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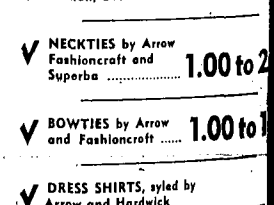

East Germany Will Be Armed Despite Revolt

BERLIN, June 17 (AP)—Two years ago East Germany erupted in a revolt that rocked the Soviet satellite empire.
 Yet today the Soviet zone regime is preparing to transform its 170,000-man para military police force into a full-fledged national army, and is talking of putting guns into the hands of East German workers.
 Does this mean the Russians are confident they have crushed the spirit of the June, 1953, uprising?
 Western observers are not so sure. They believe rumors of the revolt still born beneath the surface but are kept from breaking out by police repression and by the presence of Russian Soviet occupation troops.
 The June 17 revolt was the first mass uprising of workers against communism ever recorded. It stands in mass wax as one of the most amazing events of the cold war. It was entirely unexpected by east and west alike, and perhaps marked a turning point in postwar history.
 Western observers wonder just how far the Soviets dare to go. Perhaps significant was the first appearance of the workers' "fighting groups" at the May day rally in East Berlin this year. None of the fighters carried any weapons.

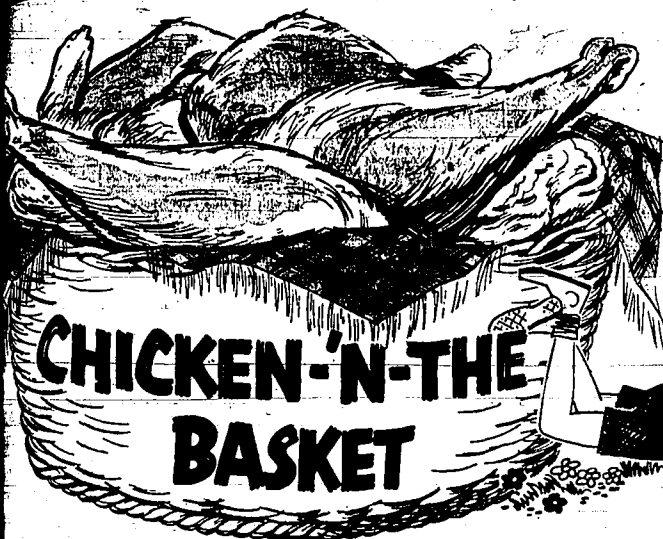

Surplus U. S. Grain Moved Like Draught

WASHINGTON, June 17—Uncle Sam is playing checkers, as it speaks with some of its stocks of surplus grain. He is moving them about in an effort to keep them from getting in the way of new crops of wheat, oats, rye, barley, sorghum grains and corn that are produced and marketed this year.

Stored in elevators, the surplus grain is being shipped from major mid-western producing areas and storage centers to eastern and western coastal areas where it will be given emergency storage in ships of the U. S. maritime commission's "mitchell" fleet.

But during the last year several hundred such ships not now needed for movement of goods and supplies are tied up for possible future need. Movement of grain from producing areas to outside facilities has become a major phase of the job of the U. S. maritime commission.

Unless it did this, storage facilities would become clogged in production regions, farmer would run into difficulty in selling or storing crops, and prices could be expected to tumble sharply, cutting down on income.

There is a possibility that storage space may be difficult to get in some areas this summer, particularly during the harvest season. Anticipating such a possibility the government has offered to make emergency priority loans of grain stored either on the ground or in temporary tie structures during the summer months.

Peace Pattern In Big 4 Meet Eyed by Solon

WASHINGTON, June 17—Senator Knowland, R., Calif., proposed today that President Eisenhower lay down at the July Big Four conference a "pattern for peace" to provide an acid test of Russian world intentions.

Agreeing that a statement of allied principles is needed, Senator Humphrey, D. Minn., suggested in a separate interview that Democratic leaders such as former Secretary of State Dean Acheson be invited by the administration to sit in on its drafting.

At a Senate hearing, Republican leader, said Eisenhower should be prepared at the meeting—with the premiers of Britain, France and Russia—to state the free world's position on such vital issues as free elections in the Soviet satellites and the conditions for repatriating Germany.

"I think the opportunity will be there to demonstrate that the free world is seeking peace," Knowland said. "The President could lay down a pattern by which peace could be achieved."

That would put the Russians on a spot. If they refuse even to discuss elections in the satellite countries, for instance, the world will quickly see through the sham of their professed peaceful intentions.

Knowland originally opposed a Big Four meeting. He said now that one has been arranged he wants this country to assume the offensive in the battle of ideologies.

