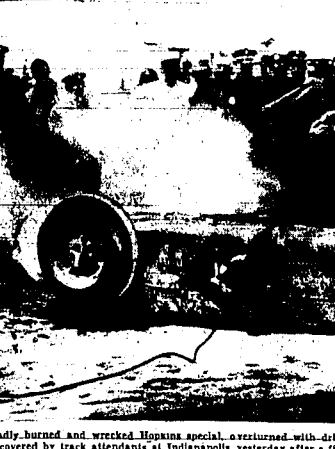

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PUC's Error Is Charged in Firm's Retort

BOISE, May 31—Mountain State Telephone and Telegraph company argued today that the public utilities commission, through mathematical error, allowed the firm to obtain a rate of return that is confiscatory to the company.

In a reply brief filed with the state supreme court, MST set forth three points on which it based its petition for rehearing in a three-year-old application for a rate increase.

After the PUC again denied higher rates last year, the company obtained a unanimous supreme court order for a rehearing, but this was later reversed in another unanimous ruling.

The company then asked for a rehearing on the reversal. Its brief today was in reply to the one from attorney general arguing against its rehearing.

Points Stressed MST and T contended in its latest brief that: 1. Various mathematical errors entered into the PUC's order and these errors should be corrected either by the court or the commission.

The errors are enough to reduce the rate of return below that which the Supreme Court has held to be confiscatory by the commission and to the point where the return is confiscatory.

Cites New Method The PUC adopted a "new and unique" method to separate intrastate and interstate operations. The substantial mathematical errors remain as apparent as ever, and no real justification has been attempted, the MST and T brief stated.

Rate case first started in May of 1952. In the interval, an Ada county court order allowed the company to collect its increase but the money, now more than two million dollars, has been held under court pending a final decision.

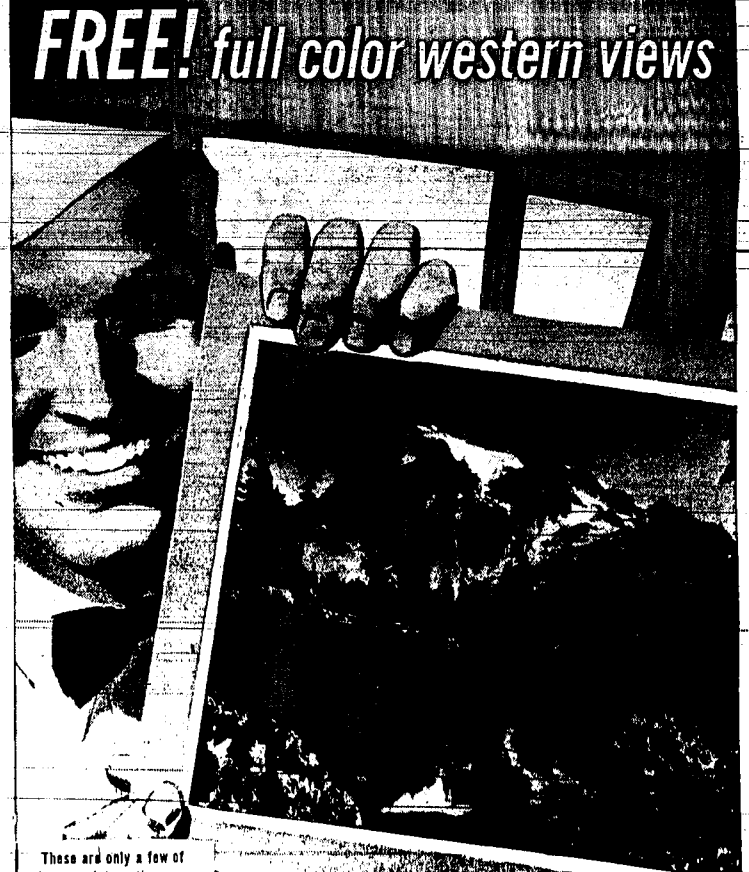

WASHINGTON—Despite repeated warnings that the present Russian "peace offensive" is a defense and not an offensive, the western allies to relax their defense efforts, including the United States. The statesmen may not be so conscious of the peril from capitol hill to the island of Formosa.

