TOKYO, May 10 (AP)—American Sabrejets, outnumbered two to one, shot down two communist MIGs and damaged a third in a blazing battle off the coast of North Korea, the air force announced today.

The air force said a flight of 12 to 16 communist MIGs attacked a flight of eight Sabrejets "over international waters" off North Korea and that the Americans returned the fire, shooting down two and sending a third into a smoking dive toward the Yellow Sea.

The fighters were not accompanying any reconnaissance bombers—but "were on a patrol by themselves."

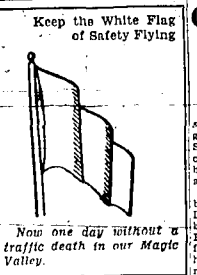

Hospital Tours to Include Emergency Room; Doctor Outlines Its Importance

In addition to facilities in the emergency room, the entire staff and broad services of the hospital may be brought into use to complete the care of any emergency patient. The emergency room serves as a clearing station for emergency patients and they may be transferred to the main operating rooms if additional surgery is required. Patients later will be dismissed or transferred to a room in the hospital. Some return later for "out patient" care, such as physical therapy or changing of casts and dressings. Hospital records show a wide variety of accidents treated in the emergency room. These include:

fractures, poisoning, knife and gunshot wounds, automobile and farm injuries of all types, injuries from fall on ice, oil steps and from trees, swallowing harmful liquids or foreign objects.

It is not uncommon for children to swallow "poisons"—insecticides, cleaning fluid and other dangerous materials which require the use of the stomach pump.

Peanuts, beans, beads, chicken bones and other foreign bodies sometimes are swallowed or inhaled. The patients will be treated in the emergency room.

Until recent years such patients emergency room. These include often were required to travel to Salt Lake City or other distant points to have the object removed. This is no longer necessary as local doctors are fully capable and proper equipment and instruments are available to perform such operations quickly and safely here.

Emergency care is available 24 hours a day as an important part of the hospital's service policy, says Mrs. Irene Oliver, hospital administrator. She compares this readiness to serve to a fire department in that it always is ready but that it is hoped it never will be used.

Needed equipment, personnel and supplies must be available at all times, she says, and their maintenance constitutes part of the basic operating plan of the hospital.

In 1954, 579 patients were treated in the emergency room. These were days when the room was not used at all and other hospital facilities injured in automobile accidents were brought in at the same time.

Meeting such critical situations requires complete cooperation of hospital personnel and doctors and human lives depend upon fast, efficient work, Mrs. Oliver says.

She points out that the provision of a well-equipped and properly staffed emergency room is another reason why the local hospital has been given full accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals.

Report Given For Statistics In This Area

A total of 232 births and 66 deaths in Magic Valley were recorded by the Idaho department of public health for February according to statistics compiled by the department's division of vital statistics.

All 232 births recorded in nine Magic Valley counties occurred in hospitals. Of the total births, 2 were stillbirths and 5 died under 1 month old.

Of 66 deaths, exclusive of stillbirths, in the nine counties, 22 died of heart disease, 12 of cancer, two of diabetes, three of nephritis, five of cerebral hemorrhage and one of hypertensive disease.

Accidental deaths in the nine counties totaled four, of which two were caused by motor vehicles.

Magic Valley marriages totaled 62 and divorces 27.

Of 165 notifiable diseases reported during the month, scarlet fever, with 19 cases, was the most frequently reported disease in the nine counties, with mumps being reported 16 times. One case of pottacosis was reported in Gooding county.

Total Idaho births for February numbered 1,252; deaths, 348; infant deaths, 18; fatal accidents, 23; marriages, 649; and divorces 165.

Two Main Vaccine Questions Studied: Is It Safe? Why So Much Confusion?

Associated Press News Analyst WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—At this point there are two main questions behind the confusion about the anti-polio vaccine: Is it safe? Is it responsible for some of the confusion? The answer to this seems to be yes. After saving for weeks, Leonard Scheie, surgeon general of the U. S. public health service, has announced a temporary halt in vaccinations.

Why? So the government can make a more thorough check on all the companies' vaccines than it has before. And it seems from what is known the government had time to do before what it is doing now. In last summer's test of the vaccine developed by Dr. Jonas Salk, sponsored by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the vaccine used was made by two companies—Bill Lilly and Parke-Davis. Since only several hundred thousand children were getting this vaccine in 1954, only a comparatively few batches were used.

But every one of these batches was triple-checked—by the manufacturer, by Dr. Salk for the foundation, and by the national institute of health, part of the public health service. "So that all children in at least the first and second grades could get the vaccine in the spring of 1955 immediately after the results of the 1954 test had become known, provided the results were favorable as they proved to be—the foundation did this."

It contracted not only with Lilly and Parke-Davis but with four other manufacturers, including Cutter. To make vaccine for perhaps nine million children in the spring of 1955, an official of the foundation said last week the manufacturers began making the vaccine last November. On April 10 came the announcement that the vaccine in the 1954 test had been 80 to 90 per cent effective. "At once, with governmental approval, the manufacturers began distributing the vaccine ordered by the foundation last fall. Far more batches were turned loose because more children would get the vaccine. Now the government did not check."

