Farm Price Supports May Be Major Factor in Presidential Conventions

WASHINGTON, May 21 (AP)—Farm price supports may be a potentially powerful factor in determining who will be the presidential nominee next year—particularly if the farm states are to play a larger role in the high-level, rigid price support system which will be implemented for crops in a bid for agricultural parity in 1950.

Republicans on the other hand, are expected to go on record for administration's flexible price support system adopted last year. The price support issue might be a deciding factor in the Republican selection of a candidate only if President Eisenhower chose not to run.

But the issue could well stir up a lot of trouble among the Democrats, particularly for Adlai E. Stevenson if he should again be a candidate. The 1952 Democratic candidate is on record with an expression of belief that neither high rigid supports nor flexible ones are satisfactory for stabilizing agriculture.

Party leaders liken the situation now to that which prevailed before the 1948 presidential election—a contest won by Harry Truman in an upset of GOP nominee Thomas E. Dewey. Truman's win was credited by most political observers to a strong Midwestern farm vote.

Labor Peace Returns Again To Bitterly-Torn Southland

ATLANTA, May 21 (AP)—Labor peace returned to the south for the first time in almost ten weeks today with the settlement of the longest and possibly the most violent telephone strike in history.

Negotiators for Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph company and the striking Communications Workers of America (CWA) reached agreement last night on a new contract covering some 50,000 telephone workers in nine states.

The settlement is still subject to approval by the union rank-and-file and the CWA district director. A. Smallwood said he would recommend it to the union members.

Smallwood said pocket lines would be maintained at all telephone exchanges "until the union members accept or reject the contract."

Another south-wide dispute reached an official end yesterday with the signing of a contract by non-operating Bell workers on the Louisville and Nashville railroad. The contract gives the brotherhood their first company-financed health and welfare plan.

Both the railroad and the telephone strikes began March 14 but were ended by N. non-operating workers returned to work at the end of eight weeks after both parties agreed to submit the dispute to binding arbitration.

The railroad walkout was the longest since 1922 and struck a major blow at the south's economy. Southern Bell used supervisory personnel and hired other workers to maintain much of its service during the telephone strike.

Both strikes were accompanied by violence including 15 fatal shootings, dynamiting, derailing, cable cuttings and brawls between strikers and non-strikers.

Smallwood reported "over 3,200 known cases of sabotage" to company property running into "the hundreds of thousands of dollars." About 150 persons have been fired by Southern Bell in connection with the strike and investigations are continuing into other incidents, the company said.

The wage loss to individual workers rises to the millions of dollars, Southern Bell estimated that its striking employees lost some 17 million dollars in paychecks during the 68-day dispute.

The telephone strike settlement was reached after the two weeks of almost sleepless negotiations supervised by the federal mediation and conciliation service. Company and union representatives met for the first time to draw up a new contract ten months and a day ago.

A Southern Bell spokesman said the proposed contract includes a "no-strike" clause, one of the major issues in the strike. The company insists on the provision but the Communications Workers said they would not accept unless arbitration of grievances was included.

Lennie B. Davis, chairman of the telephone union's negotiating committee, said "full-scale arbitration in accord with union demands" was included.

California Businessman Will Wrap up Anything, and Well

By JACK LAUCK
OAKLAND, CALIF. (NEA)—If you were to ask Norman Burkheim, "wrap up anything," you might need a truck to haul it away. Then again, Burkheim would probably wrap the truck for you as well.

Since the 34-year-old San Francisco-born Burkheim began wrapping things during the war, he's literally packaged everything from a feather to a locomotive.

Like most unusual enterprises, Burkheim's was born of necessity. Because 87 per cent of all material shipped into the Pacific (U.S. navy estimate) in the first year of World War II was destroyed due to faulty packing, Burkheim's career in packing was launched. Since then his loss because of packaging has been less than one-tenth of one per cent.

For the office of war information, under direct presidential command, Burkheim used highly technical methods to pack electronic equipment together with complete radio stations and towers.

One of his outstanding packing jobs was the delivery of over 300 tons of materiel to a Japanese 700 miles up the Yangtze river in China without loss or damage.

His plant, now called Pacific Porta Industries, covers 8 1/2 acres and employs an average of 200 people. Facilities include a complete box-making and woodworking factory.

As well as wrapping hundreds of items for the government, Pacific Porta packs all products for the laboratory at Livermore, Calif., which is contracted to the U. S. atomic energy commission. They also wrap helicopters and parts for the armed services as well as shipping them commercially for Hiller Helicopters to all parts of the world.

