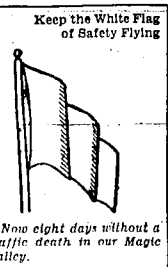

### Guaranteed Wage Known in Italy One Decade; Is Viewed

ROME, June 15 (AP)—Italy has a form of guaranteed annual wage. But here, GAW is run by the government.  
Lavor likes the plan. Management "hates" it. Economists disagree about its effect on the national economy.  
The plan was started 10 years ago and has helped hold the line against further unemployment in Italy. This is a fact of indisputable importance in a communist-threatened nation where one of every five workers does not have a full-time job.  
With two million workers permanently unemployed and two million under-employed in a work force of 20 million, labor's first concern in Italy is security. The average industrial wage is less than \$3,000 lire (\$80 a month).  
Economists point out there are few fair bases for comparison between the Italian and American standards of living... wages... of Italian companies to form monopolies—these leave the two nations poles apart in any comparison.  
Here is what the Italians do: All industrial employees pay a sum equal to 1.5 per cent of each manual worker's wage into a national "wage integration fund" operated by a semi-state social security agency. No Italian employer can lay off a worker without paying him either severance pay or lay-off pay from this fund. Severance pay may run from one week to one month's pay for each year the employee has worked. Employers try to avoid having to pay it.  
Any employer who can show a government committee that he must lay off workers due to causes beyond his control may draw on the wage fund but only for three months. After three months, he must re-employ the workers or fire them to get his severance.  
During the lay-off the worker receives, from the state fund, paychecks amounting to about two-thirds of his normal wage.  
The fund also may be used to spread work. For a three-month period a company may pay a worker for only 24 hours of work a week, and the worker receives from the national fund two-thirds of the pay he would get for another 18 hours work.  
All of this tends to be a cautious and conservative hiring policy on the part of industrialists. One man is hired he is not only expensive to keep but expensive to dismiss.  
In the first years after the war employers fell back on the plan so much that the fund ran out of money and the government had to make up the difference. This year the same thing may happen.  
Management says it is willing to "tolerate" the system but points out there are no less than 20 different plants to stay open when in a truly competitive economy they would have gone under.  
Labor organizations, both pro-communist and anti-communist, have endorsed the idea as "basically sound." They say it has prevented management from making "irresponsible mass dismissals."  
Economists say the Italian GAW plan has staved off further unemployment and guaranteed security to workers whose basic wages are low, but they also say it has tended to keep industry at a low common denominator—permitting marginal plants to stay open when in a truly competitive economy they would have gone under.

### Idahoan Raps Proposals for Sugar Quotas

WASHINGTON, June 15 — The sugar legislation proposal just announced by the U. S. department of state and agriculture will not meet the needs of Idaho sugar beet growers, Arvill Miller, Shelby, president of the Idaho Beet Growers association, said here.

He termed the proposal "disappointing" after attending the meeting at which the plan was presented by representatives of the two executive departments. Miller is vice chairman of the American sugar beet industry's national policy committee.

"We do recognize some of the basic principles included in sugar bills now in congress, the administration's proposal does not provide the increase in marketing quotas necessary to meet the American sugar industry's needs," Miller said.

"While now in congress represent the very minimum the industry can accept," he said. "After talking to many senators and congressmen, I am confident congress will do better than the administration proposes for this important United States industry."

"It is probable that the administration even expects congress to correct the deficiencies of the proposal presented by the two executive departments."

Miller said farm efficiencies have increased since 1948, and as a result drastic acreage cuts have been forced in an effort to keep sugar production in line with the fixed-tonnage marketing quotas set by the sugar act of 1948, which the proposed legislation would amend.

He said the administration's announcement recognizes that the sugar act should be amended this year, that the domestic sugar industry needs to market more sugar this year than the present fixed quotas permit; and that the domestic industry's historic right to share in the growth of the U. S. sugar market should be restored.

Now all growth in the market goes to foreign countries, principally to Cuba, Miller explained.

He said the chief differences between the administration's proposal and the bills now in congress stack up like this:

1. The administration would permit the domestic sugar industry to market 100,000 tons more sugar a year above present quotas—while the congressional bills would raise basic domestic quotas by 180,000 effective this year.

