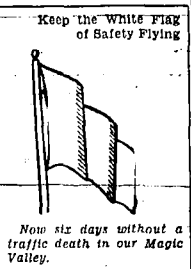

Safe Motor Vehicles Are Under Attack

May 14—The nation's automobile community is attacking the motor vehicle industry for its failure to make the motor vehicle safe for the road.

The national co-operation of the automobile industry, highway builders, and the state legislatures, said more than 100 delegates at a meeting here today.

They will complete their work on the best of the motor vehicle safety check-off program for 10 major items on the motor vehicle.

Working at the mechanics, street-side mechanics, and the state will check each vehicle and will give a report on the condition of the vehicle.

Front-headlights and turn signals including tail lights, exhaust, rear view mirror, wipers, and windshield wipers, and safety belts are the items being checked.

The city conducting the safety check-off program is participating in this service and will give a report on the 10-point safety check-off.

Emergency vehicles inspected May 14 revealed that 14 of the vehicles were in need of attention to the 10-safety items.

Probe Opens On 3 Deaths

During Blast

EL PASO, Tex., May 14 (AP)—A board of officers today investigated a rocket blast which killed three men and seriously injured three others. It appears the accident was caused by an excessive thrust launching a propellant charge.

The aerial rocket was being disassembled yesterday at 7 p. m. when it suddenly zoomed out a window and exploded.

In the resulting explosion, the aerial rocket being used to cut up the small, outmoded experimental rocket was dropped. The tank containing the fuel was severed and exploded.

The army said Pvt. William J. Harrison, 22, Cambridge, Min., and Pvt. Byron A. Baxter, 22, Aberdeen, Pa., were killed instantly. Pvt. Gene K. Martin, 27, Marlin, Tex., died later of injuries.

Others injured were Pvt. William F. Underhill, 20, Hollywood, Fla.; Pvt. Ralph Watson, 20, Smithfield, N. C.; and Pfc. Wilfred A. Wessenberg, Marysville, Kans. They were recovering at William Beaumont army hospital.

Some of the conditions for the granting of variances are that the variance is not in conflict with the general purpose and intent of the zoning regulations, that there are exceptional or extraordinary circumstances or conditions applicable to the property involved and that such variance is necessary for the preservation and enjoyment of a property right of the applicant. Furthermore, no such variance shall be detrimental to the public health or safety or otherwise injurious to the property or improvements of other owners of property. The adjustment committee, with the approval of the city manager, may grant a temporary or conditional variance from any provision of the zoning ordinance for periods not to exceed 30 days provided the granting of such variance will not be detrimental to the public interest, health or safety. If a zoning variance request is approved by the zoning and planning commission it is obligated to hold a public hearing at which time all property owners of the city may appear. If 20 per cent or more of the property owners disapprove of the change, it automatically is defeated. If the request passes its first public hearing, a second hearing is conducted by the city commission.

Between 60 and 100 people were reported at the scene.

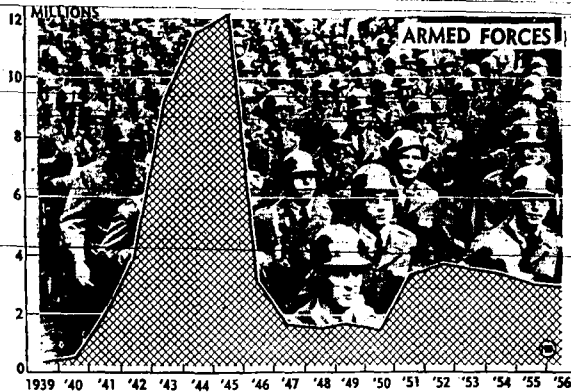
The find apparently alerted other prospectors on the ground and in the air.

The Democratic chairman struck out at the administration on this and other counts in a speech prepared for a meeting of the Federated Democratic Women of Ohio today.

