Two More Polio Cases Reported

For Idaho Is Now 82

Two more polio cases were reported today, raising the total to 82 for the year through June of 1954. Latest victims were two Idaho children, Frank Hanney, 4, Shelley, 2, Idaho Falls.

General Leonard Scheele, state health department official, meanwhile, said he backs up the theory that the virus advanced almost a month ago that the serum is at least partially to blame for the state's polio outbreak.

Doctors said the Hansen boy had a tooth which had the same polio vaccine, and the Hanney youngster was in contact with either a brother or a sister who was vaccinated.

The two confirmed "household contact" cases increased the total in this category to 43. There have been 39 cases among school children, but the last of these was reported May 23. All other cases listed have not been involved in the state's polio vaccine program.

Scheele said in a speech before the American Medical Association that evidence gathered by U.S. health service supports hypotheses that some vaccine produced by the Cutter Laboratories contained "infected virus."

All of the vaccine used in Idaho for its mass inoculation program was received from Cutter.

Subcommittee OK's Big Federal Dam in Hells Canyon Fight

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—A bill to authorize construction of a power dam in Hells canyon of the Snake river between Idaho and Oregon was approved today by a senate interior subcommittee. The half-billion-dollar dam would be in an area where Idaho Power company proposes to build three power dams.

The subcommittee vote was 3-1. The three senators who approved the bill, among 30 sponsors at it, were Subcommittee Chairman Anderson, D., N.M., O'Mahoney, D., Wyo., and Jackson, D., Wash. Senator Watkins, R., Utah, voted against the bill. Senator Millikin, R., Colo., did not vote.

Anderson told reporters the bill probably will be taken up by the full senate committee, where the vote is expected to be close, about June 22.

A statement issued after the closed door meeting of his committee referred to Idaho Power's application for federal power commission license for three dams in the Snake, a Columbia river tributary.

Examining William J. Costello, of the commission, after a year-long hearing on the application, recently recommended that Idaho should be licensed to build one dam. He said it would be "useless" to recommend the federal Hells canyon dam because congress has not authorized such a project in previous sessions.

Examining Costello found the prime-power production of the high federal dam would be 83 per cent greater than the three proposed private licenses, but not greater than the single dam recommended by Costello, Anderson said.

Costello said he thought much as he would like to see the dam built, he certainly hopes it will do this. This is the kind of project which has helped to make the west a vital part of the nation's economy.

"I don't only wish this project pay back its entire cost with interest but it will give the power to a dozen times over by creating new jobs, new industry and a broader base for the economy. To do as such where power."

Allotment on Sugar Beets Is Protested

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—Rep. Grace P. Post, Idaho, charged today that the administration has turned its back on a compelling western problem. He said the federal allotment of 100,000 tons of sugar to western beet producers who are being forced to work under limited acreage allotments.

"The farm state Democrat said the American sugar industry is vital and stabilizing part of the country's agricultural economy.

"It is a little short of unbelievable that American farmers and businessmen engaged in such industry should be left their place in the world market for foreign sugar producers," he said.

The congressman added he considered it "an undignified error in judgment not to allow sugar beet growers to have a share of fixed acreage quotas which are threatening the welfare of the domestic industry."

"I feel confident," Mr. Post said, "that congress will give this problem the sympathetic and understanding attention it deserves."

Compromise Policy Released on Sugar

WASHINGTON, June 8 (AP)—The government announced today a compromise policy on sugar legislation to provide some increase in marketing quotas for domestic producers, but not as great a cut in Cuba's sugar sales in this country as U-S producers had asked.

The government's plan proposed "special relief" for domestic producers in 1955 by giving them an increase of 100,000 tons in their marketing quotas, plus 55 per cent of U. S. sugar consumption above 8-350,000 tons. This would cut Cuba's sugar sales to the United States approximately 175,000 tons in 1955, \$115 million pending in congress has proposed a 240,000-ton cut.

Senator Bennett, R., Utah, who has been acting as unofficial spokesman for the 49 senators opposing legislation, announced the administration policy.

