay Off in Customer Relations, Awards

The Union Pacific railroad spends approximately \$750,000 annually on its courtesy and safety program, says F. B. Lewis, district director, who visited Twin Falls Thursday and Friday.

The results of the effort are apparent in the fact that the railroad during the past 25 years has won national safety contests for similar firms 18 times. Lewis says in Omaha, Neb., employs 10 persons who constantly are traveling through the 14 states covered by the railroad.

"The emphasis on safety and courtesy is like taking out insurance," Lewis says. "Our company has placed the two items together and made them a separate and distinct part of our business. The consideration of customer relations is as important as any other aspect of our business."

Lewis emphasizes that all modern railroads have approximately the same type of equipment. They offer the same type of services including sleeping, lounge cars and other facilities.

"If one railroad wants to be better than the other," he says, "it has to give the public something extra, something tangible that will make the passengers want to ride again. The merchants to do this, they freight by rail again. We feel safety and courtesy do just that."

Citing figures from the company's program, Lewis says that last year 188 special meetings were conducted for the company's approximately 53,000 employees and their families and friends.

The meetings included special shows, dinners, movie parties and get-togethers highlighted by prizes and different kinds of fun. As an example, he says the recent party at Pocatello drew 2,000 persons while gathering at Omaha saw 5,800 persons attending.

The company also has a special theater car which constantly is on the go. Lewis said it is being used for meetings, motion pictures and displays and always is open to the public.

Lewis says the company constantly makes new movies to emphasize safety and courtesy points. One of the shows, "The Human Side," recently was shown for the staff of employees at Sun Valley.

The company has printed and distributed some 200,000 copies of a pamphlet, "I'm Mad Too," written by the chief of the Colorado state police. The article, which first appeared in the Empire Magazine of the Denver Post, also was printed in the Times-News, dealing with highway safety.

The U. P. believes in bringing the messages of safety and courtesy to employees without boring them to tears, Lewis adds. Some time ago, a message of good behavior toward the customers and a thought to better relations with other persons, was presented to employees.

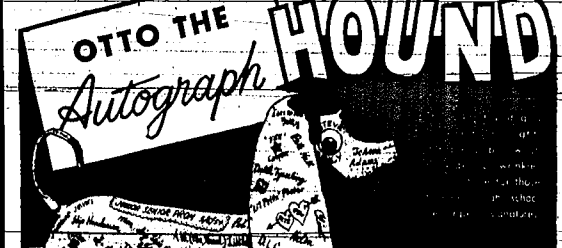

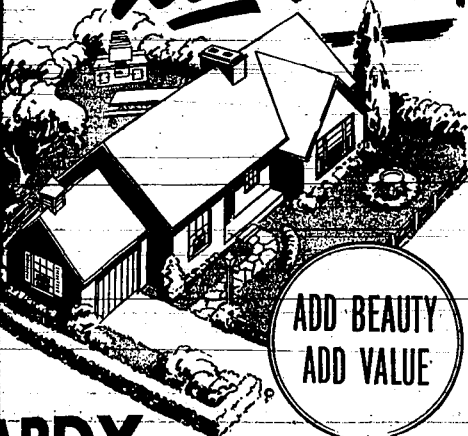

YMCA Group Votes on Bills Of Legislature

BOISE, April 16 (AP)—Idaho YMCA youth legislators voted today to require one semester of sex education in high school, but youth Governor Douglas Johnson of Blackfoot vetoed the measure.

The mock legislature meeting in its eighth annual session, voted down a 2 per cent sales tax and approved measures increasing the minimum salary schedule for teachers approximately two million dollars for school construction and banning union shops.

Clear Split Session

It also passed by the necessary two-thirds majority of both houses a resolution proposing to amend the constitution to permit a split legislative session.

The sex education bill was hotly debated in both houses. The senate passed it 31-10 and the house 26-15. Johnson vetoed it on the ground that it did not guarantee competent instruction. The senate voted to sustain his veto.

Terms of Bill

The bill would have required one semester of study of the "psychology and anatomy of sex, including a study of the social responsibilities and attitudes involved along with the parent-child relationship. It would have been taken in the senior year.

The state board of education would have been required to prescribe the course of study.

Benefits Cited

The Idaho Falls delegation, which sponsored the bill, argued that such education would "curb extra-marital relationships, give students a better attitude toward sex, prepare students for marriage and cut down divorce rates."

One young legislator arguing for the bill said "many parents don't know as much about sex as they think they do."

Opponents of the bill argued that the course should be elective, that one semester was not enough and that such education in the schools would alienate some religious groups.

Sales Tax Bill

The sales tax bill, sponsored by the Kellogg delegation, was killed in the house 23-18. It would have split revenue from the tax equally between the general fund and education.

The split session resolution—calling for a 30-day session—was a 30-day break between—was sponsored by the Boise delegation.