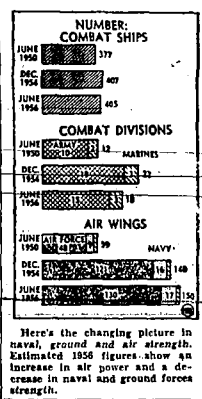

A-Powered Plane Work Is Reported

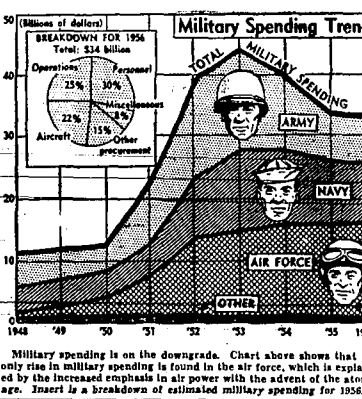

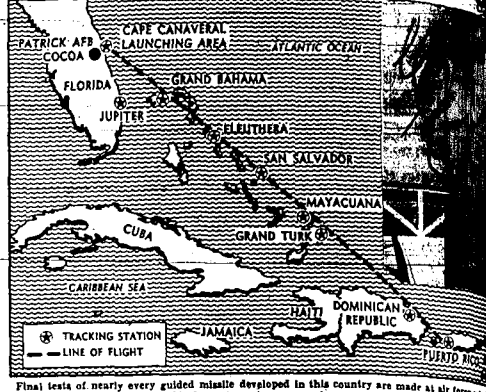

Final tests of nearly every guided missile developed in this country are made at air force base on Cape Canaveral, Fla., world's longest proving range, shown on map above. 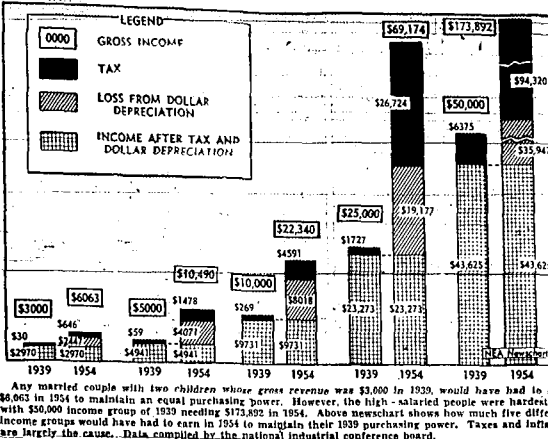

The effect upon satellite Communist countries in middle Europe is going to be profound, these sources report. Czechoslovakia and Hungary, both under Communist—and Soviet—rule, have long borders with Austria.

Austria becomes free for the first time since Hitler annexed the country in 1938. No Austrian under 30 can have much memory of what national independence means. The nation "brought" in the middle of Europe, a symbol of hope that foreign domination is not a permanent thing.

SEOUL, Korea, May 14 (AP)—America's new commander in the far east, General Lyman L. Lemnitzer, learned of his promotion while visiting front-line troops here today.

Lemnitzer leaves late today to return to Japan where he will shortly take over as United Nations and U. S. commander in the far east.

He will succeed Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor who becomes U. S. army chief of staff in Washington on July 1.

He is now eighth army and far east army forces commander. This means he is in charge of U. S. army ground troops in Japan, Korea and Okinawa.

Moving up to the number one spot in the far east, the 55-year-old general will head all army, navy, air force and marine forces in the far east—which excludes Formosa.

He said here today in a prepared statement that it is "a great honor to take over the two important commands from General Taylor. However, I am not unmindful of the heavy responsibilities that go with these new assignments."

Lemnitzer, who just earned his fifth star, returned to the capital shortly before noon after a helicopter tour of the 24th Infantry division's forward trench line positions.

