## Blow Set In Bloody Fight In Viet Civil War

INDOCHINA, April 28 (UP)—Rebellious warlord forces in government forces in Saigon today, in bloody fighting that raged for hours until loyal forces roared into the city in tank-led convoys and government said "more than 100" soldiers, rebels were feared killed. Hundreds more were wounded in fires which raged through the grassy shacks housing the refugees who fled here from the north to escape communist terror.

The government and rebels agreed on the second day of the day and fifteen minutes later only a few scattered machine-gun bursts could be heard above screams of the wounded and dying.

The fighting flared when troops of the Hinh Xuyen gang of ex-communists invaded the area in a conventional movement moving through the crowded streets. It flamed across the city and soon a quarter of Saigon was in flames with the streets echoed to the sounds of artillery and machine-guns.

The fighting broke through to areas through the government of American-backed Premier Ngo Dinh Diem, abelled the premier's police resistance but failed to capture the area.

The European quarter of the city where several hundred Americans lived escaped the full fury of the night.

"One of the heaviest battles" fought around the headquarters of Free French command, Commander Stanley's headquarters, drove off the fiercest rebels in hand to hand combat.

# Probe of Vaccine Opens, Continued Shots Are Urged

A cross-country investigation was launched today after at least nine and possibly 13 children inoculated with a California-produced Salk vaccine fell ill with infantile paralysis. One of the children died and two 7-year-old boys were in iron lungs following the inoculations of vaccine produced by the Cutter Laboratories of Berkeley, Calif.

## Continued U.S. Use of Polio Vaccines Urged

WASHINGTON, April 28 (UP)—The public health service urged parents today to go ahead with any plans they have to get Salk polio shots for their children.

It said they can have "complete faith" both in the effectiveness of the serum itself and in the vaccination programs now underway throughout the country.

The health service made the statements in a frank effort to calm a wave of concern and uncertainty set in motion yesterday by a government ban on all vaccine produced by Cutter Laboratories in Berkeley, Calif.

The ban was ordered as a precautionary measure because one child died and at least nine and possibly suffered paralysis from child after receiving Cutter vaccine. Government experts "don't think the ban is necessary, but they want to be absolutely sure."

### Sanctuary for Chinese Reds Eyed in Talks

By United Press  
 One of the things that must have been discussed in the latest talks between the State-Chinese Nationalist negotiations, is the fact that the communists now have a "privileged sanctuary" opposite Formosa.

This singular situation is seldom emphasized in the talk about a Formosa cease-fire agreement.

But it certainly must have been emphasized in the negotiations held by Adm. Arthur W. Radford, chairman of the joint chiefs of staff; Assistant Secretary of State Walter B. Robertson and Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

**Gives Opinion**  
 Official sources in Taipei, the Formosan capital, where the negotiations were held said that basic principles involved in obtaining a cease-fire were discussed.

But the belief was expressed in American diplomatic and military circles in Tokyo that Chiang's desire to attack the communists' air bases played a big part in the talks. That sounds logical, Chiang would not cease fire, he wants to check the communists—frankly hoping that the United States will be drawn into war on his side.

The United States wants a cease fire, not only to end the present dangerous situation, but to free the trading of American war prisoners still held by the communists in flagrant violation of the Korean armistice.

So far, the cease fire situation is still in the diplomatic "feeler" stage. —But the way things are going, it looks as if the United States eventually will have to let Chiang start bombing the red-held mainland unless a cease fire is arranged.

Of course the communists themselves could start things, if the cease fire failed to fall.

The Quemoy and Matsu islands in the Taiwan Strait are in preparation for an attack on Formosa.

**Will Be Dark**  
 But they still do not know whether the United States will go into action to help Chiang and his nationalist defend the two island groups.

The reds do know that the United States is pledged to defend Formosa itself.

And if they have any sense at all, they will not lightly risk a major war by attacking the islands. They have trouble enough of their own—namely a chronic agricultural crisis which leaves millions of Chinese people hungry.

