# First Type Polio Notes in All Tests

June 3 (AP)—Type 1 virus—the most virulent has been isolated in the first 21 tests conducted in Idaho's polio outbreak following its Salk vaccine, the state health department reported today.

The department director, said the results of the tests added emphasis to the earlier contention that the vaccine used in Idaho could be a contributing factor in the disease. Department records show 19 cases in vaccinated children, 37 "association cases" and 18 not connected with the inoculations, for a total of 74 for the year.

The state health department has said that "strong presumptive evidence" leads it to believe that two lots of the Cutter-produced vaccine, one of which was used in Idaho, contained a complete case in its nature.

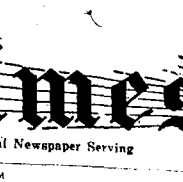

### Ike Honored For Work in Helping Jews

**WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—**The United Jewish Appeal presented its first humanitarian achievement award to President Eisenhower today for his help to survivors of Naziism during World War II.  
 The award was an ancient clay lamp from the land of the Bible recovered during archeological excavations in Israel.  
 William Rosenwald, general chairman, and 11 other national officers of the appeal made the presentation at the White House "to commemorate the tenth anniversary of the liberation of the victims of Nazi tyranny."  
 They cited Mr. Eisenhower for his "inspiring and unforgettable role in that great event."  
 A citation read by Rosenwald said: "In 1945 ... you led the allied forces to victory. ... you set a pattern of humane and helpful treatment. 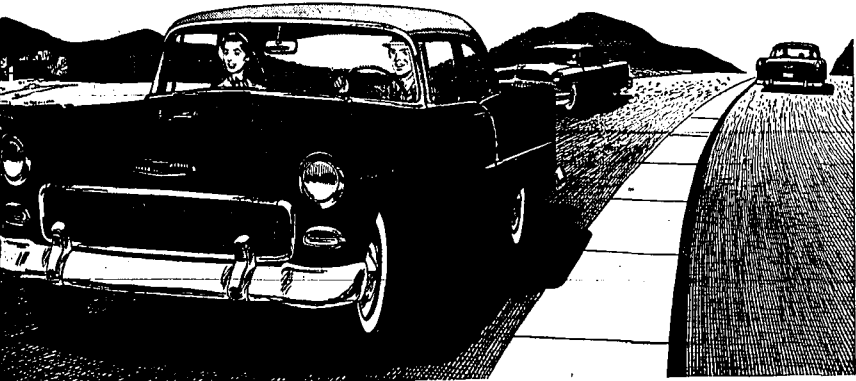

