Atomic Blast Hits Model U.S. Town

CITY, Nev., May 5 (AP)—The flaming, roaring atomic bomb struck today at this model civil defense workers training ground in a test of the survival ability of a typical American town.

Spectacular burst jolted the test site half a hundred yards from ground zero, and shells and clanked forward after absorbing the weight of a bomb half again as potent as those which leveled Hiroshima and Nagasaki. Dust clouds kicked up by the tremendous pre-dawn explosion obscured what happened to this model test town on Yucca flat. But no doubt devastation was wrought along Doomsday Drive, until 4,700 feet from blast tower, which was vaporized.

Although the jolting shock wave was greater than in any previous test here, there were reports of injury among the tanker crews of observers in trenches 2,500 and 3,000 yards from the blast. The blast was seen throughout and as far north as Oregon and Idaho, more than 800 miles away.

Women in Trench
Six civil defense women in a trench two miles from ground zero were awed, excited and some were a bit frightened.

At the last moment it was decided to include with the group Mrs. Lydia Rusk, Silver Spring, Md.

Only some 2,000 observers and firefighters were here for the fiery spectacle. About 5,800 were on hand 10 days ago when the big "operation cutback" was being tested.

The remaining observers and participants agreed that the show was well worth it.

Exercises Planned
Citizens will participate in civil defense drills here for the first time. The drills will include, rescue work, fire control, surveying structural damage and other phases of civil defense.

Survival Town consists of two "main streets." One is 4,700 yards from ground zero, the other is 2,500 yards. The buildings are of concrete block and solid concrete.

Director Val Peterson of the federal civil defense administration, who viewed the test from a distance, said the test was a "very profitable experience for all civilian defense people."

Yanks Not Best Fed in World, Say Nation's Worried Savants

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—Medical scientists devoted to the nutritional approach to health would like every American to know the nature of proteins at least as well as he knows the color of the new cars.

Some of them are frankly alarmed for the future because of protein, but what can be done about it when Americans think one protein is as good as another?

Because they don't know, Americans are kidding themselves when they think they're the best fed people on earth, according to Dr. William Coda Martin, of the New York Medical college.

He spoke out forcefully at a recent meeting of the American Academy of Nutrition because the protein content of wheat and corn...

Animal bodies, human, bovine or whatever, do not make protein—they merely remake the protein structure which is first put together by plant life, he said.

The plants take the chemical parts of proteins out of the soil, and such elements as calcium in fair amounts, and add traces of such minerals as magnesium, manganese, copper, boron, zinc, and Molybdenum.

A man eats these plants and his body breaks down the protein into their many parts and puts the parts together into man-protein. Or the man eats the cow which had eaten the plants and whose body had...

Pravda Flays Lag in Output For Agencies

MOSCOW, May 5 (AP)—Pravda delivered a severe criticism of the government and Communist party organization in a markedly critical mood, devoted nearly a quarter of its morning's edition to condemning inefficiency on farms, in industry and in government.

Long-Pursued Prize Arrives For Adenauer

BONN, Germany, May 5 (AP) — Thursday Konrad Adenauer wins the glittering prize he has pursued for six years—sovereignty for Germany, with equality in the family of nations.

It will be a day of congratulations and official ceremonies and reminiscing for Adenauer. He can consider the six years that calve him from obscurity one of the free world's outstanding statements.

Go back to May 5, 1949. Adenauer was 43 years old. He had served as mayor of Cologne but appeared to have no future in German politics. Four months later, however, he appeared political position into power and became the first chancellor of the West German Republic. A Roman Catholic, he attracted Catholics and Protestants into the nation's leading political party, the Christian Democratic Union, guided West Germany to economic recovery from war's ravages.

Today Germany is a powerful nation with 50 million in the West. Democratic governments in Europe and Adenauer is its undisputed leader.

The lion-killed Rhineland has outlasted many of his contemporaries in the struggle to link West Germany's 50 million in the Western world's alignment against communism.

When it started, Harry Truman was president, Winston Churchill secretary of state, Clement Attlee was prime minister of Britain, Ernest Bevin the foreign secretary, George Marshall was Czech premier, Robert Schuman foreign minister.