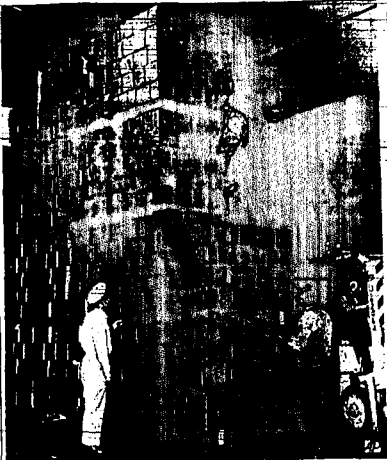

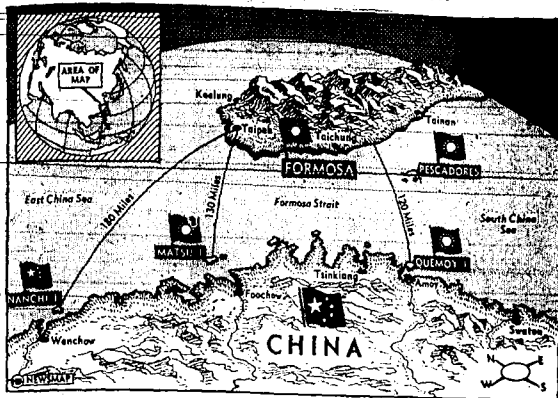

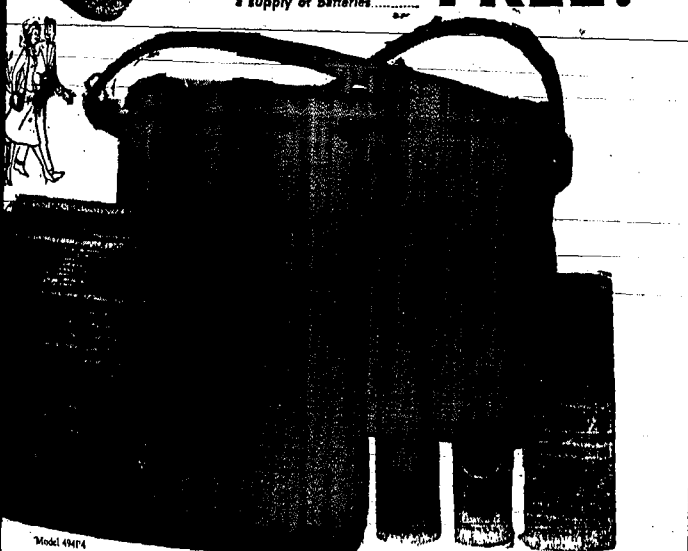

SCHENECTADY, N. Y., May 14 (AP)—The General Electric company said today it has designed a new type of atomic reactor that eventually will generate electricity as cheaply as a conventional steam generator.

A major bar to the commercial generation of electricity by atomic power has been the relatively high cost.

Vice President Francis K. McCune said later models of the new reactor would produce "several times as much power" as an old type reactor of the same size.

A step in the generating process would be eliminated by a company spokesman said by producing steam to turn a turbine right in the core of the reactor. In the old type, heat for the steam had to be transferred from a heated intermediate substance.

The company plans to use one of the new reactors at a generating station it plans to construct near Chicago, McCune said. The project also has the approval of the atomic energy commission.

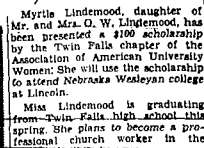

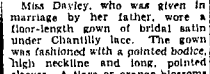

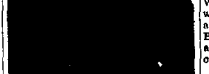

Rocky Marciano Supposed to Demolish Cockell in Fifth Round Monday

SAN FRANCISCO, May 14 (AP)—Rocky Marciano is supposed to demolish Don Cockell, on British top-farmer, in the fifth defense of his world heavyweight title, on Monday at Kozar stadium. The sturdy champ from Brockton, Mass., unbeaten in 36 fights with 41 knockouts, is such a topheavy favorite that there is practically no betting on the result. Even the promoter's release mentions a 9-to-1 choice. They say it's about 8 to 5 that Cockell won't last five rounds. Cockell, first British heavyweight to get a chance at the crown since Tommy Farr fought Joe Louis in 1937, has failed to impress in his training at suburban San Rafael. Although the 26-year-old fat boy had trimmed down from 220 pounds to 206, he has shown definite weaknesses and does not appear to have the punch to bother Rocky. On the other hand, Marciano hit a peak in his closing drills at Callisto, battering arm mates with thumping body attack. Sharp at about 150 pounds, the 30-year-old champ seems to have only cuts to fear.

