The government faced further possible trouble from a Scottish coal miners' demand for more pay.

For the time being, however, Eden appeared to be relying chiefly on the peacekeeping effort by the powerful British Trades Union Congress (TUC), British labor's central body.

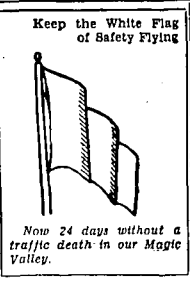

Home A-Plant Is Envisioned By U. S. Firm

ABEONON, N. J., June 2 (AP)—A plan around home heating-cooling system powered by a nuclear reactor is the size of an auto battery was put forth yesterday as "a practical reality possibly within a few years."

Robert E. Ferry, general manager of the Institute of Boiler and Radiator Manufacturers, made the forecast at the institute's annual meeting, and said the new concept marks the first proposal to put atomic energy to work actually within the home itself.

Out by 1958

He indicated that if the manufacturers were to begin research on the system now, they would be in full production by 1958.

The "unit," consisting of the baby reactor hooked up to a boiler, will be explosion-proof and safe from fire. It will be placed in the garage or basement, the system will both heat and cool the home, for about \$10,000 a unit, he said.

Ferry estimated the cost of the six-year charge at about \$300. He said the reactor would be replaced with another sealed unit at a similar price after its charge has been exhausted. Institute sources said the price of such a charge would tend to go down as the price of nuclear fuel declines.

Integrated installation of the boiler and baby reactor would cost about \$1,500, he said. In a new unit, several hundred dollars would result from eliminating flues and chimneys. It would cost around \$100 to convert existing boilers, according to Ferry.

Power Supply Hiked by Deal

BOISE, June 2 (AP)—Additional power to be supplied by 10,000 additional kilowatts of electric power became available temporarily to southern Idaho residents today under an interim agreement with Utah Power and Light Company.

President T. E. Roach said the company had to obtain the "higher-cost steam power" to supply its increased load. He said the deal was authorizing its proposed hydro-electric projects in the Hells Canyon area.

The contract was arranged with Utah Power a year ago, he said, to speed up that company's scheduled program to convert existing boilers into steam generating facilities. It is obtained through the interconnected transmission systems of the companies.

Saying Idaho Power had never had a power shortage in its history, Roach declared, "We are keeping faith with our customers in the face of seemingly endless obstructions by those who would deprive us of our power or nothing at Hells Canyon."

He called the arrangement a "temporary expedient" which would "barely suffice until the fall of the year" and that Idaho Power would have a new source of power at that time.

Two-Price Plan Eyed for Wheat

WASHINGTON, June 2 (AP)—Sen. Richard L. Neuberger urged yesterday that a two-price plan for wheat be substituted for the present, administration-sponsored system of flexible price supports with marketing quotas and acreage allotments.

The Oregon Democrat is a sponsor of such legislation and a leadoff witness at the opening of the Senate agriculture committee's hearings on the entire matter of price supports for all farm products.

The hearings are scheduled to continue intermittently until late this year with some being held this fall at various places in the farm belt.

Earth Tremors Hit North Idaho

COEUR D'ALENE, June 2 (AP)—Minor earthquake hit Coeur d'Alene Tuesday but no damage was reported.

It shook the federal building "enough however" to interrupt a court case.

Federal Judge Chas. A. Clark interrupted proceedings in a case to comment on the tremor. He said he had never expected anything like it in north Idaho. An earthquake was felt in much of the area last year.

Francis Cope, a reporter for the Coeur d'Alene Press, said the quake gave her chair "a good shake."

Legs of lamb will be on the week-end good buy list in some areas, but elsewhere prices will be unchanged or a bit higher than last week. One meat buyer says lamb prices should remain about where they are while winter supplies last. When spring lamb takes over, prices are expected to rise, he adds.

Chickens Higher

Frying chicken prices are generally higher. Increases of two to six cents a pound are planned by a major chain.

Eggs also may be a few cents higher in your market. Butter prices will show little change.

If you're looking for an unusually good buy in vegetables, consider the price of lettuce.

Bargains Occur

Favorable growing weather during May in the eastern late-spring lettuce areas brought on harvests slightly ahead of schedule. The result was an overabundance of produce and bargain prices for consumers.