"WASHINGTON CALLING" BY MARQUIS CHILDS

LONDON—If one thing clearly emerges in the aftermath of the conservative victory, it is the nature of the dead end to which the Labor party has come. In their five years in office after the end of the war, the Labor party has done little to improve the national health system, which is overburdened with bureaucratic red tape.

TRUMP FOR SANITY

The stunning election victory of British Prime Minister Eden and his Conservative party makes more secure the future of the free world coalition at a time when stability and strength in the west are of paramount importance.

Under Sir Anthony's leadership, Britain will approach the delicate problem of maintaining a posture of strength while being alert to every reasonable prospect of easing world tensions.

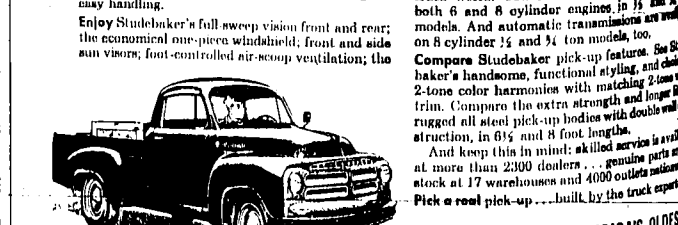

Rush Is Felt, Boom Is Seen For Mercury

SAN FRANCISCO, May 31 (UP)—Mercury, the rare liquid metal that occurs in run away when you try to pick it up, has a new generation of prospectors on its trail in the mountains of California.

Something like a boom has hit the small and shabby quicksilver (or mercury) mining industry.

The defense minerals exploration administration is spending more than \$200,000 in searches for new quicksilver deposits.

Actively seen

The new Idaho quicksilver mine, which bores into a mountain in Lemhi county, is producing 300 tons of mercury a month. It produces 20 per cent of the nation's output, is active in the region's output, is active in the region's output, is active in the region's output.

Besides its familiar role in thermometers, insecticides, and medicinal paint preparations, mercury is used in detonators for certain explosives. It has been reported that mercury is used in construction of atomic reactors, but the atomic energy commission has refused to confirm or deny this.

The new Idaho mine, which dates back to the towed gold rush era, has been in the doldrums since the end of World War II.

Support Announced

But last year the government announced a price support for quicksilver, and the production curve swung back up.

The general services administration said it was making a study of \$225 per 75-pound flask and stockpile. If actually, the support has never been put into effect, because the market for quicksilver in industry have sold all their output to industry at the going market price of \$300.

The new Idaho mine, which is producing capacity has been stepped up by renovating a fourth kiln. Production has hit 600 flasks a month, a record for the 101-year-old mine.

U. S. Now Calls on Red China To Free 52 Other Americans

WASHINGTON, May 31 (UP)—The United States called on Red China yesterday to follow up on the release of four American fighter pilots held by the Chinese, and to free 52 other Americans held behind the bamboo curtain.

At the same time the government was warning the impending release of a start toward relieving international tensions.

India's special ambassador, V. K. Rajwade, who broke the news of plans to release the pilots, has told U. S. Ambassador John Sherman Cooper at New Delhi that he believes other Americans, particularly 11 other airmen, soon will be freed.

President Eisenhower at his Gettysburg, Pa. farm and Secretary of State Dulles at his island retreat in Lake Ontario were both being kept informed on developments.

Acting secretary of State Herbert Hoover, Jr., and Assistant Secretary Walter Robertson kept watch on the situation through the Memorial day holiday. They had known since Saturday that the American announcement at New Delhi that the pilots would be freed had no advance word as to whether the airmen actually would step across the boundaries of Chinese communism to freedom.