The house passed the so-called "right-to-work" bill, 30-18, passed the senate 21-17.

Other bills which passed both houses were a bill to create county offices in a district instead of county basis, but keep them under the direction of probate judges; provide for a waiting period in divorce actions before the final judgment was filed; authorize school districts to provide public health insurance; provide for election of county commissioners by district instead of on a county-wide basis; require examinations for state police officers.

Agriculture Posts Given Idaho Boost

Downward trend in non-agricultural employment in Idaho, which was reversed during the winter months, was halted, according to a report from the employment security agency, Boise.

Non-agricultural employment as of March 15 totaled 125,000, the report said. This represented an increase of 400 more than for February and 2,100 for the same period in March, 1954.

Manufacturing employment levels climbed with 20,200 employed in March, compared to 20,700 employed in February. Total non-manufacturing employment increased from 104,000 in February to 104,800 in March.

Employment on Idaho farms during the winter season, compared with 48,600 in February. This was 3,700 less than the 54,800 reported for March, 1954.

A breakdown of agricultural totals showed 41,400 operators and family workers employed in March, 1955, compared with 40,400 in February, and 43,600 in March, 1954. 8,400 regular field workers, compared with 7,000 in February, and 9,100 in March, 1954. 1,200 local seasonal workers, compared with 1,000 in February, and 1,800 in March, 1954, and 100 non-local seasonal workers, compared with none in February and 200 in March, 1954.

DENVER, April 16 (AP)—Atomic energy commission spokesmen here said today radioactivity in the area, which aroused concern in adjacent prospectors whose Geiger counters were reported "going crazy," represents "no hazard to anyone's health."

The fallout was carried over Colorado by winds at altitudes of 30,000 to 40,000 feet.

Halt Air Travel

A ban on commercial and military airplane travel through certain sections of between Denver and the west coast, were termed "routine" by civil aeronautics administration officials. The ban was in effect only about eight hours Friday night.

The official AEC statement said fallout in the area "appears to have been at approximately 10 p. m. (MST) April 15. A maximum radioactivity level of 1.6 milliroentgens per hour was measured" at the AEC plant at Rocky Flats, northwest of Denver.

"No Hazard"

"This level, the report said, "while measurable by sensitive instruments, represents no hazards to anyone's health."

A government spokesman said the reading had diminished to 5 milliroentgens by today and compared with the 3.9 milliroentgens per hour biological dose to which an individual may be exposed without harm.

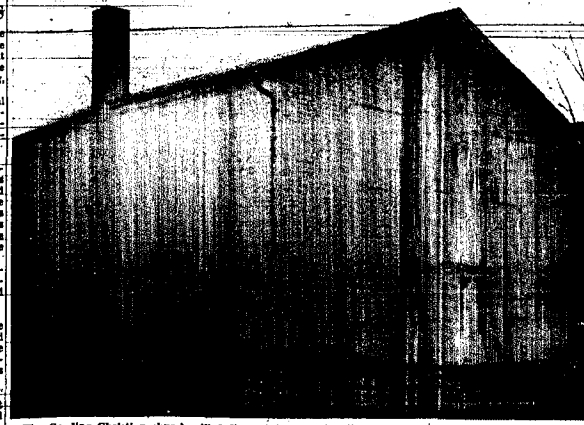

2 Issues Are Foreseen for General Election in Britain

LONDON, April 16 (AP)—Britain's general election next month may be fought around two main issues—the nation's economic health and her role in easing east-west tensions.

The battleground has been shaping up for months in parliament and press. It was thrown into sharp focus Friday night after Prime Minister Anthony Eden called elections for May 26.

Leaders of the opposition-Labor party quickly declared that Eden's 10-day government was afraid to delay the election because economic conditions showed signs of worsening.

And there was renewed Laborite criticism because the Conservative government has not seen fit until now to press for big power talks on world problems.

Eden went on the air to make his first announcement of the election date, which had been widely forecast.

He told the nation "uncertainly" about the future of the pound and about the political future he had for one influence in the world's affairs; but for trade and investment in many ways.

He said parliament would be dissolved May 8.

Hugh Gaskell, former Laborite chancellor of the exchequer declared the "real reason" for an early election was government concern over the economic situation.

"They fear a trade deficit which developed in the second half of 1954 is getting worse," he said. "They want to get the election over quickly before unemployment increases."

Last February the Churchill government took action to speed the flow of exports and to slow down imports.

Among the steps taken by Chancellor of the Exchequer R. A. Butler were increasing the interest rate date, which had been widely forecast.

Man's Home Is His Castle

Few Inhabitants of Rock Creek Canyon Are Proud of Their Makeshift Houses

In Rock Creek canyon, within the city limits of Twin Falls, men live in caves, mud-huts and cardboard shacks, but despite the dilapidated appearance of their dwellings, the few inhabitants are a proud lot, verifying the old saying that a man's home is his castle.

