Tabori Paces Trio in 3:59, First Time in History 3 Runners Break 4.0 Mile

LONDON, May 28 (AP)—An obscure Hungarian pair with a stomachache sped a mile in 3 minutes 59 seconds Saturday and pulled his two closest rivals across the finish line in less than 4 minutes—the world's first 2-3 in less than a minute. A little more than a year ago the 4-minute mile had been an improbability since the day it began racing the clock. Then in May, 1954, came Dr. Roger Bannister, the first to cross the barrier. He was followed by John Landy, who dropped the mark to 3:58. Saturday it was László Tabori, 34, just out of the Hungarian army and who never had won an important race. Tabori was followed by Chris Chataway, 24, British brewer and non-athlete who didn't think he was in condition. Time was 3:59. Almost immediately was Brian Hewson, 23, British Royal Air Force bombardier and actually a half miler. He was given the same time as Chataway, who now has been second in three of the world's four races under the mark 4 minutes.

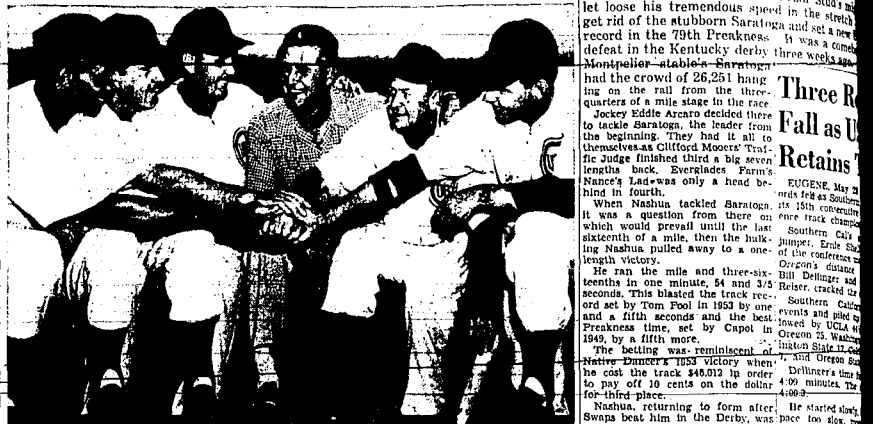

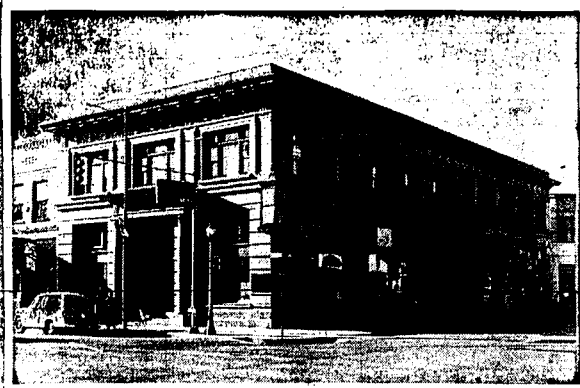