In a parallel development bearing on the case, state department officials said that all Chinese students in this country who have expressed a desire to return to China, despite communist rule there, have been cleared to go and most, perhaps all, are on their way.

It was announced April 3 that 76 students on the steamer through the capture of 76 students had been lifted. A few more orders have been canceled since that time, bringing the total of cases cleared for the past two months to around 80.

Chinese communists had accused the U. S. government of holding 5,000 Chinese students as hostages for Americans detained in China. Actually, the students were stuck

Ike Appointee Talks Back to Labor Chiefs

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—Secretary of Labor James P. Mitchell hit back today at union leaders who claim his job is practically an impossible one in a Republican administration.

It's the union leaders themselves, not the administration, who make the job tough, Mitchell said.

"Big Jim" Mitchell, who came to the cabinet 20 months ago from other tough jobs in labor relations, gave this view just before taking off for Europe for an international labor organization meeting.

Gives Interview
"We're trying to do a job in the way we see it in the interests of the working man," he said in an interview. "We get the avowed opposition of some trade union leaders when we should be getting their support or at least their neutrality."
"Naturally, this makes it more difficult for me, both within the administration and with congress."

Seeks Cooperation
He added that he thought union leaders "could serve their membership better if they were more cooperative."

Mitchell said today that "I get as much support as I could expect within the administration." On another matter that he felt strongly about, he said:

"I've gotten support."
Mitchell said today that his position of trying to get laws passed is "realistic." "For seven years, unions have been trying to repeal Taft-Hartley and they haven't made any progress," he said.

Tell Biggest Problem
Asked what he thinks is the biggest problem facing organized labor, Mitchell said the main one in various states on compulsory union membership, such as the union shop, is "one of the biggest."
"Unions should be encouraged to strengthen and grow," he said. "These laws tend to discourage their growth."

Mitchell said his personal relationships with union leaders are good. He said he assumes their public attacks on him and on the administration's labor proposals are "necessary for political purposes."

Democrat Silence on Eve of Election Raising Questions

WASHINGTON, May 31 (AP)—The Democrats are mousy quiet for a political party only 17 months away from the 1956 presidential election. If they have found one stirring issue to use against the Republicans next year, they haven't disclosed it.

Yet at this same time in 1951 the Republicans were clouting the Democrats with two issues which remained major through the next 17 months up to election day in 1952: the Korean war and alleged communists in government.

There is no war now. The Democrats can't accuse the Republicans of not trying to get reds out of government. Long ago President Eisenhower predicted his Republican would work so hard on this problem it would not be an issue in 1956. He seems to have been right.

Paul M. Butler, chairman of the Democratic national committee, has worked himself into occasion-lashers

against the Republicans. But with few exceptions congressional Democrats, the real party spokesmen when they have no chair in the White House, have been extremely placid.

The placidity might be interpreted as meaning the Democrats think they have a cinch in 1956. They probably think nothing of the kind, even though they have made gains in state and cities since 1952 and won control of congress in 1954.

If Eisenhower runs again, the Democrats' chances of losing look as good as in 1952. His popularity remains astonishingly high after almost 28 months in the White House.

The Democrats, instead of trying to manufacture issues day by day,

have given him extraordinary cooperation, particularly in foreign affairs. The question has been asked: How long will this go on? The Democrats may change their attitude. They haven't shown much sign of it yet.

They have backed Eisenhower from time to time: On lowering taxes, boosting postal workers pay, on restoring inflexible price supports on roadbuilding.

The Democrats could have ripped into the administration for its confusing handling of the anti-polio vaccine. Most didn't. Criticism on that delicate subject might have boomeranged.

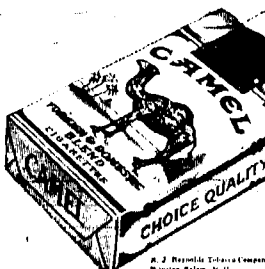
