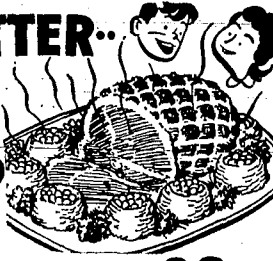

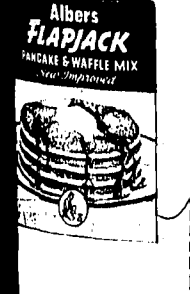

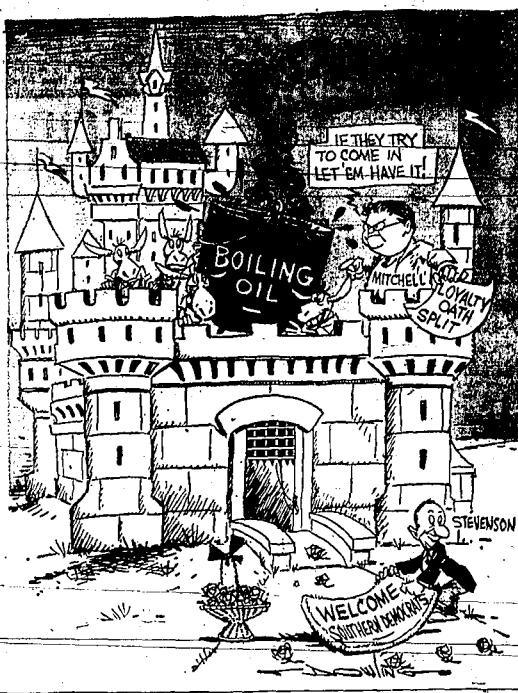

Confusion on Polio Vaccines Grows; Statement Is Needed

WASHINGTON, May 28 (AP)—Dr. Leonard Scheele, surgeon general of the United States public health service, would just one explain publicly the difficulties with the anti-polio vaccine, some of the confusion might be removed.

Scheele said the health service from time to time have issued statements, as confusion piled upon confusion, but no layman would understand what, if anything, was wrong with the vaccine or why the program has ground to a virtual stop.

In the 44 days since the government first okayed use of the vaccine, this has happened:

1. The government stopped use of the vaccine, then cleared some of it but not enough to keep the inoculation program going very long.
2. At least 21 vaccinated children have come down with polio, 60 of them after receiving vaccine made by the Cutter Laboratories of Berkeley, Calif.
3. Scheele has met repeatedly with groups of advisers—his own specialists, outside polio experts, representatives of the six licensed vaccine manufacturers—and so far as the public can see the program is still up in the air.
4. Although the government is withdrawing all Cutter vaccine, it has not yet said what if any connection there is between the Cutter vaccine and the polio which developed in 60 children who received it.
5. A split occurred last night between one manufacturer—and perhaps all six of them—and the health service after it laid down new testing standards.

Some dates tell the story: April 12—The government licensed the distribution of the vaccine.

April 27—After several children vaccinated with the Cutter product came down with polio, the government withdrew all Cutter vaccine.

May 7—After more vaccinated children developed polio, Scheele called a halt to all vaccinations so his experts could check the laboratories of the manufacturers.

May 13—Scheele approved release of some batches—after his men had checked the plant-of vaccine made by Parke, Davis and company, Detroit.

May 15—Scheele gave similar approval to some batches made by Eli Lilly and company, Indianapolis.

May 18—The health service delayed the release of vaccine by all other manufacturers for "some days." None of it has been released since.

May 24—The health service said all vaccine "already used or released" for use had been found safe with the possible exception of two out of the nine batches made by Cutter.

Scheele said there was "strong presumptive" evidence of a connection between the Cutter vaccine and the polio which developed in some children who received it.

He stopped short of saying positively there was a direct connection. When would the government release more vaccine? Scheele was asked that question May 24. He said he couldn't answer when he'd have information on that.

May 25—The health service laid down new testing standards for manufacturers. At least one of them—an official of the Parke,

'Shot' at Birth Is Started by Country 'Doc'

NEW YORK, May 28 (AP)—A vaccine-conscious America will be "taught to know" that a country doctor has wiped out three diseases among his youngest patients simply by vaccinating them at birth.

The first dealing Dr. Herbert D. Chamberlain has with a new arrival is to tie the umbilical cord. His third is to put a vaccination needle into the forearm.

