Newspaper Association Blasts Official For Censorships, Restriction of News

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—The American Newspaper Publishers Association today blasted Secretary of Defense Charles E. Wilson for restricting information. He said the greatest concern of the American press was the ever present urge to censorship and a limiting of news sources.

Richard W. Slocum, ANPA president and executive vice president of the Philadelphia Bulletin, spoke at the publishers' 69th annual meeting at the Waldorf-Astoria hotel here. He said the association maintained "a questioning attitude toward everybody who occupies a place of power."

"We shall hope that our well-intentioned secretary of defense will quickly see the error in his recent check of alleged secret leaks," Slocum said.

"This is not to say we do not trust and respect and even admire public servants," Slocum said. "But experience has shown that the power of government in some people brings resentment of the operation of a free press."

He expressed his approval of the critical eye and voice of our readers, but lashed out at the "complaints of a few disappointed and disgruntled partisans, even an ex-president."

The latter part of his statement obviously referred to former President Truman's remark last week that the nation had "a one-party press" favoring President Eisenhower.

Slocum condemned the leaders of some newspaper unions who, he said, were "putting out" and "hooking the other way" when their members are not living up to their contract work obligations.

"Regarding censorship," Slocum said, "Our problem sometimes lies more with the high principled, loyal and conscientious public servant who just does not realize that full operation of the people's right to know is more important than any single decision."

Then he pointed out the recent clamp on defense department news instituted by Defense Secretary Wilson and said that the ANPA was "constantly vigilant on anything that directly affects newspapers and the performance of their tasks, and the people's right to know."

He said the ANPA would "seek no special privileges for the press but equally will oppose any discriminations."

In his address to the three-day convention, which ends tomorrow, Slocum advocated a program which would turn young persons from "too much television" to "the art of reading" newspapers.

The convention also heard reports from various committees, including those on advertising agencies, newspapers, social security, traffic and postal rates.

Labor Situation Is Termed Good

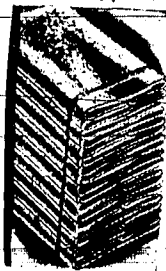

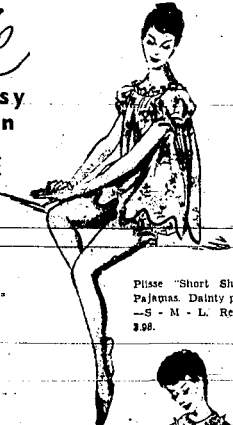

Tourists Can Take Cars to Other Places

By HARMAN W. NICHOLS
 WASHINGTON, April 27 (AP)—If you are planning a vacation out of the country you may wish to well drive. That is, take your car along. Key you are taking a ship from Key West, Fla., to Havana, Cuba, a port city 100 miles east of Havana.

A car and driver can make the trip (float for a total of \$228, plus \$120 for each passenger. And you will have your car handy for sight-seeing.

I speak from a little experience. Last fall, I took my car to Paris with some other newsmen. We wanted to see southern France. We did it by motor.

Take Own Trip
 We wouldn't have seen the countryside, had we not been mobile on rubber tires and our own wheels. We could stop and take pictures of sheep grazing and peacocks picking grapes in the vineyards whenever we wanted.

The American Automobile association has some ideas about people who like to travel abroad.

Take Europe, for example. If you are going for a whirlwind trip and are satisfied with looking at Eiffel tower from the air, that's fine enough.

Rent Cars Available
 But if you and your family expect to remain for a couple of three weeks, you can rent a small French Renault for \$2 a week. You'll get 35 to 40 miles on the gallon of gas and gas is pretty high in France, but if there are only two of you, that adds up to only \$40 each a week for transportation. American cars run a little higher.

If you plan to stay a matter of months, you can take your American car on the steamship for \$450, round-trip.

Most of the hotels in London and Paris have parking facilities for visitors.

But say you plan to be overseas for something like a year or more. You can buy a new or second-hand car of your own from special agencies in Europe, for about what you would pay for them here. A little more, maybe.

May Get Contract
 Many of these agencies will give you the small European cars which you purchase at 25 per cent less than you paid for it if you return it within a year.

That's too bad.

You can buy any kind of a machine you want to. I can tell you that the small European cars sometimes can give you an ache. That is, the ancient ones we traveled around in. But the new ones are never ones—a little more comfortable.

At any rate you can get away from your old European car. If you are behind the wheel yourself, if you can afford it.

Monkeys Hurt By Contacting Human Beings

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—Scientific research could be the same without monkeys but the trouble with monkeys who live with people is that people contaminate them. People never do a monkey any good. And so scientists of the air force decided to get their monkeys fresh out of the wilds. They sent three of their number to India twice, the first time to fetch back 440 monkeys the second time, 500.

Once in the jungles of north India where there was many, many monkeys and very few people, they got an idea of what people do to monkeys.

Free of Fleas
 For one thing, the monkeys were relatively free of excessive parasitism, which is the way a scientist says they didn't have too many fleas. The implication is uncomfortable clear—that monkeys either acquire fleas from people or people introduce the animals to the fleas.

