

Specials Hint Vetoes for Subsidy

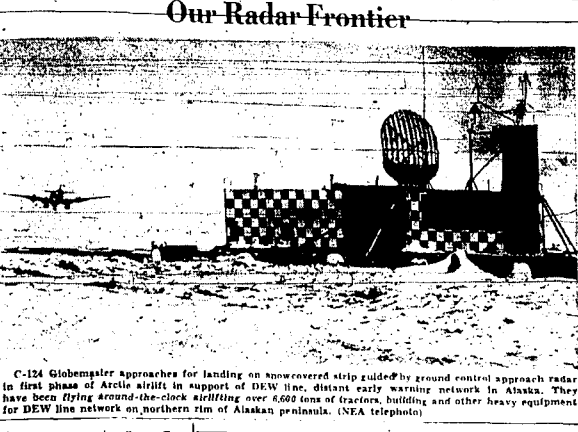

This is not the customary treatment for a congressman returning from an overseas trip, he said.

Powell charged that this country's initial rejection of Red Chinese Premier Chou En-lai's offer to negotiate a Formosa cease fire forestalled a chance for an early peaceful settlement of the Formosa dispute.

U. S. Navy Chief Talks to Chiang

TAIPEI, Formosa, May 9 (AP)—Adm. Felix B. Stump, U. S. naval commander in the Pacific, arrived unexpectedly today and scheduled a meeting with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

Stump held long talks immediately after his arrival with American Ambassador Karl Rankin and Vice Adm. Alfred M. Pride, commander of the U. S. seventh fleet, on the airplane situation in the Formosa Strait.

Pride on Saturday paid a six-hour visit to Quemoy island which came under sharp communist artillery fire last week. He inspected the defenses and conferred with Gen. Liu Lien-chi, the garrison commander.

Stump was scheduled to confer with Chiang at the presidential mansion near Taipei tonight. Official quarters refused to comment on the reasons for Stump's unannounced and completely unexpected visit.

UAW Officials Gather to Plan Moves in Talk

DETROIT, May 9 (AP)—CIO United Auto Workers officials from across the nation met here today to plan future moves in the union's guaranteed annual wage negotiations with General Motors corporation and Ford Motor company.

Representatives of all union employees of the two automotive giants met separately with negotiating teams which represented them in talks with the companies on the controversial wage issue.

Union spokesmen said the meetings were called to give a detailed report on what has happened at negotiations and to discuss and formulate a strategy for the future.

Observers said the future plans may include instructions to prepare for strike votes when the delegates return to their home locals.

Strike vote machinery usually is set up so the union can be ready to call a walkout at any time after the contract expires.

The union's five-year contract with Ford expires June 1. A similar pact with GM runs out June 7.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON—Leaders of organized labor have taken a "new look" at Dwight D. Eisenhower, and they begin to believe that they can "coexist" with the president. It is a change of heart that should be shown to the people who are now his predecessors. They now admit that they had been unexpectedly fair and friendly to the president. The fact that they are now coexisting is the result of the American Federation of Labor and the Congress of Industrial Organizations into a single organization would operate to the political advantage. According to plans, George L. Meany, AFL president, will head the new group, Walter Reuther, UAW boss, will be second in command.

Under this dual control, Meany and Reuther, managing trade union problems, while Reuther will be the political operator and propagandist. He will seek to mobilize the unions into a "ballot-box" force, as he has done as head of the Automobile Workers. Political flamboyance is his forte.

He obviously ran well with the workers three years ago, and he can not have swept so many great industrial cities and states.

In seeking to convince him that he must stand for republicanism, GOPers will use this argument. No other Republican likes such an appeal to men in overall.

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LOW-INCOME FARM PROBLEMS

The most important background fact on President Eisenhower's latest request to congress for aid to low-income farmers is where they are and what's what.

The President's special message gave only the general total that one-fourth of America's farm families have cash incomes of less than \$1,000 a year. A special study submitted by Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Tamm-Benson spelled this out in more specific terms.

The figures are taken from the 1950 census of agriculture and are already five years out of date. But they show that out of the country's 3,520,000 farm families, 1,513,000 have cash income of less than \$1,000.

They are most concentrated in about 1,000 of the 3,650 U. S. counties. More than half of the farmers are dependent on the income from small, poor farms.

This makes the first approach a regional matter in these areas:

- The Cascade and Rocky mountain areas of western Washington, Oregon and Montana.
- The mountainous Indian country of north-west New Mexico.
- Cutover timberland of northern Michigan and Minnesota.
- The Appalachian areas of Pennsylvania, West Virginia, Virginia, Kentucky, Tennessee and the hill country of southern Ohio, Indiana and Illinois.