Similar announcements were made to representatives sponsoring sugar legislation by Rep. Hiram H. Hays, R., Kans., and at a meeting of domestic industry representatives at the department of agriculture.

The house bill, which has had hearings on sugar legislation starting June 22.

Senator Knowland, R., Calif., Republican, said he hoped the bill "will definitely be action on sugar legislation" during this session of congress. He spoke after a meeting of Republican congressional leaders with the President.

New Nuclear Sub, Seawolf, Almost Ready

GROTON, Conn., June 8 (AP)—The atomic-powered submarine *Seawolf*, the second nuclear-powered warship of the navy, will be christened and launched here July 21, it was announced today.

The *Seawolf*, larger and more powerful than the USS *Nautilus*, will slip down the ways at the electric boat division of General Dynamics corporation, where the *Nautilus* was commissioned last September.

Commander Named

The *Seawolf* will be commanded by Cmdr. Richard B. Lanning whose assignment to the ship was announced today.

The defense department said that the *Seawolf* will provide the navy with a vehicle for evaluating the relative merits of different types of propulsion plant from that which was installed in the *Nautilus*. The ship will be used to test the feasibility of the sea operations of the two submarines.

The *Nautilus* power plant is called a "fast reactor" because it is cooled by high pressure water and was built for the atomic energy commission at Groton.

Sodium Fuel

The power plant to be installed in the *Seawolf* will be known as a "submarine fast reactor." This reactor is being built by General Electric.

The keel of the *Seawolf* was laid here Sept. 18, 1953.

The electric boat division also will build at least two other atomic-powered submarines. Under the navy's 1955 budget, one will be constructed here and another at Groton. Others are in the planning stage.

Bonn Officials Welcome Note On Russ Offer

BONN, Germany, June 8 (AP)—The West German government today welcomed the Kremlin's note calling for normal diplomatic relations with Russia and said it hoped the Soviet move will lead to a conference between West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer and Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Meanwhile, the three biggest parties in West Germany jettied the unexpected and bold Soviet diplomatic move.

The unexpected Soviet move caused some doubt on the plans for a July 18 meeting at Geneva of the western big three heads of government with Russia's topmost representative.

French authorities said the Kremlin's new strategy would force France and the other big three western powers to revise their planned strategy for the top-level Geneva conference.

A political observer said the Soviet maneuver raised "some doubts" about the Geneva meeting.

The state's powerful opposition Socialist party urged Adenauer to make his Moscow trip before the four power talks are held next month. But informed German sources said it is highly unlikely Adenauer will go to the Soviet capital, Moscow.

Strikes Seen As Ford and CIO Ink Pact

DETROIT, June 8 (AP)—The CIO United Auto Workers formally announced today a tentative pact with the Ford Motor company today while General Motors workers, impatient to receive the same guarantee against anti-strikes, told more than 40,000.

The new contract was signed after a delay of nearly four hours, but it is expected to be in effect by the end of the week.

The agreement was signed by UAW President Walter Reuther and Ford Vice President Walter Dill Scott. The pact is expected to be in effect by the end of the week.

Walter Reuther said the demand for the extra five-cent hourly pay hike had been thrown back as a "local matter."

General Motors workers expressed dissatisfaction over union action in extending the contract with General Motors until mid-July.

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Boys' States Select Magic Valley Youths

BOISE, June 8 (AP)—Tim Dayley, Jerome, captured the governorship of the 12th annual Gem Boys' state yesterday, but voters of the rival "silver party" walked off with a U. S. senate seat and named a lieutenant governor. Dayley defeated Rex Call, Rigby, in voting for governor, but his running mate, Dave Thompson, Wallace, lost to Bill Alworth, Twin Falls, for lieutenant governorship. Floy Ayers, Jerome, was elected U. S. senator. Dayley's "Gold party" adopted a platform calling for higher teachers' pay, more funds for access roads and civil defense planning, and an increase in non-resident fishing and hunting license fees.

The Silver party asked for 18-year-old suffrage, a "right to work" law, statehood for Alaska and Hawaii, universal military training, and more education for youngsters on the harmful effects of tobacco, alcohol and narcotics.

