## Diem Falls As Revolt In Rock Indio

IGON, South Viet Nam, (Sunday), May 1 (AP)—Gen. Van Vy took over control of South Viet Nam today and declared himself still loyal to ex-Emperor Bao Dai. He declared the revolutionary committee headed by Premier Ngo Dinh Diem also was illegal. Vy repudiated Bao Dai Saturday night but he said he acted under the threat of the committee to the south.

Vy said Diem himself now is in the palace. He has taken over command on orders of Bao Dai, and that the statement issued on Saturday was a declaration around the capital. He would maintain order and an army appeared to be in control.

Diem had drawn up the plan for the revolution, but he had not yet taken any action. He had appointed Bao Dai as state and entrusted the revolution to the American-backed Diem. He had three points for the program: to end the rebellion of the army of Binh Xuyen, to end the French colonial rule, and to end the French domination of the country.

Diem's fall was a surprise to many. He had been in power since 1954, and had been successful in bringing about a cease-fire with the Communists. He had also been successful in bringing about a coalition government with the Communists.

"This means that the vaccine conceivably could have been a contributing cause," he told a reporter after a talk to the state Congress of Parents and Teachers.

"We will not know for sure until exhaustive tests are completed." The 10th child to develop the disease was 7-year-old Sherman Vaughn, Malad. He is at St. Benedict's hospital at Ordan.

# State Budget Draws Blast In Demo Fete

**MONTPELIER, April 30**—The 1938 legislative approved spending of \$12,847,786 more than was authorized for the 1937-38 session, according to the secretary of state, Irvin H. Masters, today.

A demonstration sponsored by the Bear Lake county Democratic Central committee, the veteran of the legislature, and the veteran of the legislature, said Gov. Robert E. During their three-day trek they lived on four squares of chocolate found in the craft. They received their first food at the mission—a cup of tea and a bowl of soup—they were picked up by a helicopter and flown here for a medical check.

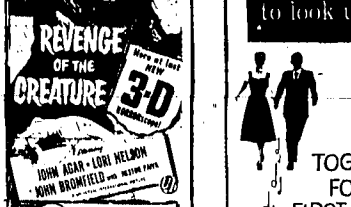

He announced that the company, through merger, acquired all mining and oil and gas properties of United States uranium corporation and Pueblo-Southwest corporation, Santa Fe, and Border Uranium Corporation, Pueblo, Colo.

### Bond Holders To Ask Court Help in Battle

**BOISE, April 30 (AP)—**Holders of one of the defaulted Northern Idaho bonds today planned a court fight to force payment from State Treasurer Ralph Moon.

Their attorney, Willis Moffatt, said he would accept a proposal by Mrs. Moon that the state supreme court be asked to decide whether she—his client—had the power to appropriate \$100,000 to pay some of the bonds.

And Atty. Gen. Graydon Smith said his office would defend Mrs. Moon in court if necessary, even though she had disregarded his advice to pay the principal and interest.

Mrs. Moon said Friday she had refused to dip into the general fund to pay the revenue bonds, which were issued by the state department of education to finance construction of a dormitory at the Lewiston school.

She said she feels the 1955 legislature may have violated the state constitution in appropriating \$100,000 to pay off the bonds, "a moral obligation" of the state.

Smith had told her that the legislature was within its rights because the payment of the bonds was its purpose, she said, but her own attorney, citing a supreme court opinion, had advised her that "no state is in any way bound by the action of its legislature in saying that senate bill 216 is constitutional."

Because of this "contradictory" advice, she said, she had refused to sign a claim for a \$56,152 payment which falls due Monday.

She said she would sue to nullify the closing of the school by the 1951 legislature. They were to have been paid by student rentals. The school will be reopened again next fall as Lewis-Clark Normal school.

She personally feels that the payment of the bonds is a public and urgent interest, is a moral obligation of the state, Mrs. Moon said. "As a graduate of the Lewiston Normal school and one who has worked long and hard to have the school reopened, I am hereby-hurs-at being the one to throw any rocks in the path of those attempting to get things moving at the college."

She also mentioned a "contamination through the courts" to avoid the danger of her own bondsmen being "appointed" to represent her in the appropriation process unconstitutional.

She said she would defend Mrs. Moon even though she didn't follow her own advice.

"While I feel that she should have paid the bonds and interest, I sympathize with the position in which she finds herself," he said.

Mrs. Moon said that her doubts were raised by a section of the constitution which prevents the loaning or giving of the state's credit to any individual association, municipality or other organization.

