Committees Await Her's Action on Foreign Aid Bills

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—House and senate committees are awaiting President Eisenhower's big new foreign aid program, each hoping the other would move first.

The proposed \$3,500,000,000 aid program is the result of a compromise between the two bodies. The program provides for a "free Asia" was generally applauded.

The program also includes a role for the United States and other nations in the Far East.

The program is expected to be passed in the next few weeks.

Hells Canyon Hearings Set By Committee

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—A subcommittee today scheduled hearings here May 2 on a bill to authorize a federal Hells Canyon dam.

The reclamation committee of the interior department will hear technical and other testimony on a bill sponsored by 30 senators to authorize a half-billion-dollar federal project in the Snake river basin in Idaho and Oregon.

The bill provides for a federal power commission license to build three smaller power dams in the area.

The interior committee held hearings in the Pacific northwest early this month to sample public opinion on whether Hells canyon should be dammed by the government or by private industry.

The 30 senators sponsoring the bill include Sen. Frank Church, Idaho, and Sen. Frank Lautenberg, New Jersey.

Security Meet Discusses Big Asiatic Issues

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—President Eisenhower met with the national security council today to discuss the big Asiatic issues.

The meeting was held in the White House and was attended by the president, the secretary of state, and other top officials.

The meeting discussed the situation in the Far East, particularly in China and Korea.

The president expressed his confidence in the ability of the United States to handle the situation.

U.N. Committee Gives Pledge

NEW YORK, April 21 (AP)—The United Nations Security Council today gave a pledge to the United States.

The council, in a resolution, expressed its support for the United States position in the Far East.

The resolution was adopted by a vote of 9 to 0.

The United States is pleased with the council's action.

President Chiang's visit to Matsuo is part of a tour of the Pacific northwest. He is expected to visit other military installations in the region.

National Guard Moves Quickly for Test Alert

The exercise was termed a "test" because it was the first time since the end of World War II that the national guard has been called into action for a test alert.

The exercise was held to test the readiness of the national guard in the event of a national emergency.

The dynamite blasts hit the phone plants in Atlanta, Georgia, and other cities in the Dixie Eight.

The strike is being led by the Communications Workers of America (CWA).

Ceylon Offers Plan On Formosa, Bitter Anti-Soviet Attacks

BANDUNG, April 21 (AP)—Ceylon today linked a proposal for Formosa with the strongest attack against communism yet before the 29-nation Afro-Asian conference. The attack sent Red China's scowling Chou En-lai striding angrily from the conference chamber.

Chou wrangled face to face with Ceylonese Premier Sir John Kotelawala at the end of the political committee session. Chou also demanded the right to reply to Kotelawala's charges tomorrow.

The Ceylonese prime minister's attack on the Chinese Communists was his account of the "war" and he caught all the delegates by surprise with his proposal for a Formosa trusteeship which also would include withdrawal of the U.S. seventh fleet from Formosa waters.

Matsu and Quemoy islands would be given to the Reds. The trusteeship, under the United Nations Charter, would be held by Ceylon, India, Pakistan, Burma and Indonesia—would abolish the Nationalist Chinese government of Formosa.

The trusteeship would remain in effect until Formosa could become independent after some kind of plebiscite.

Kotelawala's proposal first was received by the United Nations Security Council today. He said that he had heard of the trusteeship plan in the four-day-old conference.

He noted that Red China's intention to take Formosa "is by no means negligible" and demanded that it publicly proclaim the dissolution of the communist government in Formosa and the withdrawal of the U.S. seventh fleet from the area.

He also demanded that the United States should not provide military aid to Formosa.

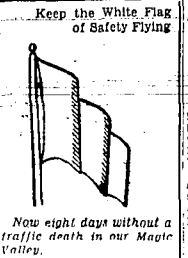

Practical Nurses "Learn by Doing"