Improvement Is Listed for Water Supply

BOISE, May 10 (AP)—Record snowfall in the mountains last month has improved the water supply outlook in the Columbia basin and created "moderate flood potential," two federal agencies said yesterday. "The water supply outlook for all northern rivers in Columbia basin is good," the soil conservation service and weather bureau said in a joint report.

"A few rivers along the main stem of the Snake river in southern Idaho and Oregon have a poor-to-fair water outlook in prospect," the report said. "The unprecedented heavy snowfall in the mountainous watershed during April improved the water supply outlook considerably throughout the entire basin and resulted in moderate flood potentials on the Kootenai and Columbia rivers."

"Many snow courses recorded more April snowfall this year than has ever occurred in the period of record. Usually the maximum snowpack occurs near the middle of March or the first of April but this year the highest water content was measured near May 1."

"The agencies said the May 1 snowpack throughout the basin was about average for April 1. "The critical water supply shortages, developing on the Big and Little Lost rivers, the Big Wood, Little Wood, Salmon Falls creek, Cwyther and other smaller rivers in the same area has been partially stopped by the heavy rains during April," the report said.

"These areas were saved one irrigation or more by these rains as well as snow water added to the high watersheds which will produce more runoff for the season. These rivers are still expected to have a shortage of water."

Why hadn't the government checked each individual batch, as it had in 1954? He said that since the vaccine was first produced, a number of companies have had "continuing experience" in producing it and have "shown their abilities."

He said that the government has learned something more by examining again the long delayed announcement made April 10 about the effectiveness of the vaccine used in 1954.

State Mine Chief Sees Ore Areas

BOISE, May 10 (AP)—It is too early to predict whether commercial uranium will soon be found in Idaho, State Mine Inspector George McDowell said yesterday after a three-day visit to Salmon, the scene of intense prospecting activity. McDowell said he is interested in the area because of the Salton river valley to satisfy his curiosity about the uranium boom in 1941 county, where hundreds of claims have been filed in recent weeks.

Optimism is high among prospectors and miners, McDowell told newsmen, but he plans to withhold his conclusions until samples have been assayed by commercial evaluators and by the atomic energy commission.

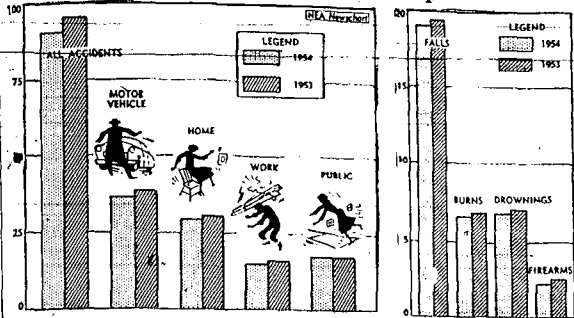

Butterfat Prices Reach 85 Cents

IDAHO FALLS, May 10 (AP)—Idaho farmers were paid an average of 85 cents a pound for butterfat in milk during March, the Idaho bureau of dairying and the agricultural marketing service reported yesterday.

This was one cent below the February average and two cents below that for March of 1954.

The report said that milk received at creameries averaged 4.03 per cent butterfat during March, compared with 4.17 per cent for February. An average of \$3.43 per hundredweight was paid for whole milk, 17 cents below that of the previous month.



Ancient Ruins Of Mayan City Spied by Trio

By FREDERICK A. PETERSON (Written for United Press)

LAKE MIRAMAR, Chiapas, Mexico, May 19.—We have found the ruins of a Mayan city perhaps 400 or 500 years old. We might have missed it if our raft hadn't had a flat tire. Juan Leonard and his wife, Carmen, and I made a raft buoyed up with inner tubes to explore the shore of Lake Miramar. We loaded the raft with food and equipment to last several days and paddled off. After three hours of rowing, one of the inner tubes blew out. I was nearly thrown into the water and the raft started to sink. Juan, Carmen and I dived to and saw ashore pulling the raft behind us. All the equipment was saved.

Explored Area

While the Leonards stopped to fix the raft and set up a temporary camp, I went ahead on foot to reconnoiter the territory. There was little more than dense brush for quite a while, but then I came upon a fallen tree with peculiar square stones clutched in its roots. The stones obviously were the work of some primitive craftsman. I have been making preliminary surveys to figure out the full extent of the city. But we will leave the bulk of the exploration for a bigger expedition being planned for next year by the center of anthropological investigations of Mexico.

Built on Terraces

The city seems to have been several miles in length. It was built upon terraced levels which line the steeply slanting shore of the lake. We have found the foundations of over 50 large buildings. Evidently the walls and roofs were made of adobe or wood, as nothing of them remains. But stairways, canoe landings, platforms and other structures can easily be traced. We moved our camp to the site and have been making preliminary surveys to figure out the full extent of the city. But we will leave the bulk of the exploration for a bigger expedition being planned for next year by the center of anthropological investigations of Mexico.

