## Medical Chief Confidence Retained In Vaccine for Polio

Despite the death of two Idaho children of poliomyelitis after they had been vaccinated with the Salk vaccine, medical authorities have not lost confidence in the vaccine's eventual effectiveness.

Dr. Cecil R. Reinstein, medical director of the southern public health department, said Wednesday that the incidence of illness traceable to the vaccine is below that which was anticipated in the event live virus was present in the vaccine.

"Before the Salk vaccine was approved by the U. S. public health service, researchers estimated that in the event live virus was present, one out of 1,000 inoculated would become infected," Dr. Reinstein stated. "At that rate we should have had five cases in Magie Valley. To date we have had none."

## Senate Saves Eisenhower's Trade Project

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—The senate overwhelmingly defeated a proposal to junk President Eisenhower's trade program today, handing the administration a victory in the first floor test on the foreign trade bill.

Sen. Charles McNair, R., Nev., proposed a substitute plan that was defeated by voice vote with only one or two votes heard in its favor.

McNair, a bitter foe of the so-called trade bill, argued that the bill would increase the tariff on certain goods, which would be fixed to compensate for differences in the cost of production and foreign currencies. It would have been operated by the tariff commission.

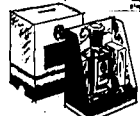

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Sen. Lyndon Johnson, D. Tex., said yesterday that the military aid to five nearby a billion dollars of new military aid to Korea, Indochina and the Chinese in Formosa.

### No Strike Is Predicted on Truck Lines

LOS ANGELES, May 4 (AP)—A possible strike of 25,000 freight truck drivers in 11 western states won't occur this week, a union official said yesterday.

"We are still hoping that we can negotiate a contract," added Frank Brewster, president of the Western Conference of Teamsters, AFL.

About 30 representatives of teamsters met in a closed session here today to discuss expired contracts with the trucking groups.

"This is the first time in history that the employers have balked at an agreement," Brewster told a reporter. "This would be the first industry strike, if that is necessary. We are hopeful that the trucking industry will name a committee with which we can work around the clock."

Brewster said the teamsters intend to protect the public. He said a strike, if called, would not affect food or milk or defense truck movements.

Contracts on long hauling expired Sunday, and contracts covering coastwise and local freight drivers are expiring this month.

The teamster talks here followed sessions in Salt Lake City and San Francisco. Brewster said he will leave for Chicago tonight to continue discussions with truckers there.

A truck industry spokesman said the union seeks pay raises of 10 to 20 cents an hour over the prevailing rate of \$2.14 an hour for line drivers.

A U. S. conciliation official said he had met with the union and negotiations were deadlocked and no basis was in sight for their resumption.

### Official "Grown in Idaho" Trademark Already Being Used for Idaho Spuds

BOISE, May 4—The official "Grown in Idaho" trademark adopted by the Idaho advertising commission recently and use of which Idaho growers becomes mandatory beginning July 1, is already being used by several Idaho shippers to identify their current crop, says Lew Heller, commission secretary.

"The design is copyrighted and U. S. trademark registration is being made through the attorney general's office," Heller said.

Regulations governing the use of the trademark have been mailed to all Idaho shippers and to known manufacturers of potato containers. Regulations stipulate that the trademark be not less than seven inches in diameter when used on the front of each container, not less than four inches from the top but above the middle on containers of 50 or more pounds, and "plainly visible" on the front of lesser containers. Also required on all potato containers are the words "Packed in Idaho" followed by the name and address of the shipper.

The same regulation also prohibits the use of the name of any state or geographical region other than Idaho.

Idaho growers and shippers are given until July 1, 1956, to use up existing supplies of containers that may not conform to the new trademark regulation.

Permits for the use of the "Grown in Idaho" trademark will be granted to out-of-state receivers who re-pack Idaho potatoes in their own containers, provided that the name and address of the re-packer also is used and other provisions to be outlined by agreement are observed.

The increase in production of Russet potatoes outside of Idaho in recent years has resulted in widespread trading on Idaho's name and reputation for quality potatoes by unscrupulous distributors.

"The trademark will help Mrs. Housewife identify Idaho's grocery stores and market and will assist in curbing misbranding and misrepresentation of other potatoes as Idaho's."

VIENNA, Austria, May 4 (AP)—Russia yesterday was reported demanding withdrawal of all occupation troops from Austria by Dec. 31 whether an Austrian state treaty has been signed or not.

Diplomatic sources said U. S., British and French envoys attending the five-nation conference to complete a treaty settlement did not immediately accept Russia's surprise proposal.

Austria, "also taking part in the talks, was said to have agreed to the Soviet move."

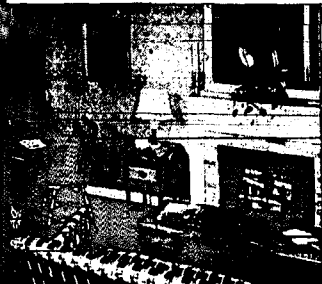

### New Era Looms for European History As German Sovereignty Draws Closer

A new period in European history will open tomorrow when the Federal Republic of Germany becomes a sovereign nation.