Hospital Sets Next Class of Practical Nurses Here for Sometime in October

The fall class of students in practical nursing will begin training at Magic Valley Memorial hospital some time in October, states Dorothy Aldrich, director of nursing service. Miss Aldrich points out that practical nursing offers men and women many opportunities. She says it is a field of service which is rewarding personally because the practical nurse can do so much for the sick, working hand in hand with the doctor and the registered nurse. Many advantages are to be enjoyed including financial security with an assured income and the opportunity to work in many areas, she says. As a student the individual earns a living wage while learning and upon graduation is eligible to take examinations to become licensed. Graduation from an approved hospital school is required for licensing in Idaho. The school at the local hospital is approved by the state for training and is part of the vocational education program in the state and Twin Falls. Licensed practical nurses always are in demand for work in doctors' offices, hospitals, nursing and convalescent homes and on private duty. Miss Aldrich states she also notes that practical nurse training is valuable in caring for a family and that several of the students in the present class are married and have families. The course at the local hospital requires one year of classroom instruction and practical experience under supervision. Classroom work includes 500 hours in subjects such as hygiene, biology, anatomy and physiology, community health and sanitation, nutrition and food, nursing care of various types of patients and first aid. Supervised experience in hospital departments includes care of surgical, medical and pediatric patients, work in the diet kitchen, central sterilizing room, emergency room, obstetrical department and newborn nurseries. Each student is given two weeks of vacation at the end of the course. Applicants may be either men or women and must be at least 18 years of age if under 25 years old. Students must have had at least two years of high school. If more than 25 years they must have had an eighth grade education or the equivalent. All who are accepted will be paid for their hours on duty and this provides enough for living expenses. Initial cost to the student is about \$25 which covers the cost of uniform, books, examinations, scissors, etc. Housing is available in the nursing home for women students who request it. The next course will start in October and applications are being accepted now. About 15 students are to be selected. All interested persons can telephone or write to Miss Aldrich of the hospital. She will arrange for a personal interview and supply the necessary application forms.

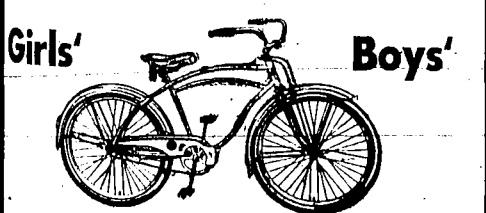

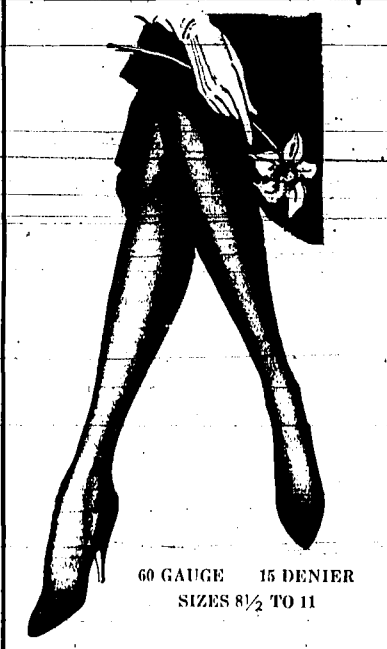

Surprise Test For Guard Is Fast, Smooth

 Hundreds of thousands of "week-end" soldiers and airmen today ended the nation's first practice test of its national guard "militiaman" strength. The surprise "Operation Minuteman" involving an estimated 400,000 men in all the 48 states and Alaska, was apparently a complete success.

National guard officials who directed the giant exercise from headquarters in Washington said it showed that the nation's citizen soldiers are ready to fight back against a sneak attack at practically a moment's notice.

"Operation Minuteman" began at 6:30 EST last night and lasted into the early hours of this morning. A spot check showed that about 86.7 per cent of the nation's national guard forces mobilized on the double and rushed to battle points where they had been rehearsing for weeks.

Within 10 minutes after the alert sounded an air national guard plane was in the air. Within 20 minutes to an hour, hundreds of jets and bombers were streaking across the skies.

On the ground, national guardsmen raced to their armories and hurried into uniforms. Within an hour they were patrolling key defense points, many of them armed with loaded rifles.

State adjutant generals had known the alert was coming, but national headquarters deliberately kept the date and time a secret for as long as possible.

No serious accidents were reported.

Housewives will find plenty of variety in the special buys offered in the meat departments of the nation's food stores this week-end.

Prime ribs of beef will be a feature in many markets. Another favorite will be pot roast. Round steaks or roast also will be on sale in some areas.

Pork loins and pork chops will be the advertised specials of a good number of stores. Here and there, lower prices will be available on pork butts and smoked pleaters.

Frying chickens generally will be cheaper than a week ago. One chain is dropping prices two cents a pound in New York, Chicago and Philadelphia.