Then broadly the entire southeastern United States, stretching from eastern Oklahoma, Texas and southern Missouri to the Atlantic coast, taking in southern and western Carolina and northern Florida.

One-fourth of the farmers in these areas are white. The average education is less than seven years and only one out of ten is a high school graduate.

The average farm in these problem areas is only 40 acres, compared to the 120 average elsewhere in the nation. Only one farm in three has a tractor. Eighty per cent of the sharecroppers are in these areas.

Nine-tenths of the farms in these low-income areas have sales of less than \$2,500 a year and the average value of land and buildings is less than \$9,000.

Except in the Mississippi delta and the Piedmont coastal plains, most of the land is hilly, eroded and poor.

County agents, farm research, conservation, modern farming methods and farm credit have not reached here.

This is, of course, no new problem. From the days of the depression through World War II, the old resettlement and farm security administrations tackled it. When they were damned out of existence as "red," FFA—farm home administration—look over.

During the past 20 years the three agencies have lent over 500 million dollars to help 80,000 small farmers buy or improve family-sized farms. About half has been repaid.

Since 1948, FFA has lent about 750 million dollars to some 600,000 small farmers, for equipment, livestock, feed and operating expenses. Two-thirds of this has been repaid.

So far this year, FFA has lent 128 million dollars to 69,000 farmers for operating expenses. FFA has also lent or insured 27 million dollars to 3,800 small farmers for land purchase. Approximately 125,000 small farmers are now using government credit supplied by the agency.

These figures indicate that there has been some improvement in the low-income situation. In 1930 it was estimated that about a third of the 6,289,000 U. S. farm families, or 2,100,000 of them, had income below \$1,000. Today the total number of farms has dropped by a million and the proportion of small, low-income farms is down to a fourth.

Part of this decline represents abandonment of uneconomic farms and migration of farm workers to the cities.

Another factor that must be considered in the change is that the value of the dollar is now half of what it was.

One word of caution that has developed in the past 25 years is that the number of part-time farmers and city workers who merely live in the country, but don't try to farm, has risen from a million to over a million and a half.

In addition to supplying 30 million dollars more credit, more vocational education and more extension services to all low income farmers, the Eisenhower program calls for exploring the possibilities of finding more employment for them off the farm, to take their standard of living.

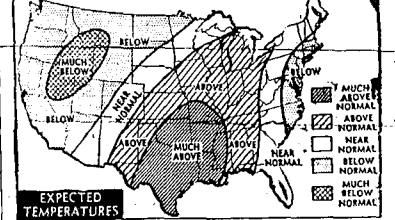

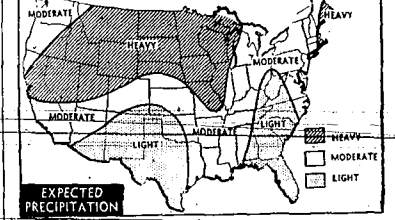

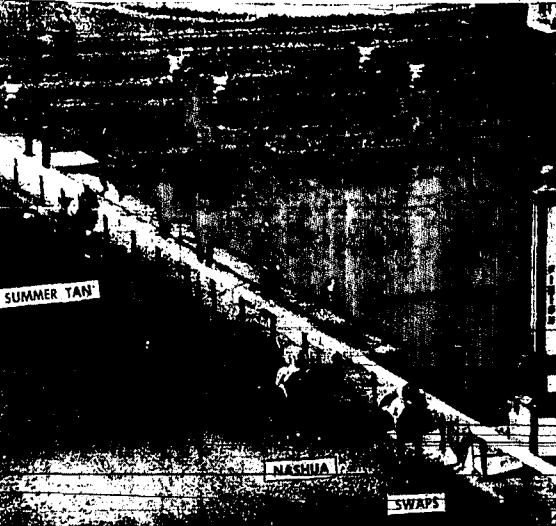

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India Diplomat Thinks Fliers Can Be Freed

TOKYO, May 9 (AP)—Indian diplomat V. K. Krishna Menon said today he believed Communist China would release the American airmen it is holding on "spy" charges but said he had not been asked by the United States to take up this problem with Peking.

Krishna Menon, Indian representative to the United Nations and close adviser to Prime Minister Jawahar Lal Nehru, landed here today when bad weather at Hong Kong forced an 1,800-mile detour. He was to have begun talks with Red Premier Chou En-Lai today.

He told 20 newsmen in the Indian chancery he was not going to Peking to discuss any "particular prescription" for easing world tensions. It was generally believed his mission might bring about release of the fliers and set up U. S.-Communist talks on Formosa.