"To add to the confusion," she noted, Gov. Robert E. Smylie had allowed the bill to become law without his signature, expressing doubt about the precedent involved but saying the need to ease his "load" on our state's credit.

### Train Unions Plan Walkout

**CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., April 30 (AP)—**Amtrak's train roads today alerted to the likelihood of a nationwide rail strike unless current negotiations bring a settlement, a spokesman for the Order of Railroad Conductors and Brakemen said today.

The brotherhood and the carriers will resume negotiations in Chicago Monday. The spaney has been in dispute in the pay and equity case, in which the union seeks a graduated rate of pay and other benefits.

### Former Local Man Credited On Invention

**Roy McBride, Pocatello, former Twin Falls resident, has invented a water-return system in boilers that may revolutionize boilerroom operation, according to word received here.**

The inventor claims the system which returns the hot condensate into a steam boiler without the loss of heat will save fuel and maintenance.

Explaining the operation, McBride says the tank containing the water-return mechanism is mounted above the waterline of the boiler. When the equalization tank becomes full of hot condensate it automatically releases steam from the top of the boiler into the equalization tank. The pressure being equalized with that of the boiler and because water is heavier than steam, the water returns through pipes back into the boiler.

McBride first invented the return system in Twin Falls in 1945 while he was working as a steam fitter and engineer for a laundry. The invention has been perfected during the past month. Several manufacturers reportedly are interested in his invention.

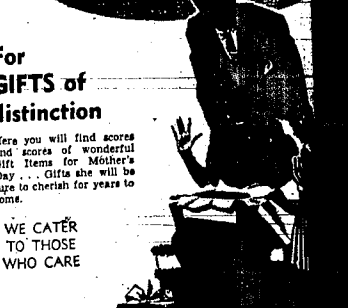

### New Owners of \$350,000 Pumice Plant Give Report on Idaho Falls Operation

Following an announcement Friday that the Hoops Construction company, Twin Falls, has bought controlling interest in the \$350,000 Pumice, Inc., Idaho Falls, the company's local officers have released additional information regarding the concern.

The corporation's property containing pumice deposits is located in Bonneville county. It consists of approximately 3,360 acres controlled by the corporation through leases, and 540 acres held under contracts to purchase patented and unpatented claims.

Pumice is a cellular glass lava material essentially unaltered since its formation, ejected from the core of a volcano. Gases are released during its solidification, which turn the molten mass into a glassy foam honeycombed with elongated parallel cavities.

It is a non-metallic mineral, replacing sand and gravel as an aggregate in block. It has the advantage of half the weight and six times the insulation, with strengths that meet all building code specifications.

The corporation's pumice deposits are pure, according to company officials. V. E. Camozzi, a mining engineer, indicates that the corporations properties contain millions of tons of commercial grade pumice.

He also said the pumice deposits undoubtedly are some of the finest in the nation. He feels that the pumice in the area practically is inexhaustible. He feels that if the present deposits should become exhausted, underground mining methods could be used.

The corporation has employed regularly between 12 and 20 employees. The demand for pumice an aggregate constantly is increasing and the corporation currently has an order for 1,000 fifty-ton cars during the next year.

### Senator Told Indians Have Big Problem

PHOENIX, A. I., April 30 (AP)—Sen. William Langer, R., N. D., acting chairman of a U. S. senate subcommittee investigating juvenile delinquency, testified today for Palm Springs, Calif., after hearing a mass of testimony, many of it conflicting.

While many Indian leaders from Arizona reservations testified that juvenile delinquency problems could be traced to lack of economic opportunities and educational needs, as well as availability of liquor, a state official said Indian students are no more of a problem than other children.

C. L. Harkins, state superintendent of public instruction, said the Indian children attending public schools presented no problem. He advocated the federal government pay for the Indian education in public schools, and at Senator Langer's request, submitted a copy of Arizona's contract with the government for Indian education.

Senator Langer said that the San Carlos Indian reservation, said 90 per cent of the juvenile trouble on that reservation could be traced to liquor. His contention that delinquency has increased since removal of restrictions on sale of liquor to Indians was borne out by tribal representatives.

Sentator Langer was scheduled to continue hearings on the proposed "order travel" bill today at Palm Springs. This measure would curb travel of juveniles across the border into Mexico by refusing such travel without parental consent.

### Reds Won German War-Claims Reds

BERLIN, April 30 (AP)—Ten years ago today, victorious Russian soldiers splattered the Soviet flag atop the shattered Reichstag building in Berlin.

