Threatened Strike May Curtail Salk's Anti-Polio Serum

A labor dispute threatened today to cut off supplies of the Salk anti-polio vaccine. In the south, meanwhile, officials of the strikebound Louisville and Nashville railroad and Southern Bell Telephone company charged that devastating fires and explosions were "deliberately set." In Detroit, leaders of the CIO Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers met with officials of Parke, Davis and company in an attempt to head off a walkout against the vaccine-producing firm. The union, representing 2,000 production workers, has filed a 60-day notice of contract termination, but so far has not set a strike date. Parke, Davis and another firm manufacture 60 per cent of the Salk vaccine now being used to give five inoculations to millions of first and second graders. Company officials said a strike would bring its production to a halt. Both company and union spokesmen promised they were doing their best to settle the dispute and keep the supply of the precious vaccine available to all. The extended southern walkout continued to erupt in spectacular violence and angry charges of sabotage. Both walkouts are well into their second months and have had wide-area effects on the southland's economy. Elsewhere on the nation's labor front: Lake Success, N. Y.—A "consent" industrial union strike against a limiting mass picket lines by 5,000 strikers permitted 5,000 non-striking employees to return to work at the Sperry Gyroscope plant. Indianapolis, Ind.—ATU teamsters went on strike against five of the city's largest department stores, threatening housewives with temporary food shortages. Huntsville, Ala.—2,400 U. S. Air Force workers upheld a scheduled strike against two cotton mills pending action by Gov. Foy Kohler. A strike of 18 AFL cement finishers at the Clifty Creek Atomic Energy Power plant held 2,500 construction workers.

Large Investment for Gas in Region Seen

George W. Carpenter, president and director of the Idaho Natural Gas company, told the city commission Monday night that his company plans to invest \$1,000,000 over a five-year period to install a gas distribution system in Twin Falls by this fall. With investment in the gas appliance business and other indirect investment resulting from the advent of natural gas, Carpenter said the total investment attributable to natural gas in Twin Falls would be about \$3,360,000 in five years. Carpenter continued by saying the company expects to have about 200 customers here at the first year of service and about 4,500 at the end of five years. It is estimated that 255,000 feet of distribution mains will be installed in Twin Falls this year. About 300,000 feet of service line will be required during the first five years of operation to connect the distribution mains to the consumers' buildings. Carpenter said Twin Falls has two potential large users of gas. They are the American Power company and the Idaho Cooperative Creamery. The company president explained that the American Power company is planning to purchase gas from Pacific Northwest Pipeline corporation, which will build a 24-inch transmission line through southern Idaho, generally following highway 30. Each city's gas supply will be contracted for separately. The city commission, in addition to Twin Falls, which the company proposes to serve and the estimated cost of distribution systems over the first five-year period is: Filer, \$85,000; Rupert, \$100,000; Burley, \$200,000; Gooding, \$100,000; Arco, \$100,000; Wendell, \$175,000; Jerome, \$500,000; Bligny, \$175,000; and Glenn Ferry, \$100,000. Pointing out the benefits of natural gas, Carpenter said it is a quick, clean, economical and competitive fuel, and that it is 35 per cent cheaper than oil and competitive with coal for space heating and industrial uses. The commission will take the company's request under advisement and will have a public hearing on the matter at a later date. 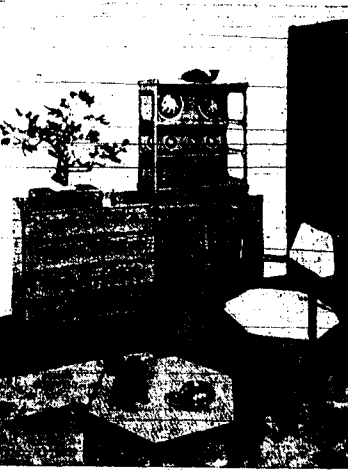

Shaw Project Dies; Home Is Seldom Noted

AVON ST. LAWRENCE, England, April 26 (AP)—At the end of a sleepless night in this little hamlet is the red-brick Victorian mansion from which George Bernard Shaw departed this life nearly five years ago.

This is a story of disappointment. When Shaw died, in November of 1950, they dimmed the lights of Broadway for a few moments because the theater had just a few days left.

Audiences stood up in silence in Australia.

Kings . . . prime ministers . . . presidents . . . paid their respects.

Shaw was compared with Shakespeare.

He had died, finally, at the age of 93, and news of his death had his place in literary history was assured.

Almost immediately a \$700,000 "Shaw memorial campaign" was started. Eminent people all over the world gave their support.

But the money . . . the memorial campaign never got off the ground.

There were to be Shaw scholarships for promising playwrights . . . a repertory theater devoted to Shaw's plays . . . a fund to maintain his home as a museum.

Campaign ends

One year after Shaw died the "campaign" was quietly wound up. The national trust which was going to run the Shaw museum has had to offer the place for rent.