Monkeys around people are very prone to tuberculosis. And sure enough—there was practically no tuberculosis among the wild monkeys. The closer the monkeys lived to Indian villages, the more they had tuberculosis.

The scientists—Benjamin D. Freeman, Richard E. Benson and Rogers J. Young—lived a professional trapper. He guarded his know-how in monkey trapping as he guarded his life. Whether he was afraid the monkeys would get wild to his secrets or thought rival trappers might, he did not make clear. However, the monkeys were not reckoned with when some were transferred to cages, their brothers, sisters, uncles and aunts swarmed down and made every effort to get them free. These would-be liberators were willing to attack men.

Didn't Forget
 These were little rhesus monkeys that, with only five to eight pounds, after trapping in any given area, the trappers had to stay out of that area for months. The monkeys didn't quickly forget.

When he forms the majority, the rhesus monkey harasses the minority; that is, the people. He destroys their crops, for one thing. But the Hindus consider him sacred and try to protect him. The monkeys are Mohammedans who avoid the Hindu villages.

After an assortment of adventures, the scientists flew back to New York to the radiobiological laboratory in Austin. They made their monkey reports to members of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Missing Dads Are Traced to Help Families

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—Boom times are upon us, but a social problem usually associated with hard times is still around and bigger than ever—child abandonment cases are on the increase.

George Lamb, who has made a 38-year career of locating down-run-away fathers, believes he knows why. "When a man takes off today he knows the public welfare bureau will take care of his kids," he said. "We used to have the fellow's conscience working on our side but now I'm not so sure. At least he doesn't have as much cause to worry about his children going hungry."

Works Long Distances
Lamb, 68, chief of the abandonment bureau of the Queens district attorney's office, carries on a far-flung dragnet operation from a cubbyhole office in the Queens county courthouse.

Lamb's long experience has led him to look for a woman in most abandonment cases. Few men run away by themselves, although he has now enforced records which have a particular lure for New York fathers.

When a case is brought to his attention, Lamb usually allows a month or six weeks as a cooling-off period. Many abandon breadwinners show up at home under their own power within that time and are more likely to stay if the wife hasn't brought a lawyer.

Lots of Problems
"There's a lot that doesn't make sense in this business," he said. "Actually it should be easier than ever to locate a missing person. He has a social security number and may be drawing unemployment insurance. He may be on file with the veterans administration or belong to a union."

"Often it's to his own benefit to let these agencies know his whereabouts. But the agencies won't tell."

Lamb would like to see federal and state agencies open their records to law enforcement officials seeking the whereabouts of a citizen. The agencies now are prohibited by law from doing so.

Public Health General Says Time Needed to Block Polio

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—The best expectation of a public health "general" newly armed with powerful weapons against disease, is not to do it in the next year, but only in the next year or two.

The enemy is polio, the weapon is the Salk anti-polio vaccine, and the general is Dr. Morris Greenberg, director of the bureau of preventable diseases of the New York City department of health.

He is a hard examiner in one of the world's largest theaters of man's continuous war upon disease. His responsibility is to prevent all the diseases that preventable among 11,100,000 human beings living in close proximity to one another—and to one another's viruses.

There are three "sub-themes" three types of viruses which cause polio. From the standpoint of the collective health of masses of people, it is not enough to disarm viruses into harmless ones with vaccines. Somehow you've got to reduce the "pool" of circulating viruses to just about the vanishing point before you can be sure of victory.

Dr. Greenberg's immediate objective is to get at least 70 per cent of the 2,215,000 most susceptible New Yorkers those under 20 vaccinated as quickly as possible, by mid-summer if he can. He figured that will drastically reduce the virus's polio cases, which average 700 annually.

There will be no let-up in the vaccinating of course. The 70 per cent will be made to mount toward 100 per cent, and the least susceptible ages will be brought into the program. Well over half the city population will have polio-immunity within a few years.

That's preventing the disease without necessarily reducing the "pool" of circulating viruses. Eliminating this "pool" is something you can do only "in time," Dr. Greenberg said. How long this "time" will be, depends upon what the Salk vaccine does to the "environment" inside the human body.

Near Miss



Indian Leader Loses Stature At Conference

BANDUNG, Indonesia, April 27 (AP)—Prime Minister Nehru starts home from the Asian-African conference today with his position as a leader of the Asians no higher than before the 29 nations met.

There are many who say Nehru, Asia's top neutralist, lost ground in competition with lesser known statesmen for leadership of the peoples represented at Bandung.

Reese Opposite
Nehru came with no claim to speak for anyone except the Indians. But it is apparent from his past statements and activities that he expected to voice the thoughts of most nations here.

Instead he ran into opposition. Whether this is responsible, it's difficult to say, but India's usually fiery leader took a back seat to Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev, foreign affairs adviser to India's prime minister, appeared more active than his chief. During and between sessions, it was Nehru who sat quietly at his delegation seat, reading papers or gazing into space while Khrushchev buttonholed delegates after another in a campaign to push forward India's ideas and programs.