Neues Deutschland, newspaper of the ruling Communist party in East Germany observed the anniversary by charging the Western allies had provided only 4 per cent of the supplies used by Russia in her drive on Germany.

Quoting what it called official U. S. figures, Neues Deutschland also asserted that the Soviet Union had lost 7 1/2 million lives in the war against Germany, as compared to 285,000 for the U.S. and 305,707 for Britain.

The newspaper said this proved that it was the Soviet army which led the way in smashing Nazi Germany.

BINDAPORE, April 30 (AP)—The 11 U.S. fliers held as spies by Peiping are unlikely to be released soon, in the opinion of an American writer who recently interviewed Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai.

Sam A. Jaffe, who writes for the magazine "The Nation," talked with Chou during the Asian-African conference at Bandung. In an interview here, Jaffe said a "high Chinese official" told him: "Any form of reply on the American fliers would not benefit or facilitate improvement or relations between our two countries."

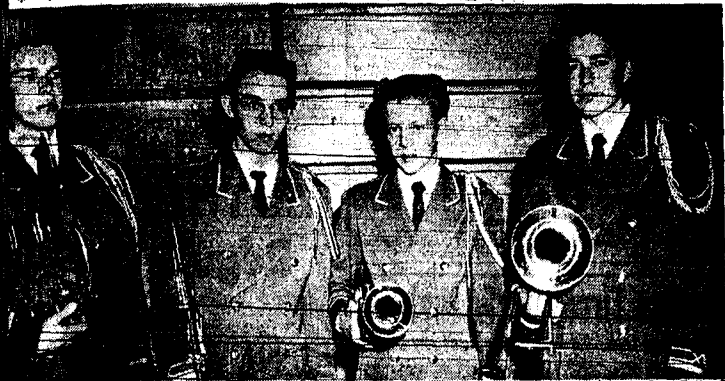

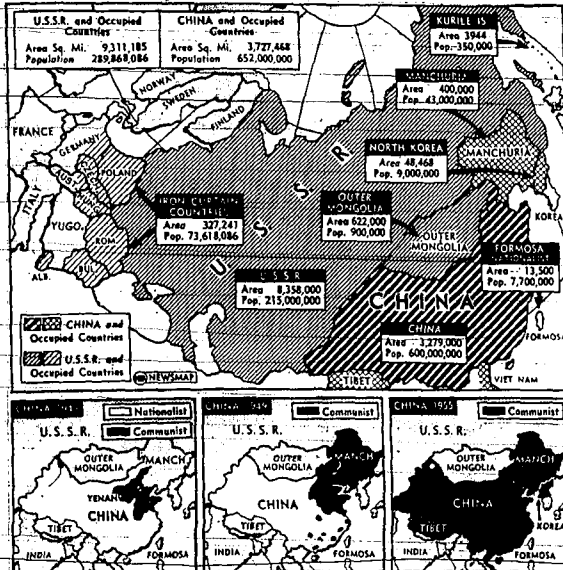

### Program Set For Farmers On Field Day

Visitors and exhibitors will be in the limelight Wednesday at the Caldwell branch experiment station of the University of Idaho. County Agent G. W. Dalrymple invites farmers of this area to attend the annual field-day beginning at 10 a.m.

Work with beef and sheep is on the morning program. Dairy experiments, including mixtures and fertilizers for pastures, will be discussed in the afternoon following lunch served at the station by the Maple-Croves-Goodwill club.

Rube Johnson, station superintendent, has arranged a program that, among other things, offers stockmen the latest word on use of silbstrud in feed. Dairy notes. Visitors also will find out the effects of delayed grain feeding on fattening steers, the best rates of concentrate and roughage for steer calves, and the gains of ram lambs from different Panama sires.

George Cleveland, assistant station superintendent, will launch the dairy division. He has four main topics, experiments in use of consolidated non-fat dry milk solids supplemented with aureomycin and Vitamin A and D for feeding calves, effect on milk production of the state of maturity of the cow, hay variety trials for grass mixtures in pastures, and the use of fertilizers on dairy pastures.

"All these things are important to many farmers in Twin Falls county," the county agent said. "It's a good chance to visit the station and pick up some useful ideas from the practical research."

Men on hand to join in the discussion and answer questions will be G. C. Anderson, Boise, extension chairman; Richard C. Ross, associate dairy husbandman; T. B. Keith, and William P. Lehrer, Jr., associate husbandmen, all Moscow.