The youths met in the Appleton hotel in Boise yesterday. Gov. Robert E. Smylie, launching the two-day legislative session. The general election would be the second since the 1952 election. School children who are taking part in the week-long mock government election will be the first to vote.

Other election results included first district congress—Lonnie Ayers, Lewiston; second district congress—Bill Whitzler, Falls Church; secretary of state—Roger Jordan, Idaho Falls; state treasurer—Bob Pierce, Lewiston; state auditor—Bill Moore, Twin Falls; inspector—Danny Forsyth, Jerome.

Dip Noted in State Income Levy Return

BOISE, June 8 (AP)—Idaho income tax payments are still showing a dip, but the level of last year has been reached by the 11-month period ending May 31 showed a net decline of \$22,304 in total state income tax collections for the 11-month period.

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Officials Slate Meet to Close British Strike

LONDON, June 8 (AP)—The British government agreed today to meet with striking engineers and firemen in an attempt to end Britain's disastrous 11-day-old railway walkout.

The meeting, scheduled for this afternoon, will be the first direct contact between the British Transport commission which operates the nationalized railways, and the strikers since the walkout began May 31.

Previously the government had insisted that there could be no negotiations until the striking Association of Locomotive Engineers and Firemen (ALEF) called off its work stoppage.

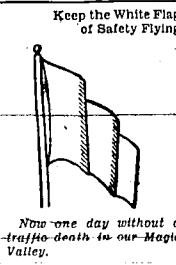

CHICAGO, June 8 (AP)—Slim Brundage, a "housekeeper" by trade, runs one of the world's most unusual taverns, an open forum sort of place known as the "college of complexes."

"We cater to artists, writers, intellectuals and assorted screwballs," Brundage said, "and every now and then we get somebody with the price of a drink."

The college of complexes occupies the ground floor of an old building on the near north side. It's a couple of doors from the old Dill Pickle Club, famed for its Chicagoan literary during the roaring '20's.

Formal Held
The open forums are held in the back room in the best tradition of the soap box and cracker barrel.

Speakers have included an imposing array of college professors, politicians, clergymen, lawyers and writers.

It's a diversified "course" the college offers. A recent speaker was Alois Knapp, operator of Zoro nuclear park, who spoke on "Is Anti-Nuclearism a Rocket?"

There was a recent book review on "The Physiology of Sex," and a talk by Dr. Philip A. Anderson of Chicago Theological seminary on "Why Are People Going Back to Religion?"

Qualification Given
To qualify for membership one must be declared lacking in sanity by the college psychiatrist, who happens to be a cab driver with an IQ of 100.

The college offers a degree of "bachelor of complexes maximum-graduation."

Fortcoming programs are printed in a bulletin known as "The Official Neurosis." Activities include folk singing, poetry and an intellectual-type quiz program, in which only a genius would stand a chance.

Oddly Decorated
The college is decorated with odd-looking paintings by one of Brundage's customers. Behind the bar is a shelf lined with the ornate mugs of steady customers.

The walls are blackboards. Brundage provides chalk so his patrons can scribble. A random sampling of intellectual humor:

"Chicago has the best politicians money can buy—Eliot."

"Eliot was good for nothing, but she wasn't bad for nothing."

"Work is the cure of the drinking classes."

"Nothing a woman says above a whisper is worth listening to—Grandfather."

Italian Premier Mario Scelba may have saved his job by his victory in the Sicilian regional election. It is so, in good news for the United States and its allies. Scelba is a firm friend of this country. He hates the communists, and the communists hate him.

Scelba has been in trouble for several months. The coalition which he leads is shaky. Rebels in his own Christian Democratic party have been gunning for him. He suffered a loss of prestige when Giovanni Gronchi, one of his party enemies, was elected president of Italy on April 29.

Gronchi is a member of the left wing of the Christian Democratic party. Scelba's leadership is opposed also by a strong group of right-wing members of the party.

Scelba's pro-American, anti-red policy has been strengthened, and he has been strengthened personally, by the Sicilian victory.