Expected Dominance
Many delegates at Bandung expected Nehru virtually to dominate the conference.

He failed to do it. Even the major policy points he favored were not an attraction to most delegates. Nehru's own condemnation of old style colonialism and adoption of India's five principles of coexistence as a convention slogan were beaten.

What happened to keep Nehru in the background? His associates insist it was by choice. But his opponents say they kept him from the limelight by presenting united opposition to his attempts to railroad his pet theories through the conference.

Loses Temper
Nehru lost his temper—and lost some potential friends—and supporters—once or twice during the meeting. He flared up at Sir John Kotelawala of Ceylon, whose proposal for an independent Formosa countered Nehru's insistence that the island belong to Red China.

Another time he flared with Pakistan Prime Minister Mohd. Ali, whose nation's membership in a defense pact with Turkey was frequently the subject of Nehru's criticism.

Krishna Menon likewise failed to win friends for India.

Clear Thinking Asked for Radiation, Harmful Effects and Future Danger

SALT LAKE CITY, April 27 (AP)—The harmful effects of radiations from atomic tests upon human heredity should be neither minimized nor overemphasized, says research geneticist Dr. George Lefevre, Jr., of the University of Utah.

In an interview he agreed with Dr. H. J. Muller who Monday night in Washington told the National Academy of Sciences that "one of the worst kinds of harmful mutations may come about in the next generation because of H-bomb tests."

Muller declared extremists who say that the radiations are either harmful or so dangerous that the tests should be stopped.

Both Muller and Lefevre attacked what they called the "reckless" use of X-rays in the medical profession. Muller said human beings get more radiation in this way than from all the atomic tests combined.

Muller received the Nobel prize in 1947 for his discovery in 1927 that X-rays can cause mutations.

The 37-year-old Lefevre, who once was a biological researcher at the Oak Ridge national laboratory and received his Ph.D. in genetics at University of Missouri, is currently doing research on radiation effects in the fruit fly.

"The results of his most recent work are scheduled for presentation before the American Genetic Society next fall."

His experiments show that even different groups of fruit flies which are seemingly the same show great or lesser degrees of resistance to the same amount of radiation exposure. This could possibly be true among human beings.

His work also contradicts a widely-held view that X-rays can not only cause mutations, but can reverse the change, putting it back to normal.

He says it cannot be reversed in fruit flies and believes that the mutations caused by X-rays are not natural or "true" mutations.

He thinks the mutations caused by X-rays are because of permanent damage to the genes, which determine heredity and which when changed, cause mutations.

"Therefore X-ray treatment of damage done to genes from fallout radiation would not be plausible. As for the damage which can come from such fallout or X-ray medical treatment that is not done carefully, Lefevre explains that it is not a question of the health of the individual exposed.

It may take a great deal of radiation to cause sickness or death. But the smallest amount of radiation will change a gene—if it hits a gene in the reproductive cells.

Muller estimates there are about 10,000-20,000 genes in such a cell. In order for an observable change to occur in the offspring, the father's gene must be changed in the mother. Then their child could be abnormal in some way, such as growth, since mutations are generally harmful.

It's not likely this would happen, he said, because of the small number of mutations before two people with exactly the same change meet, marry and have children.

"The atomic tests just add 'one more thing' to the already present 'background' radiation and the natural or 'spontaneous' mutations.

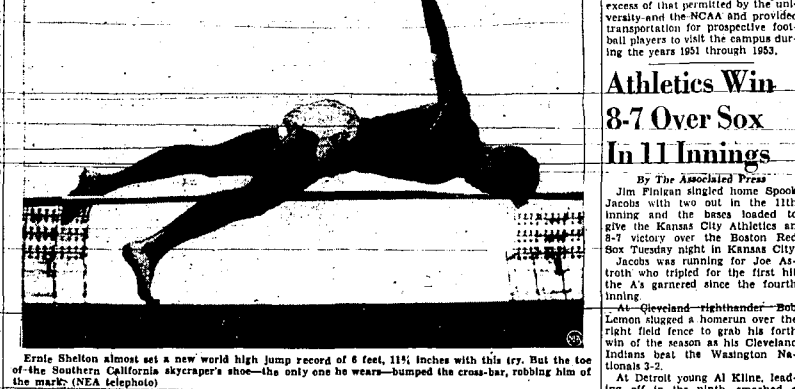

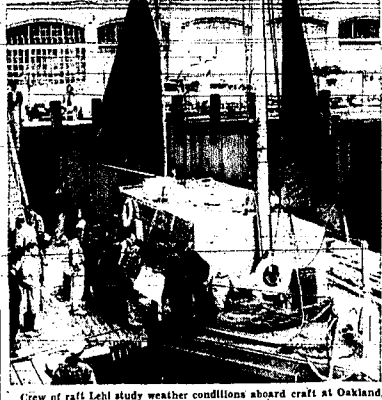

Parakeet May Require Aid in Trying to Talk

CHICAGO, April 13 (AP)—If your parakeet doesn't talk he may be emotionally unbalanced.

At least that's what Mrs. Marge Driscoll told her parakeet class at the Y.W.C.A.