There are other good buys in vegetables, among them yellow and green squash, peppers, escarole, pascal celery, and nearby items such as spinach, radishes and green onions.

Beans (mostly with tops), asparagus, carrots and onions also are worthwhile purchases in the opinion of produce specialists. Heavy shipments of California long white potatoes and Florida round whites have brought lower prices. Old crop potatoes are selling for about the same as a week ago.

Beans, Corn Rise

Beans and corn went up a bit this week. Produce men consider cucumber prices rather high right now.

Strawberries are lower while oranges and grapefruit continue to win a good buy rating. Cantaloupes are much lower than a week ago but still not a bargain.

Plums are starting to arrive in eastern markets. Cherries are a little more numerous, too.

Three Peaks Are Climbed

LONDON, June 2 (AP)—Man was master today of nature's three highest and most treacherous mountain peaks.

British expedition's conquest of 28,146-foot Mt. Kangchenjunga in the Himalayas, considered the most difficult climb, toughest challenge, clinched the historic triumph by man over the world's three greatest peaks within a space of three years.

The nine-man expedition, led by Dr. Charles Evans, reported its victory in a telegram Wednesday from Darjeeling, India, which is on the Nepal border 50 miles from Kangchenjunga. The Times of London disclosed the conquest in a copyrighted dispatch today.

General Anderson conquered 29,002-foot Mt. Everest, the world's tallest, in May, 1953. Last July 31, an Italian expedition successfully assaulted 29,248-foot Annapurna, near Austen, the second highest, known as K-2.

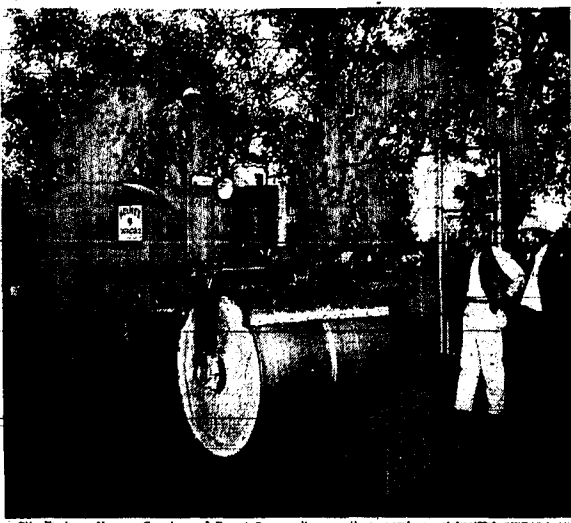

A Japanese team has occupied a sugar farm at Polonnaruwa. An American team will put up on Swamp road at Trincomalee, Kaimant and Giritira. A Dutch group is located at Kaleswewa, and a Canadian team is at Champola. An Indian group is at Hingurakanda.

A major test of one of the late Dr. Albert Einstein's most famous predictions will be made during the eclipse. The Einstein theory to be checked is one saying that a ray of light, traveling close to a massive body, will be slightly deflected by the mass of the body.

Idaho Strikes May Stop Job At AEC Plant

At least one atomic energy commission project was faced with a shutdown today as about 750 plumbers walked off the job in Idaho to bolster their demands for a 25-cent-an-hour wage increase to \$3.00 an hour and other benefits.

Some 200 members of the A.P.U. Plumbers and Steamfitters local stayed off the job at an AEC contractor said it would mean a virtual work stoppage.

The union also is asking paid vacation and changes in working rules. Edgar T. Lesinger, director of Intermountain Plumbing company, Boise, said the "fringe benefits" would bring the total increase to 61 cents an hour.

John Muller, manager of the Associated General Contractors, Boise, said three other projects might be thrown out of work if the strike should continue for a week.

The walkout left a total of about 1,250 Idahoans idled. A western states near strike has idled some 500 truck drivers and office workers for nearly two weeks.

UNITED NATIONS, June 2—A resident of the French-administered Cameroons trust territory in Africa reported by cable today that 5,000 Cameroons were killed in recent rioting.

Efforts were made here immediately by the Indian delegation to have France report to the U.N. on the situation. The French previously had charged that the uprising in the Cameroons were started by communists.

All communications from inhabitants of the U.N. trust territories are turned over to the trusteeship council here and made public without comment. In Paris during the day a group of students from the Cameroons said the death totalled several hundred.
