Time Testing Of Bees Gets Slight Delay

NEW YORK, June 14 (AP)—Bad flying weather yesterday postponed the start of time experiments with a hive of bees from the University of Natural History. Dr. Max Reuter, a German scientist, decided to postpone bringing the bees here until today. "We want to begin the experiments immediately after their arrival," said Dr. T. C. Schneir, curator of animal behavior for the Museum of Natural History. Trained in Paris, the bees have been trained at the University of Paris to come out of their hive from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. each night to drink sugar water. A group of scientists is trying to find out if bees really have built-in clocks and if so, how do they work. The room used in the Paris tests has been duplicated at the museum, even to the direction it faces. Will Be Watched For three days, starting immediately after the bees' arrival, they will be watched to see if they emerge from their hives to seek the water at the same time they did in Paris. Their Paris feeding time will be from 8:30 to 5:30 p.m. in New York time.

Train Leaves Rails; No One Killed or Hurt

SULPHUR, Nev., June 14 (AP)—Western Pacific's cattle eastbound California Zephyr struck a section of washed-out track last night but 150 passengers and 30 crewmen escaped injury in the derailment.

Officials in San Francisco said the three unit diesel engine and nine cars of the 12 car train left the tracks, but all remained upright.

The Zephyr, which was en route to Chicago, was 30 miles west of Winnemucca when it struck the spot where a cloudburst had washed out a short section of track.

A Western Pacific spokesman said the speed limit in the area is 40 miles an hour. However, he said that it is reasonable to assume that the train was proceeding slowly.

Officials of the railroad said the track was not expected to be cleared until midnight tonight, but a relief train was en route from Salt Lake City Utah, so that the passengers could continue their trip east.

Zephyr-trains from San Francisco and Chicago today will be detoured along the Southern Pacific tracks between Sacramento, Calif., and Winnemucca, Nev.

Damage Rises From Lash of Severe Storm

LAS VEGAS, Nev., June 14 (AP)—Damage from Las Vegas' worst storm in more than 20 years, which lashed the southern Nevada resort town with heavy rain and hail, was estimated today at "at least" \$150,000.

A fire department official said he would not be surprised if damage from the storm late yesterday ran as high as one million dollars.

The hailstorm pelted the town for 20 minutes followed by a half-hour of rain which the weather bureau listed at 3.9 of an inch and described as "a pretty good amount" for this area.

The storm dumped hailstones so thick that streets appeared blanketed with snow and debris and flood waters cut off main highways temporarily.

Most of the damage was reported in the northern section of town where water from the flash flood poured off the mountains and ran as high as three feet in some areas. The downtown area and gambling casinos along the famed strip suffered only slight damage.

Regulation for Election Fund Facing Battles

WASHINGTON, June 14 (AP)—A new move in congress' 50-year effort to enact realistic regulation of political campaign was headed today toward possible trouble on the southern front.

Assisting senate rules committee action was a proposal with subcommittee endorsement to hike spending limits for all federal elective contests, and for primary and pre-convention limits.

Increase Asked

National committee spending would be increased from the three million dollars fixed by the 1953 Hatch act to about 21 million dollars. This presidential campaign spending figure would be calculated on a basis of 20 cents for each vote cast in any of the last three presidential elections.

Senate candidates could spend at least \$50,000 and house candidates \$22,500, but more in larger states where the maximum figure would be 30 cents for each vote cast in the last previous election.

Senators now are limited to from \$10,000 to \$25,000 and representatives to from \$2,500 to \$5,000, depending on the population represented.

Close Loophole

The subcommittee proposal also would close a contribution-loophole whereby an individual could give the maximum \$5,000 political gift to as many organizations and candidates as he chooses. The new individual gift-limit would be \$10,000 which could go to a single organization or candidate or be divided among several.

Candidates would have to assume responsibility for all spending in their behalf—so they couldn't get around the limits by having several separate committees working for their election.

The catch in this proposed legislation is that it would apply also to primary and pre-convention campaigns.

Balk at Regulation

Southern members of congress traditionally have balked at federal regulation of primaries. They have argued that the constitution gives the federal government authority only over "elections" and that such authority does not extend to primaries.

Sen. Price Daniel, D. Tex., reflected this historic southern position today when he said, in comment on the new proposals, that "we don't think congress has any business controlling the primary campaigns. I think the states ought to set those limits."

There are doubters as well as southern lawmakers who will take that position.

Radford testified before the house foreign affairs committee in support of President Eisenhower's request for \$3 billion dollars in foreign aid next year, including \$1,400,000,000 in military assistance.

The 69-year-old Radford, recently appointed to a second two-year term as chairman of the joint chiefs of staff, said the foreign aid program is not a "giveaway" but "on the contrary is essential and realistic from our standpoint."

LONDON, June 14 (AP)—Western diplomats said today Russian uneasiness over Communist China's sudden rise to power in the Soviet east is the reason for the China's new campaign of friendship in the west.

They suggested that Peking has risen toward the status of a world power far faster than the Kremlin expected and that the Soviet is trying to ease its relations with the west to keep her hands free for future dealings with her huge Asian neighbor.

The diplomats based this assessment on two parallel developments in the affairs of Peking: its increasing willingness to assert itself and Moscow's subsequent campaign to "normalize" relations with India, Yugoslavia and West Germany.

The situation has an example in recent world history. Adolf Hitler at the opening of World war II looked westward to the hostile democracies and eastward toward a growing, assertive Russia.