The case-out that Emmet Cramer opened last September has leaked no blood during the long training grind. There is no quarantine, however, that it won't split again from a solid punch. Marciano was gashed on the head and around the right eye the night he won the title from Jerry Walcott in '52 and was cut around the left eye in both fights with Cramer last year. San Francisco, which still remembers Jim Corbett and Jim Jeffries, has been slow to heat up for the first heavyweight title fight since Charles stopped Pat Valentino Oct. 14, 1949. That bout set a California record for a gate of \$1,075,000 at the Cow Palace. Jimmy Murray, local promoter who is working with the International Boxing club in staging the fight, has reported advance sales of over \$150,000. Although they talk of \$500,000, chances are a crowd of 10,000 and a gate of between \$300,000 and \$350,000 are more realistic. The stadium has 68,000 seats, and will be packed to the rafters. Santee Fails Again in Assault Against Mile Runner Equals World Record For Century

FRESNO, Calif., May 14 (AP)—Wes Santee, America's premier miler, kicked off the distance in 4:06.5 today as he failed again in his bid to crack the four-minute barrier. Running a special event in Evansville, Ind., May 14 (AP)—Jim Golliday, Northwestern runner, blurted through the 100-yard dash in 10.3 seconds Saturday in the Big Ten relay to equal the world record set in the fastest time ever recorded in the conference. Golliday, whose best previous clocking was 10.5 in a triangular meet at Northwestern last week, flashed the distance with a slight tailwind of 3.22 miles per hour. It matched the accepted world mark set by Mel Patton of Southern California in 1948 and by Hector Hargrave of Australia a few years ago. Northwestern track coach Russell Wulfer said he would submit Golliday's mark for world recognition. The maximum wind velocity for a world record acceptance is 4.07 miles per hour. Golliday's effort can be accepted as a Big Ten record, because it was not set in a championship meet. However, it betters the 10.2 set by Jesse Owens that has stood for the conference standard for 20 years. Five watches were on Golliday. Two caught him in 10.2, two in 10.3 and one in 10.4. The official time was 10.2.

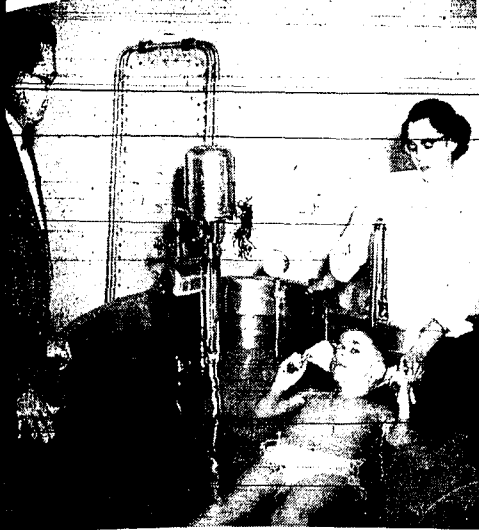

Mercury Will Hover in Sky Near Twilight

Many who are ardent students of the skies claim they have never definitely spotted the planet Mercury. This is because of the "little messenger of the gods" of ancient mythology spends so much of his time hiding in the rays of the blinding sun that only for short periods a few times each year is he visible to the observer. Then the observations must be made in the waning twilight of the advancing eastern dawn.