He is immunizing the babe against diphtheria, lockjaw and whooping cough. Preparations which combine immunizing doses against all three are in widespread use.

His program is this world come equipped with immunity to all sorts of diseases, since his blood contains antibodies acquired from his mother. These maternal antibodies start disappearing very soon and by six months have disappeared. In common medical practice, newborn infants are not vaccinated. The doctor starts immunizing when the infant is three to six months old. When mothers have doctors and cooperate with them, babies get their shot as a matter of course.

Dr. Chamberlain carefully explains his program to mothers. He also explained the importance of the babies getting their second and third shots. But he set the time for the second at six weeks after the first because he gives mothers their post-birth checkups six weeks afterward and they were going to have to come in anyway. Having gotten the babies through the second shot, he was able to persuade the mothers to bring them in for the third when they were three months old.

Chamberlain described what he was doing in the Journal of the American Academy of General Practice.

Area Is Dry

CEDAR CITY, Utah, May 28 (AP)—The area around Cedar City was in its 10th day without appreciable moisture today.

A total of 38 of an inch has been recorded since Feb. 15. The biggest amount to fall in a single day was .07 on May 15. That was hardly enough to moisten the top of the wind-parched ground.

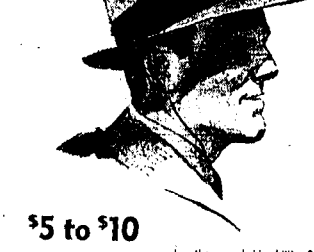

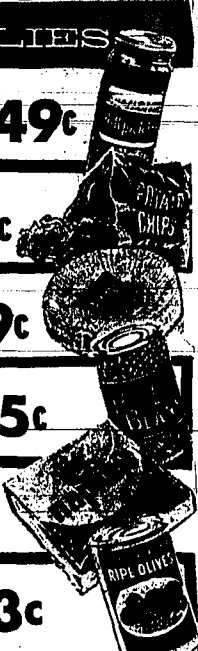

The Burley office of the agency reported a shortage of experienced irrigators. Sugar beet thinning was not expected to begin before June 1. Although the state-wide total of job openings decreased from 4,738 to 4,680 during the week, non-agricultural openings increased from 3,404 to 3,512.

Nearly completed is a new substation at Milner, which will reduce voltage from 138,000 to 48,000 volts in transmission to Oakley, Kenyon and Golden valley. It also will reduce voltage to 32,500 for distribution of power in the Milner area. The King-Eden junction 138,000-volt transmission line has been extended 18 miles to serve the Milner substation. Cost of the Milner project, including the re-routing of transmission and distribution lines from the substation, is nearly \$225,000.

Idaho Power is building a substation in Golden valley, southwest of Burley, which will step down power for distribution from the 48,000-volt tap line. A substation at Artesian, southwest of Murlough, and distribution lines from this substation are being enlarged. The capacity of the Wilson butte substation near Twin Falls is being increased as are electric facilities serving the town of Hazelton.

Work to double the capacity of the Notch butte substation, north of Jerome, was completed recently. A new substation being built at Picabo has double the capacity of the old substation at Grenett, which the new station replaces. The Picabo transformers will be served by a 48,000-volt tap line.

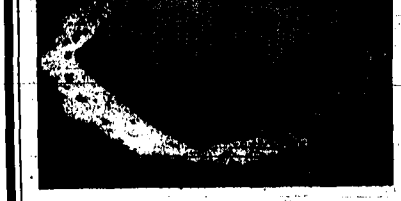

Predicted Toll In Traffic Set At High Count

NEW YORK, May 26—Speeding, driving on the wrong side of the road, and reckless driving will cause 119 deaths of a predicted nationwide total of 425 highway accident fatalities during the three-day Memorial day week-end starting Friday night, the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies announced here today.

Excessive speed is expected to be the "number one killer," taking the toll of 170 lives. Eighty-five more persons will meet death as a result of driving on the wrong side of the road, and another 64 will die because of recklessness.

Other major factors contributing to the grim score of 425 deaths are: Failure to yield the right of way, which will account for 43 lives, and sleeping at the wheel, which will take 25. Miscellaneous causes will kill the final 28 of the predicted total.

Approximately one-fourth of drivers who are involved in fatal accidents, or pedestrians who are killed, will have been drinking. Motorists who are drunk will take place on straight, dry roads, and almost half of all fatalities will occur in broad daylight.