The class, scheduled to meet one night a week, is for parakeet owners. But it's also for the birds.

Mrs. Driscoll, a buxom, gray-haired woman who runs a pet shop and breeds parakeets, invited her pupils to bring their birds to class.

She doesn't guarantee to teach them to talk, but she offered a few hints.

For one thing, she said, each parakeet is a "distinct personality." So don't get impatient if yours isn't quite as bright as the one down the street.

The best way to teach a bird to talk is to turn out the lights, Mrs. Driscoll said. In the dark there are no distractions.

Speak Distinctly

Hold the parakeet close to your lips and speak simple words slowly. Parakeets tend to stir their words. Mrs. Driscoll said, so don't set a bad example.

When you want to teach the bird a new word, use it with a word or phrase he already knows. Example: If his name is Pauntyberry and he knows it, then you can teach him to say "nice Pauntyberry."

But his name shouldn't be Pauntyberry. That's too much of a hard-to-remember word for a bright bird like a parakeet.

Mrs. Driscoll offered other hints

Some Dew Planets.

If your bird chews the plaster out of the living room wall, chances are he has a diet deficiency. Maybe he needs more calcium in his bird gravel.

"A clean bird is a healthy bird," Mrs. Driscoll said.

But parakeets do usually better. They'd rather squirm around in wet grass or leafy vegetables.

But never feed a parakeet lettuce. It knows it, then you can teach him to say "nice Pauntyberry."

Develop Taste

Seems some birds develop a taste for the stuff.

Some parakeets are "mimic birds," she said. But she didn't say what to do about it.

Mrs. Driscoll said it's pure fiction that female parakeets don't talk.

"The females," she said, "are quite talkative."

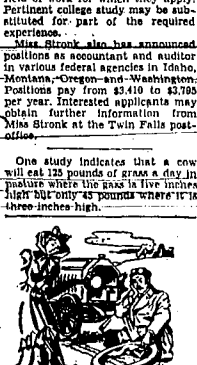

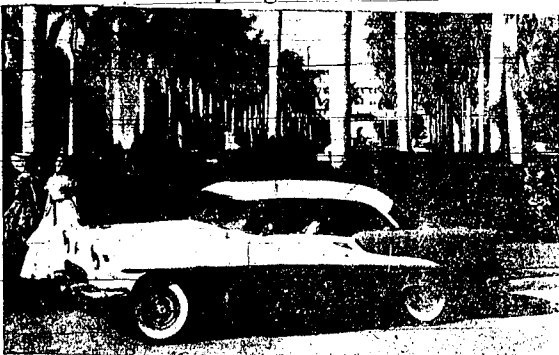

FBI Reports Say Crime Increases

WASHINGTON, April 13 (AP)—A crime wave of record-breaking proportions, supported by a sharp increase in theft, was recorded in the United States during 1954, the Federal Bureau of Investigation reported.