Veal About Same
Veal chops will show little price change from last week-end. A few markets will have veal shoulder on their list of specials.

Eggs will rise in price in some areas while butter will be down two or three cents a pound in sections of the west and midwest.

The U. S. department of agriculture notes that onions are a good buy. It offers this advice to housewives:

"Flavor and quality of onions are not affected by size or color. Avoid onions with wet necks. The Bermuda and Spanish types are milder than the very hard, long-keeping onions."

Onions Good Buy
Onions are only one of many vegetables on the good-buy list this week-end. And you should thank warmer weather in growing areas for that.

Produce specialists describe escarole, endive, new-crop cabbage, spinach and summer squash as particularly good buys.

They also recommend beets, pascal and golden heart celery, potatoes, medium and small peppers, cucumbers, carrots, asparagus and broccoli.

Cucumbers have come down sharply in price in recent weeks.

Corn supplies are rather light. Once again, it's hard to find good beans.

Strawberries are higher in eastern markets but California is beginning to ship them and produce buyers expect a "considerable" decline in price.

Better buys in fruit continue to be oranges, grapefruit and apples.

Atom Shelter Built for New Safety Ideas

LOS ANGELES, April 21 (AP)—An atomic shelter is being built on the suburban estate of a Los Angeles industrialist. Everyone hopes it will never be put to a test. But the men who designed it believe they have come up with the best idea yet for survival under atomic attack.

The shelter, involving a cylindrical iron "shell" buried in the ground is the brainchild of Paul Lazlo, a noted industrial designer, and James Clark and Max Robert Crawford, two aerodynamics experts.

Believe in Oufit
They believe the shelter would offer complete protection to its occupants as close as one mile to the "ground zero" of an atomic bomb explosion. Ordinary buildings this close to ground zero would be demolished.

The Los Angeles city planning commission earlier this month gave its approval to the shelter. The first one is being built on the spacious grounds behind the home of industrialist John D. Heria in suburban Woodland Hills.

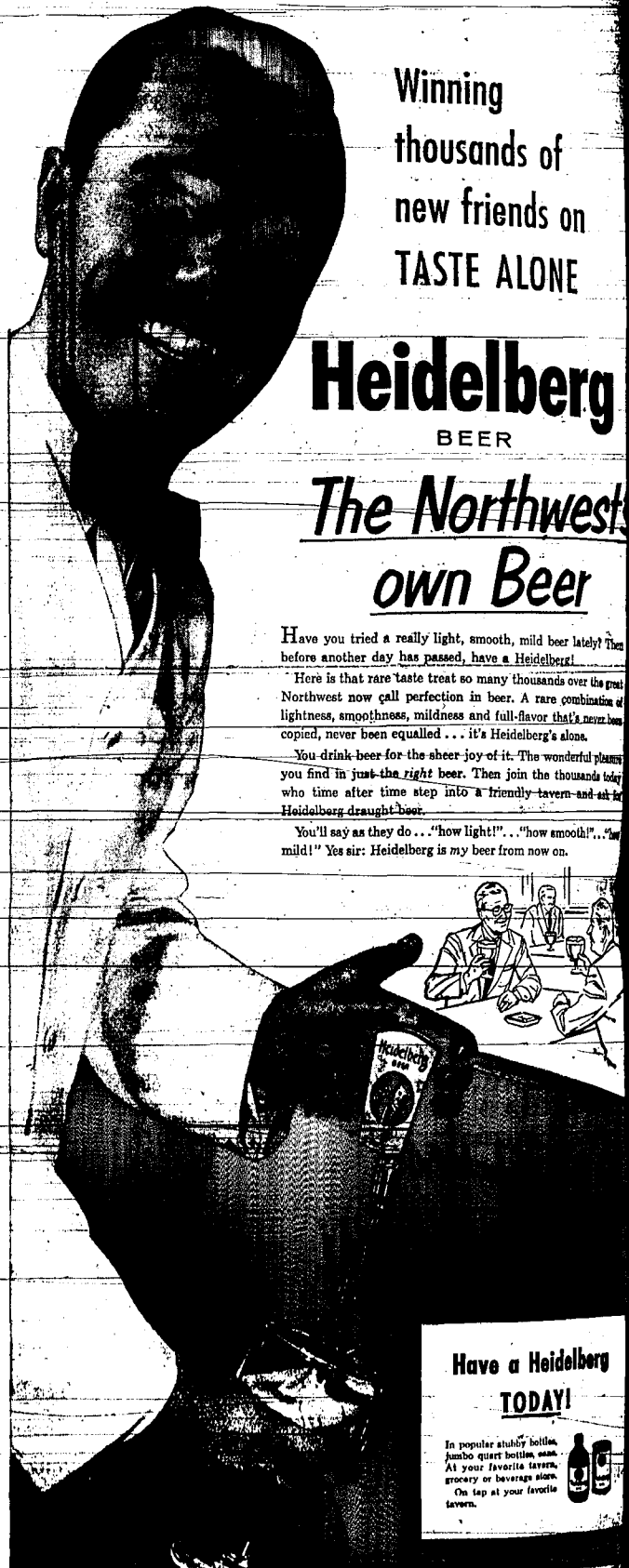
The shelter itself consists of a corrugated iron tube 10 feet in diameter and 30 feet long. It will be sunk in the ground and covered with about six feet of earth. It will have three rooms and a capacity of about 14 people.

