Army Engineer Cites Aid of Hells Canyon Project as Senators' Quiz Continues

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—An army engineer said today the proposed federal Hells Canyon would provide flood control and navigation benefits in the Columbia river. Fernald, Portland, Ore., was testifying at a senate reclamation subcommittee on legislation to authorize the half-billion-dollar dam in the Snake river between Idaho and Oregon. Fernald said Hells canyon, one of about 12 projects in the army's long-range control plan for the Columbia and its tributaries, would provide 12 per cent of the reservoir space needed to keep the rivers within their banks.

With Bonneville dam operating for flood control, Fernald said, the level during the disastrous 1948 flood would have been 10 feet higher. Fernald testified before the Senate Reclamation subcommittee on the Hells Canyon project. He was asked whether engineers had found adequate substitutes for Hells canyon. Fernald said alternate sites considered in the Clearwater and Salmon rivers, tributaries of the Snake, had not met engineering standards. He said the Hells canyon dam project would block the migration of salmon and steelhead trout from the Clearwater and Salmon rivers. Congress Ponders Control Measures For Polio Vaccine

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—Measures that would provide federal control over distribution of Salk polio vaccine were introduced in both chambers of congress Tuesday. Ten senators joined with Senator Ross, N. Y., in sponsoring a senate bill to control distribution.

Prices Boost Of Cigarettes Is Predicted

BOISE, May 3 (AP)—Most Idaho vendors are expected to raise the price of cigarettes at least a penny a pack tomorrow in observance of the 1955 legislative session.

The increase boosted the state tax on cigarettes from 3 to 4 cents per pack. Some retailers questioned by the United Press indicated they would pass the increase along to consumers.

Leading chain stores and most neighborhood grocers now sell cigarettes at 21 cents per package for regular, 22 cents for king-size and 23 cents for king-size filter tips. Each of these packages is expected to go up a penny in most stores.

It also is expected that vending machine prices would be increased from 25 cents per pack as soon as they could be changed.

Some tax collector P. G. Neill said dealers will have to inventory their cigarette stocks tonight and pay a sales tax a penny for each package on hand.

He estimated that the extra penny would result in about \$400,000 of additional income from this source during the next two years. The present 3-cent tax has been earning about \$350,000 a biennium, he said.

Support Seen For Viet Nam Chief Official

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—The State Department, after wavering briefly, reportedly decided several days ago on all-out support for free Viet Nam's Premier Ngo Dinh Diem.

The French position, meanwhile, reportedly has changed. Government sources said last night in Paris that France is joining the United States in support of Diem.

Push Support Overseas

Special Ambassador J. Lawton Collins was ordered today, has been instructed to give Diem 100 per cent backing, scrapping plans which might have curbed Diem's authority. New directives were said to have been sent to Collins which are being filed in Washington.

At the same time the United States is understood to have requested both France and the Netherlands to support Diem's position.

The freshly forced policy of all-out American support grows out of Diem's apparent success in crushing an attempted rebellion by communist opponents and in rallying broad support from anti-communist groups in South Viet Nam.

Diem's economic victory apparently convinced top U. S. officials that it ought to reinforce their long-standing policy of backing him as the best qualified leader to unify and strengthen the now Indonesian state.

Senate Okays Trade Project

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—The senate today agreed to start voting tomorrow on President Eisenhower's foreign trade bill. The action might bring final passage by tomorrow night.

An agreement to curtail debate on the measure was adopted with almost no discussion.

It was offered by Majority Leader Knowland, R. Calif.

Senator Malone, R. Nev., bitter foe of the reciprocal trade program, was not present when Johnson proposed the debate limitation. One dissent could have blocked it, but it was reported Malone had agreed privately not to object.

Starting when the senate meets Wednesday, debate will be limited to two hours on each amendment, four hours on final passage.

Knowland said he expects the senate to approve Eisenhower's request for an extension of the reciprocal trade programs such as the tariff reduction program.

Senator Byrd, D. Va., floor manager of the bill, already had said most of the opposition to the program seems to have disappeared. Malone, too, conceded that there would be only a few votes against it.

A rewriting job done on the trade bill by the finance committee, which Byrd heads, appeared to have quieted much of the opposition.

The committee preserved features of the bill requested by President Eisenhower, and passed by the house. These extend the reciprocal trade programs three years and give the chief executive additional power to cut tariffs during that period by 15 per cent.

But the finance committee wrote in some additional authority for the president to curb imports if the nation is short of goods to protect an industry important to national security.

The committee preserved opposition to the measure by making changes to prevent double tariff cuts on all products involved in current trade talks with Japan.

New Bids for Elevator Plan Slated by U.S.

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—Florence A. Hill, chief of the U. S. Bureau of Reclamation, said today that the agency is making fresh start on bids for a project to build grain elevators in Pakistan.

He said the agricultural construction company, TACCO, of Los Angeles, with which the foreign operations administration (FOA) was negotiating several projects, will be barred from bidding.

Also barred, he told the senate permanent investigating subcommittee, were any firm with which either of two individuals is connected—Alfred E. Poulson, an official of the California firm, TACCO, and Robert B. Pinner, a California engineer who admitted lying to the subcommittee in one appearance.