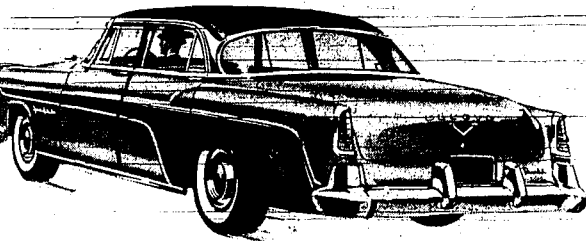

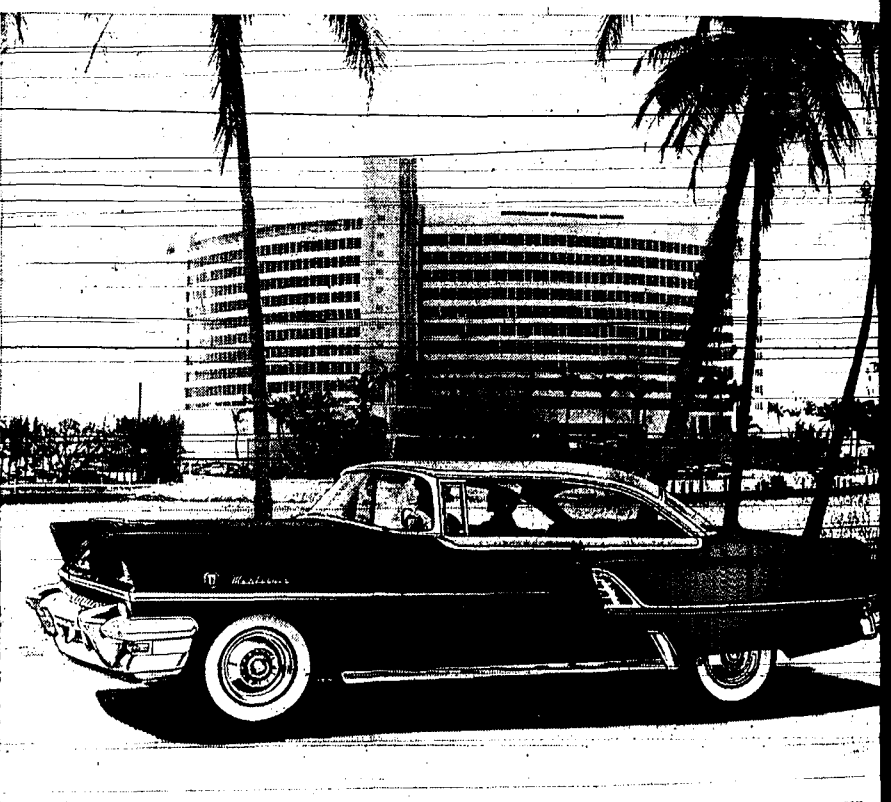

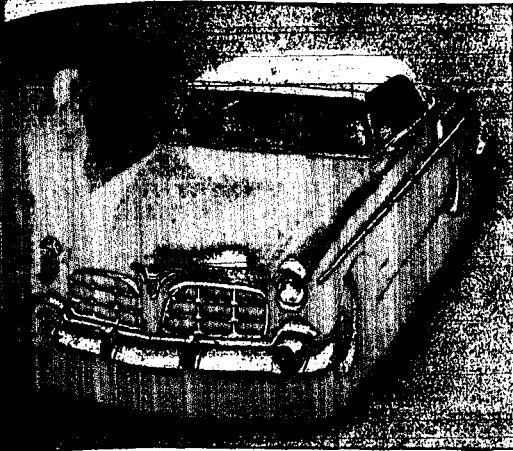

Big Business Shows Gains; Swells Assets

NEW YORK, April 27 (AP)—The ranks of the really big business firms continue to swell.

Despite last year's setback in general business activity, two more companies joined the total of those having assets in excess of one billion dollars.

They are now 33 non-financial corporations in this group of the nation's biggest businesses. In addition, at the end of the year there were 18 banks in the country with resources in excess of one billion dollars. (Since then two have merged, cutting the total to 17). And there were 15 insurance and finance companies in the same choice group.

Twenty-eight companies reported their 1954 sales totals were one billion dollars or better.

And 16 of the nation's big companies had net profit after taxes of 100 million dollars or higher.

Among the 33 non-financial corporations with assets in excess of one billion dollars are 11 oil companies, six railroads, five utilities, three auto makers and three in the electronics field.

Topping the list (leaving out consideration the insurance companies, banks and finance companies) is American Telephone and Telegraph company with assets of \$16,515,528,882. Second is Standard Oil (New Jersey) with \$6,214,743,182. General Motors is third with \$5,130,093,585.

Two companies are in the three-billion-dollar assets class: U. S. Steel and Pennsylvania Railroad. There are five in the two-billion-dollar group. In order of size they are: Dupont, New York Central, Southern Railway, Indiana Standard Oil and Pacific Gas and Electric.

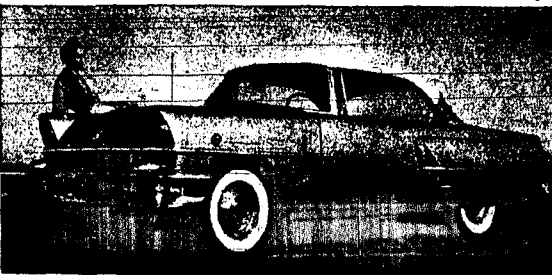
Just under two billion are Southern Pacific, Gulf Oil and the Texas Company. Ford Motors belongs in the group on basis of 1953 assets of \$1,695,130,000 (in 1954 assets are unreported).

Berlin, Devastated and Divided, Rises Quickly From Ruins of 10 Years Ago

BERLIN, April 27 (AP)—Berlin, devastated and divided, is rising swiftly from its ruins 10 years after the end of World War II.

A "little iron curtain" slices it in two: its free western sections are isolated 110 miles deep in Soviet-occupied territory.

Two city governments, two economic systems, two worlds struggle for mastery in what was once the proud capital of the German Reich.

Ten years ago the capital of Hitler's Nazi empire was in its death throes under Russian attack.

The United States and Russian armies had met on the Elba river on April 25.

Adolf Hitler was three days from his death.

It was at about 3:30 p.m. on the afternoon of April 30, 1945, that Hitler shot himself through the mouth in the air raid bunker of his chancellery. His mistress, Eva Braun, whom he had married the night before, took poison.

Those who heard the suicide shot and hurried into Hitler's room found him and Eva Braun lying on a blood-stained sofa.

The bodies were taken outside, wrapped in blankets, to a small garden in front of an emergency bunker out. There gasoline was poured on them and they were burned.

Hitler's death never has been officially certified. But only a few weeks ago a dentist, testifying in a law suit, said that he had identified Hitler's and Eva Braun's false teeth which the Russians found in the garden tunnel pit.

Eight correspondents were flown here with German Field Marshal Wilhelm Keitel for the final surrender.

Keitel, the German commander-in-chief, had surrendered to Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower's western-allied armies at Rheims, France, on May 7.

The final ceremony took place at the headquarters here of Soviet Marshal Georgi Zhukov, now Russian defense minister.