Filters Used
Air ducts will be clean radioactive particles out of the air that is sucked into the shelter. The equipment also includes oxygen tanks, an electric generator, an emergency water supply, a set of tools and a geliger counter and radio.

But the most significant feature of the shelter, as Lazlo describes it, is the entrance: A concrete mound with a carefully worked out aerodynamic shape surrounds the entrance well. This mound is designed to create a low pressure area around the entrance no matter how powerful a blast of air is pushed over it.

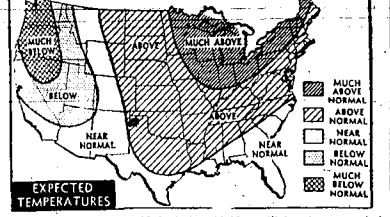

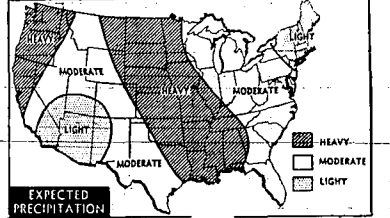

Indian Sales Law Opposed By Statement

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The interior department has announced it opposes a bill introduced by Senator Malone, R. Nev., to force sale of all Indian tribal lands and liquidate the Indian bureau in three years.

Indian Commissioner Glenn L. Emmons expressed particular opposition to the proposal for mass liquidation of tribal land holdings now in federal trusteeship. He said in a statement:

"In some cases such as among the Pueblo of New Mexico, this proposed legislation would sweep away the tribal ownership of lands which the Indian people have occupied and used productively for centuries. Many other similar examples could be cited."

An Indian bureau spokesman said the best estimate is that there are about 400,000 Indians with whom the government has special relations of some kind. He noted that many of these do not live on reservations.

In place of the wholesale liquidation proposed in the Malone bill, the department recommended continuation of the Eisenhower administration's policy of "terminating federal control on a selective basis. It said this policy provides for full consultation with the Indians, constructive action to alleviate their outstanding health, education and economic problems, and a gradual readjustment of their special relations with the federal government."

Newspaper's Duties and Work Eyed by Former Educator; Probe Is Requested

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—Dr. Robert M. Hutchins told newspaper editors today a special agency should be set up to check and report on whether the press is doing the right kind of job.

Hutchins, former president of the University of Chicago and now head of the fund for the republic, was featured speaker at the opening session of the annual meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

Recalling his part in a 1947 report by a commission on freedom of the press which recommended a new agency to appraise and report annually on the performance of the press, Hutchins said the editors should reconsider their opposition and take up the idea.

"Such an agency should contain representatives of the press, it should contain laymen," Hutchins said.

Hutchins said the newspapers have a unique place in the enlightenment of people about current events. But with criticisms of "monopoly towns" and publisher control, he questioned whether newspapers are fulfilling their obligations to their readers.

He said most newspapers have taken "the official line" that the most important fact of present-day life is the international conspiracy of communism while watching, at the same time "the erosion of freedom without a being."

"When the official line permitted," he said, "you have spilled forth, as when you gallantly led the troops from the rear in a belated attack on Senator McCarty."