Mr. Pinner said he had ordered all negotiations stopped and is starting over on the project with new competitors in Pakistan.

NEW YORK, May 3 (AP)—The Pulitzer prize for distinguished fiction in 1955 was awarded yesterday to William Faulkner for his "A Fable," an allegory on life in the World War I trenches of France.

The 1955 Pulitzer prize for drama was awarded to Tennessee Williams for his play, "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof."

The Columbus G. Ledger and Sunday Ledger-Enquirer was cited for its complete news coverage and fearless editorial attack of widespread corruption in Phenix City, Ala.

The 1955 award for national reporting went to Anthony Lewis of the Washington (D. C.) Daily News for a series of articles which brought about restoration to duty of Abraham Chaasnow. He had been dismissed from the navy department as a security risk.

Harrison E. Salisbury of the New York Times was awarded the 1955 prize for international reporting. The award was made on the basis of his series of stories, "Russia Re-Viewed," based on his six years as a correspondent in Russia.

Other prizes were: Editorial writing — The Detroit Free Press for an editorial by Royce Hoopes which "impartially and clearly analyzes the responsibility of both labor and management for a local union's unauthorized strike in July, 1954."

Cartoons — Daniel F. Fitzpatrick of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch for a cartoon entitled "How would another Munich policy have altered the course of the war?"

New photography — John L. Gunt, Jr., Los Angeles Times, for a picture entitled "Tragedy in the Surf."

He said the field would be ready for use as soon as the snow clears. A new field at Murphy will be completed by the end of this week, and work will begin as soon as weather permits on a field near the backwaters of the Cascade reservoir.

Construction of the airports is financed by funds collected from airplane licenses, airplane registration fees and airplane gasoline taxes.

Gas Probing Project Is Set

DENVER, May 3 (AP)—A drilling program of 14 gas wells is planned by Pacific Northwest Pipeline for the San Juan Basin in Colorado and New Mexico in the coming year.

The company has more than 460,000 acres in the basin to explore and develop.

Petroleum Information said in its weekly summary, Western oil and gas developments the company hopes to have 165 miles completed by the end of May to its 1,446-mile natural gas pipeline from the basin to the Pacific northwest. The line should be completed by 1955.

Montana highlights in the past week included new locations by Shell Oil and Atlantic Refining. Shell plans a 9,250-foot test of the Red River sand at its No. 22X-16 site in the Pennel area of Fallon county, between Cabin-creek and Little Beaver. Atlantic's wildcat is the No. 1 Horton Estate in the Wolf springs area of Yellowstone county.

An apparent gas discovery has been made by Orco Oil and Gas in Payette county, Ida. The well, No. 1 Johnson, flowed at a rate of 185,000 cubic feet. It will be drilled to 1,402 feet.

Expansion of Nuclear Ships Foreseen In 10 Years by Navy Operations Head

WASHINGTON, May 3 (AP)—The U. S. fleet will boast "a variety of types" of nuclear-powered warships within 10 years.

The navy already making "great progress" with nuclear submarines, now is "on the threshold of developing advanced atomic reactors for large surface ships."

Adm. Robert B. Carney, chief of naval operations, made those statements today to the United Press in written answers to questions. Questions were submitted following congressional criticism that the navy was "dragging its feet" in converting to nuclear propulsion and was "a little slow" in developing new weapons for the nautilus class of atomic submarines.

The criticisms came respectively from Sen. Henry M. Jackson, D., Wash., and Clinton P. Anderson, D., N. M.

Carney said President Eisenhower's plan for a nuclear powered merchant ship to roam the world in peaceful commerce "will also open the way for the application of nuclear power to military craft of comparable size and comparable speed."

The navy now has under development five different types of atomic reactors designed for both submarines and surface ships.

These officers said the Nautilus carries "all modern" weapons. But they refused to comment on whether they include missiles and atomic submarines. The Nautilus is understood to have six torpedo tubes which will fire a new type homing torpedo. However, delivery of this

projectile to the navy has been slow. Carney said there still are "knotty technical problems" but he was confident "our scientists and engineers will whip these problems" and bring about nuclear powered warships.

"No specific date can be fixed for a fleet in which nuclear power will be commonplace although, in the submarine field, we are making great progress now," Carney said.

He believed that in a decade from now there will be a variety of types of ships in the fleet operating with nuclear power.

The navy, he said, is "on the threshold of feasibility" with regard to nuclear powered ships. He called such power "one of the great significant maritime developments" and said "we must press to master it and to harness it."

The navy's spokesman did not identify the five types of atomic reactor under development. The Nautilus has a "thermal" reactor and the sister ship, Sea Wolf, now under construction, is understood to have a so-called "intermediate" reactor.

A third type is the "breeder" reactor, which produces as much fissionable material while in operation as it puts into it. The navy now may be working on an advanced type which eliminates much of the cumbersome heat exchange equipment in the heat exchange plant.

Jackson, in criticizing alleged navy slowness in shifting to atomic propulsion, said it was "regrettable" that five conventional submarines were sought in the fiscal 1955 budget. The navy said those submarines

"will not become obsolete during their normal life span." It said they were needed while nuclear-powered submarines are "still in the development stage."