Asked about the possibility of early release of the American airmen he said "there is no reason to think that with negotiations something couldn't be done." But he added the United States "has asked no country to take this problem up."

Asked if he believed Chou would call for direct talks with the United States on Formosa, he replied, "I wouldn't think anything else. The United States and China and the United States could not resolve that problem."

Answers Query
Asked if he would recommend release of the airmen to ease east-west tensions he replied:

"I don't think as a rule a person recommends to a government. By far the best way is to allow conditions to grow so they recommend themselves."

He said he was flying to Peking because India "has the advantage of the friendship with the United States and Communist China and 'no one suspects our motives.'"

Increase Is Seen For Crime Rates

DENVER, May 9 (AP)—The crime rate in the Rocky mountain region increased last year by six-tenths of one per cent more than the national average, Denver FBI Chief Charles W. Brown reported today.

Nationally the crime rates increased an average five per cent. A check of 15 principal cities in Colorado, Wyoming, Arizona, Idaho, Montana, New Mexico and Utah showed a 6.6 per cent rise, Brown reported.

He said 55,978 crimes—rated in eight categories by the federal bureau of investigation—were recorded in the mountain states.

An increase in juvenile delinquency also was noted. Arrests of persons 17 and younger rose 2.3 per cent, which Brown said more than offset a 1.9 per cent decline in arrests of persons 18 and older.

Doctor, 94, Sires His Second Baby

CLINTON, Ia., May 9 (AP)—Dr. John D. Hüllinger, 94-year-old father of another boy—the second born of his marriage three years ago.

The 10-pound baby, described by the elderly doctor as "feeling fine and looking fit as a fiddle," was born early yesterday to 34-year-old Mrs. Hüllinger.

The doctor has brought 3,200 babies into the world during 63 years of practice as a country doctor. The Hüllingers were married May 18, 1902. The doctor will be 95 next Dec. 12.

CANNES, France, May 9 (AP)—French movie actor Jean Pierre Aumont sadly departed today for Paris, leaving behind actress Grace Kelly whom he described as "an adorable and sensational woman any man would be proud and pleased to marry."

"What I am saying is on my own responsibility." Aumont said. "She is a wonderful woman . . . I adore her . . . but whether the feelings are reciprocal is up to her to say."

They have been constant companions for several days of the Cannes film festival and Aumont made no secret of his romantic attentions.

U. S. Army Plans Arouse Japanese

TOKYO, May 9 (AP)—Some 3,000 Japanese shouting a "protect our sacred Mt. Fuji" demonstrated at the foot of the famed mountain today against U. S. army plans for firing live artillery shells the area.

A force of 100 Japanese policemen kept the demonstrators in check and there was no violence.

But authorities prepared for more trouble tomorrow when the six days of firing is scheduled to begin. The U. S. army said the plans will be carried out.

English Protest Ship's Boarding

TAIPEI, Formosa, May 9 (AP)—The government has received a British protest over the alleged boarding of the British freighter Inchirran off the Foochow coast of the China mainland. It was learned today.

A "national" naval spokesman said earlier it was possible today's guerrillas had stopped the 3,000-ton vessel and boarded her.

The Inchirran reported she was later released and was proceeding to Shanghai.

Bad Fido MASON CITY, Ia., May 9 (AP)—Hester McClung will have to walk to the postoffice to get her mail or else lock up her dog.

The postoffice canceled delivery to the McClung home after the dog bit two mailmen.

Small Baby Killed In Truck Mishap

AGATE, Colo., May 9 (AP)—An 11-month-old baby died last night of a skull fracture incurred as 10 families of migrant workers were spilled out of an overturning truck at the edge of this eastern Colorado prairie town.

Several others, including small boys and girls, are hospitalized in Denver with head, chest, arm and leg injuries. Nearly 50 persons were treated for cuts and bruises and released.

MOSCOW, May 9 (AP)—Nine American veterans who met the Russians on the Elbe river in 1945 began a 10-day visit with army veterans today with vodka toasts and a feast of caviar and smoked salmon at a banquet.

The nine Americans were met at the airport last night by five members of a reception committee led by retired Col. Evgeny I. Pavlovich and a large delegation of Soviet newsmen, newswire and still photographers and the western press.

They were whisked into the city in a motorcade to the National hotel overlooking Red Square for the late starting banquet and a sample of lavish Russian hospitality. There was little conversation but broad smiles and cries of "what say, sarge!" to a grinning Soviet sergeant.

Portly toasts in vodka, hoping the Americans would "have a fine time in Moscow" although their stay was short and suggested they prolong their visit beyond the scheduled five days.
