

Plenice, Unease Spread in Strikes in 3 Major Areas

Tension spread in three major strikes in the second day of a strike of (10 Electrical workers in the Sikestons plant at Lake Shoshone, a large Sperry Gyroscope plant at Lake Shoshone and a strike of the Western Union telegraph employees in their jobs. At the Sikestons plant, the Western Union telegraph employees were reported and plant security forces were reported damaged by pickets rocking the vehicles. Some 9,000 workers struck Monday in demands for an 18-cent-a-hour wage boost. The company offered 12 cents.

Violence and talk of violence flared in the 38-day Louisville and Nashville railroad and Southern Railway strike which is crippling commerce in 14 southern states.

P. L. Shackelford, Birmingham, Ala., chairman of Area Team of the 10 nonoperating unions that struck the railroad, told a mass meeting of strikers they had his picket line. "I don't know if you want to keep" non-strikers from working. Shackelford said he was "not preaching violence" and cautioned against involving the wives and children of "non-strikers." But he said the pickets care what they do to the people who are working.

Cable cuttings disrupted service in Louisiana, Florida, Georgia, Alabama and Tennessee. Windows were broken and eggs thrown in demonstrations. A strike of southern governors and state legislatures in 14 southern states has scheduled meetings among management and union representatives in Washington, D.C., on May 20-21. In Boston, a strike of some 35,000 railroad workers was reported in a report from New York.

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Large Foreign Aid Sum Asked by Ike To Aid "Security"

WASHINGTON, Ga., April 20 (AP)—President Eisenhower today proposed to congress a \$3,580,000,000 foreign aid program to meet "the grim essentials of security." His recent was admitted on the far east.

The object of his over-all program for the 1956 fiscal year "was to keep the free nations against the Russian bastion at fullest possible strength and to hurdle any obstacles created by the communists."

"There is a clear case of international aid to congress. The chief executive said in a 3,000-word special message to the house and senate endorsing a multi-billion dollar program of assistance to cooperative nations, particularly those in the far east.

"The president threats to world security and stability are now centered in Asia," the President said. "The preponderance of funds requested of the congress will be used to meet the threat there."

"The President based his program on the fact that the world peace and the grim essentials of security."

He said the proposed aid funds amounted to defense alliance expenditures clearly safeguarding, in the most desirable manner, and at the least possible cost, the security of the United States and of other free nations.

"The President's mutual security program in congress contains a substantial program of foreign aid."

He said there was no hope for the world peace and the grim essentials of security and growth are recognized as a prior and paramount objective of the program.

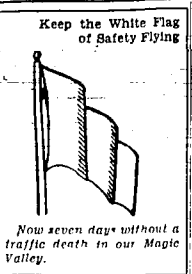

Wind Gets Blame For Cut on Head

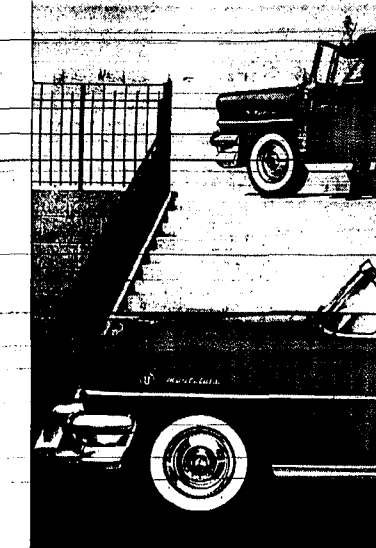

WASHINGTON, April 20—A spokesman for a legislative group told a congressional committee today that a 1953 federal survey of school needs "may well be classified as one of the great frauds of the fifties."

The charge was made by Steve Stahl, coordinator of the National Conference of State Taxpayer Executives and vice president of the Oklahoma public expenditures council. He testified before a subcommittee in opposition to federal aid for school construction.

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Polio Project Has Top Call Upon Vaccine

NEW YORK, April 20—A survey of the six drug companies producing the Salk polio vaccine showed today that only a trickle of the fluid would be available for commercial channels until the "no charge" program of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis is completed.

Even the foundation's program was lagging, but primarily it was a question of distribution—the chief reason was the intensive scrutiny which each batch of the vaccine must be given by government scientists to decide if it is safe for public use.

The survey of drug company officials showed that until a tie-up is between the ages of 6 and 10—the ages generally covered by the foundation program—the chances of getting the anti-polio vaccine through commercial channels in the next eight weeks are rather slim.

The foundation announced last night that five of the six companies manufacturing the vaccine had shipped enough of it to provide first shots for 4,173,120 children. This is not quite half of the nine million throughout the United States and its territories who are slated to get the two-shot, anti-polio treatment at foundation expense.

The shipment went to 24 states, the District of Columbia, Hawaii and southern California. Most of the 4,173,120 children are recipients of vaccine (one cc represents one shot) sent to southern states, the foundation explained, because of the earlier incidence of polio and the earlier closing of schools in that area.

Officials said they felt sure that vaccine for first shots for the rest of the nine million children and for second shots for all of them would be available by the original target date, June 1, it depends on the speed with which the government certified the product as to safety, purity and potency.