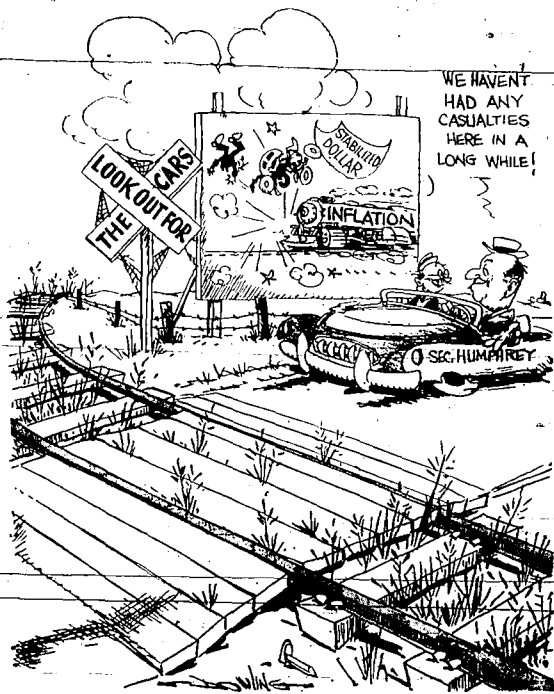
Nine months ago his cherished aim featured near disaster when France jettisoned the project for a European defense community (EDCO) to include West Germany. Some German politicians hastily declared, "this finishes Adenauer." Two months later, however, he returned with pledges of sovereignty and membership in the Atlantic Alliance and a West European union (WEU).

All this is becoming a reality this month. Today is the day for the signing of a treaty.

With a nuclear deterrent two years away, Adenauer has no intention of giving up Germany's leadership. He is charting his last unification of this divided nation, now steps toward European unity, membership in a building of a new German army. He tells his people:

"The fact that we are now assured of the support of the NATO powers is a pledge of the eventual success of our labors for a free and undivided Germany. We shall never cease to strive for the unity of Europe. We must continue to champion European unity on grounds of self-preservation."

Survey Shows People Think Future Good

PORTLAND, May 5—Another factor pointing to a bright future for the country has come to light in a statement by the Northwest office of the National Association of Manufacturers.

The NAM, in releasing results today of a study on public opinion, states that the future looks bright because people think the future looks bright.

The NAM study reveals that today 50 per cent of persons polled in the survey expect "good times." Last year only 43 per cent expected good times.

This year, only 12 per cent expected "bad times," compared to 25 per cent who had a gloomy outlook last year.

In both surveys, the NAM pointed out, a substantial number of consumers gave answers which could not be classified as either definitely optimistic or definitely pessimistic.

"In the field of economic affairs," the NAM said, "what people expect to happen is a highly important influence on what does happen."

The NAM went on to explain: "For instance, people fearing a depression will draw their money out of banks, causing a 'scare,' thus actually causing a depression.

"On the other hand, people optimistic about the country's economy will invest strongly in American business, creating more and larger industries, creating more jobs and products... thus creating prosperity through their optimism."

Probable explanation of the optimism can be found in a consideration of various economic factors today compared to a year ago, the NAM states, citing the following:

Total economic activity showed a 2 per cent upturn in fourth quarter 1954. Manufacturers' sales in February were the best in over a year, and exceeded January, 1954, sales by 4 per cent.

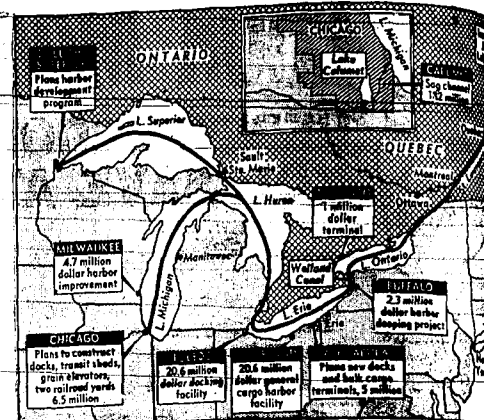
Physical production of industry in February went up 2 points on the federal reserve index to a level of 8 per cent ahead of a year earlier. It has recovered to 98 per cent of the peak month of 1953.