Police know about the existence of the Rock Creek community. They say most of its inhabitants are friendly persons, living within the law. Most Twin Falls residents, however, are not even aware that such a situation exists within the city limits. The few who have had an opportunity to check the conditions are appalled at the filth, misery and degradation thriving about the muddy waters of the creek.

Who are the men who live here and why do they live the way they do? Solomon Martinez, 65, and Jasper Vasquez, 67, are typical of the Rock Creek inhabitants.

Both of them came from Mexico years ago, but neither is sure just when. As a matter of fact, Vasquez last year tried to make heads-and-tails of what they say.

Judging by his appearance, Vasquez is at least half Chinese but is himself unable to account for his Oriental features. The other day he was doing a wash outside the men's mud hut. With a small piece of soap, he was scrubbing away and after a rinse or two he hung the clothes to dry in the warm sun, satisfied with a job well done.

Vasquez is all smiles. A couple of yellow teeth add a grotesque look to his face.

"Old Mexico . . . yah, yah," Vasquez smiled when questioned about his native land.

"No, no," he said when an attempt was made to find out if he had ever

roof is of boards and paper. The men say they keep warm and dry. Actually, they're about as sturdy as the canyon.

What do they do for a living? Nothing. Do they care about finding a job? No. Their attitude indicates they couldn't care less. Questioned about trying to find work, they lead one to believe they find an odd job here and there, but never try to keep it.

Vasquez and Martinez have no worries. They have no bills to pay, no tax forms to fill out and no social obligations to meet. They don't even have a landlord who might throw them out.

Their menu is simple. They eat beans, potatoes—onions and whatever milk products they can pick up at the dairy nearby. The merchants give them the stuff free.

The police know all about the situation and the men in Rock Creek stay within the law. They never cause any trouble and don't even try to mingle with others. Police officers check the area regularly.

Vasquez and Martinez are only two of the community, but definitely seem more permanent than the others. Some of the other men live in board shacks and a couple have taken refuge in caves. Their story is about the same. They live "off the land," work a few days every week. The rest of the time they sit and wait. They are all older men. Do they have families somewhere?

Possibly, but they don't seem to remember. Certainly, they don't care. No mailman ever calls at their shacks. They are the forgotten members of humanity. The police officer making his rounds occasionally will take one of them to the doctor for a checkup if things seem to be especially bad.

Other than that these unfortunate by-products of modern civilization get no attention. Police feel most of them are victims of a lost battle against alcoholism. Actually, they won't even take a drink any more.

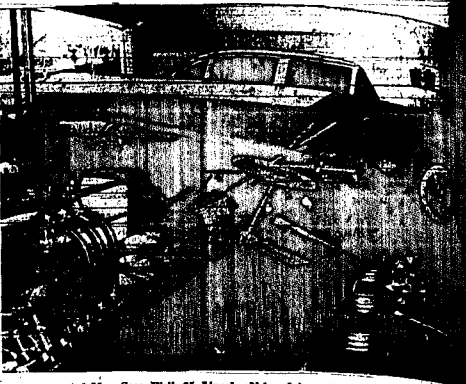
Further up the creek a different type of humanity dwells. Here one finds the tramping transients. During the summer months hundreds of them will camp along the creek bed waiting for the next train out. At the present time there are only about a dozen of them around.

These men don't refuse a game of cards or a shot of whiskey. Police watch them closely as they are more apt to start trouble than the permanent residents. Most of them stay only a couple of days. They get a shave and a good sleep. Then they are off like misfit birds to greener pastures. Some find seasonal work here, but none of them seem interested in permanency.

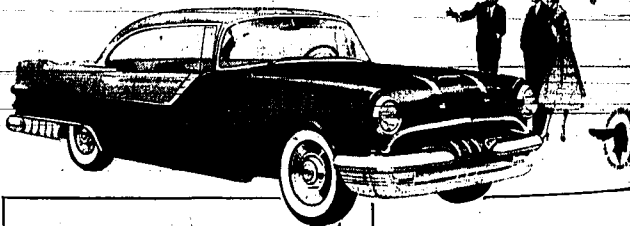

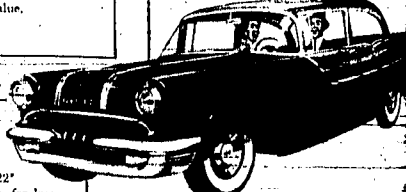

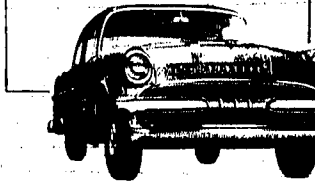

LONDON, April 16 (AP)—British firmly and formally rejected Peiping charges that British negligence was responsible for the crash of an Air India transport carrying 100 Chinese diplomats to the Afro-Asian conference in Indonesia.

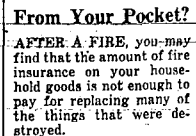