No Black Market

It was disclosed that to date only an infinitesimal amount of the vaccine had gone into commercial channels—not enough, drug firm officials said, to form the basis for any profitable "black market."

Most of the drug firms said they would not supply vaccine to commercial channels—except they had completed their commitments to the National Foundation to supply two shots each—for the nine-million children. These include all children in the first and second grades, all children who participated in the 1946-47 trial of the vaccine, and the 440,000 children who actually received the vaccine in 1954. The last group will receive booster doses only.

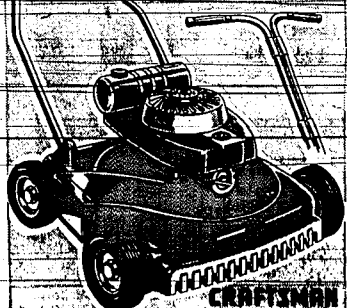

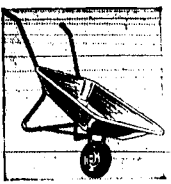

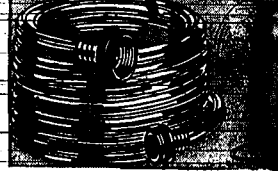

Time Altering Brings Annual Confused Day

By United Press
About half the nation's population will lose an hour and farmers, travelers, and timetable authors will have their annual day of confusion and frustration next Sunday.

That's when daylight saving time replaces standard time for an estimated 60,779,800 Americans in most of the nation's major cities and throughout at least nine states.

The big switch will come at 2 a. m. local time. Or, to be more exact, 2 a. m. will never arrive. Instead, official clocks will be turned to three o'clock in the morning.

The change-over generally results in suburbanites missing their trains, employers turning up late for work, and farmers grumbling because their cow-milking schedules are out of step with the clock.

Next year, however, may bring even more confusion. Many eastern states have decided, or are on the point of deciding, to extend DST an extra month until the last Sunday in October.

This will put them out of step with the rest of the nation, where DST, traditionally ends the last Sunday of September.

Not All Uniform
Across the nation, nine states will switch officially to daylight time and the change will be made on an optional basis in 15 others. In the remaining 24 states, some will be standard through and through and some will allow pockets of daylight time.

The Elgin National Watch company estimated that 43 per cent of the nation's population will be under daylight time this year, as compared to 41 per cent in 1954.

A company official figured that DST would allow three and a half more hours of sunlight after working hours on May 15, three hours and 15 minutes on July 15, and a little more than two hours on Sept. 15.

Opponents Jump On Budget Issue
LONDON, April 20 (AP)—The labor party pounced today on Britain's new budget to support its election charge, the conservatives failed to stem the rising cost of living.

Laborite leaders met to approve the party's 1955 election platform, already well known through past declarations of policy.

The conservatives will determine whether the conservative or the laborites will govern Britain for the next five years, are scheduled for May 26.

Murrow said Salk "does not solicit funds, but if the spirit moves you, communications and contributions can be sent to the 'Jonas Salk Fund,' care of the University of Pittsburgh, Pittsburgh, Pa."

Smother-key starting is standard on all V-8, forward control, and COE models.

Smother acceleration is provided by a new Power-Plant no-clutch automatic transmission offered on 1/2, 3/4 and 1-ton trucks as well as forward control models.

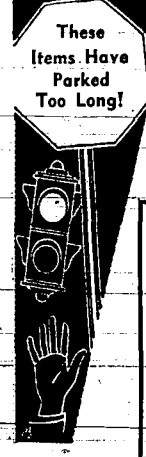

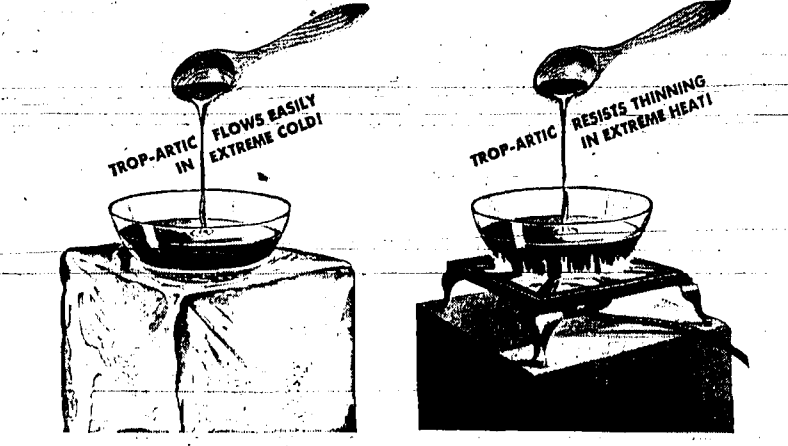

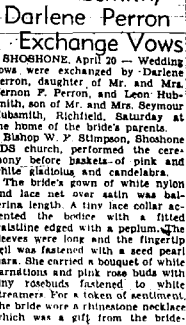

Parking Jams May Be Aided By New Mean

JACKSON, Miss., April 20 (AP)—An imaginative engineer is out to cure the nation's parking headache by shifting cars off crowded streets and hanging them in the air.