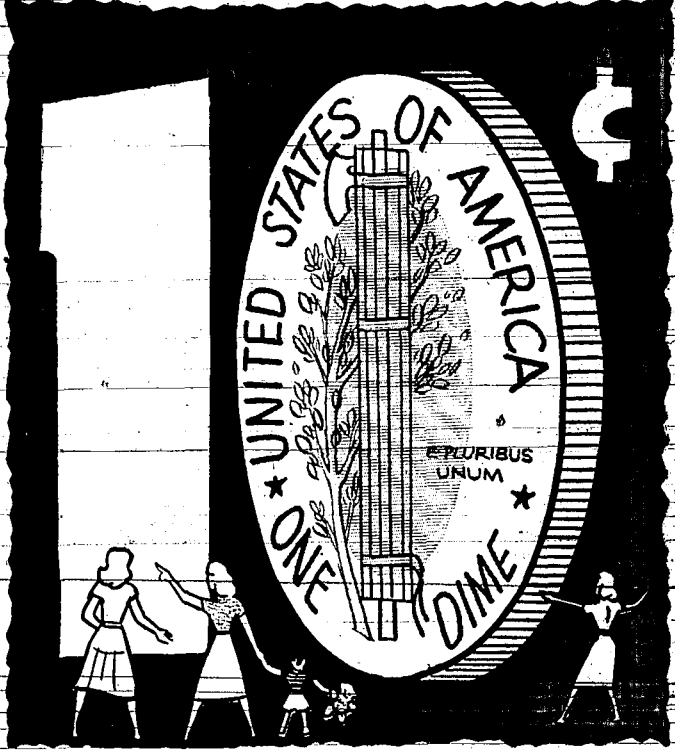

# Uranium Rush Shooting War Is Forestalled

WASHINGTON, April 23 (AP)—The uranium rush in the Pumpkin Butte area of Wyoming, which threatened a shooting war between prospectors, has been forestalled by a federal injunction.

Secretary of the Interior McKeay issued an emergency order yesterday cancelling plans to open 65,343 acres of public land in Campbell and Johnson counties May 3 for uranium prospecting and home-steading.

McKeay said he acted because state authorities reported there was a grave danger of violence if thousands of prospectors piling around the Pumpkin Butte area were allowed to rush in and begin staking out claims.

The situation is so out of hand, McKeay said, that Gov. Milward L. Simpson of Wyoming has been asked to call out the national guard.

Sena, Barrett, R. Wyo. and O'Mahoney, D. Wyo., and Rep. Thomson, D. Wyo., called on the interior department to revoke public land order 1943, issued last Jan. 4 to open the federal land to mineral and home-steading claims.

Thomson told a reporter a lot of the waiting prospectors are armed.

The effect of the injunction order is to place the area back under public land order Bill and withdraw the land from all forms of appropriation under the public land laws, including the mining laws.

**Conflict Arises**

Serious conflict has arisen between owners of private land and prospectors. Large areas of private land are interspersed with federal holdings in the area. In the open range country, stagers find it difficult and often impossible to distinguish between federal and private holdings. Consequently an increasing number of clashes between prospectors and prospectors have been reported.

The reports that have reached the state have made it clear, McKeay said, that additional time is necessary to fully inform both private landowners and prospectors as to their rights in the area.

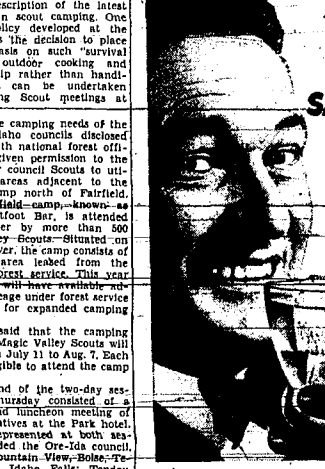

# News Editors Take Jobs at Top Officials

NEW YORK, April 23 (AP)—American newspaper publishers took several jobs yesterday at the Eisenhower administration.

Richard W. Slocum, president of the American Newspaper Publishers association, criticized what he called "the over-present urge to censorship and a limiting of news sources."

Slocum, executive vice president of the Philadelphia Evening Bulletin, told the ANPA convention:

"We shall hope that our well-intentioned Secretary of Defense (Charles E. Wilson) will quickly see the error in his recent resort to censorship in an effort to check alleged secret leaks."

Wilson has contended his recent tightening of defense department rules on giving out military information was aimed at keeping potential enemies from learning too much and that it did not constitute censorship.

The ANPA's federal laws committee expressed concern "that special

interest groups, including certain elements of the Federal government, or judicial decision to try to impose editorial censorship what can be printed in a newspaper."

### Federal Campaign on Unclean Grains Causes Anxiety Among Farm Chiefs

**WASHINGTON, April 28**—A government campaign to keep unclean grain from moving into food processing plants is causing some anxiety among federal farm officials. They fear it may upset grain markets this summer and hamper the agriculture department's price support operations. The situation could develop, officials agree, into one comparable to a shortage of grain storage in 1946 when the grain belt gave Harry S. Truman an upset presidential victory over Thomas E. Dewey. Should a considerable percentage of the grain storage facilities be up this year, the result could be a price-depressing factor in the markets. The practical effect would be the same as in 1946 when a lack of storage facilities forced many farmers to sell grain at sacrifice prices. The agriculture department is acting along with the FDA on the clean grain campaign. It has notified farmers that price support loans will be made on wheat only if it meets the same standards as those later when farmers turn it over to the government in payment of their loans. Should grain deteriorate in storage, farmer-borrowers would be required to make up to the government the difference in the volume of the loan and that of the contaminated wheat. This difference could well approach a dollar a bushel. The FDA has pointed a finger at farmers for much of the contamination. It said recently that "present practices in the harvesting, storage and marketing of grain are making it difficult for millers to get clean grain . . . for milling into flour and cereal products."