There is to be a Christian Democratic party caucus Friday. What will happen there remains to be seen. But the stocky, smiling, 50-year-old premier may be expected to face his critics boldly and to ask no favors. At the moment, his chance of riding out a threatened crisis looks good.

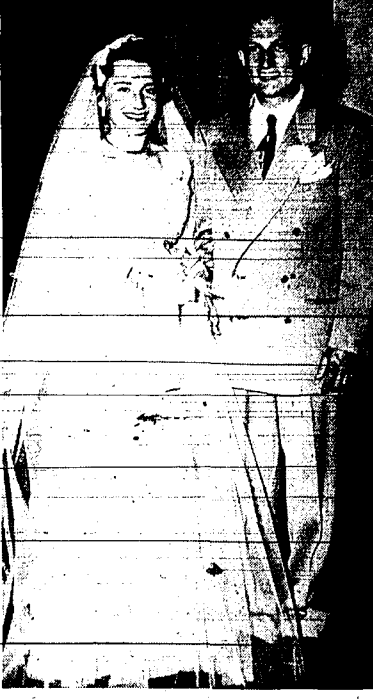

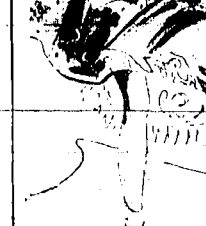

Bulwark for Liberty Seen In Practices

BOZEFON, June 8—Practical application of scientific Christianity in building a mighty bulwark for individual and universal liberty, the National Science board of directors declared today.

Addressing a gathering of some 7,500 Christian Scientists at the annual meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass., the directors declared that the "assurance of freedom from sickness as well as from sin, from want and war as well as from forebodings of despair" is available to all through spiritual understanding of God.

"The uncertainties which confuse and perplex the nations become less alarming," the portents more propitious as the certainty of God's guidance is better understood," the directors stated.

Delegates from all over the world—Australia, Africa, Switzerland, Germany, Great Britain, Sweden, Japan and other distant points, as well as Canada and the United States—came to Boston for the meeting which has been held annually for more than a century.

Smaller meetings on specialized subjects convene on days following the main sessions.

"Communistism—the world's fight for freedom, the directors called for individual, spiritual alertness in meeting the moral, political and wicked manipulations which seem to be so potent in the struggle."

"In every new usage of the will we find fresh proofs of the presence and redemptive power of the Christ," they said.

Forecasting victory for the lovers of freedom, they declared that the way is being paved for "the reconciliation of all nations and for the reign of harmony on earth."

New president of The Mother Church for the coming year, it was announced, is Mrs. Gertrude W. Elsemann of Boston. In her keynote address Mrs. Elsemann stressed the need for churches which the churches can do to help mankind cope with contemporary problems and to establish the effectiveness of healing according to the pattern of the Christ.

"The present availability of divine healing was stressed by William R. Knox, of Boston, retiring president, who said "Our Redeemer lives and works today to heal the sick and reclaim our lives from sin and mortality."

Healings through spiritual means alone of broken bones, immorality, rheumatism, heart trouble, and polyomyelitis were among those reported. By Gordon V. Conner, clerk of The Mother Church, reports to Christian Science activities for the armed services. Other Christian Science healings cited at the meeting included total recovery from alcoholism, deafness, blindness, dumbness, lameness, stuttering and congenital dislocated hip.

More widespread public acceptance of divine healing was reported by Will B. Davis, managing director of Christian Science committees on publication. Many insurance companies, he said, are now adding special riders to their policies recognizing Christian Science practitioners, nurses, and sanatoriums.

Increasing demand for lectures on college campuses was announced by The Christian Science Board for Lectureship in a report read by John B. Sammons of Chicago. Mr. Sammons also disclosed that over 4,000 lectures including many in Asia and other overseas areas were given during the past year.

New translations of certain of the writings of Mary Baker Eddy, the discoverer and founder of Christian Science, into French, Greek and seven other languages were announced by the trustees under her will.