Labor Unions Ponder About Surplus Cash

WASHINGTON, May 19.—Labor unions are having financial worries. Their problem is what to do with their own burgeoning wealth.

Some buy banks. Some build housing developments or rest camps. A number are building impressive new headquarters. Others have loaned money to employers. One bought enough stock to get into the Montgomery-Ward proxy fight on the winning side.

But they still put most of it away in a sock. In cash and government bonds, waiting for a rainy day.

No Statistics Known

How much money is there in union treasuries and how much in pension and welfare fund reserves in which they have some voice? There are no over-all statistics.

Estimates of assets in union treasuries range up to two billion dollars, and up to three billion dollars when treasuries of union locals are included.

One expert estimates that unions have a voice in close to 10 per cent of the 15 to 20 billion dollars in pension fund reserves and in nearly half of the perhaps two billion dollars in welfare fund reserves.

Wary of Stocks

Investment companies and consultants have been trying to talk union leaders into putting their money into stocks. But so far they have met with little success.

Most union constitutions prohibit

or severely limit the use of union money for anything other than government bonds.

A recent survey showed that the assets of the national treasuries of 42 large unions were invested approximately 75 per cent in government bonds, 10 per cent in cash, 10 per cent in real estate or mortgages and only two per cent in stocks.

Care of Your Children

By ANGELO PATRI

There are times when it would seem that those in authority over our schools were overlooking the highly important fact that schools are created and maintained for the benefit of the children. They are not maintained for the benefit, or the comfort, of the administrators or the teachers. Just for the children.

When that fact is recognized and acted upon, the schools serve their purpose effectively and when it is overlooked they do not and the children are deprived of their rights to the extent of the overlooking.

Take the method of admitting children that is first used. We have learned that at about the age of 5 children are ready for kindergarten and the experiences providing them that first time. We have learned that if they are not given this experience they lose valuable growth.

How about admitting the children to the first grade when there is no kindergarten? Experience has taught us that children are usually ready for reading instruction at about the age of 6. Does that mean they should be admitted at that age? Suppose they won't be until a couple of months after the start of the term and no admission is to be made until a year from then?

That would make the child 7 or close to it.

That year is one of high tide of learning for these little ones and they should not be deprived of it. Two admission times in the year are the very least we should have. Why not admit them any time during the year when they reach 6 years? It has been done and successfully.

Given an experienced teacher and no other should ever be assigned to first grade—the pupils admitted during the term often catch up to the others and go along with them. Even if they don't they are gaining the experiences that enable them to make their growth and attain their skills at the time they can best achieve them.

Of course, if a school admits children only once a year the administration is that much smoother. There is not the bustle and the clerical work and rearrangement of rooms and classes to deal with. But what about those shut-out children? Schools are created for all children.

Annual admission allows a teacher to stay with the class a whole year? That's easy. Let the teacher stay so with the class when they are promoted. There is really no sound reason for annual promotions and admissions.

Childing is characteristic of childhood but children pass through this state of being as adults progress. Dr. Patri's research shows that children who are admitted to school at the age of 6, and in some cases at the age of 5, New York 11, N. Y.

Bright Future Predicted for Entire Nation

SEATTLE, May 10—A bright future for the country—and especially the northwest—was predicted here today by Henry C. Ritter, 3rd, president of the National Association of Manufacturers.

Ritter, president of Thomas A. Edison, Inc., West Orange, N. J., stated that the country is on the threshold of what might well be its greatest era and that "the people of the northwest should be as the forefront as the fruits of this greatness are harvested."

The industrialist made the statement during a special interview following his arrival here. He is in the northwest for a series of meetings this week with local businessmen.

Ritter cited recent technological advances, such as those achieved in electronics and nuclear energy, as well as the population growth of the country as reasons for his optimism.

"We should have by 1975 a standard of living that will far exceed our modern society of today," he predicted. "The Northwest, with its great sources of electrical energy and its vast natural resources, should have an economic growth at a rate faster than the national average. It would seem that this area is assured a population growth well above the national average," he added.

At present, there are as many people living in greater Los Angeles county as live in the four Northwest states—Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Montana—combined. Both total roughly five million, Ritter pointed out.

"The ever more indication of the expansion possibilities of these four states," he added.

The NAM leader added a warning note, stating: "America and American industry must have the proper climate in which to operate if the marvels of science are to be fully developed and incorporated into our everyday standard of living."

"The monopolistic strength of big unions and the high discriminatory income tax are two critical deterrents to this progress. These two factors make it increasingly more difficult for citizens to improve their standard of living and achieve real security."

Fatherless Fowls' Farm Flock Fails

WASHINGTON, May 10 (AP)—It looks like another barren year on the government's "fatherless turkey" farm.

"We haven't been able to hatch a live one," Dr. M. W. Olson reported yesterday at the end of a concentrated series of experiments conducted from February through April, as they were last year.

But the government, with six other scientists on the problem again next year, Dr. Olson said he thought they would be able to get a fatherless turkey eventually. The research is being done on the department of agriculture's experimental station at nearby Beltsville, Md.