2. Both plans provide for sharing future growth in the market according to percentages in effect before 1948—55 per cent to the domestic industry and 45 per cent to foreign countries; but the administration plan would give foreign countries an additional 150,000 tons more of the market before putting the "growth formula" into effect.

"It's a case of too little and too late," Miller said.

### Soviet Goal



Goal of current Soviet diplomacy is a belt of neutral nations from the Baltic sea to the Adriatic that would separate European members of NATO from the Soviet Union and its satellites. At present only Austria and Switzerland are neutral in central Europe. Playing on all Germany's deep desire for unification, Moscow holds out neutrality as a bait for West Germany. So far, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has rejected the bait. Southern link in the neutral belt would be Yugoslavia. Soviet top brass went hat-in-hand to President Tito, offering to sell him on the idea. So far, Tito maintains his "firm independence." Early this year Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko went to Stockholm with the reported message that the Soviets would not object to a Scandinavian union (Sweden, Finland, Norway, Denmark) if the union would pledge strict neutrality. (NEA)

### City's Strikes Are Result of 2-Way Tussle

SINGAPORE, June 15 — The general strike that has almost paralyzed Singapore is the result of a long struggle between two political groups to gain control of 120 trade unions and 400,000 workers.

For the past five or six years Singapore's trade unions lacked efficient leadership. Strikes often flared out through lack of organization and support.

Four years ago the trade unions formed a united front, hoping to strengthen their position. But the leaders fought over petty problems and the movement stalled.

Some broke away from the organization, called the Trade Union congress, and carried on independently.

When the British government decided last year to give the people of Singapore a higher hand in government, a new political organization called the Peoples Action party was formed. It was headed by Lee Kuan Yew, a fiery Chinese lawyer returned from England.

Others who formed the nucleus of the party were powerful trade union leaders. Some had well known leftist leanings.

In a matter of months the Peoples Action party picked up considerable strength. More and more unions joined the PAP camp.

The Trade Union congress, under the leadership of Lim Yew Hock, lifted its flag in protest against the wholesale swing of the colony's unions to the left. The surprise victory of the labor front in the April elections raised some hope that a balance of power could be achieved.

Chief Minister David Marshall and his labor colleagues, including Lim Yew Hock who became minister of labor in the new administration, had hardly taken office when they were overwhelmed by several big strikes.

The government's headache was made more severe by the participation of thousands of Chinese students in the industrial unrest.

 The United Nations is 10 years old next week.  
 Vladimir Molotov and the San Francisco Open House, are not much changed since the historic charter signing ceremony there on June 26, 1945.  
 But little else is the same. The decade has seen a bewildering array of the world's alliances and enemies. It has seen a multitude of changes of governments. It has witnessed the cold war, desert, death and dishonor of men who played the Opera house stage at the U. N.'s birth.  
 Molotov, now as then Russia's chief representative of the 1945 "big five"—United States, Russia, Britain, France and China—returned to San Francisco for next week's anniversary session.  
 Mr. Molotov will be the only foreign minister who addresses the opening session Monday, after returning from Europe exactly 10 years ago Sunday to find the new U. N. organization 10 years old. He is writing his memoirs in dependence.  
 Alger Hiss, the bright young man who served as secretary-general of the conference, has served a prison term for lying about turning government secrets over to the Reds. He is living quietly today in a small Manhattan apartment.  
 There was a hint at those first meetings 10 years ago of the struggles, disappointments and frustrations to come.  
 The poker-faced Molotov rose at the very first business session to object to U. S. Secretary of State Edward R. Stettinius Jr. serving as conference president throughout. Molotov demanded — he did not ask — that Russia, Britain and China alternate with the United States. Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden, now Britain's prime minister, took a conciliatory role and Molotov's demand was accepted. It was a minor token of massive battles to come.  
 There was argument then, too about admitting Argentina and whether the Communist or London-based governments of Poland were entitled to a U. N. seat. That, too, foreshadowed the membership disputes still raging.  
 Stettinius, who headed the American delegation, is dead. His chief adviser, Sen. Arthur Vandenberg, is dead now, too. Others of his assistance were Harold Stassen, Sen. Tom Connally and John Foster Dulles.  
 The French mission was led by President Minister Georges Bidault, no longer in the government, and the Chinese by T. T. Soong who now lives quietly in New York.  
 The 1945 session lasted 63 days, from April 25 until June 26 when 59 member nations signed the U. N. charter. It was a dull and dry session for the most part. The New York Times remarked on the lack of excitement or demonstration even at the opening meeting.  
 But during those two months the delegates hammered out the document — the "Magna Carta" of the United Nations "Constitution." The most controversial issue of the whole conference was a veto power for the big five nations in matters involving peace and security.  
 Many of the little nations fought hard against the veto but they lost. Now there are many who wonder if they were not right all along.