Hourly wages in manufacturing went up another cent in February to an average of \$1.85—5 cents above February, 1954. Industrial prices have gone up 1 per cent since last October.

Total personal income in January was 2 per cent above January, 1954, bringing it slightly above the 1953 peak. Total employment in non-farm jobs was about half a million above February, 1954.

'Live Virus' Scientists Keep Hunting Despite Proven Vaccine of Dr. Salk

By DELOS SMITH, United Press Science Editor

NEW YORK, May 5 (AP)—Despite the statistically proven success of the Salk "killed-virus" vaccine against polio, scientific advocates of a "live virus" vaccine have by no means given up their search.

Dr. Albert B. Sabin, of the University of Cincinnati, a leading "live virus" scientist, indicated this group's continuing lack of faith in the "killed virus" approach to immunizing human beings against polio.

He described to the annual meeting of the American Association of Physicians in Atlantic City some of the results of his experiments with a "live virus" vaccine in 28 inmates volunteers at the Federal reformatory at Chillicothe, Ohio, which had been previously reported by the United Press.

The volunteers swallowed his "live" viruses in milk. All developed antibodies against the viruses, yet none developed any sign of illness. Dr. Sabin continued, "what happened in the vast majority of 'natural' immunizations—weak, but 'live' viruses invaded the body, caused no illness, but bestowed life-long immunity."

Dr. Sabin described his experiments with the vaccine as a lecture to the Phi Lambda Kappa fraternity at New York university today.

It is a fact that non-virulent strains of polio viruses circulate in nature. Otherwise there wouldn't be so very many people who have polio virus antibodies in their blood chemistry without ever having been ill with polio.

Dr. Sabin is working with "attenuated" or mutant "live" viruses, seeking such non-virulent strains which can be deposited upon to remain non-virulent. An "attenuated" virus is one which has been so weakened, usually by repeated "passages" through laboratory animals and test tube cultures, that it no longer causes disease.

This weakening depends upon a natural phenomenon called mutation. When some of the offspring of a virulent virus are unlike their

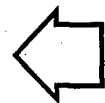

Lewis Is Said Mystery Man Of U.S. Labor

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—John L. Lewis is the mysterious man behind the American labor, standing on the sidelines while the AFL and CIO push forward with plans to merge their 45 million members into one giant federation.

The shaggy-browed chief of the United Mine Workers of America remains uncommitted and enigmatic. He declines to give a hint as to whether he will eventually make peace with the AFL-CIO chiefs and give organized labor virtually a solid front in pushing for expansion and political power.

But there are signs aplenty that Lewis doesn't intend—at least for the present—to join forces with the American Federation of Labor and the Congress of Industrial Organizations. Thus his ranks will not be closed completely in unity even with the AFL-CIO merger expected in December.

The best hint as to Lewis' thinking comes from his old friend and longtime lieutenant, Thomas Kennedy, UMWA vice president, whose statements usually can be taken as an accurate reflection of Lewis' own views.

Kennedy said in reply to a list of questions that organized labor could join the present membership of 45 million (this includes the AFL, CIO and Independents) to more than 20 million under certain conditions.

Then he added: "These conditions would include, first, a unified labor movement with a militant leadership that is capable of mobilizing up for labor-rights and with the ability to see beyond the end of a Silicon wrench."

The question is inescapable that Kennedy doesn't think that kind of leadership will be present in George Meany, AFL president, who will head the merger and with whom Lewis has been at odds for years.

Kennedy had no comment when asked if he could foresee a time when the miners would join the merger "under what conditions such a move might be made."

Kennedy indicated that Lewis and the UMWA believe the AFL and CIO are moving too deeply into politics before consolidating their strength by an organizing drive.

"In this score, Kennedy said: "The American labor movement now and always has been essentially an economic movement in contrast to the European movement which has been basically a political movement."