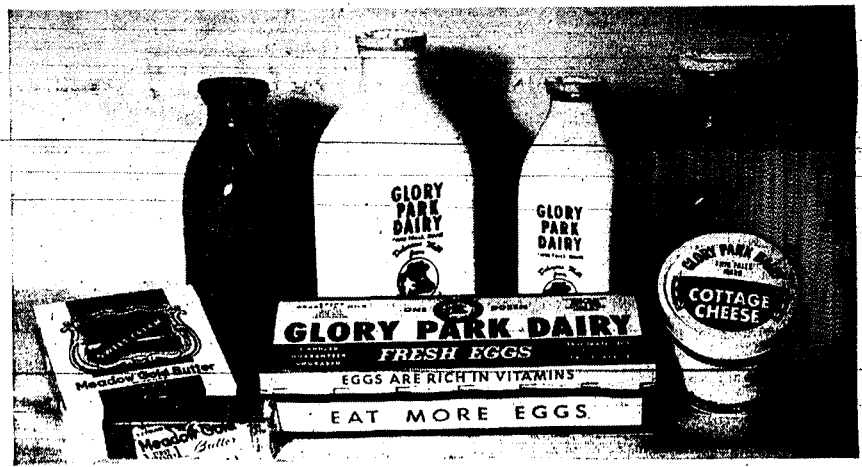

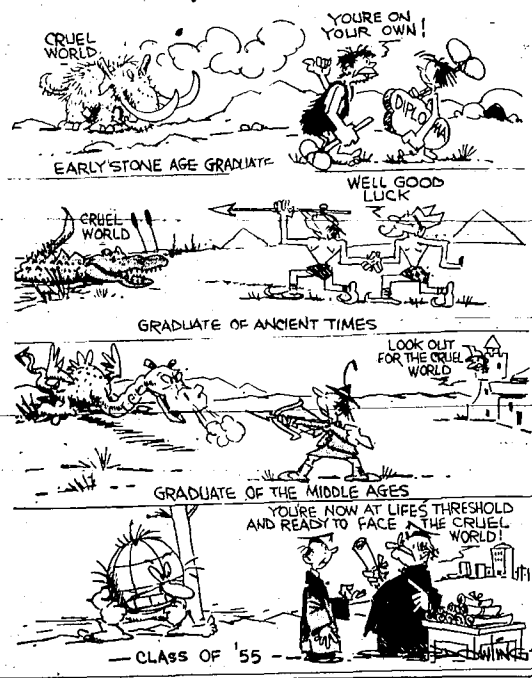

### Dearth of Built-in Bomb Shelters in New Houses Worrying Defense Agency

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—Some 4,200 houses were completed in this country Wednesday, and probably not five of them had their own built-in bomb shelters.  
 This is cause for concern to the civil defense administration, President Eisenhower and David Scull, Washington contractor.  
 The civil defense people have been arguing, without much success, that no home is complete without a bomb shelter.  
 "One official put it this way: 'If they dropped a bomb on our cities tomorrow, 95 per cent of us would get it. But if we had bomb shelters at least 85 per cent could be saved.' Only Tuesday, Eisenhower, without specifically mentioning bomb shelters, said he hopes for a 'speed-up' in the enthusiasm of the average citizen to do his part' in civil defense. 'I must reiterate,' he said, 'that civil defense is largely a matter that falls on each of us ourselves.'"  
 Scull is trying to do the job. He builds the things and as far as the demand for shelters hasn't been overwhelming.  
 "Well, why all the apathy?" Scull probably has as good an answer as any. "Most people," he said, "simply don't want to think about the thing. That's the sad part of it."  
 Scull, Scull, a World War II veteran, got to thinking about the thing. And so he built himself a shelter in his own basement. As a contractor, he decided there might be a profit in building shelters for others.  
 The score so far: One built, two on order.  
 Scull isn't too depressed about that. He points out that it takes through to figure costs so that a contractor can name a price on any prospective bomb shelter. And he says that he is getting many agencies in the mood to advance money for such projects.  
 The present cost: Around \$100. If you are a do-it-yourself fiend, it's less.

### New Soviet Rulers Try Hard To Be Different From Stalin

WASHINGTON, June 3 (AP)—The Kremlin's present rulers seem to be trying hard to show they are different from their old boss, aloof, stubborn Joseph Stalin.  
 This may go far to explain why the Russians of late have been acting moderately and even cooperatively, as they did in letting Americans have independence.  
 They probably figured it was time for a switch, that they could catch more favor with the west. Stalin was a real "Vinegar Joe."  
 He got Russia into a dead end. With his inflexible hardness he forced the western allies into rearmament and unity, the last thing Russia wanted.  
 Three of the top Russians, visiting Yugoslavia under the eyes of western newsmen, act like go-getting businessmen, admiring the competitor's establishment.  
 They examine a Yugoslav factory and commended the amount of cement that was used to build it. They say "publicly" their own Russians depend too much on steel.  
 Their performance to date—in public—has been a combination of visiting firemen, jolly good fellows and country cousins to the Yugoslavs.  
 Nikita S. Khrushchev, Russia's Communist party boss, gaily explains to an Associated Press reporter why he talks so fast: "Life is short. Live it up."  
 While the first sign is being felt of Khrushchev and Natasia I. Mikoyan, head of the Russian government, who did most of the talking.  
 Stalin, fixed in his ways, moved ahead by phoning forward like a bull. He never seemed to change. And almost every time he moved

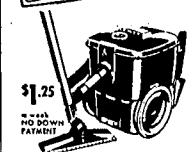
# Tax Commission Sets June Meet

# 'Ageless' Man Dies; Body Is Taken by Pal

UTAH STATE PRISON, June 3 (AP)—A man described as a "friend and student" of convict Hiram BeBe took custody of the body of the "ageless" killer's body yesterday. BeBe, one of Utah state prison's most colorful characters, died in prison hospital yesterday morning after a long illness. His age was not known, but prison officials said he had admitted to being 105 years old earlier this week.

Clatsop Age BeBe has no known relatives. His wife, Glame, died in 1953 while on her way for a weekly visit with her husband at the prison. The convict had unshorn locks and a scraggy beard when he died. But the beard wasn't what itched to be shaved. Prison officials gave him an enforced shave and haircut in 1949, trimming a set of whiskers that reached almost to his waist. BeBe had fought to keep his whiskers all the time.

"I've had this hair for centuries," he had said then. "It was given me as a personal present by mother nature." Settlement Made In Damage Suit HONOLULU, June 3 (AP)—The International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union has settled a long-standing one-million-dollar damage judgment won by the Hawaiian Spruce company, Alaska, for \$250,000.