"You have filled the air with warnings of the sinister figures on the left, but you have printed almost nothing about the fat cats on the right."

Running down a list which included a post-office ban on importing Russian newspapers and the recent state department firing of Edward G. Cona as an immigration specialist, Hutchins said:

"The most distressing part of it is that the press has been so busy playing tourists and celebrities wearing a 10-pound black jacket embroidered with 1953, being a little bit boogie-woogie, classic and hill billy tunes, first at a gold piano and then at a black moped with a 4100-transparent plastic top."

Auto Builders

Are Hurrying In Production

DETROIT, April 21 (AP)—The auto dealers here have projected the projection of approximately 2,200,000 cars in the April-June quarter.

The significance of the schedules is that if the factories turn out that volume in the second quarter the auto makers will top four million for the first time in history.

Old Record Told

The greatest number of cars ever built in six months so far was 3,258,010 units assembled in the first half of 1953.

The car makers are setting new records with almost monotonous frequency. All daily, weekly and monthly marks almost have been upset so far this year. And more high marks are probable under the scheduling for the second quarter.

Close to Capacity

Rolling along at a rate of well over 8½ million cars a year the plants are operating at close to capacity levels. The volume is being achieved through nine-hour shifts and Saturday production.

The overtime, obviously, adds to production costs. But no manufacturer wants to level off assembly lines at this time. The race for position among the various makers is too close right now.

Nearly All the Car Makers Are Paired Off in the Competitive Battle

The major fight of assembly lines is between Chevrolet and Ford. Aside from this, however, Buick and Plymouth are battling for third place. Oldsmobile and Packard fifth and Mercury and Dodge for seventh.

American Tourist Horde Will Descend This Year on Europe

The greatest horde of overseas tourists in history—more than half a million Americans—will swarm over western Europe from now until October.

They are charter members of a revolution in vacationing.

It is an uprising which is taking tens of thousands—every summer from the James U. S. highways and sending them by plane and ship across the Atlantic.

They will spend as little as \$380 or as much as \$2,290 just to get there and back.

They will find that Italy has supplanted France as the American tourist's favorite country.

They will discover that in Madrid one does not have dinner until 10 p. m. They will bristle at a 12½ percent "service" levy that still does not take the place of a tip.

They will find cafes slowly surrendering on serving "tourists": hotelkeepers still ranting motorists with will room. Half a billion dollars they will spend altogether for fares, lodging, food, wines, guides, entertainment and purchases.

They will find Capri crowded. Glendale, B. Dennis, a million in Italy. The Oxford university only a few blocks from a miniature Detroit. The same 400-day clocks for sale in Munich as in Chicago.

Some will go by guided tour and wish they weren't being herded. Others will strike out on their own and wind up buying "antiques" as they should and seeing less.

They will discover that snob appeal, keeping not only up with but ahead of the Joneses, is one of the main motivations for foreign travel and a big reason why Americans notoriously jangle from country to country.

Yet the great majority will come back tremendously pleased with having spent—been—operating—in Europe. They will consider their money well used and look forward to going again.

Their numbers go up every year. In 1953 some 576,000 Americans vacationed in Europe. Last year it was around 460,000. This year a total is estimated at around 600,000.

Why are Americans in such growing numbers going abroad?—There are many answers but the biggest one unquestionably is the airplane. It has made it possible for Americans with only two or three weeks vacation to span the ocean swiftly enough to see something of the old world.

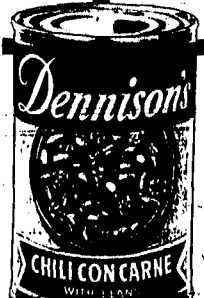

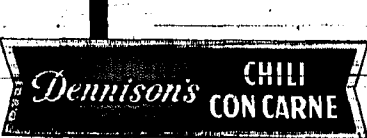

WASHINGTON, April 21 (AP)—The United States got in on an act where it wasn't supposed to be playing. It used propaganda on Red China when the Red Chinese were supposed to be making some of their best propaganda.

Secretary of State Dulles suddenly warned about a Chinese air power buildup opposite Formosa just as the Chinese were anxious to appear as peace lovers to the 20 other Asia-African nations meeting with them at Bandung, Indonesia.

