2 Strikes Still Stop Tradings

ATLANTA, April 25 (U.P.)—Two rail and communication workers strikes have been stopping tradings for 43 days and there was no hope today of settlements.

The entire Louisville and Nashville railroad system lying the middle of the southeast and touching 13 states has been brought to a virtual standstill by a bitter dispute over union-salaried benefits.

A simultaneous strike against the Southern Bell Telephone Company in nine states involves 50,000 members of the CIO Communications Workers of America.

While Southern Bell has maintained nearly normal service, because of dial exchanges in most cities, the rail lines have checked commerce over wide areas, spreading the strike's effects to other lines.

U.S. Atomic Ship To Cruise World, Show Atomic Use

NEW YORK, April 25 (U.P.)—President Eisenhower today announced plans for United States construction of an atomic powered merchant ship which will demonstrate peacetime use of atomic energy. The new ship, which will not require refueling "for scores of thousands of miles," will carry a countless foreign ports the exhibits of "practical application of the new atomic science and medicine, agriculture and power production."

The President made his disclosure in a speech prepared for delivery before the Associated Press lunch held a day before the opening of the annual convention of the American Newspaper Publishers' association at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel.

Mr. Eisenhower's accent was on the need for freer two-way trade among nations and particularly congressional passage of the reciprocal trade program. He called reciprocal trade "a broad avenue by which all men and nations of goodwill can travel. Peace is a golden age of peace and plenty."

The dramatic highlight of his prepared address, however, was his announcement of the atom-powered merchant vessel as another part of the American program of peaceful use of atomic energy.

He said specifications for the vessel were being developed by the Atomic Energy Commission and the Federal Maritime Administration. The chief executive will ask congress for special construction funds in the near future, accompanying his request with a draft of the bill.

The new ship, powered with an atomic reactor, will not require refueling for a year. The President said the vessel would be built at the shipyard of the General Motors Corp. in Detroit.

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When he was 6 years old he moved from Canada to Allingdale, Wis. He was in Illinois, Miss. when he ran away from home "to be a catfishman." In two years he had the cattle and later he had a ranch on Montana. After 44 days he arrived in the Boise river country.

Socialists Fail in Ruling Majority

HANOVER, Germany, April 25 (AP)—The coalition led by the anti-Communist Socialists lost its ruling majority in the second round of the lower Saxony state legislative, final official returns showed today.
 Both the Socialists, who remained the strongest single party, and the Christian Democrats of Chancellor Konrad Adenauer increased their strength at the expense of the extreme right and left and small splinter groups. But the votes failed to show any clear-cut sentiment and neither major party won enough seats with its traditional political allies to form a new state government.
 The "inclusive" election left many in doubt of the state with the big weak neo-Nazi German Reich party, the communists possible roles in deciding the balance of power.

Reds in Austria Note Big Defeat

VIENNA, Austria, April 25 (AP)—Austria's weak Communist party suffered a crippling new defeat in municipal elections held yesterday in Soviet-occupied lower Austria province, final official returns showed today.
 Chancellor Julius Raab's Conservative People's party emerged as the clear winner of the elections followed by the Austrian Socialist party. Both major parties gained votes at the expense of the reds and the extreme right wing "League of Independence."
 The reds, running under the name of the People's Opposition, dropped to four per cent of the popular vote compared with 6.2 per cent in the last similar elections held in 1950. They lost 1,853 votes and two municipal councilors.

Home Rule in Tunisia May Have Effects

 The situation in troubled French North Africa has taken a new turn with Premier Edgar Faure's agreement to give home rule to the province of Tunisia.
 The agreement is a personal triumph for the diligent Faure, 54, who is expected to leave office in June when it appeared that all hopes of agreement had gone.
 The question is whether Faure can "sell" the agreement to his own countrymen.
 If he succeeds, the Tunisian agreement may well become a pattern for an agreement with the nationalists in turbulent Morocco.
 But if he fails, Faure may be forced out of office and France may be looking for its 72nd post-war encounter.
 Tunisian reaction to the home rule agreement has been enthusiastic.

 But it is already assumed that Faure will face the bitter opposition of the French colonial population in Tunisia and of those members of the French parliament who oppose the weakening of French rule.
 It should be remembered that Pierre Mendes France, Faure's predecessor, started the Tunisian negotiations—and that the French national assembly threw him out of office in Feb. 5 because it regarded his Tunisia policy as too soft.
 In any event, the next few weeks will tell. The Tunisian agreement is to be put in final shape, and signed formally, by May 30. Then it will be up to the national assembly to ratify it.

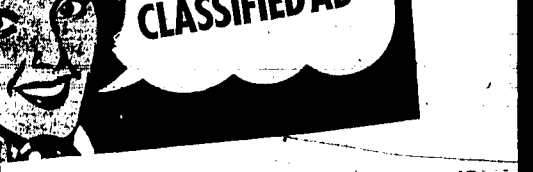

When my April copy of "Driftwood Carving for Profit" didn't arrive on time I hurried to the library to get their copy. I was told they had their copy "read" to him. Sure enough, another driftwood fan had beaten me to it, but as it turned out I am glad he did.