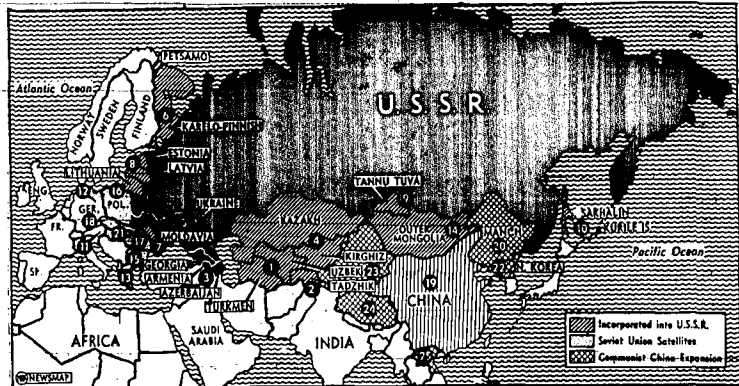
The UMWA foresees the greatest advances for labor to be gained through organizing the unorganized. It would appear obvious that if Lewis and there are approximately 60 million Americans in the work force and only 18 million of them belong to unions, that organized labor still has a tremendous job of organizing to do.

"It stands to reason that political action is not the first job of organized labor but is secondary to the basic job of organizing the unorganized."

Life With FDR Is Discussed In Interview Of Former Aide

WASHINGTON, May 5 (AP)—Grace Tully knew the late Franklin Delano Roosevelt almost as well as a member of the family.

During the four years Mr. Roosevelt was governor of New York and all of his years as President, 1932 to 1945, she was his private secretary.

She likes to tell the story, never published until the time her boss received a shipment of oysters from New York.

"There was a rule in the White House then, and there is still, I suppose, that everything that the President ate had to be looked over for bugs and other things that might do him in."

Mr. Roosevelt demanded that he have a few bites of the oysters without delay. He was told that, according to the White House grounds rules, the delay might run into considerable time.

"The boss," Grace told me during an interview, "was in something resembling a rage. He commanded that Harry Hopkins, his assistant, should do up the four boxes of oysters in the White House and sample the oysters."

"I want some—right now," Mr. Roosevelt told her.

FDR was a firm man, one to be obeyed, without delay.

"Grace," she told me, "you and Harry try those oysters on for misery. If you are still alive in two hours, I want a big bowl of oysters on the half-shell, and another big silver bowl of oyster stew and dessert. And keep some back for 'bec' on both orders."

Grace and Harry Hopkins survived the ordeal, and Mr. Roosevelt got a tummy full of one of his favorite dishes.

But mostly this is a story about the lovely little white-haired lady named Grace Tully, who has served the Democratic party well for more years than she would like to admit. She once worked for Averell Harriman, now the governor of New York. Presently she is executive assistant to Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson, Texas (the ward of the Democratic party committee).

"It is fun working with the senator," she said. "All of the Democratic leaders are so considerate and cooperative."

I asked her truthfully how she would compare Roosevelt with Mr. Eisenhower when it comes to press conferences.

Prepared by Kenneth E. Kall, Twin Falls high school dean of boys, the report indicates most boys in the graduating class plan to continue their education than expect to enter some sort of business or industrial work after graduation, the report states, two-thirds have jobs waiting for them.

In January, the report noted, every senior boy was given a battery of differential aptitude tests published by the Psychological Corporation of New York. 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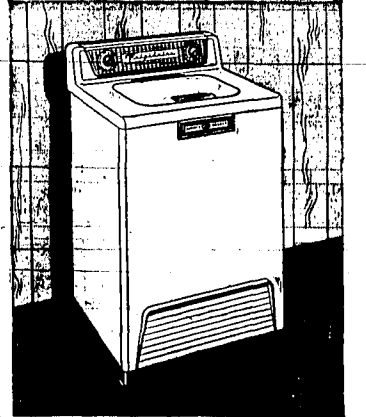

