4 New "Secondary" Polio Cases Reported in Idaho; Total for State Is Now 37

BOISE, May 16 (AP)—The state health department today reported four new "secondary" polio cases—one of them that of a vaccinated child and one among dialyzed children who received anti-polio vaccinations. They made 37 cases in the state this year—17 among vaccinated children, eight among persons closely associated with them and 12 having no apparent contact with the now-halted mass immunization program.

Dr. Stanley J. Leland, state director of preventive medicine, said in answer to a question, that it was not advisable now to consider further vaccinations as a possible means of preventing the spread of the disease.

Federal Sum Approved to Give Salk Vaccine to Needy Groups

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—The Eisenhower administration today proposed a 28 million-dollar federal fund to help the states provide polio vaccine for children in low income families.

This was one of 11 recommendations submitted by Secretary of Welfare Hobby to President Eisenhower. The White House said Eisenhower approved the report and endorsed the recommendations.

Reds' Hoard Of Jet Fuels Told by Foes

TAIPEI, Formosa, May 16 (AP)—The Taitao news agency of the ministry of interior said today the Chinese Communists had stockpiled enough jet fuel at coastal airfields for a major air effort against Formosa and its island outposts. The agency said fuel sufficient for 5,000 missions had been stored at Luchiao airfield since the agency, which claims close nationalist intelligence sources, said truckloads of jet fuel were sighted en route from Shanghai and Hangchow. Luchiao is within easy fighter range of Matsui and Quemoy islands and Formosa itself. The Taitao agency said jet fuel for the fields originally came from the Romanian oilfield at Vukovar. Publication of the oil report coincided with appearance of new-type MIG-15 in the Formosa skies. These improved MIG-15 types crashed in a 10-minute dogfight with Nationalist Thunderjet fighter-bombers this week-end, but neither side reported damage. The agency, quoting intelligence sources in Peiping, reported yesterday the communists were taking steps to release 11 American airmen imprisoned in the Red Chinese capital as "spies." It said the prisoners had been tipped off to file appeals to the communist supreme court requesting retrial. This would enable the communists to release the men without loss of face.

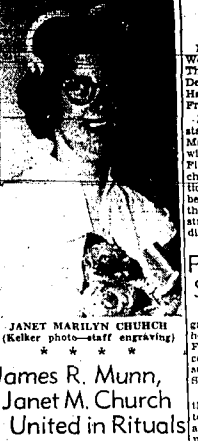

Tests Planned On Separating Joined Babies

DETROIT, May 16 (AP)—Doctors are today planning to separate two babies who were joined at the chest and abdomen. The babies, who were born at St. Clair hospital yesterday, were joined at the chest and abdomen. Their chances for survival in their present state were "pretty good."

They said they would not be able to comment on the chances that the girls would be able to separate until they completed tests and X-rays to determine which vital organs they shared.

The twins, who have not been named, were born in Mrs. Naomi Sterling, 27, of Detroit. They were immediately placed in an incubator to insure them of a constant supply of heat and oxygen. Attendants at the hospital said their color was improving all the time and their chances for survival appeared to be improving steadily. The babies weighed a total of 12 pounds, 14 ounces when they were born.

High X-ray heard Preliminary X-rays indicated the twins had normal spinal cords and chest bones and two heart beats each. They each had a heart of their own. But a hospital spokesman said it could not be determined immediately whether they had individual stomachs and livers.

An attending physician said doctors would wait between 24 and 48 hours after their birth to determine their chances for survival before conducting further tests. If they are found to be separated, a series of tests will be conducted to determine which vital organs they share, if any, and whether they can be separated by an operation.

Richard Herring, 30, father of the twins, said he was warned by his family physician that the multiple birth "but I didn't expect anything like this."

WASHINGTON, May 16 (AP)—Lampson Berry, U. S. consul general at Singapore, said yesterday it appears unlikely that police negligence was responsible for the death of a United Press executive in Singapore.

Sydney Smith, UP manager for southeast Asia, was beaten fatally by rioters while covering a bus strike in the British crown colony.

Berry's report to the state department was based on a preliminary investigation conducted by Singapore police. He said he had been assured that the investigation is continuing and that statements are being taken of all witnesses, including police.

Died of Injuries—Sydney Smith died Friday of injuries inflicted when a mob beat him with clubs, bottles and stones.

The general was assured that no attempt would be made to cover up any evidence, if any appears, that there was any dereliction of duty on the part of the police," Berry reported. "In view of the facts already uncovered, it appeared that any such dereliction was unlikely."

Went at Own Risk—Berry said the preliminary investigation showed that Smith told police he would proceed to the scene of the riot "on his own responsibility" after twice being turned back at roadblocks.

He walked where the rioting was taking place and a shouting mob turned on him. Berry's report to the state department reads: "If he then tried to run back to his car but was seized by the crowd before reaching it."

Berry said Singapore police commissioner Nigel Morris informed him that Smith had returned to the residence to the roadblock and requested police aid.

New Concrete Bridge Opens Across Snake

MARSHING, May 16 (AP)—Some 1,000 persons braved cold winds Saturday to attend the dedication of a newly built \$280,000 steel and concrete bridge across the Snake river.

State Highway Engineer Earle W. Miller told them it would last 100 years if the state's load carrying restrictions are not greatly relaxed.

The new two-lane bridge was erected next to a narrow one-way bridge which has spanned the river since 1921.

"The inadequacy of this and other old bridges in the state is due not so much to 'the short-sightedness of the old timers as to the tremendous increase of traffic in Idaho," Miller said.

State Sen. Adam Blackstock, R. Owyhee, told the crowd that his father had played a part in instituting construction of this old structure.

"I recall that my father was bringing a load of cattle across the Snake river on the old ferry when a cable broke and the boat capsized," he said—almost because an orphan that day, and as my father crawled out from the river he swore that he would do everything to get a bridge across the river.

The new bridge has a 28-foot roadway and is 774 feet long. It carries state route 20 across the river along the shortest path between Boise and Winnemucca, Nev. It was financed jointly by Owyhee county and the federal government.

State legislators from Canyon and Owyhee counties and mayors and Chamber of Commerce officials from Marsing, Nampa, Caldwell, Boise and Homedale attended the ceremony.