The trick is a ferris wheel parking tower, a compact, easily assembled contrivance which began rolling off an assembly line in an Ohio manufacturing plant this week.

The inventor is P. J. Scott, who was a prosperous Mississippi pipeline and oil field contractor before his own car steered him into the parking business.

News up Markets

"I got tired of driving for blocks looking for a place to park every time I went into a city," he said on a brief visit home. He spends most of his time away these days, lining up markets for his "Scott-Block" parking towers, which have been three years in development.

The tower is 74-foot-high steel frame enclosing 14 rotating auto platforms. It works on the principle of a carnival ferris wheel—loading and unloading one platform at a time. It occupies the ground area usually needed to park two cars but it will hold 14.

An electric motor supplies power. The tower can be assembled in four days, Scott said, and it will sell for about \$1,250 per car space as compared with \$4,000 per stall in parking buildings.

Tells of Savings
"There are other savings, too," the inventor said, "you only need three men to operate towers that will park 300 cars."

Scott put a 10-tower experimental tower together here, working virtually with his own hands. He has worked out the bugs and now the production is being produced by a fabricating firm at Fremont, O.

"There are a lot of answers to the parking problem being offered today," said Scott, "but most of them are impractical or too expensive. I think I have the answer."

White House News Curtailment Order Challenged by U.S. Newspaper Editors

WASHINGTON, April 20 (AP)—A group of newspaper editors today challenged recent White House and Pentagon orders restricting release of government information on security grounds.

The challenge was made in a resolution by the American Society of Newspaper Editors' freedom of information committee to the organization's board of directors.

Committee Chairman J. Russell Wiggins, managing editor of the Washington Post and Times-Herald, referred particularly to a directive by Defense Secretary Charles Wilson which has slowed news from the Pentagon and to a statement by White House press secretary James C. Hagerty on behalf of President Eisenhower.

The Wilson directive put a tight rein on release of all military information. Hagerty said a few days later that Mr. Eisenhower feels there is a "strong feeling" which has been three years in development.

The Wiggins committee said one of the most disquieting developments in the field of information freedom has been the recent obligation of the firm between classified material not available to the public and unclassified, technical material never classified at all or officially declassified.

"Unless this attitude is clarified, it is bound to have a profound and paralyzing effect upon the flow of information to the American public," the committee said.

The committee pictured what might happen if such a tendency was carried to extremes.

"If the flow of information on technical material and in other areas is to be diminished to that which involves no risk whatever," the report said, "the volume will be—initially small—the American people will not have the foundation of truth upon which to judge their government."

"If the flow is sufficiently restricted to quiet the fears of those who would ban maps and pictures of civilian installations, citizens will have hardly enough information with which to conduct their private lives, let alone enough to discharge their public duties."

The report cited the complaint of Gen. Robert Cutler, recently resigned White House director on national security matters, that snags of all harbors can be obtained from the coast-and-geodesic survey.

Senator Republican leader William P. Knowland accused Ben H. Hubert, H. Humphrey of giving newsmen a "distorted and unfair interpretation" of Dulles' testimony behind closed doors before the senate foreign relations committee yesterday.

What angered the Republicans most was Humphrey's statement to reporters that Dulles thought some of the Yalta agreements have been of value to the United States and that the GOP does not plan to repudiate the agreements as promised in the party's 1952 campaign platform.

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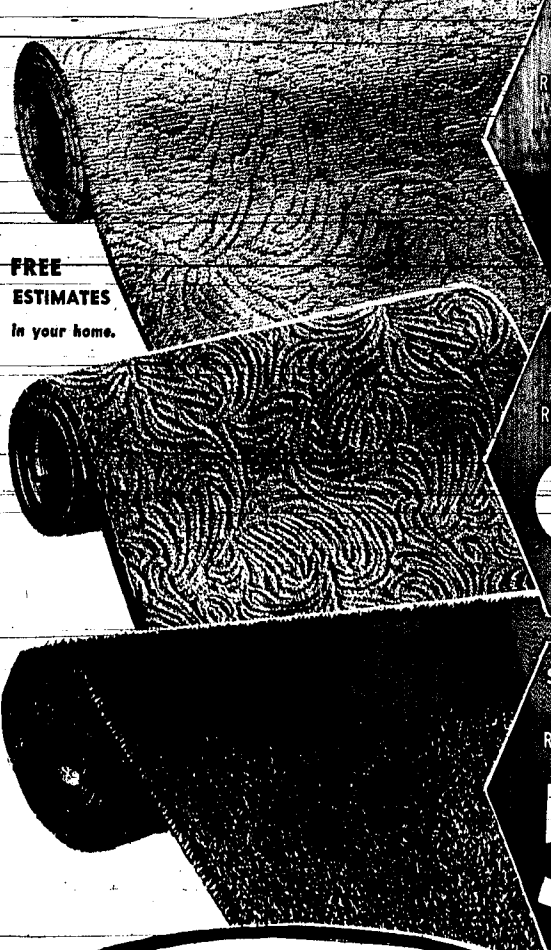