Membership figures are not published by the denomination, but a net gain of 31 branches of The Mother Church in the past year was reported, bringing the total to more than 3,100 in some 40 countries. Among the branches are recently are those in Salzburg, Austria; Upper Hut, New Zealand;

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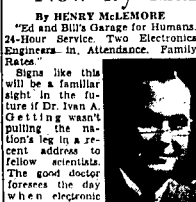
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Garage for Humans Awaited Now by Man-With Mileage

"I imagine the American Automobile association will increase their already fine facilities. With his built-in walkie-talkie (this chest seems a good place for that) a disabled man will be able to call an AAA troubleshooter who'll rush out and recharge his kneecap batteries, replace the brushes on his heart generator, or as a last resort, put him on a pair of skates and tow him into the nearest garage.

We will all have to be more careful as pedestrians. With delicate mechanisms packed inside, a hurried bump coming out of a door, or a slip on a sidewalk, could injure us so badly we'd have to be rushed to MIT, Calif. Tech, or Georgia Tech, for major surgery.

I'm counting the days until I can get my brain, air-conditioned. I'm sure I won't need a big unit."

I think Dr. Getting is right, because he can't walk but he'll myself up the ramp of a good electronic clinic and get a complete overhaul from ball bouncer to headlights. It'll be uncomfortable sitting for a couple of hours hoisted up in the air on one of those hydraulic jacks, but it'll be worth it.

Just think of a man my age, with goodness knows how much mileage, rolling out of the human garage with every squeak knee, the old motor purring like a cat, and with a sticker on my forehead saying I won't need any more tires and lubrication for, say, another 10 years. What a grand feeling that will be! I might even go for a reprieve while I'm in there.

Let's listen in on the conversation between a man-stop-a-minute trouble-maker repair shop for a check-up.

Doctor: I just can't seem to get going in the morning. It couldn't be my self-starter, because I had a new one put in only a month ago.

The doctor changes into a clean pair of overalls, lapel pins with a lug wrench, puts him on a device to see if his eyes, ears, nose and throat are lined up properly, and recommends another specialist.

"You're troubled with a short circuit," the doctor says. "You need to see a good wiring man, and I don't particularly like the sound of the booster pump you have. There's also a knock in your chassis, but Dr. Edwards will make you as good as new. And I wouldn't be at all surprised if your right mastoid needed retreading."

With "us humans running about loaded with mechanical parts, a lot of us are going to be breaking down at inconvenient spots. It's had enough to have one's car stop in the middle of a desert or on the slope of a steep hill, but when one stops oneself—well, there has to be help around."

Uranium Leases Sought in Region

FORT WASHAKIE, Wyo., June 8—Some 10 uranium lease applications are being considered by the Arapahoe and Shoshone Indian tribes, and they have led to speculation that the Wind River reservation may soon be opened to active uranium development.

Letters sent by the tribes to the applicants advise them the tribes will consider granting leases up to 40 acres if the applicants can prove they have discoveries of commercial ore.

Copies of the letters also have been sent to persons holding permits to prospect on the reservation, but who have not made application for leases.

She was Mrs. Mary Cecilia Vance, whose husband Clarence was here for the western regional convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers.

Vance is a retired engineer.

Divorce Granted To Millionaire

LAS VEGAS, Nev., June 8—Mrs. Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney Gubaldoni, member of two multimillionaire families, has won an uncontested divorce from Luis Emilio Gubaldoni of Peru.

A jury of six men and six women deliberated about 30 minutes in District Judge Frank McNamee's court yesterday before deciding in favor of Mrs. Gubaldoni, who charged her husband deserted her three years ago.

Gubaldoni wrote Judge McNamee after the verdict was filed last December, demanding a jury trial and denying his wife's allegations, but he did not appear at the trial.

Judge McNamee awarded Mrs. Gubaldoni custody of the couple's two children, Barbara Gertrude, 8, and Luis Vincent, 5, but it was believed she would have difficulty taking possession of them. When Gubaldoni left, he took the children and they are believed to now be in either Europe or South America.

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