During the coming week this elusive little world may be seen by all who are favored with a clear normal evening and the knowledge of where and how to look. This evening and every evening during the next week Mercury will be almost two hours after sunset. The point on the horizon of setting for those who are not hindered by hills or buildings will be only a little to the left of northwest. The planet will be about west-northwest when first visible in the twilight.

Mercury will appear like a fairly bright star near the horizon. Considerably higher and to the right of this planet, the star Capella will be twinkling; higher and to the left, the twin stars Castor and Pollux. Do not confuse these with Mercury. On Sunday evening, May 22, the crescent moon will be only slightly below our little planet with the point of the crescent facing it as if to engulf it in the golden bow. Mercury moves around an orbit nearer the sun than any of the other planets. Its diameter is only about 3,000 miles as compared with the earth's 8,000. It makes a complete trip around the sun in about three months while the earth requires a year. To speculate regarding conditions on the surface of Mercury is always interesting. It is generally considered that the planet keeps one side constantly turned toward the sun. This lighted side is so intensely hot that all water would quickly evaporate. Parallel bars, walkers, tilt-up chairs, exercise pianos, a mixer, floor mats, heat producing machines, lamps for infra-red and ultra-violet rays, a small whirlpool tank and a large Hubbard tank with an overhead crane, wheels for shoulder motions and music stimulators.

bold away, and any lead existing there would melt. Jeans, the English astronomer, has written that if there are rivers on Mercury, they are rivers of lead. Mercury was one of the immortal deities of the Romans and was usually pictured as flying on winged sandals through the twilight skies as he carried messages from the greater gods on lofty Mt. Olympus to the deities of earthy humbler children. He was pictured as an agile, thinly-clad youth, exulting in the delight of swift motion through the air. The poet Longfellow has him exclaim: "I fly, I float, I soar . . . O joy of motion! Oh delight to cleave the infinite realms of space . . . through warm sunshine and the cooling cloud." Be sure to look for our little messenger of the gods as he flies in the western twilight during the coming week.

Railroad Commissioner Olin Culberson said the order was the result of "increasing complaints filed by household goods shippers moving from one town in Texas to another."

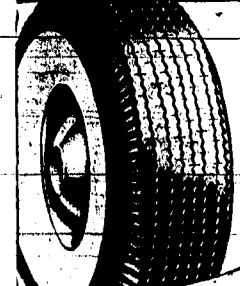

Hoover Unit Said Against Reclamation

WASHINGTON, May 14.—Reclamation Commissioner Wilbur A. Drexelner said today he believes a forthcoming Hoover commission task force report will be critical of western reclamation development.

He said his feeling was partly based on questions asked him when he testified before the commission: "I feel the group is essentially against western irrigation development," he declared.

Drexelner expressed his opinion at a news conference called to defend the reclamation program against what he said are attempts by critics to discredit and bring to a halt efforts to help meet the need for critical water shortages.

One "critic" named by Drexelner was former Gov. Leslie A. Miller, Wyoming, who heads the Hoover task force group drawing up recommendations about federal activity in the fields of reclamation and water supply. Another was Raymond Moley of Newsweek magazine.

Drexelner was asked if he believes the task force will bring in adverse recommendations on the reclamation program. "I have a feeling they will be critical of reclamation as being subsidized by the government," he answered.

He added, however, that he did not believe the report will have any particular effect on western resource development.

The reclamation commissioner told reporters he called the news conference because "it is time to take a close look at the indiscriminate attack of those critics who are attempting, by every means at their command, to destroy public confidence in our efforts to assist the arid western states in meeting their water needs."

Such attacks, he said, are currently centering on the upper Colorado reclamation project. A bill to authorize this billion-dollar-plus program has passed the senate.

"The Tap on the Shoulder"

The late Peter Marshall, for years the young dynamic pastor of the New York Avenue Presbyterian church, Washington, D. C. asked a question which gets at the very heart of my message today.