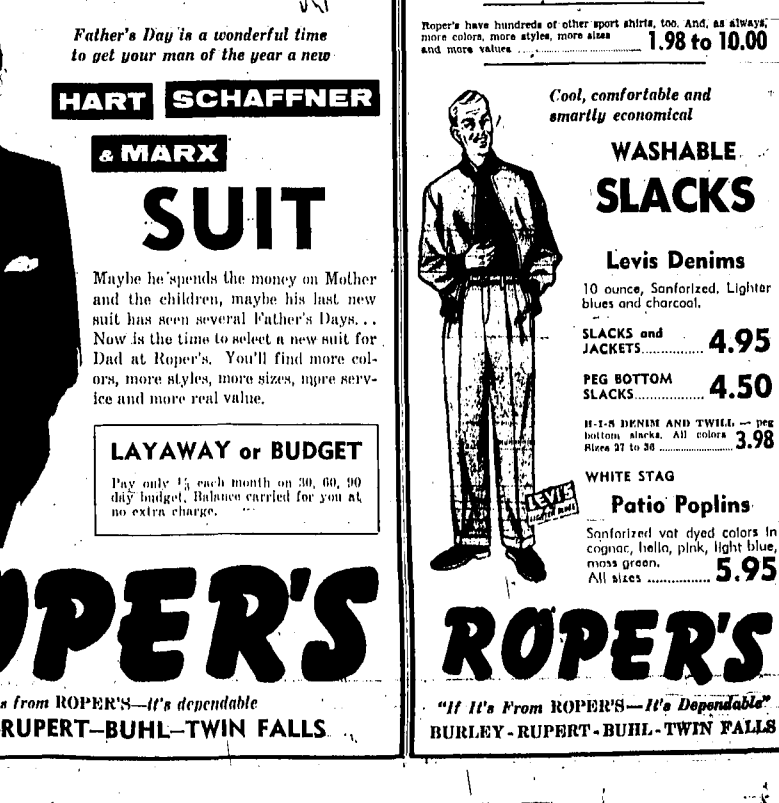
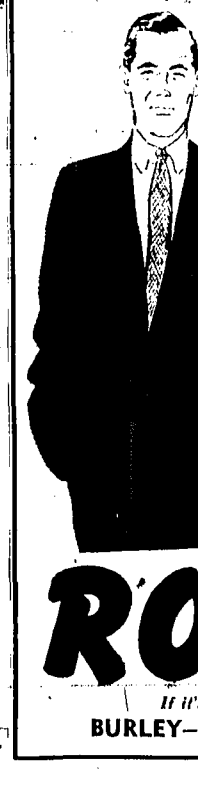
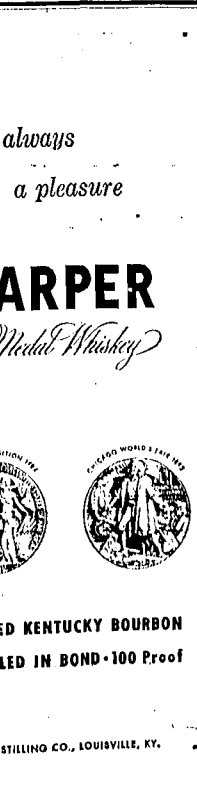

## Idahoan Raps Proposals for Sugar Quotas

WASHINGTON, June 15 — The sugar legislation proposal just announced by the U. S. departments of state and agriculture will not meet the needs of Idaho sugar beet growers, Arvill Millar, Shelly, president of the Idaho Beet Growers association, said here.

He termed the proposal "disappointing" after attending the meeting at which the plan was presented by representatives of the two executive departments. Millar is vice chairman of the American sugar beet industry's national policy committee.