Diplomatic Enigma; Krishna Menon, Aids and Abets Reds

BY TOM W. CULLEN
LONDON (NEA)—There is a saying in London diplomatic circles: Wherever Krishna Menon turns up, there the world is doing its damndest to have a nervous breakdown.

Menon, who is India's representative at the United Nations, turned up in Geneva after the fall of Dien Bien Phu last summer to pave the way for the Indo-China sell-out.

Although Menon was only an "observer" at the Geneva conference, he probably more than any other man was responsible for Red China's victory at the conference table.

Behind the scenes Menon was polking furiously with Red China's Chou En-lai and the Viet Minh leaders. Now he is polking openly at Peiping with Chou on the Formosa issue.

Getting Krishna Menon for the first time at Geneva last June a young American military attaché asked: "Who's the lean guy with the hungry look?"

Today, the world might echo this question. For despite his ubiquitous, Menon still remains something of a man of mystery.

He is tall, gaunt and cadaverous-looking, with silver streaks in his long wavy hair and eyes that can glow with suspicion or smoulder with resentment.

A strict vegetarian, he neither smokes nor drinks and is a bachelor at the age of 55. The austerity of his private life would make a hermit's look merry by comparison.

This is the man whom Pandit Nehru would like to make India's foreign minister. If Nehru can shove him down the throat of the Indian Congress party, so far the Communist party isn't swallowing.

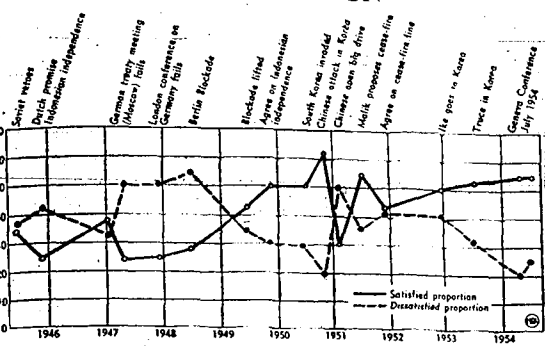

"Fallout" Pattern Data Is Presented Twice Daily From Federal Agencies

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—The weather bureau is now putting out information twice a day on what way to run if H-bombs start falling.

Delbert M. Little, assistant chief of the weather bureau, said this information—"upper air fallout observations"—has been a regular part of the bureau's report since May 15.

With this data thus supplied civil defense officials in potential target areas can quickly compute the radioactive fallout patterns that would result from nuclear attack.

ground, up to 80,000 feet at its nearly three-score upper air stations.

It then figures how far and in what directions the wind would travel in three hours at the various altitudes.

Coupled with estimates of bomb size and point of burst, this data supplies the fallout pattern—the region in which deadly radioactive debris would descend downward from a target for hours after an H-bomb explosion.

Meteorologists plot wind speeds and directions aloft by sending up balloons and following them with automatic tracking equipment on the ground. The tracking equipment records on tape the balloon's position at various brief time intervals.

The bureau's upper air observations go out two times a day on the 30,000 miles of teletype circuits which connect its stations throughout the country. They go directly to federal civil defense headquarters at Battle Creek, Mich., and to key regional officials elsewhere.

The world learned about the deadly hazard of radioactive fallout after the U.S. H-bomb tests in the Marshall Islands in the spring of 1954. Rainsplitting particles contaminated a 7,000-square mile sea

area extending 220 miles downward from the big explosion of March 1, 1954.

It has been estimated that a similarly poisoned land area would be uninhabitable for perhaps as long as three months.

The weather bureau is making progress for \$2,700,000 to modernize its 58 existing upper air stations and build three new ones.

Jurors Find Seven Guilty In Red Trial

DENVER, May 26 (AP)—Four men and three women named as Communist party leaders were convicted yesterday on charges of conspiring to overthrow the government.

The panel returned the verdict to U. S. District Judge Jean Steinmetz after slightly more than 12 hours deliberation.

Not Sentenced Yet

The trial began March 21 but because of numerous interruptions, yesterday was only the 29th actual trial day.

The jury was charged by Breitstein in special instructions yesterday morning, and retired to start deliberations.

In his instructions, Breitstein told the jurors:

1. The Communist party (itself is not an trial and membership in the party is not a crime.

2. To convict the defendants, the government needed only to prove they conspired to teach violent overthrow of the government.