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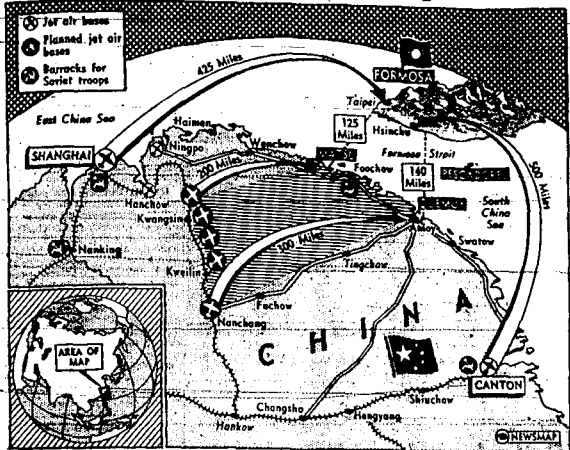

End Noted in Allied Force 'Gravy Train'

BONN, Germany, May 5 (AP)—West Germany joined the ranks of independent nations today, and a big economy aid swing down on U. S. forces that have occupied this country for 16 years with British and French troops. The big change comes automatically as soon as British and French high commissioners depart countries ratifying treaties restoring sovereignty and permitting allied troops to remain only as defense forces. The United States and Germany already have taken this step. 'Now the gravy train has come to the end of the line,' commented one veteran of the occupation. 'This is what it will mean for the Allied forces.'

Strict economy is the order of the day. No more parties on the sabbath for allied high-ups. The allies' dependents already have lost numbers of their domestic servants. Allied troops in general will be required to observe German law. Military offenses will still be tried by courts-martial, but the soldiers will be liable to civil suits in connection with roadblocks and similar matters. The soldiers also can be sued for maintenance of illegitimate children born after 1945. They previously were immune from such suits, although there were 100,000 such children. The soldiers will be able to keep their most valuable privileges—the right to buy customs-free goods in the weekend's stores. The new continued access to cheap cigarettes, coffee, tea, liquor and other luxuries at prices far below German costs. But rations on some of these items have been cut on German request. On the whole, American-British-French and Belgian forces have been told to lead much more austere lives. They will serve as defense forces under NATO's terms, which will need money for new airfields and other vital requirements.

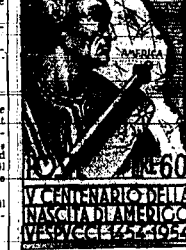

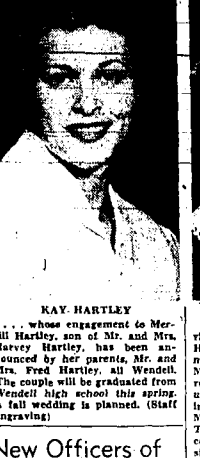

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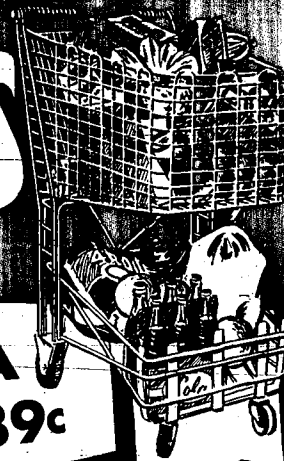

The progress of the AG Food Markets may be found in the illustration above. At the top is the wholesale warehouse used by the organization—Associated Food Stores, Inc.—in the early days of its beginning, 1940. The lower illustration is a modern warehouse and office building of Associated Food Stores, Inc. Not as many stores will be featuring fried chickens this week as a week ago, but prices generally will be the same or a trifle lower. Meat men consider them a fine buy.

If you're looking for something else for Sunday dinner, however, you'll find the choice is wide. A number of markets, with an eye to Mother's day this Sunday, will be offering small turkeys and smoked hams at lower prices. There'll be a good number of specialties on prime ribs and legs of lamb, too.

Eggs continue to be a good buy. One chain is lowering prices by a penny or two a dozen in some of its markets.

The department of agriculture sees a small increase in the next few months in the general level of retail food prices. It says recent frosts and wind damage to fruits and vegetables and strong consumer demand will be major factors in the rise.

Among vegetables the best value this week may be found in spinach, iceberg lettuce and nearby vegetables, including radishes, green onions, leeks, kalamintz, etc.

Old crop potatoes are a good buy. New crop spuds haven't come to market in big volume yet, but supplies are increasing and prices are a little lower than last week.