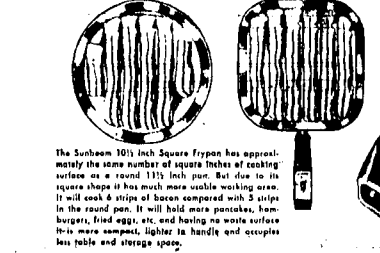

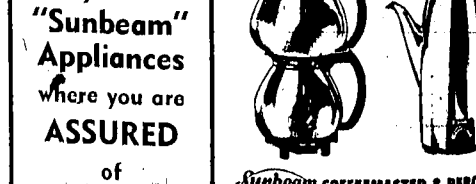

### Idaho Official Tells 2 Banks To Shut Doors

BOISE, April 30 (AP)—Plans to liquidate the assets of two north Idaho banks which have been in court litigation for more than 18 months were announced today by state Finance Commissioner R. U. Spaulding.

Spaulding said he chose their doors at the end of business today. Spaulding said the Bank of North Idaho at Pocatello and the Rathdrum State Bank had been turned over to him for liquidation at the request of the boards of directors at both banks.

**FDIC Gets Job**  
The commissioner said the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation had agreed to act as receiver or liquidator of the banks.

Spaulding said the FDIC representatives already were in the north Idaho area to begin setting up the liquidation machinery.

Spaulding took over control of the two banks Nov. 10, 1954, following lengthy court battles for control among two sets of directors.

**To Conserve Assets**  
The commissioner said he assumed the control to conserve the assets of the banks pending the ability of stockholders to make up the impairment of the capital and surplus.

"This was unable to do and the banks were notified by the Federal Deposit Insurance corporation that its insurance of deposits in both banks would terminate as of the close of business today," Spaulding said.

**Insure Deposits**  
He added he immediately moved to close the banks and turn their assets over to the federal agency. Deposits are insured up to \$10,000 by the FDIC.

Closure of the two banks was the first such action since March 22, 1953, when the Latah County State Bank at Drary closed its doors.

### Peace Is Weapon in Cold War Maneuvering All Over World

WASHINGTON, April 30 (AP)—The cold war has come out of the trenches. It has become a war of maneuvering, peace being the weapon.

Within the month the world may see the first pledge to pull back troops from the frontiers of Europe since they took up their forward positions there 10 years ago.

Secretary of State Dulles is due to meet for a peace summit on a mission that may result in the completion of an Austrian peace treaty in the immediate future.

There is peace talk by the Chinese in the far east, and there are signs that the men of Moscow would like to have more friendly personal contacts with leaders of free world nations.

Most of these events have burst upon the world in the last few weeks. They have caused much speculation as to their meaning and their future significance.

Some insist that the whole thing is a "red delusion" planned by the political magicians of Moscow to fool the world into thinking that communists are no longer a threat.

But there are pieces which fit into the pattern and which demonstrate that what has come to pass was not unexpected and is not necessarily a sudden thing.

Also they may desire to become more respectable, to disassociate themselves from ideas of subversion

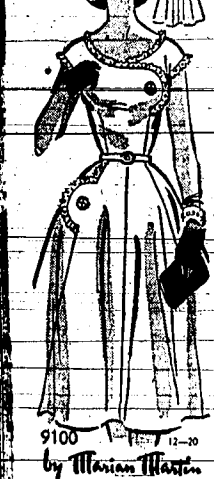

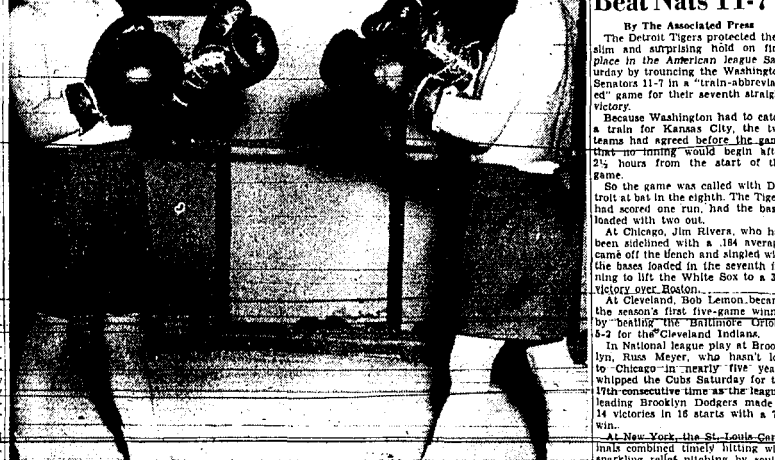