BELOGRADE, Yugoslavia, May 26 — Yugoslav police made at least 118 "preventive arrests" in the 48 hours preceding the arrival here of a "high Soviet" peace mission, reliable sources said today.

The Soviets were arriving this evening on a dramatic mission of negotiation that may erase the southern anchor of the Iron curtain and eventually ease Soviet control of its satellites.

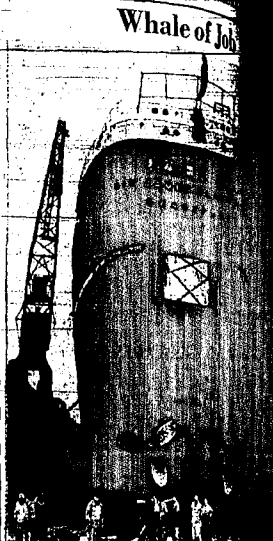
About a score of Soviets, believed to be members of the MYD (secret police), were posted at the Zemun airport keeping watch for the Soviet leaders headed by Nikita Khrushchev, the Communist party boss, and Premier Nikola Bulganin.

Reliable sources said those arrested included Miodrag Popovic, former secretary-general of the new defunct Soviet-Yugoslav Friendship society. The society was quietly dissolved after Tito's break with the Kremlin in 1948.

The arrival of the Soviet "friendship" delegation represented a Kremlin about-face seven years after Tito threw off the Soviet yoke and set a course of independence.

Soviets Take Back All Epithets Once Hurlled at Tito as Pilgrimage Occurs

"Bloodthirsty dog of a Fascist-Gestapo breed!"
"Traitor! Murderer! Imperialist!"
"Contemtable degenerate!"
"Insolent dwarf!"

These were epithets the Russians used to describe Tito of Yugoslavia between 1948 and Stalin's death five years later.

Now the Russians admit they were wrong. As President Tito observed his 53rd birthday the Soviet leadership is ready to humble itself with a visit to Tito's lair, to be forgiven.

What caused this turnaround? What motivates the Belgrade pilgrimage of three of the Soviet Union's most powerful men?

So far as the outside world can guess, the maverick communist ruler of 17 million Yugoslavs has told the collective dictators of a land of 200 million: Come see me if you want to talk.

The stakes are high to inspire such humility in N. S. Khrushchev, Nikita Bulganin and A. I. Mikoyan. Yugoslavia is a dictatorship with a coldly efficient secret police. For the best observers it is difficult to know the Kremlin can measure the political and economic strains in Yugoslavia.

The west has supplied Yugoslavia over a billion dollars in aid since World War II, with most of the money coming from the United States, American diplomats and military observers are on a tough spot in Belgrade. They know much depends on their guesses. A highly placed observer has said:

"Tito is a reasonable gambler. We cannot go beyond that at the present time."

Would Tito ever go back completely to the conformist fold? This question was asked recently of many qualified persons, including Yugoslavs.

"What worries you Americans?" a highly placed Yugoslav countered. "Is it that you think we stand for world revolution? You can say that. The Yugoslav government does not believe in world revolution."

This was an odd statement for a Yugoslav communist. It denies Lenin, and the Yugoslav party claims to be more Leninist than its Soviet counterpart. It states constantly it is based on Marxism-Leninism, a theory involving ultimate triumph of world communism.

Others, including some non-communist Yugoslavs, say the Yugoslav party would rejoin the conformist under some firm conditions. These would include: Absolute equality of partnership, collaboration in a struggle against world capitalism but with the right reserved to criticize the Soviet party, and an independent intelligence service for Yugoslavia. The Yugoslavs, these sources say, would insist on being assigned the job of building and keeping contracts with leftist movements.

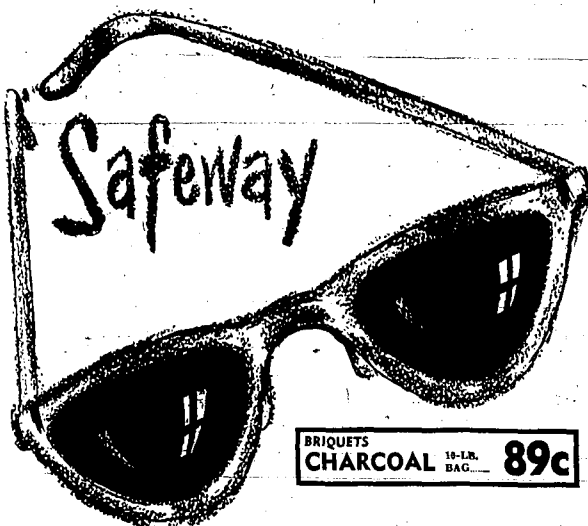

Noted Tongue Is Utilized for Unique Shows

NEW YORK, May 26 (AP)—Edward Steichen believes in the oneness and oneness of human beings. Pursuing that belief, he is sending to Europe and Asia this year a message in a universal language, the language of photography. Steichen, a world-famed master of that medium, has assembled from more than two million pictures made in 68 countries by professional and amateur photographers, 503 prints which he says "serve to explain man to man."