At midnight on May 8, Zhukov summoned Gen. Carl Spaatz of the United States Air Force, British Air Chief Marshal Sir Arthur Tedder and French Gen. Jean De Lattre de Tassigny to the surrender room.

Then Keitel and his aides were brought in.

Tedder, in behalf of the allies, asked Keitel:

"Have you read this document of unconditional surrender? Are you prepared to sign it?"

Keitel picked up a copy of the surrender terms from a table in front of him and said in a rasping voice in German:

"Ja, I am ready."

Zhukov mentioned him to come forward. Inmate in his gray uniform with red-striped trousers, Keitel picked up his cap, his medals and gloves and walked to another table where nine copies of the surrender document were laid out.

He screwed his monocle with studied deliberation into his right eye, examined his baton loudly on the table, sat down and signed.

Eighteen months later Keitel died on the gallows as a war criminal.

Berlin then was still in smoking ruins. It was Stalingrad, and Coventry, Cologne and Warsaw all heaped into one—a hideous, nightmarish labyrinth, seemingly beyond all hope of repair.

But Berlin is pulsating with life again. In the western part, the cafes, tables are out again along the Kurfurstendamm sidewalk in the spring sun. Big 10 and 15-story buildings are rising. The shops display the same expensive goods you may see on Fifth avenue in New York.

At night the neon signs make the "Kudam," as Berliners call it, a sea of light that conceals the plaster

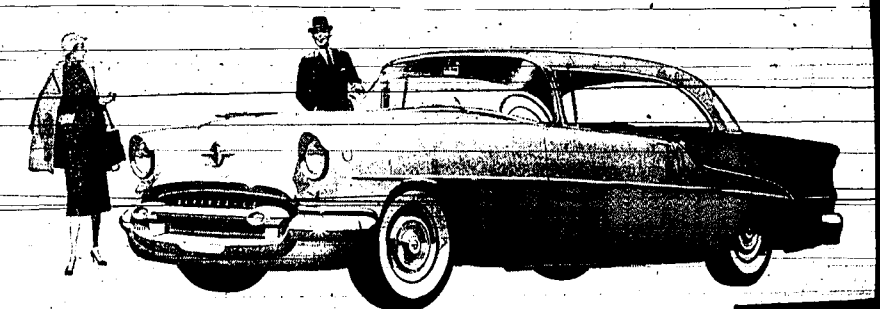

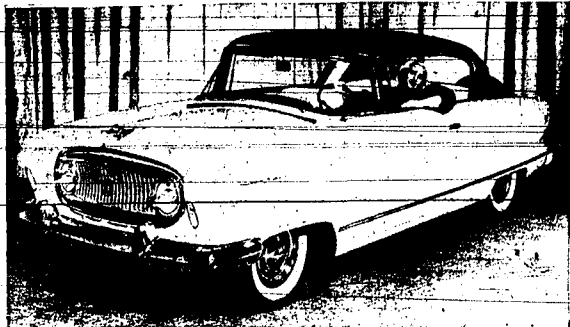

Records Near In Wide-Open Building Race

DETROIT, April 27 (U.P.)—The hottest production rate in history is being set by the auto industry this week close to its 2,750,000th car assembly of the year.

The industry set a new passenger car production record last week with 183,145 assemblies. Most of the assembly lines operated six days to achieve this volume. General Motors factories poured out an unprecedented 185,000 of the passenger cars. Chevrolet built 41,000 of them; Buick 20,150.

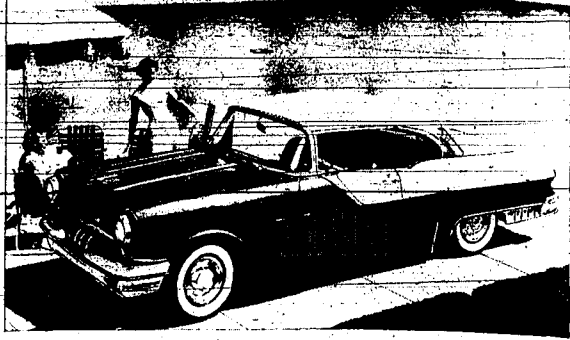
Ford's Ford division, continuing an all-out effort to outpace GM's Chevrolet division, got 35,915 car assemblies last week. On the year's total so far Chevrolet leads Ford 608,427 to 556,513 passenger car assemblies.

Plymouth Booms. Elsewhere in the production battle—Plymouth built 28,200 cars for a 1955 total to date of 212,688 against Buick's 255,310. Buick has said registration figures will show it in third place in new car sales by a substantial margin over Plymouth.

Chrysler corporation, stepping up its "Dodge" effort, has built more than 522,600 cars so far this year. The total more than doubles last year's output for the comparable period.

The industry's executives insist the current production rate is inspired wholly by the indicated market for new cars. They insist there is no plan to pile up inventories against a possible production-crippling strike stemming from labor's demand for a guaranteed annual wage.