The pilgrimages to the Shaw home which his admirers envisioned have never materialized. A few scholars occasionally stop at the house, but they seem more inclined to wander into the 500-year-old pub for a drink.

Avon is hard to get to, except by car, which is one reason Shaw chose it as a place to live.

Another reason was the local graveyard, where Shaw had noticed an epitaph for an 83-year-old woman: "The stone said she had been cut off before her time."

Any place that considers 83 the prime of life, said Shaw, was the place for him.

Refugee Program Satisfies McLeod

PARIS, April 26 (AP)—Scott McLeod, state department security chief, said yesterday he is satisfied with the present administration in Europe of the refugee program which he heads.

McLeod declined comment on the announcement in Washington by Sen. Herbert Lehman, D. N. Y., that he intends to introduce legislation seeking to oust McLeod as head of the refugee program. McLeod is in Europe on a brief inspection tour.

Throttle Sticks, Panther Crashes

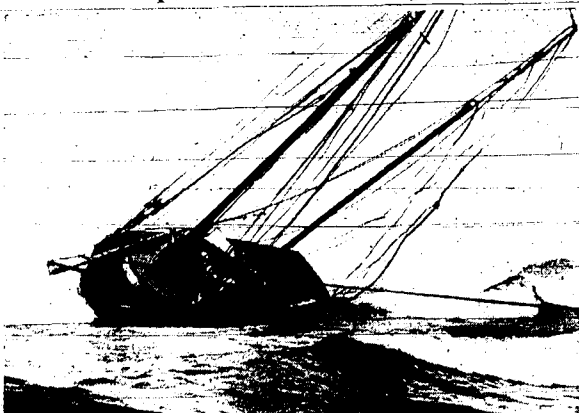

Reds Tighten Berlin Grips; Allies Watch

BERLIN, April 26 (AP)—The communists are tightening their grip on West Berlin in a series of moves like those which led to their blockade of 1948-1949.

West German and allied officials are watching developments closely. But they doubt, as things are now, that the reds will try again to isolate the western part of the city completely.

The new communist crackdown was launched at midnight March 31.

At that time the reds imposed what was called a "pocketbook blockade" of the Americans, British and French sectors of the city.

The "blockade" took the form of exorbitant tolls on the trucks which roll over the 110-mile super-highway linking Berlin to West Germany.

Mindful of Road

West Berliners are ever mindful of that 110 miles of territory, occupied by the Russians, which lies between them and free West Germany, for Berlin is an island in the red zone.

In their crackdown the communists increased truck tolls about 1,100 per cent. A truck which had paid a tax of \$5 to move over the highway was assessed \$55.

The reds' latest harassing move, the increase in highway tolls, naturally was understood by the East German government as a high way maintenance measure. Everybody knew that behind the East Germans were the Russians.

Retaliation Seen

Apparently the reds decided on the move first as a retaliation for the reduction of the treaties to arm West Germany, secondly as a means of forcing east-west negotiations on a neutralized Germany, and

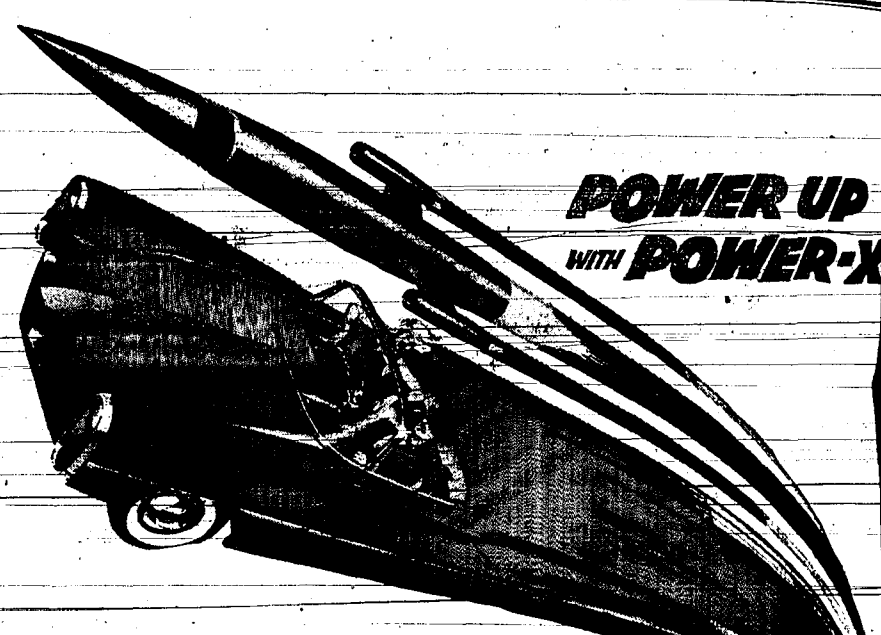