The exhibit, named "The Family of Man," has been huge success at the Museum of Modern Art in New York, drawing nearly 300,000 viewers. It will begin touring American cities next month. The artist also sends two duplicates of it next fall to Europe and Asia.

Steichen is a robust man of 78 with silvery hair, twinkling blue eyes, and a freckled face. Steichen insisted on "the image as a symbol. What's that? Well, you remember the famous picture of the Frenchmen in tears at the end of the German occupation? It became a symbol of the resistance movement. Remember the crying woman in the rubble of London when Shanghai was bombed? And the flap-raising on Iwo Jima? Both became symbols.

Like a Mirror

Steichen's "Family of Man" exhibition leaves its viewers rather shaken because "it's like looking into a mirror." It shows just plain people loving, living, being born, dying, suffering and struggling. Steichen has put most of the exhibit pictures on display of his big mural size into a poster-back book which went on sale nationally this week. He believes, since a majority of the pictures are of Americans, the exhibition will do a distinct service abroad in good will.

It has value as propaganda simply because it's propaganda," he said. "It's simply the trials and joys of man from birth to death. Americans appear in it as well as some of the simple folks as everybody else. We're not all gold and chromium and chrome. We have laugh and cry just like anybody else.

Shows Examples

"I believe Asians and Europeans will like to get a look at us that way. Take a look at this," he said, holding up a picture of a first one I picked for the exhibition—from St. Louis Post-Dispatch of a Missouri farmer looking at his tent show, that's a well Americaner; there isn't a face in it that you don't just love. Look at that great big mother with a gazillion of kids all sitting around her.

"And look at this wife enjoying the show, and her husband enjoying watching her watch it. I think Europeans are going to recognize themselves there. That's people."

"And later in this Nobody realized before what a universal thing ring-around-the-roy was in those pictures. We found 147 pictures doing ring-around-the-roy. And we made a point of it in the exhibition. It's a beautiful symbol—the circle of unity, of human oneness."

Funds Requested For Atomic Ship

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—President Eisenhower today asked congress for \$12,550,000 to start construction of the world's first atomic powered merchant ship.

Eisenhower first disclosed plans for building such a ship in a New York speech on April 25.

The request was included in an overall request for \$139,334,014 for additional appropriations for the fiscal year starting July 1.

Diplomats Hope That Chinese May Free Imprisoned Yankees

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—do not want to let the men go too quickly or without some hope of return. The belief now is that they might see the prospect of such gain by trying to build goodwill with the U. N. nations in advance of the San Francisco session. It is assumed that the state department that the Chinese Reds strongly desire international acceptance and U. N. membership.

More broadly, authorities believe the general improvement in the international atmosphere due to developing plans for a big four meeting "at the summit" must have some effect on Red China's behavior even though China would not be a party to the conference.

The denial of freedom to Americans has been a sore point between the United States and Red China during the five years the communists have controlled the Chinese mainland. The number of civilians held has been cut down by individual releases until there are now 41, according to state department records, who cannot get exit permits, are under house arrest, or are in jail. The members of the air force include bomber crewmen and fighter pilots captured by the Red Chinese during the Korean war and supposed to have been released two years ago under terms of the armistice agreement. "The Reds convicted 11 of them on spy charges denominated by this government as baseless and put them in prison."

Resistance Trial Decision Waited

BRATTLEBORO, Vt., May 26 (AP)—Federal Judge Ernest W. Gibson reserved decision today on a motion to dismiss charges against Manuel Miller, charged with assaulting federal officers who sought to take his wife to a mental hospital.

Counsel for Miller filed the motion yesterday in federal court. Also requested was amplification on a grand jury indictment charging obstruction of federal officers.