The ILWU's Hawaii regional director, Jack Hall, said yesterday the Alaska firm had accepted the \$250,000 settlement and would be paid from a \$335,000 settlement the ILWU won from the Hawaiian sugar companies in a fair labor standard suit. The Alaska lumber firm originally sued the ILWU for \$1,225,000 for damages it said it had suffered in a hurricane strike which closed the company in 1948. The company was awarded \$350,000 by the sum grant. The \$250,000 was added court costs and interest during the union's long fight for a reversal.

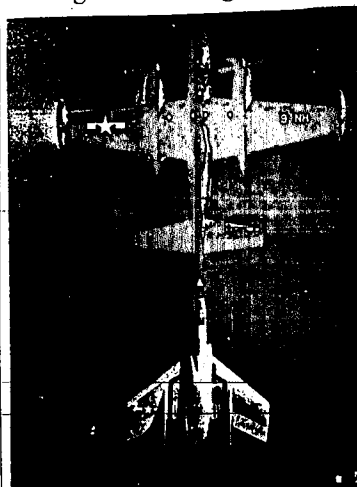

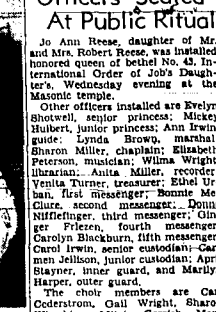

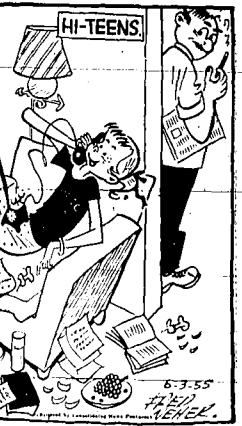

# Millionaire Is Carrying Gold Yoke on Neck

NEW YORK, June 3 (AP)—Jack Turner, a millionaire leather-tough citizen from Utah who grew up among cattle, sheep, cactus, and areas of throwaway dirt containing worthless mineral called uranium, is in town with a yoke of misery on his face.

He is struggling under a monstrous burden: 21 million dollars. And it's growing bigger all the time. Being a multi-millionaire can weigh down a fellow like... well, like a yoke of solid gold.

Turner came out of the army at the end of World War II. Before the war he had made a 50-50 living mining vanadium around his native Utah. When he was drafted, he sold his four mines. (One of them, in Wild Steer canyon, which he sold for \$500, has since made five million dollars.)

**Works in California**  
He was working at a \$4,000-a-year job in California when, in 1948, he read that big money was waiting to be paid for the uranium-laden ore that he used to throw away in his stamp piles. He hurried back to Moab, traded his outworn Chevy for a truck, and began hauling ore from dumps that he knew about.

There, at 27, a wiry sort with blue eyes, hornrim glasses, a receding hairline, and the slightly lined face of an outdoor man, he has a tendency to talk like Herb Shriner, the Hoosier entertainer.

"I'm a little bit of a 'get back,'" he said. "I'm one I'd had—well, it was right outside town, was where it was—and shoveled up dirt I had thrown away before, and I got paid for it. That was the initial start."

**Keeps Doubling**  
"In California, working for an oil company, I got on my hind end and twisted knobs. It was a deaxing plant, was what it was. My first year in the uranium business, 1948, I doubled the \$4,000 I'd made the year before. In 1949, I doubled my intake of 1948—and I just kept on doubling. My wife, Aggie, used to drive a truck and come out and get the cooking for us when I was getting started."

In 1952, Turner discovered one of the most valuable ore bodies in the whole uranium-rich region. Now he owns some 1,000 claims, 15 to 20 operating mines, and as many more non-operating mines.

**Tells Difference**  
"The only difference it's made for me in work harder, that's all. It's a terrible lot different from working with a pick in a mine. It just seems to keep a guy busy every minute. It's all conferences, meetings, lawyers, paperwork. I'd like to be able to spend some time with my family."

"I want to do things I'd expect to do if I had that much money. Makes a fellow think. I was planning a fishing trip to Vancouver for 18 months now. Aggie is waiting for me right now, to come get her and make that trip. And I'm waiting out of patience."

**Turns Folks**  
"We're simple people," Turner said. "We have two cars, as all. We renovated our house. It's a three-bedroom place. I think we have the nicest kitchen in Moab. Aggie built that kitchen. It's a real way she wanted it. She's a wonderful cook, can cook better'n my mother, even, and that's saying a lot."