While it recognizes some of the basic principles included in sugar bills now in congress, the administration's proposal does not provide the increase in marketing quotas necessary to meet the American sugar industry's needs, Millar said.

"Bills now in congress represent the very minimum the industry can accept," he said. "After talking to many senators and congressmen, I am confident congress will do better than the administration proposes for this important United States industry."

"It is probable that the administration, even expects congress to correct the deficiencies of the proposal presented by the two executive departments."

Millar said farm efficiencies have increased per-acre beet yields 20 per cent since 1945 and a "realistic" drastic acreage cuts have been forced upon growers to keep sugar production on line with the fixed-quotage marketing quotas set by the sugar act of 1948, which the proposed legislation would amend.

He said the administration's announcement recognizes that the sugar act should be amended this year, that the domestic sugar industry needs to market more sugar this year than the present fixed quotas permit and that the domestic industry's historic right to share in the growth of the U. S. sugar market should be restored.

Now all growth in the market goes to foreign countries, principally to Cuba, Millar explained.

He said the chief difference between the administration's proposal and the bills now in congress stack up like this:

1. The administration would permit the domestic sugar industry to market 100,000 tons more sugar this year above present quotas—while the congressional bills would raise basic domestic quotas by 185,000, effective this year.

2. Both plans provide for sharing future growth in the market according to percentages in effect before 1948—55 per cent to the domestic industry and 45 per cent to foreign countries; but the administration plan would give foreign countries an additional 150,000 tons more of the market before putting the "growth formula" into effect.

"It's a case of too little and too late," Millar said.

## Soviet Goal



Goal of current Soviet diplomacy is a belt of neutral nations from the Baltic sea to the Adriatic that would separate European members of NATO from the Soviet Union and its satellites. At present only Austria and Switzerland are neutral in central Europe. Paving an all-German deep desire for unification, Moscow holds out neutrality as bait for West Germany. So far, West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer has rejected the bait. Southern link in the neutral belt would be Yugoslavia. Soviet top brass went hat-in-hand to President Tito, hoping to sell him on the idea. So far, Tito maintains his "firm independence." Early this year Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Andrei A. Gromyko went to Stockholm with the reported message that the Soviets would not object to a Scandinavian union (Sweden, Finland, Norway, Denmark) if the union would pledge strict neutrality. (INEA)

## City's Strikes Are Result of 2-Way Tussle

SINGAPORE, June 15 (AP)—The general strike that has almost paralyzed Singapore is the result of a long struggle between two political groups trying to gain control of 120 trade unions and 400,000 workers.

For the past five or six years Singapore's trade unions lacked efficient leadership. Strikes often flizzed out through lack of organization and support.

Four years ago the trade unions formed a united front, hoping to strengthen their position. But the leaders fought over petty problems and the movement stalemated.

Some broke away. Several big unions broke away from the organization, called the Trade Union congress, and carried on independently.

When the British government decided last year to give the people of Singapore a bigger hand in government, a new political organization called the Peoples Action party was formed. It was headed by T. T. B. Pong, a fiery Chinese lawyer returned from England.

Others who formed the nucleus of the party were powerful trade union leaders. Some had well known leftist leanings.

In a matter of months the Peoples Action party picked up considerable strength. More and more unions joined the PAP camp.

Tries to Stop Being. The Trade Union congress, under the leadership of Lim Yew Hock, tried desperately to prevent the wholesale swing of petty colonies' unions to the left. The surprise victory of the labor front in the April elections raised some hope that a balance of power could be achieved.

Chief Minister David Marshall and his labor colleagues, including Lim Yew Hock who became minister of labor in the new administration, had hardly taken office when they were overwhelmed by several big strikes.

The government's headache was made more severe by the participation of thousands of Chinese students in the industrial unrest.

### T. F. Teacher Gives Talk on Labor Needs

POCATELLO, June 15 (AP)—An educator told the Idaho Federation of Labor last night that what labor needs is more people educated to its problems and opportunities.

Jerry Swisher, Twin Falls teacher, advised union locals to offer local scholarships to area students wishing to continue labor studies in college.

The state federation's annual \$500 scholarship was presented to Dianne Williams, Pocatello, after Swisher's talk.

From other speakers, the IFL convention heard that the labor movement was nicer to labor than any session since 1927 and that Idaho can't expect to see giant manufacturing plants constructed in the state.