Miller and his wife, Lucille, 44, were forced from their Bethel, Vt., home by ten gas when federal officers sought to take custody of Mrs. Miller. She has been committed to St. Elizabeth's hospital, Washington, D. C.

Gibson ordered her commitment on grounds she was unable to defend herself on charges of advising youths not to register for the draft.

Jewels Stolen

HOUSTON, Tex., May 26 (AP)—Astrac lady Linauer told police last night a small sapphire ring box containing close to \$50,000 in jewels has vanished from her River Oaks home.

The loss left Miss Linauer and her husband, oilman W. Howard Lee, puzzled. Nothing else in their painted home appeared to have been disturbed. They said there was no sign of a forced entry.

Hazardous Qualities of Gem "Staff of Life" Are Reported

BOISE, May 26 (AP)—Water—generally recognized as Idaho's staff of life—also was one of the most serious hazards last year with at least 44 accidental drownings recorded in the Gem state.

The tragic record prompted the state health department today to appeal to Idahoans to take extra precautions when engaging in summer recreational activities this year.

Parents were urged to take special care if their children have access to irrigation ditches and canals and rivers or ponds.

Thirteen drownings already have been reported this year by the department's division of vital statistics and 11 of these were in April.

The year's total to date, there were six boat accidents, among these the one that claimed the lives of three Pocatello fishermen who were lost in the Snake river near American Falls.

A girl in Boise fell off her horse and into a canal.

The 1954 report listed eight children under the age of 4, who drowned in ditches or rivers and another four between the ages of 5 and 10 who tumbled into rivers or ponds.

Records also showed that drown-

ings claimed the lives of five adult fishermen last year and another seven drowned when they fell from boats. At least three fishermen died by over-exhausting themselves.

Water even proved to be the death of one man who made his living from it. A canal manager drowned when he slipped on a muddy bank and disappeared in the swift water.

Three other men drowned while on the job—a mechanic fell into a slip pond, a government surveyor slipped while trying to cross Rapid river and a construction worker fell into the Lucky Peak dam intake tunnel.

One of the most tragic accidents reported in the headlines of last year was the story of four months of one family—the parents and two of their youngsters—who died one night when their cable car plunged

Workers Are Involved in Big Wrestling Match With Words

WASHINGTON, May 26 (AP)—1300,000 others. These are people now getting less than 90 cents an hour. The wrestling match between the Eisenhower administration and some Senate Democrats over the meaning of words.

The words involve a boost in the minimum wage and its extension to workers not now covered. In spite of the talk and the words, there's a good chance these will be no increase.

About 24 million workers in businesses which deal across state lines—such as factories producing goods shipped in interstate commerce—are covered by the federal minimum wage law. It requires that they be paid at least 75 cents an hour.

Another 20 million people working for wages and salaries are not covered, which means their employers are not compelled by the federal government to pay them as much as 75 cents an hour.

Included in this uncovered group are farm workers, such people as small grocery store clerks, employees of banks, and people employed by theater, grocery, hotel and movie theater chains, and employees in 5 and 10 cent store chains.

In his Jan. 6 state of the union message President Eisenhower said of the minimum wage: "I recommend that many others, at present excluded, be given protection of the minimum wage."

Congress set the present minimum of 75 cents an hour in 1950. Since then living costs have gone up about 15 per cent. The 15-cent increase from 75 to 90 cents would be a boost of about 20 per cent.

The big labor organizations want the minimum set at \$1.25. The Eisenhower administration sticks to 90 cents. A boost from 75 to 90 cents would mean an automatic raise for about one million manufacturing employees in the south, and 145 days during the year.

