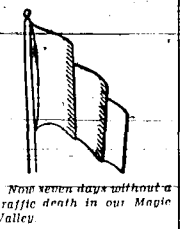

Dutch Senate Ratifies Pact On Germany

THE HAGUE, The Netherlands, April 29 (AP)—West German parliament received its final parliamentary approval yesterday. The Dutch senate gave a historic 22-vote ratification of the pact.

The pact was the last such engagement needed to bring West Germany into the western bloc against communism.

The Dutch lower house approved the pact 145-114 March 20. Six months later, nearly five years of struggle, the parliaments of all 15 nations affected have voted for West Germany's sovereignty and the right to recruit armed forces that will eventually total a half-million soldiers, sailors and airmen.

Ceremonies marking West Germany's change from an ex-enemy to a full Western power will take place early next week.

The Bonn republic's enrollment in the U. S. embassy, France, Great Britain and the North Atlantic treaty organization is planned at foreign ministers' meetings opening in Paris May 1.

Treaty Nations

The nations in the alliance are West Germany and the present members of NATO: Britain, France, Italy, The Netherlands, Belgium, Luxembourg, Turkey, Iceland, Norway, Canada and the United States.

All signed one or more of the four Paris agreements.

School Lunch Fund Slashed

BOISE, April 29 (AP)—Payments to Idaho schools under the federal school lunch program will be cut about 30 percent for the rest of the year because of insufficient appropriations. Superintendent of Public Instruction Alton B. Jones said yesterday.

There are now 406 Idaho public schools operating under the program, an increase of approximately 100 per cent since the school year. Federal appropriations, however, were only \$291,500, counting a supplemental payment of \$10,000, compared to \$397,874 a year ago.

Cecil Olson, state school lunch director, said the federal district court has ruled that there would be no further supplemental payments to western states this year.

ment said the illness of another child would be investigated. A 7-year-old Pocatello girl who had received the free vaccine died earlier this week.

Dr. Stanley J. Leland, state director of preventive medicine, said a federal health specialist would investigate.

All the children in Idaho received vaccine from the Cutter Laboratories of Berkeley, Calif. The vaccine has been recalled for further tests. Total polio cases in the state in April now stand at six for a total of 14 this year. There were two in April last year.

Dr. Gerald Laveck, U. S. public health service epidemiologist, was expected in Boise from Pocatello today and would look into the illness of a second grader at Council. He said the boy became ill after receiving the shot, but his case had not been definitely diagnosed as polio.

The health department has said the Pocatello children "obviously" were exposed to the disease before receiving their shots.

It has ordered supplies for the second round; and Director E. J. Peterson said it hoped to complete the series before school opens.

A sample of blood from the Pocatello boy will be sent to the U. S. public health service laboratory at Hamilton Mont. Leland said Laveck also would look into the north Idaho cases.

The boy, James P. Shipley, Jr., 6, was reported in fair condition at a Pocatello hospital as Laveck arrived there.

Goodwill Between Chief and Zhukov Is Put to Rigid Test

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP)—President Eisenhower has posed a tough test of the power and goodwill of Soviet Marshal Georgi Zhukov, also known as "The Iron Curtain" commander-in-arms 10 years ago.

Ever since Eisenhower became President there has been speculation that the friendly relationship which existed between the two men in the title of occupied Germany might some day, in some way, help to bridge the gap between Moscow and Washington.

This speculation was stimulated last February when Zhukov stepped up to the post of defense minister after Marshal Bulganin became premier.

Now the President has written Zhukov, saying to him something like this:

"Why don't you help obtain the release from Red China of 15 American aviators held away from the Korean war? Why don't you persuade the Chinese Reds to let other Americans come home?"

That was the sense of what Eisenhower is reported to have written Zhukov about two weeks ago. At a news conference Wednesday he declined to disclose the content of the correspondence.

"Vapor Lock" Causes, Cures Are Discussed

NEW YORK, April 29 (AP).—Here are scientific revelations of two things every motorist ought to know but will have a hard time finding out about from automobile dealers and repairmen.

They are: (1) what a "vapor lock" is, (2) what to do about it.

"A vapor lock is a condition which can run down your battery trying to start it up again. And the battery-blank thing has been running like a cat right up to the instant it went dead!"