West Germany, as it is called, will become an ally of the United States and the other members of the north Atlantic treaty organization.

It will start to raise an army of 400,000 men, an air force of 80,000 men and a navy of 20,000 men.

Russia will have suffered a momentous defeat in the cold war.

At the same time, West Germany's allies—Britain, France, Belgium, the Netherlands, Luxembourg, and the United States—will be strictly limited by treaty.

But so was the settlement of the west between the two world wars. Adolf Hitler just tore up the treaty.

For the present, however, and for the foreseeable future, Soviet Russia is the threat.

Every step which West Germany takes in the process of rearmament will make the danger of a third world war more remote.

Russia has shown how deeply it fears West German rearmament.

It fought every step of the long, painful process of writing and ratifying the rearmament and accompanying treaties.

It has denounced its treaties of alliance with Great Britain and France.

It is about to form a joint military command with the European satellites as a rearmament to the north Atlantic treaty organization.

At the same time, the Kremlin is now trying a new tack—the treaty to restore to Austria the sovereignty it lost when Hitler seized it in 1938.

Russia's sole reason for even thinking of concluding an Austrian treaty is the hope that it will sabotage German rearmament.

If an Austrian treaty is signed, Russian occupation troops will leave. The Kremlin's idea would be to use the treaty as bait, luring West Germans that the red army would leave East Germany, and the country could be unified, if only the federal republic turned its back on the west.

### Would Hurt Invasion Plans, Nationalists Believe

United Press — Improve with age. To maintain an army, the leaven of youth is needed. The communists now have China's vast reservoir of manpower to draw upon. Chiang has only the eight million population of Formosa. And the unpleasant prospect that the Formosans show no eagerness to fight for a crusade to retake China. They just want to be let alone.

In these circumstances the nationalists are bitter over the possibility of a cease-fire.

Dispatches from Taipei, the Formosan capital, tell of a blast of criticism of the United States that appeared in local nationalist newspapers.

The trend of events seems to reveal that it would be better to have a bitter enemy of Uncle Sam rather

than a faithful ally," one newspaper said.

"It is a pity that the leading tendency is again preferring surrender of principles to victory on the battlefield," another said.

Chiang's own situation is becoming more complicated as time passes. Chiang's one aim in life is to lead an army back to the mainland. He is confident that once he and his people would rise against the Reds. He feels that every day which sees his army still idle is a day lost.

It is no wonder that Chiang wants no cease-fire. As he sees it, a cease-fire could only help the communists. The argument that a cease-fire would reduce far eastern tension makes no appeal to him.

Chiang has been fighting the communists most of the time since 1927. In that year, when President Eisenhower was an army major, Chiang as the nationalist leader of China broke with the left wing of

his Kuomintang party. He started a mass purge of communists, and fighting started.

Chiang fought the Reds for 10 years until, in 1937, the Japanese invaded China. The anti-Red fight was renewed at the end of World War II, and an open civil war exploded in 1947.

Now, five and one-half years after his withdrawal to Formosa, Chiang still feels that his chance of leading his army back home may soon become dimmer. He is now 67, and like his soldiers he is getting no younger.



### Official Urges National Plan In Water Use

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Assistant Secretary of Agriculture Edwin I. Peterson said yesterday the United States needs a nationwide water policy and resources policy under which private interests, and local, state and federal governments can all work in harmony and accord.

Any federal activity and any national water policy "must honor fully the rights of any user" which is granted by a state law, he said, and it also must "recognize the authority of the states to control and regulate the use, appropriation and distribution of water within their geographic boundaries."

Finally, a framework policy must "provide the framework within which the states can resolve conflicts arising between themselves for the use of water," he said.

Peterson spoke at a water supply session of the U. S. Chamber of Commerce 4th annual conference on water resources committee appointed by President Eisenhower is now working on a national water resources policy.

He said there is "more water storage capacity in the ground than in all man-made reservoirs" and cited the need for all forms of water to be "brought under sound management, both in the interest of the maximum yield of water products and in the interest of water conservation." The country also must continue to move ahead with construction of man-made water storage and distribution facilities, he said.

At the same session, Harry E. Jordan, secretary of the American water works association, said personal demands for water are expected to increase by two-thirds during the 25 years from 1950 to 1975.

He said future needs, plus deficiencies which already exist, require the spending of some \$500,000,000 a year for water works construction during the next ten years, and not less than \$200,000,000 a year for the ten years following.

### Aide Attacks Press in U. S. Trust Actions

WASHINGTON, May 4 (AP)—Assistant Attorney General Stanley Barnes said yesterday that recent press attacks in the U. S. against the government effort to regulate a fair settlement of its pending anti-trust suit against the nation's largest publishing and advertising associations.

Barnes said recent public pronouncements by counsel for the American Newspaper Publishers Association (ANPA) and the American Association of Advertising Agencies had "sought to distort the government's efforts" and had "feared the government's aim to reach a consent settlement."

For this reason, Barnes said, the government will file suit against the ANPA, the advertising group and four other media trade associations in the southern district of New York "within the next several days."