### Big Congress Fight Seen on Bricker Plan

**WASHINGTON, April 28**—A fight is expected in Congress today over Sen. John W. Bricker's proposed constitutional amendment to redefine the federal government. The Ohio Republican argued for his proposal as the first witness before a Senate Judiciary subcommittee. He made a proposed statement that he had revised the amendment he first offered in the last Congress but had not changed its objectives. The Senate a year ago rejected the Bricker proposal after weeks of debate and a narrow vote. President Eisenhower opposed it, then Secretary of State John Foster Dulles, said yesterday the administration opposes the 1952 version also. Bricker said his amendment would declare that a treaty or other international agreement which conflicts with the Constitution shall have no validity nor shall either become effective as domestic law without congressional approval. Bricker denied that the amendment would restrict the President in exercising foreign policy. But he said it would keep the President from making "one-man laws" by executive agreement or from making agreements conflicting with the Constitution.

### Chancellor Seeks Quick Peace Pact

**VIENNA, April 28**—Chancellor Julius Raab called on the big four powers today to free Austria from occupation by early November. Raab told a joint session of both houses of his parliament that it would be a "time gift" to the Austrian nation if it realized freedom before the Vienna state opera reopens its war-damaged house with Beethoven's "Fidelio," a "musical salute to deliverance from tyranny." The opera reopening is scheduled for Nov. 5. With aged President Theodor Koerner at his side, the chancellor spoke at ceremonies marking the 10th anniversary of Austria's liberation from the Nazis.

Among Shippingport's citizens the only one making active plans for the effect of the new plant is Postmistress Florence Cook, who also runs the town's only grocery store.

"I've been doing business here for many years and everything has been going quietly," she says, "but with this new plant I'm preparing for a lot more mail business and probably selling more groceries."

And she adds wistfully: "Maybe the plant will give us a bridge—somehow."

### Chickens Will Offer Big Buy For Shopping

Frying chickens will offer outstanding value for shoppers in the nation's food stores this week-end. After rising sharply at wholesale for the past several months, there was a definite downturn this week in the price of the birds, and most retailers plan to make fryers their No. 1 feature. Prices will be down as much as six cents a pound from a week ago.

"Frying chicken prices are getting back to normal again," commented one meat specialist. "And they may go a little lower next week."  
Shoppers will also find a broad selection of beef cuts among advertised specials for the week-end. Items mentioned by a number of markets include prime ribs, pot roast, round steak and corned beef.

**Lamb Featured**  
Legs of lamb will be featured in a number of markets, but in most sections of the country, prices will be unchanged from a week ago. In the pork line, there will be special here and there on smoked hams and fresh picnic. Lower prices on veal, shoulder roast and legs and hump of veal were mentioned by a few stores.

Egg prices may be lower in your market. Reductions of two to four cents a dozen are being made in many areas.

Are you eating more shrimp these days? Someone in The Shrimp Association of the Americas reports that during the first two months of this year, Americans consumed more than 21 million pounds of shrimp. In the same two-month year ago, the figure was only 14 million pounds.

### Parity in Vegetables

There's lots of variety on the vegetable counters. Onions are cheap, although quality is mostly ordinary to fair. An exception is the new crop Texas onion, which sells at a slightly higher price. Spinach, cabbage and nearby greens such as radishes, kale, rhubarb and leeks offer good value, too. Produce men also favor escarole, endive, corn, asparagus, carrots, shall and medium peppers, old crop potatoes, beets, celery, lettuce, cucumbers, squash and beans. The quality of beans is improving. The best buys in fruits are the old standbys—apples, grapefruit and oranges. Strawberries are a little older than a week ago because supplies are increasing.



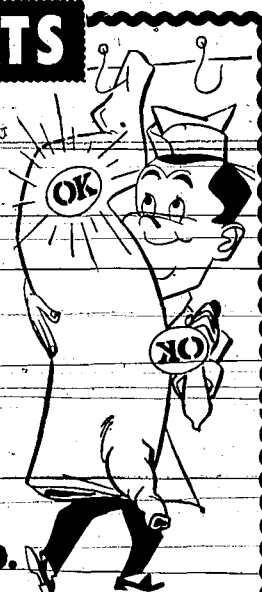