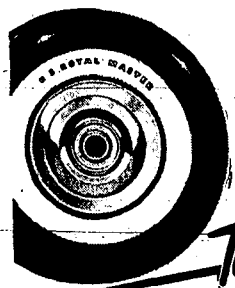

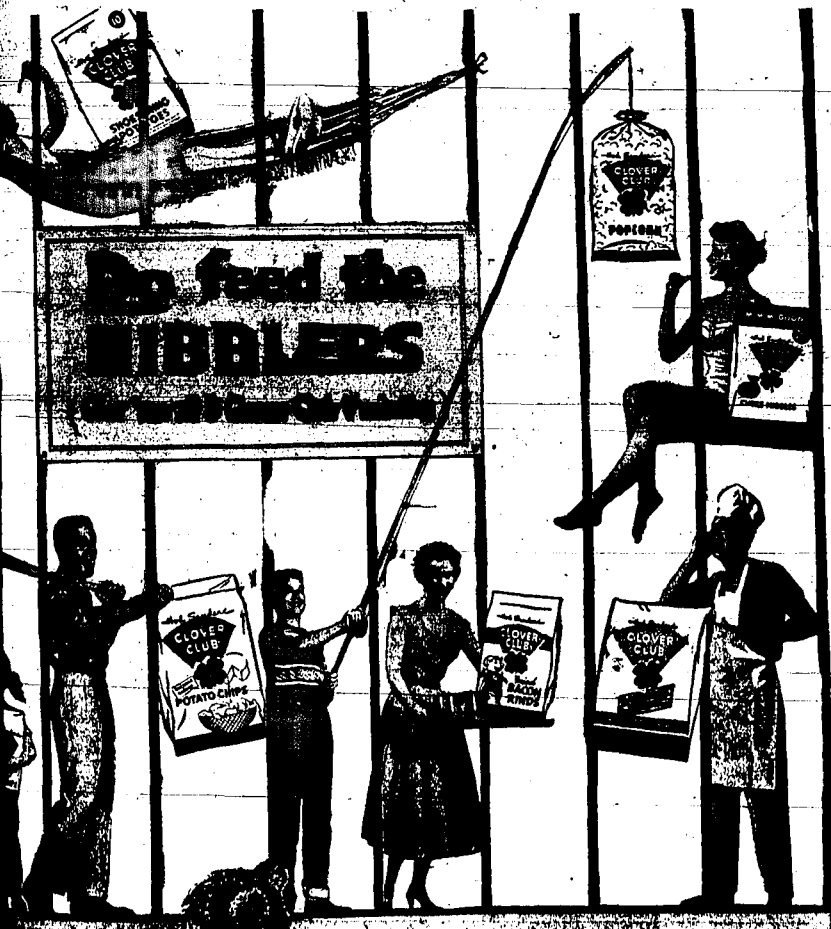

Ham, Turkey Special Seen For Holidays

Smoked hams and turkeys will dominate the list of specials in the nation's foodstuffs for the approaching Memorial day week-end.

These holiday favorites will be priced below a year ago, minimum report. In general, turkeys will be down a couple of cents a pound. Smoked hams will be available at levels 10 cents a pound or more below those of last Memorial day. Canned hams also will be lower.

Chickens Featured
Many stores will feature frying chickens, too. Prices will show little change from a week ago. Here and there you'll find ducklings available at reasonable prices.

A number of markets will offer prime ribs at moderately lower prices for those who want to stick with the old standbys. Chuck roast and legs of lamb will be special attractions in some areas.

Sirloin steak prices will be higher, in many places, but by and large popular cuts of meat will sell for around the same prices as a week ago. There won't be much change, either, in butter and egg prices.

—Pork Is Good
The American Meat Institute comments that contrary to the usual pattern, pork continues in relatively good supply for this time of year, with retail prices ranging 12 to 31 per cent below those of a year ago. It says the average retail price of all meat—beef, pork, veal, lamb and products such as frankfurters—is down around 15 per cent from May, 1934.

You may have noticed the abundant supplies of lettuce currently available for those who want to sell. Both the green and the yellow types of squash offer good value, too. Peppers are cheap, and nearby vegetables such as radishes, green onions, rhubarb, asparagus and other greens look attractive.

Others Recommended
Asparagus, carrots, beans, celery, escarole, endive, tomatoes and zucchini also are recommended by the produce specialists. Old-crop spuds from California and Florida sell at a higher price but are good bets.

Strawberries are coming down in price as supplies increase. Oranges and grapefruit continue to rate as good buys in fruits.

Produce men describe cantaloupes and honeydew melon as moderately priced. Peas are higher.

Southern Fried Chicken

Dip pieces of chicken in 1/4 cup milk, then in 1/4 cup seasoned flour, then in 1/4 cup hot shortening. Bake and cook until chicken is tender (about 15 minutes). Remove to basket or wire rack.

Fiesta Fried Chicken

Cut 1 frying chicken in 1/2 cup milk, then in 1/2 cup undrained canned tomatoes, then in 1/2 cup seasoned corn meal. Brown in 1/2 cup melted shortening. Top with sliced green onions and 1/4 cup chopped jalapeno in moderate oven (350° F.) 30-40 minutes until chicken is tender.