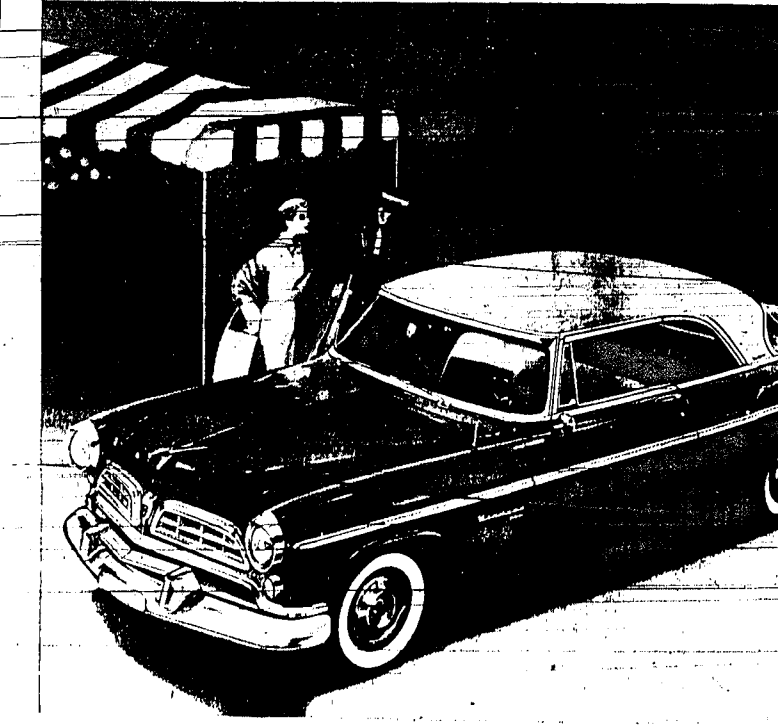

History Remembers Event of 1861: Hanging of Paula Angel

LAS VEGAS, N.M., April 27 (AP)—Just 94 years ago, American newspapers missed one of the most sensational stories of our times.

The event was the hanging on April 26, 1861, of one of the first women ever to be executed under U.S. laws.

Paula was charged with stabbing to the gallows for the murder of her lover, Miguel Martin, to death in New Mexico. She was an isolated "after allowing him to embrace her" territory on the western frontier.

No newspaper carried the story of her trial and death, historians say. A few years later, in 1865, the world was horrified at the widely publicized hanging of another woman, Mary Surratt, one of the five persons condemned for conspiring to assassinate President Abraham Lincoln.

But when Paula died, the eyes of the world were elsewhere in April 1861. Paula was a young girl, 19 years old, who had been abandoned by her father and was living in a small town in New Mexico.

Paula was not the first woman ever hanged in this country. But she was probably the first ever hanged in the rugged west, where for many years a man's life was every enough but a woman was rarely to be protected. As far as available records show, she was the second woman ever executed under U.S. laws.

His source was Dist. Judge Luis Armijo of Las Vegas. As a child, Armijo heard the story of the sensational story of our times.

On the bench for the trial was Judge Kirby Benedict, an outstanding figure in New Mexico's hectic Civil war and reconstruction days, and later chief justice of the state supreme court. He sentenced Paula to die.

"Each morning," Kelleher says, "Sheriff Antonio A. de Herrera passed by her cell and spoke to her, always using the same words: 'Paula! The judge sentenced you to be hanged, and I'm going to hang you until you are dead, dead, dead!'"

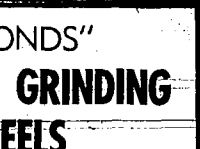

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., April 27 (AP)—Arkansas hopes to become a "Cinderella" state. The Prince Charming is William Rockefeller, and people around here are convinced he can do as much for Arkansas as he did for Bobo.

Bobo Rockefeller, a coal miner's daughter, got a five million dollar settlement from the oil multimillionaire when she divorced him last year. One local wag already has figured out that Arkansas could have built 123 miles of badly-needed highway with that much money.

No Niceres Mania
But Arkansas is not looking for a divorce. Arkansas loves Rockefeller who came here to live just a few years ago and has already shown he can help the state out of its economic doldrums.

The 45-year-old grandson of billionaire John D. Rockefeller already has given the state's cattle ranch atop Pease mountain the best breeding the Santa Gertrudis strain of beef cattle and has through his place opened significant extension agents to come and profit from his pasture and feed experiments.

Arkansas has started a number of philanthropies in the state, chiefly aimed at improving medical facilities in rural areas.

Area Bright Future
But these benefits are secondary compared with what Arkansas sees in the future. Gov. Orval Faubus, who has Rockefeller in charge of the state's industrial development commission, which is dedicated to the proposition that Arkansas need not always be poor.

Arkansas now ranks 48th among the states in expenditure for education and 47th in per capita income. But state officials and businessmen have always insisted the state has more industrial potential than most other states of comparable size.

The Arkansas economy is pegged principally on cotton farming, poultry raising and oil and timber production. Few of its raw materials are manufactured into finished products within the state. Much of its wealth is siphoned off by eastern companies.

Traders Apartment
Rockefeller traded his peach New York apartment for a ranch in the undeveloped "Frontier," sinking at least one million dollars into the ranch itself. Among his ranch projects is a water pumping station that furnishes enough water for a city of 5,000 population.