He said the government would "cooperate" in every way to bring the matter to trial at the earliest possible moment.

Barnes made the statement before a senate judiciary subcommittee.

The government's intention to file suit against the trade associations was first revealed last week at the New York convention of the ANPA. Attorney General Herbert Brownell, Jr. later confirmed that the government had drafted a complaint charging them with violating anti-trust laws through alleged price fixing, restraint of trade and the operation of a "recognition system."

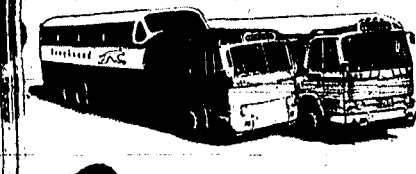

**Good (Damp) Year Looms for Operators of Diaper Service**

NEW YORK, May 4 (AP)—Diaper service operators, assembled for the 10th annual convention of their infant industry, had good news from their vital statistics department today—it looks like 1955 will be a very wet year.  
 The birth rate is the only statistic vital to diaper laundrymen, and prospects are that nearly 4,500,000 babies will now in as 11.5 citizens and potential customers this year. That's almost 100,000 more than 1954.  
 The convention of the Diaper Service Institute of America has drawn more than 300 delegates to the Hotel Statler for four days of child-chat on what's new in rime formulas and water softeners and anti-bacteric techniques.  
 Robert Mandel, president of the DSEA and head of a diaper service that helps 7,000 babies on Long Island through these changing times, took time out to measure 10 years of growth in the industry.  
 "The first convention was just a handful of men in a Chicago hotel room in 1946. We have a \$15,000,000 a year industry now, and if people keep having babies we'll continue to grow," he said.  
 Although the first diaper service started about 20 years ago, it was not until World War II that the idea seemed to catch on. After the war, the government encouraged veterans to get into the business as a venture which required comparatively small capital.  
 There now are about 400 diaper services around the country keeping 400,000 babies supplied with up to 100 clean diapers a week. Some of them make deliveries in a 100-mile radius on schedules that are as important to mothers as the daily milk delivery.

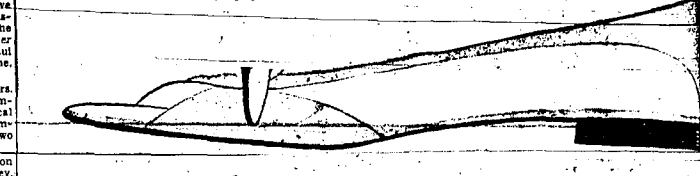

### Rainmaker to Have Bumper Year in 1955

WASHINGTON, May 4.—This may be the rainmaker's biggest experimental year, an official of the U. S. Advisory Committee on Weather Control said today.

Charles Gardner, executive secretary of the committee, said cloud seeding experiments probably will be carried out over a larger area than ever before.

The previous record year was 1951 when tests covered an area 12 or 13 times larger than was covered by irrigation at that time. About 95 million acres, or more than 4,000 square miles, was under irrigation in 1951.

Gardner said interest in artificial rain-inducing experiments appeared to drop some extent after 1951 but is picking up again now.

He said competent meteorologists don't claim actually to "make" rain, but attempt rather to increase the amount of potential rainfall.

The advisory committee is now attempting to evaluate how effective its dry ice and silver iodide cloud seeding has been. It expects to have some pretty good answers by June 30, 1955.

The committee does not itself conduct tests. But all "rainmakers" and "rain increasers" are required to submit detailed data to the committee for study.

Gardner said there are four commercial firms carrying on several operations simultaneously, 20 carrying on at least one operation, and others operating individually or in cooperative ventures.

One man said he could protect the entire nation against drought by converting ocean water into a spray, just as an automobile carburetor converts gasoline. The spray would be shot 1,000 to 20,000 feet into the air, depending on rain-cloud and air-current levels, to fall as rain on arid lands.

Another would pipe water from the Mississippi and Missouri rivers and Lake Michigan to drought areas. It would be expensive, he said, but not as costly as loss of the land.

It also has been suggested that the army corps of engineers cut enormous ditches through the Rocky mountains from west to east to channel moisture from the coast to states east of the mountains.

A major test committee he knew how to divert the gulf stream from its normal course northward from the Gulf of Mexico along the Atlantic coast and then east to Europe. But he decided not to reveal how to do it, Gardner said, "for fear that we might put it to some evil purpose."

LOS ANGELES, May 4.—The animal regulation department made its "Be Kind to Animals week" announcement today that 18,001 persons were bitten in Los Angeles last year by dogs, cats, raccoons, skunks, rodents, birds, and a privacy-loving gopher.

There was good reason for the timing of the announcement. The department estimates 95 per cent of the nippings were provoked by the victims.

Dogs topped the nip-list with 14,887 bites and cats were second at 1,092. Hamsters took a surprise third place with 81 victims, followed by rats, rabbits, monkeys, mice, horses, squirrels, gophers, chipmunks, guinea pigs, raccoons and a few skunks.