What happened was that the gasoline in the fuel system changed from a liquid into a vapor before it was supposed to. From gasoline tank all the way to the carburetor, this fuel system can pass along liquid gasoline only. Gasoline vapor stifles it.

St. Tight

What to do about it is nothing. As the stalled engine cools, the heat in the fuel system goes down. The vaporized gas condenses back into a liquid. And then the engine will start up again. Nature unlocks the "lock."

If you want to hurry nature along, you can lift the engine hood and let cooler air in. Or you can wrap wet cloths around the fuel pump, especially the intake side. That's where the "vapor lock" usually forms. But it could be in the intake side of the carburetor, so wrap a wet cloth around it, too.

Try to find out from the automobile dealer what a vapor lock is and he looks blank. Pushed, he may say that maybe it is some odd thing that happens to the cars of his competitors, but certainly never happens to his car.

Result of Progress

But independent scientists say the "vapor lock" was the inevitable result of automobile progress.

Combine efficient engines and efficient fuels with a hot, muggy day or night, and much starting and stopping and you're likely to get premature vaporizing and then a "vapor lock."

Engineers of the Texas company offered a practical how-to-avoid suggestion: If you're caught in weather, never turn off the engine. It may not start again. Instead, speed the engine up a bit for a normal idling speed, without racing it. That'll turn the fan over faster and keep the fuel system cooler.

Deadline Is Here For Tax Payers

WASHINGTON, April 29 (AP).—Tomorrow is the first deadline for something like a million of Uncle Sam's tax collectors. The deadline is for holders who pay a domestic helper. An average of \$4 a week or more.

The new social security law went into effect last January. It requires domestic help for social security if they make \$50 a quarter, or more, from any one employer. That figure is out to about \$4 a week.

In the past, such helpers were covered by social security if they worked 24 days for a single employer in a quarter. The household is required to make the social security payments.

Payments are due for any help around the house who earned as much as \$50 during January, February, and March of the year.

The company, which dredged for strategic minerals in the creek last winter, contended that there was no fish life in the stream to speak of. The jury deliberated 25 minutes before returning its verdict in the court of Probate Judge H. V. McMaster.

Porter Hatcher of the state fish and game department testified Wednesday that all fish from the dredging had killed large numbers of salmon. He said the creek was one of the principal spawning grounds of the Salmon river system.

Heavy Work Project Is Accomplished By Municipal Recreation Department

Without fanfare and with a crew never exceeding seven, the Twin Falls parks and recreation department has accomplished a phenomenal amount of work during the past six months at city parks and playgrounds.

In a report summing up the department's accomplishments, Ernest Craner, parks and recreation superintendent, outlined work which included tree-trimming, resodding, painting, carpentry and the installation of new sprinkler systems.

The most dramatic progress was made at Harrison park where 127 truck loads of dirt were dumped and leveled to bring Twin Falls' newest park up to standards. An old barn in the park, 80 feet by 12 feet, has been demolished and is now a recreation building.

Installations in the old barn include two rest rooms, one storage room for park equipment and a storage room for recreation equipment. A cement floor has been laid and four windows cut in the walls. The recreation room, 23 feet by 12 feet, will be furnished with ping-pong tables, checker boards and other indoor recreation equipment.

In addition to the ground-leveling of the new park, several hundred feet of two-inch pipe for a sprinkler system has been laid. The barn will be painted white in the near future.

In the Harmon park, the department has laid out a new softball field with a "skinned" infield. Also added is a new regulation-size basketball court with a 12-foot-wide back and two 12-foot-wide wings. The basketball has a 4 1/2-foot ceiling and a 12-foot screen to protect four balls has been erected.

Other improvements made in Harmon park include three new outdoor fireplaces and two newly-decorated restrooms. Twenty loads of fertilizer were brought in for use on the grass and trees, and all the bare spots on seven baseball diamonds have been resodded.

In Joyce ballpark, used by the Magic Valley Cowboys, the city has installed a new screen behind home plate and another screen, 300 feet long, behind the top bleachers. Old wooden bleachers behind and back rests have been replaced and the bleachers repainted.

Two veterinarians had pumped 10 million units of penicillin, 15 times the dose given a human being, under Roxie's thick hide with syringes as big as a man's arm. They also pumped barrels of water, buckets of glucose, gallons of dextrose and heat stimulants into the animal in efforts to save her life.