And President Eisenhower asked congress yesterday for \$1,500,000,000 in foreign aid, most of it for Asia, just when the Red Chinese were most eager to win over to their side the other Afro-Asians, or at a critical hour, to voice the peaceful aspirations of the peoples of the world and exert a practical influence for peace.

Dulles later minimized a bit the danger of war over Formosa now. But the statement by him and Eisenhower didn't make it easier for the Chinese at Bandung to look too persuasively upon the propaganda. There are colored and impoverished. All have reason to be concerned about an outbreak of war over Formosa.

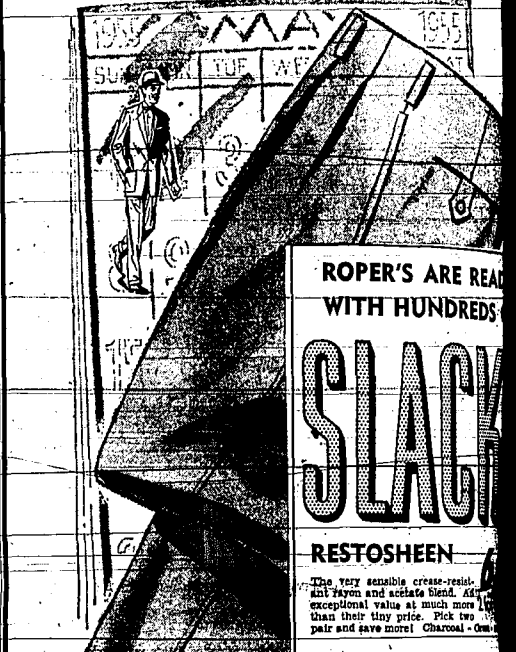

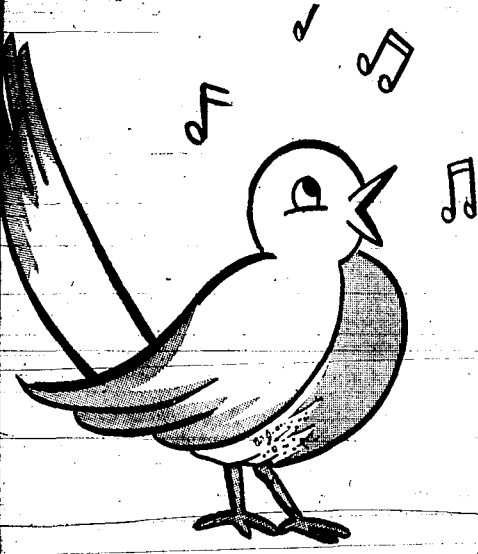

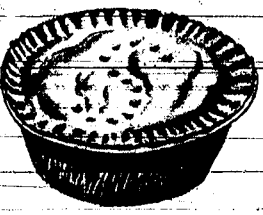

Atlee Begins Politic Drive Against Eden

LONDON, April 21 (AP)—Labor party leader Clement R. Atlee, who once defeated Winston Churchill, flew back from Canada today and took immediate command of the opposition campaign to oust Prime Minister Anthony Eden's Conservative government in the May 26 general elections.

Atlee sped to a Labor party national executive conference immediately after his plane touched down on an 8,000-mile dash back to Britain to hammer into line the divided Socialist party's wavering ranks.

Atlee, who bested Churchill in the 1945 elections, and the Labor party high command drafted strategy at party headquarters, Transport House, for the campaign against Churchill's "Blitz" Eden.

Eden, who succeeded Churchill as prime minister only three weeks ago, today took over another of the elder statesman's posts. He was formally confirmed as party chief at a closed-door caucus of conservative leaders at Church House, Westminster.

In the "common" fight against the Tories, Labor ranks which had been split sharply by the clash between the moderate Atlee and the late-America bloc led by Aneurin Bevan closed behind Atlee.

Bevan was expelled from the Labor party in parliament for his defiance of Atlee's leadership. But so great is the fiery Welshman's popularity with rank-and-file, socialist Christians clapped their hands in approval for his expelling him outright from the party.

To Stump Country Atlee said he would stump the country during the campaign and said he thought "the Labor party had a good chance of ousting Eden. "It is going to be a good fight," he said. "We have a good chance of winning—we are always confident."

Eden kicked off the election drive last night with publication of a statement to conservative party workers that "if we show the enthusiasm which brought us from defeat in 1945 to victory in 1951, we shall win."