Hitler's answer was to make friends with one side while he dealt with the other. He signed non-aggression pacts, a short-lived one, with Russia and then fought the west.

Diplomatic observers who suggested this classic strategy as a possible explanation of the Soviet's present policy said the outcome would not necessarily be tension between Russia and China.

But they said Chinese Communist growth still may be carrying certain uneasiness in Moscow over the potentialities of the new colossus which borders the Soviet Union for thousands of miles. That lone border holds the potentiality of differences over territory and population.

Diplomatic sources said these trends would make the recent Soviet advances to western Europe plausible and acceptable though the west would remain alert against any Soviet "plant."

Meets Continue By Russ, Japan

LONDON, June 14 (AP)—Russia and Japan resume their negotiations today on the restoration of diplomatic relations between the two countries and observers predicted the first sign of progress would come then.

Soviet Ambassador Jacob Malik and Japanese Matsumoto, leader of the fifth meeting of their series in London. The last session was held on June 7, and each side referred the proposals and counter-proposals to their home governments.

Malik was expected to give the Soviet reply and observers said he probably would offer counter-proposals which might meet some of the Japanese views.

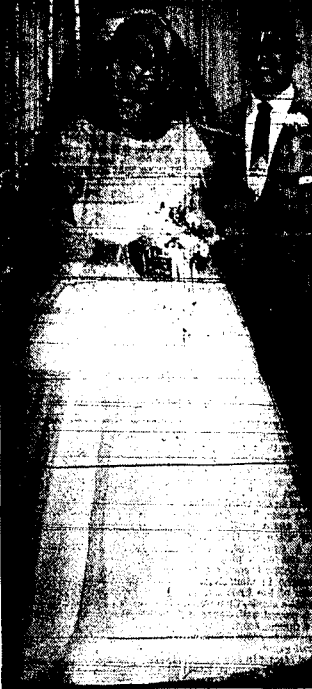

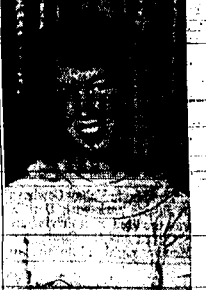

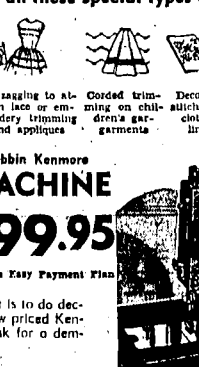

General Eyes Soviet Efforts In New Arms

NEW YORK, June 14 (AP)—A top aid force general said last night he is concerned about the "grave possibility" Russia might perfect a new super intercontinental guided missile. He added this could be a most difficult advantage to overcome.

Lt. Gen. Donald L. Pitt, deputy chief of staff for development, said he was concerned about the "small size" of our national effort in basic research.

"We have had clear evidence that we can no longer be complacent in going about our research and development of new and radically advanced weapons," he said.

Opinions Differ
The general's opinion, voiced in a speech prepared for the Polytich Institute of Brooklyn, appeared somewhat different from recently expressed views on research by Secretary of Defense Wilson.

Pitt's statements appeared more in line with a recent report by the Hoover commission on Government reorganization, which criticized the military services for "insufficient daring and initiative in their approach to radically new weapons."

Wilson Quoted
Wilson said last week it was "not completely fair" to say that we are lagging in basic research. "We are lagging in the military services," he said.

Pitt did not elaborate on prospects for a Russian intercontinental missile, but he said he was concerned the communists might develop one by an all-out effort such as the United States put into the first atomic bomb.

Idaho Will Attempt to Capture New Taste Market, That of Fresh Trout

BOISE, June 14 (AP)—Idaho, already famed for her potatoes, is making a bid to capture another taste market with commercially-raised rainbow trout.

Today, the bulk of commercial trout production is claimed by Idaho hatcheries. An estimated 2 million pounds will be marketed this year. With her sister state of Utah, Idaho also will produce about 75 million pounds of rainbow trout.

Faced with the competition of foreign trout at lower prices and what American producers say are often poor quality fish, Idaho producers have gone after the "taste market" the first class hotel, moist and restaurant trade.

Robert A. Erkins, president of the Snake River Trout company, Buhl, and also secretary of the Rocky Mountain Troutmen association, says there are two major objections to foreign trout.

One of these, he says, is price—much lower than American producers can offer. The other, Erkins asserts, is inferior quality, which injures the entire trout market.

"These foreign trout usually are sold to the public as American trout by using the names on menus, and in other ways which leave little impression," Erkins says. "This ruins customers for future trout purchases."

Idaho congressmen tried last year to get through a law that would compel foreign trout producers to clearly label their product. The proposal passed Congress, but it was vetoed by President Eisenhower.

The first successful attempt to propagate trout artificially in the United States was by Dr. Theodatus Garlick, Cleveland, O., in 1857. The first trout hatchery was started in 1864 by Seth Green, Montford, N. Y.

While the bulk of commercial trout production now is found in Idaho hatcheries, other states contributing to the market are Washington, California, Utah, Colorado, Missouri, Arkansas, Michigan, Wisconsin and Massachusetts.

Idaho hatcheries ship live trout into many states for stream stocking by private groups. President Eisenhower caught Idaho-raised trout in some of his Colorado fishing haunts.

Erkins estimated that about 900,000 pounds of trout will be shipped from Idaho this year to stock private streams.