They have just completed shipping the 20th helicopter to the police department of Bangkok, Thailand. The Bangkok police use the ships for crowd dispersal and border patrol.

Because it would take almost two hours to truck a "box" from the Hiller plant in Palo Alto, pilots ferry the ships across San Francisco bay

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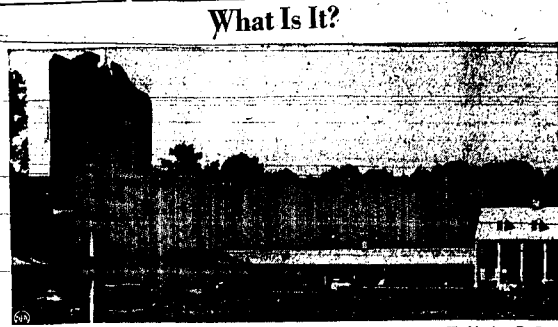

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Rabbit Chaser Uses Car, Net To Snag Prey

FRIDAY HARBOR, Wash., May 21 (AP)—Hunters who lead out a bounding motor "bunny bug" swinging long-handled fish nets expect to round 10,000 rabbits this summer on San Juan Island.

A unique kind of rabbit-hunting has become a profitable pastime for farmers who share the 45-acre hunting island with thousands of long-stayed neighbors.

"A bunny buggy" is an ancient automobile stripped down to its engine and frame. Two tractor seats are welded onto each side so the buggy can accommodate a three-man hunt team—driver, a spotter and a net man.

Work at Night These buggies cruise the island at night. The spotter pokes the beam of a spotlight into the darkness until a rabbit is caught in the glare.

"The rabbit usually freezes in the light," said Terry Jackson, a veteran spotter. "But sometimes they freeze and run. I've chased them about the fields at 30 miles an hour. Once in a while they outrun us."

Lake and Dulka Farmers look on the rabbit population with mixed emotions. The rabbits do some damage to truck gardens and grain, but a farmer with "bunny buggy" can make several hundred dollars a year marketing them.

"Actually," rabbit marketer R. E. Schaefer said, "the island is the world's biggest rabbit hatch. We harvest about 10,000 rabbits a year. The San Juan rabbit is a distinctive breed, unlike the common American jackrabbit or cottontail. It is a domestic rabbit gone native, mixed with the strains of the Flemish giant and the New Zealand red."

NEW YORK, May 21 (AP)—Civil defense administrator Val Peterson said today that if this country ever attacked with nuclear weapons some cities may be "so utterly destroyed" they may never be reentered.

"No one can escape some consequences from a thermonuclear bombing, no matter where he lives," Peterson said in a speech prepared for the U. S. mayor's conference here.

In this era of super-bombs, he said the mayor "certainly has civil defense responsibilities are right in your lap and no other echelon of government can do them for you."

As an example of the destructiveness to be dealt with, Peterson said, "We must think in terms of weapons which, if dropped on Manhattan Island, could cause complete destruction in an area with a radius of five miles and diminishing degrees of field May 21 at 11 a. m.

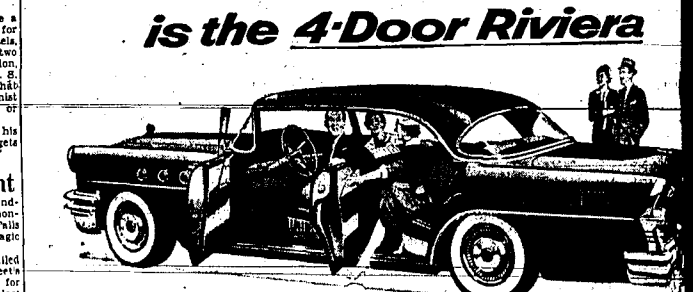

Pelting Rains Aid Southwest Farmers in Age-Old Struggle

By The Associated Press. Soaking rains the past week enabled southwest farmers and ranchers to win a battle with drought—an age-old war in which there are no lasting victors. Downpours soaked wind-eroded lands and brought new hope to the heart of the old dust-bowl areas of western Kansas, eastern Colorado, western Oklahoma, northeast New Mexico and the panhandle-plains of Texas, where drought and wind had threatened this spring to recarve the desolation of the mid-1930s. The rains revived stunted wheat and soaked deep to assure moisture for later crops. Parched rangelands are greening again and stock ponds are brimming in many sections. But the rains were not without their losses. The deluges carried off valuable topsoil and washed out newly planted crops in some areas. For some farmers the rains came too late for this year's wheat. And the rains were spotted—while floods raged in some areas, near-by counties didn't get enough rain to wet the dust.