Joshua Work, resident manager of the Westvaco Chemical corporation plant west of Pocatello, discussed the future of labor in Idaho.

"We cannot expect to see giant manufacturing plants here," he said, "since we are too far from centers of population to make mass production economical."

Work cited recent wage increases won by employees of General Motors corporation and Ford Motor company in discussing what he called the "eternal circle" of wage and price increases.

"Where do you think the money will come from?" he asked.

"Why, from the customer. And who's the customer? Why Ford and GM employees."

Leo H. Hottel, chairman of the Idaho industrial accident board, characterized the last legislature as beneficial to labor.

"Two important amendments to the workman's compensation law were passed," he said, "the first defining terms of the second-injury clause and the second requiring the employer to furnish the first proceeds in accidental loss of limb or eye of a workman while on the job."

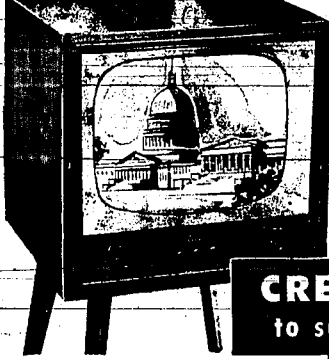

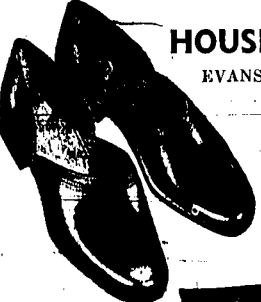

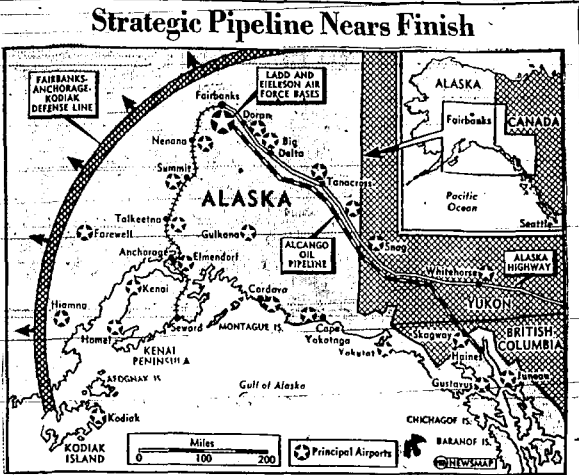

### Special Meet Is Slated for Sugar Quota

WASHINGTON, June 15 (Special)—The nation's sugar beet growers will have an opportunity to air their views on 1955 acreage allotments at a meeting this month, the department of agriculture reports.

An informal public hearing on "restrictive proportionate shares" is scheduled at the department's main auditorium here for June 27.

The department estimates that 1955 crop production will "approximate" the quota of 1,800,000 tons of sugar, and that carryovers will be about the same as last year's 1,915,000 tons.

"In view of this prospective carryover," says an agriculture bulletin, "adjustments on the 1955 crop appear to be necessary to keep supplies in line with the marketing quota and carryover requirements."

USDA already has drawn up a recommended program of its own to offer domestic growers at the hearing. This is what it contains:

- A provision to reserve 1,000 acres "for states not having production in the base period and for hardship cases";
- Basic state acreages would be established by the 1953 formula with an additional ceiling in order to release to states where the demand exists surplus acreages not used in certain other states;
- Within-state and individual farm allotments would be determined by the same formula as used last year, with last year's "net farm" re-ceiving—identical—allocation depending upon the national distribution;
- Adjustments, appeals, and shares for farms of new producers would be handled in the same way as before.

USDA makes no mention of the current administration compromise proposal to increase marketing quotas for domestic beet and cane sugar producers. The conference is aimed only at growers.