The commission he heads will attempt to lure new industries to Arkansas "with Winthrop Rockefeller at the helm" and banker W. C. Campbell, a member of the commission, "our hopes are really up."

Asked by "pressmen" what he thought of the prospects for bringing capital into Arkansas, Rockefeller himself said: "We're really going to get something done."

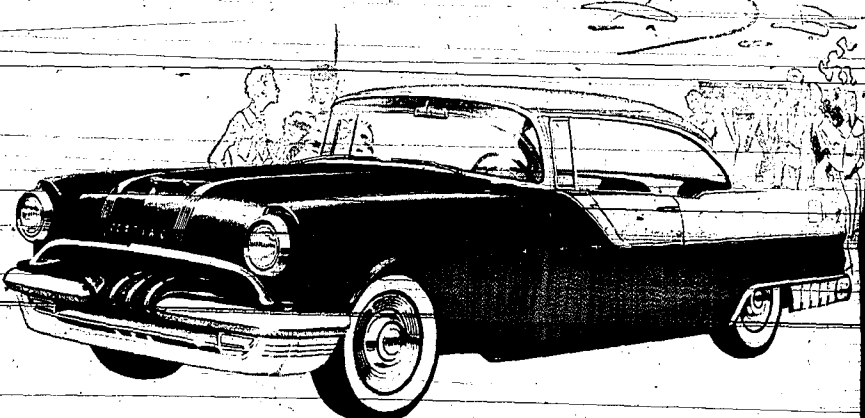

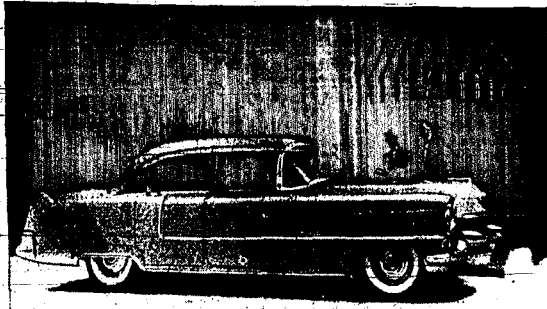

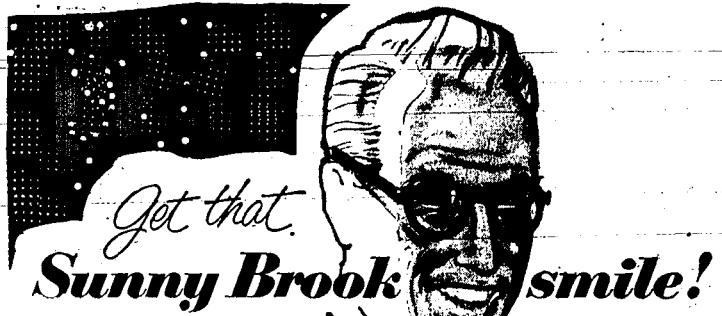

Oil Firm Sets Explorations In Argentina

BUENOS AIRES, April 13.—The Standard Oil company of California will make an initial investment of at least \$13,500,000 in oil explorations and production in southern Argentina under a contract signed with the Argentine government.

The contract, signed by Owen J. Hayes, an officer of the California company, and Minister of Industry and Commerce Orlando Santos, is subject to approval by President Juan D. Peron and congressional ratification, an official announcement said.

Operations will be carried through a new subsidiary of the company known as California de Petroleos S. A. A delay in ratification in the Senate Cruz territory.

Structure of the contract, as the headquarters of Argentina's state oil monopoly, Y.P.F., as the "main" of production, started last October when the California group offered economic, financial and technical cooperation to help Argentina become self-sufficient in oil resources.

The announcement said the figure of \$13,500,000 represents only a "minimum part" of the eventual total investment.

The contract calls for geophysical exploration and drilling in an area of the Santa Cruz territory owned by the Argentine-Cuba border and the Santa Cruz and Chichas rivers.

WASHINGTON, April 13.—A California sugar industry official has asked the state's congressmen to urge early house agriculture committee action to revise sugar production quotas.

Oordon Lyons, executive manager of the California Sugar Beet Growers association, said the industry would be done to California growers if the bill were bogged down.

California, which he called the No. 1 sugar producer in the nation, would get an extra 25,000-ton quota under the bill.

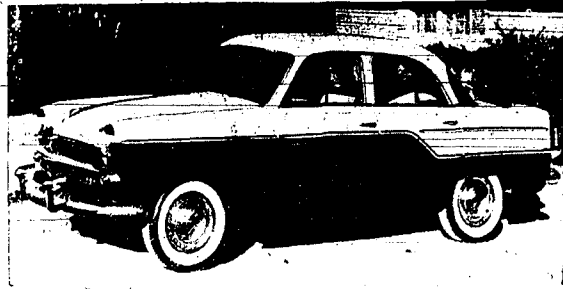
Passage of the bill appears assured in the senate, he said, but hearings have not yet been scheduled by the house committee.