Tells of Weapon
"This is a pitiless weapon which could take off from communist territory, travel through space at a speed of many thousands of miles per hour, and explode in the United States," he said.

He gave no basis for the statement other than the fact that the Russians captured German scientists and production centers for the V-2 bomb raised on England near the end of the World War II.

BOISE, May 21 (AP)—State tax collector F. C. Neill said today his office has mailed 21,000 registration forms for Idaho's new withholding tax law which goes in effect July 1.

Fall-Out-Proof Room Is Developed by University to Conduct Delicate Tests

BOULDER, Colo., May 21 (UP)—Technicians at the University of Colorado isotopes laboratory have developed what they believe is the world's first fall-out-proof room. Tests during the time that radioactive dust was descending over Colorado from the recent Nevada atomic bomb blasts showed that air outside the room carried 40,000 times as much radioactivity as inside. The little, air-tight, windowless, concrete cube is known as the carbon 14. It shelters an electronic device that measures the age of plants.

radioactive C-14 atoms to disappear. That is their half-life. That long half-life makes the carbon clock very flimsy but it provides the opportunity for dating the plant life under study. But the whole mechanism is thrown out of balance by just a flick or two of the violently radioactive dust from an A-bomb fired at the Nevada proving ground, 600 miles southwest of here. Scientists at Chicago and Princeton universities put away their specimens and shut up when fallout from the mid-Pacific or Nevada tests threatened to upset their calculations. Here at Boulder, however, laboratory chief Dr. R. N. Keller and others on his staff decided to air condition the C-14 room thoroughly that no radioactive specks could sneak in from Nevada, Eniwetok or Siberia. A plant absorbs fresh radioactive carbon 14 from the air as long as it is green and alive. This keeps its "carbon clock" sound up. The clock starts to run down when the plant dies. It takes 5,730 years for half the

"Pentecost, Commonly Called Whitsunday"

Today is one of the really great feasts of the church year. It is Whitsunday, this feast is outstanding, for it marks the utter completion of our Lord's plan for our salvation. He had commanded His disciples to "wait for the promise of the Father," and in due time they would receive power after the Holy Ghost had come upon them. They waited—and the power came, exactly as He had promised. It always has, and it always will, for "they that wait upon the Lord"

will receive their strength." Had there been no patient waiting on the part of the disciples, there would have been no coming of the Holy Spirit, and no completion of our Lord's sacrifice for us. This seems not to be in the modern mood. All we hear is "get going," "step on it," "make it snappy," and all trends are toward speed rather than deliberation. But God's plans for His children are not outshopped after the latest fashions of mere men, and those that rush along have no time to pick the lovely flowers that grow by the roadside.

Waiting brought the Holy Ghost into our lives. Waiting has saved many a life from utter ruin. Waiting for guidance, instead of plunging ahead fitfully and impulsively, always brings power and direction and comfort (strength). Nowhere for "they that wait upon the Lord"

in God's plan for men do we find Him adjusting us to "step on it," but more frequently He does tell us to wait upon Him. Spiritual waiting has no relation to that evil known as "procrastination." The two are not related. Procrastination should be lifted as a sin. It really is one, and it has too frequently had tragic results. But waiting upon the Lord, patiently, loyally, faithfully, humbly—invariably—brings the soul nearer and nearer to God and supplies just the necessary cooperation He seeks of us to enact His will. God doesn't move according to our ideas of time or speed. He cannot be rushed, coerced, or pushed around. God is God. It has taken us an awfully long time to learn that, hasn't it?

Let us learn at this Pentecost, perhaps for the first time, to wait upon the Lord, that power may come upon us—that we may have fire, and warmth, and enthusiasm—that we may at long last be enabled to accompany those tasks which God has so long waited for us to complete. Baby Watching Is Urged as Way to Study Human Nature

By HAL BOYLE

NEW YORK, May 20 (AP)—Every adult in the world ought to spend at least an hour a day baby watching. Can't think of a better way to learn human nature? Seeing a child struggle to desperately to become a grownup, you begin dimly to understand why grownups so often act like desperate children. There is no industry, pastime or hobby — call it what you will — that gives you quite such a frightening insight into the passage of time.