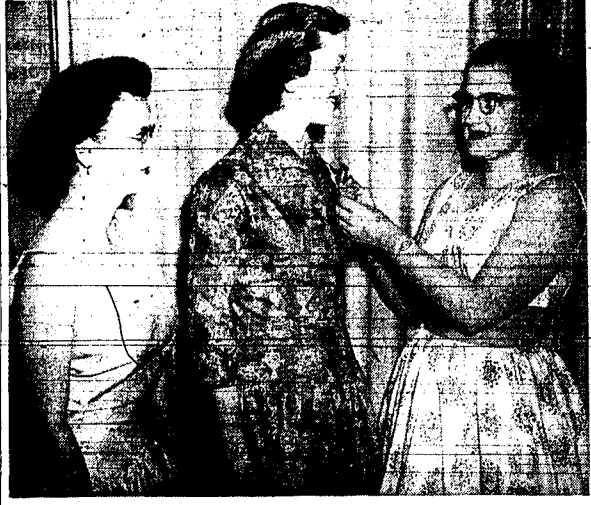
A fight still looms between proponents of sugar legislation already introduced by sugar state representatives and the less liberal bill which the administration announced last week.

One provision in the administration bill likely to touch off a battle is the interim increase of 100,000 tons to domestic producers who have asked for some 185,000 tons this year.

### Politicos May Change Rules At Convention

WASHINGTON, June 15—If Republican party bosses have the will to follow and improve on a Democratic lead, it may not be necessary after all to refer to next year's national conventions as "the vulgarities of 1954."

The sample of convention processes served up to the TV public in 1952 was a shocker and eye-opener. The viewing public did not like a lot of the awful goings on by which political parties select their presidential tickets.

Convention processes had been better. TV made them worse by inviting political nobodies to various strategies to get their faces and names on the air. Now, Democrats have made a lynch start toward reform, knowing that insulting adult intelligence is no way to make votes for a party candidate.

**Suggestion Made**  
Democratic party Chairman Paul M. Butler has approved a suggested regulation of the process of polling state delegations. Hereafter the poll will be taken privately by a representative of the convention chairman who would appear among the polled delegation and take down the names.

Meanwhile, convention business would proceed. The old system which so offended those present and the television viewer in 1952 was to conduct the poll from the rostrum in full view and hearing of all. Showoffs often took polls merely to get a fleeting peek at the TV camera lens and to hear their names blared over national hookups. Even the legitimate polls were tiresome.

**Examples Given**  
But, for example given, there is one man—the suggested demonstration in behalf of an individual just proposed for nomination as president or vice president. These swanky parades usually are phoney. So are the aspirations of most of the political scene stealers who permit some payroller from back home to take care of the convention and propose them for nomination. The convention should demand a money forfeit if such a time waster failed on the first ballot to poll a fixed percentage of the delegates.

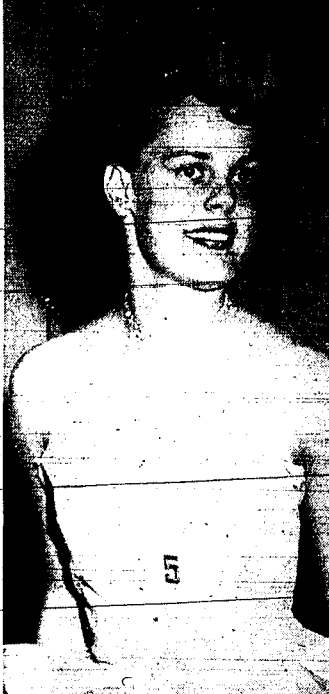
There have been demonstrations of real political impact, such as the bedlam which helped stampede the 1940 Republican convention to nominate Wendell L. Willkie, a recent Democrat, who went down for the party since the ensuing campaign when Harold L. Ickes tagged him as "a barefoot Wall street lawyer."

**One Not Phony**  
There was nothing phony about the 1924 anti-demonstrations in 1924 when Alfred E. Smith and William G. MacAdoo knocked each other out after 128 ballots and left the worthless Democratic presidential nomination to John W. Davis. That was a blood feud.

But most of them are fakes and a noisy voter could look into the wings or back alley during any of the more recent political clambazars and see the stooges lining up with their banners for the next parade. The stooges usually number 200 or so and they are non-partisan, appearing in all demonstrations just for the hell of it or, maybe, for five bucks.

There was grumbling among the TV millions during and after the vulgarities of 1952 and there will be more in 1956 unless some sense of the dignity of the occasion wins over the indecent trumpeters which have overrun the convention machinery like rank and poisonous weeds. If reform is accomplished, TV can take the howl until the home did some millions of citizens get a peek at the tawdry processes that were expected to underwrite with their votes on election day.