Otherwise I would never have known the importance of the book. I made the acquaintance—of "Home Made Zoo" a volume I took from the shelves while the man was taking notes from the driftwood magazine on how to carve a stepladder. Once I fell under the spell of "Home-Made Zoo," I lost track of time and the fellow could have copied instructions for carving a funicular railway for all I cared.

I opened the book at random and the first sentence to hit my eyes captivated me. "There is something especially charming about a mouse." For the next three hours I was lost in the charming revelations of how easy and gratifying it is for a householder to keep mice, frog, guinea pigs, turtles, snakes and salamanders.

By the time the library closed, and I was ushered out by the attendant, I was convinced that what Edgar Guest really meant to say was: "It takes a heap of living creatures to make a home."

I am all hopped up about having a home-made zoo and if mice are to the home-made zoo what, say, lions are to public zoos, then I'm just plain lucky because our house doesn't have to take off its hat to any house when it comes to mice.

The book stresses the importance of the house owner's getting to know his mice. "Feeding time is get-acquainted time and one of the most enjoyable activities for the pet owner," the book says. "I have been slack in this respect, so it is wonderful that some of our mice are a trifle bashful and won't come any closer to sitting on my lap than to scamper half-way up my trouser leg."

But in fairness to myself, I must say that our mice don't look underfed. Most of them have bay windows that would do credit to a gold watch chain.

"Mice are easily trained because they are lively and active and are always glad to have something to do. Rewarding them with a tasty bit of food every time they do something correctly will make them learn quickly. Peanut butter is a good bait." That's a quote, and I believe it because our mice, which have never had the benefit of training, do a lot of things well, being especially good at games.

I know they play football in the attic at night, because only good, bontangling tackles and blocks could

make the noise we hear over our heads. It could be worse, but I think it's good. They do a "form" of skiing, too, to judge by the sound, and every now and then they cause a racket that could result from only one sport—putting the shot.

This, mind you, without ever having had so much as one nibble of peanut butter, unless they have learned how to open the refrigerator door.

I just have to get some frogs. I knew the minute I read under the heading Fun With Frogs: "Playing with a frog is not only good sport, but it means freedom and exercise for the pet."

Just what games to play with a frog are not listed. I never have seen frogs playing polo, but there is no reason why they shouldn't like it, particularly on a court with water hazards. I can't imagine howling with a frog being much fun, but what about fishing? A bullfrog might well know some deep holes filled with big ones.

"When a salamander gets to know you it will follow you around wherever you go." That's another quote, and just about decided me against any salamanders in my zoo. True, salamanders are bright enough, faithful to a fault and, as a rule, good conversationalists. But there are times in a man's life when he feels the need to get away from everybody to be all alone. And that's what I need.

Critical of Plans

The other group, "The Elbe National Veterans Committee," sharply criticized Russian plans for a reunion. It said the Russian veterans, who were present when forces of the two wartime allies met at the Elbe.

This group planned a ceremony just off the senate chamber today with Vice President Richard M. Nixon, senate Democratic leader Lyndon B. Johnson, and other senators scheduled to attend.

"One day," he predicts, "I will try the German in this manner also to teach."

Drought Area Inspection Set By Committee

WASHINGTON, April 25 (AP)—Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson leaves today for a three-day tour of the drought and dust storm damage area of the southern great plains.

Benson will get a first-hand look at the damage wrought by crop-choking and soil-destroying dust storms in Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas and New Mexico. In these states and in Nebraska and Wyoming, March dust storms caused severe damage to more than five million acres of land. Since last November, more than 10 million acres are so sparsely vegetated that they would lose valuable top soil to any strong wind.

Plan Efforts

Benson and members of agriculture department agencies will inspect the damaged areas with a view to reshaping government efforts in treating problems brought on by drought in the southern great plains region.

They will cover a wide territory. After spending the night at Denver, the party will drive by bus and automobile across eastern Colorado, one of the most severely damaged sections. They will make brief stops at Limon, Kit-Carson, Lamar, and Springfield, Colo., and at Johnson, Olayas, and Liberal in western Kansas. They will confer with affected farmers from the general area during a lunch meeting at Lamar.

End Thursday

On Wednesday, the party will travel to Guymon, in Oklahoma's panhandle; Sistrar and Amarillo, Tex., and Tucuman, N. M. The group will return to Washington Thursday.

Members of Benson's party include K. L. Scott, agricultural credit services; R. B. McLaughlin, Farmers Home administration; G. A. Laird, Federal Crop Insurance corporation; and C. M. Ferguson, extension service. They are expected to report their views to a drought committee of agency heads set up to draft a new program of action against drought and dust.

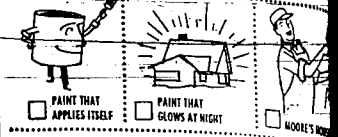