Chances of Error in Memory Association Course Revealed

By HENRY McLEMORE Before I forget it, let me tell you how the book I am studying at home to improve my almost negligible memory for names and faces is Dr. Bruno Furst's "Stop Forgetting."

I have had the book less than a week but already I can tell you it has done me a lot of good. I can now remember the name of the man who shot the picture of Eisenhower four times out of five without look at the caption, and I haven't called "Mae West" in my wife's presence.

The trick in remembering names is association. As Dr. Furst points out, it was introduced to a Mrs. Fulton shortly after getting the book, and her name didn't suggest Robert Fulton to me, but another Fulton—Fred Fulton, a great prize fighter of long ago.

I hope and pray that, when I meet a Mrs. Fulton, I will be able to remember her with "Put up your dukes, Mrs. Dempsey."

Something like this happened to me yesterday, and it was pretty embarrassing. There is a lady in our neighborhood whom I see quite often with a name that rhymes with "High Tower."

I never have been able to remember it. So I pictured her as wearing gym suit bloomers and standing on a tall tank. The next time I saw

her I said, "Good morning, Mrs. Reservoir. You look blooming today."

Dr. Furst stresses the fact that most names have a meaning, and states that it will know the meaning it will help us to remember it.

He points out that "Schneiderman" is a difficult name but not if you know that it is German for "a man who tailors," and that "Pruchtenberg" is relatively simple if one knows it is "a mountain which bears fruit."

So he advises we ask the meaning of names from the people who bear them.

I have been doing this of late and have to admit that I have met with indifferent success. Sometimes it works and sometimes it doesn't. Lots of people don't know what their names means, as was the case of

the first man I experimented on, a chap named Neophanter. When I asked Neophanter what his name meant he said, "You tell me, Bud. What does it mean?"

Others seem to resent being asked to explain their names. They adopt the attitude that you think their name is funny and are making sport of them. This certainly was the case of a man named Gurglewode, whom I met playing golf the other day.

"Gurglewode, eh?" I said. (Dr. Furst also recommends repeating the name.) "Gurglewode, would you mind telling me what Gurglewode stands for?"

Gurglewode just stalked off, after giving me a look that indicated he would like to wrap a No. 2 iron around my neck.

The people who are glad to explain their names often are so glad that a whole afternoon is shot before they get through. I liked to have never gotten away from a chap named Felonpopper. He started

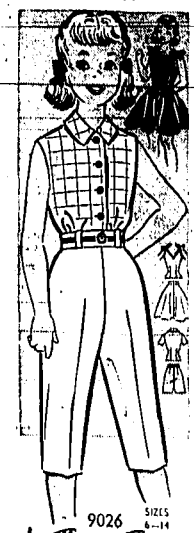

June 17 (AP)—Cleveland's trade with Baltimore appeared to be collapsing Thursday as one of the principals, Billy Cox, decided to quit baseball and seek refuge in tennis to his new club.

Wrestlake, said after a telephone conversation with Cox that the deal had made up his mind to give up the game of baseball and would not report to Cleveland.

The 37-year-old Houstonian had been in the hole 12 times and had putted 14 greens from 20 to 3 feet to cut out three strokes from par and tie the second lowest first day score ever recorded in this blue-ribbon event.

Bolt's 35-32 gave him a three-stroke advantage over a near-challenger, Walker Inman, Jr., a 41-known, 25-year-old professional from Augusta, Ga., who barreled his shots down the cypress canyons for an even par 70.

In a third place came Jackie Dupree, Jr., son of a late Houston professional, with 71, followed by Ben Hogan, the world-line winner, who squeezed home with a 72.

Tied at 73 were Mike Souchak, the former Duke football player, and Babe Dickson of "Wentfield, N.C." Other scores ranged as high as 99 by the host pro, Johnny Battini.

Assaults were heavy as the fast, tricky green at the Olympic course took their toll of the game's great-ests.

Defending champion Ed Purjol, who began defense of his crown by losing a hole on the first hole and taking a double-bogey on the second for a total of six, wound up with a 76, six over par, which left him well 17-8 in the field.

But he had distinguished company. Masters champion Gary Midgoff also was in the 76 bracket, along with Julius Boros, 1932 champion. Gene Littler, the only one of the brightest of golf's brass few "trailer brigade," Al Besenik, Smiley Quick and Marty Furgol.

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Molotov Pays Surprise Visit To Great City

CHICAGO, June 17 (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov rolled across the Midwest plains in a special Pullman car today, leaving behind him a slightly shaken Chicago and group of angry demonstrators at Omaha.

The stocky diplomat went on a surprise whirlwind tour of Chicago during a five-hour stopover in yesterday and before his train pulled out to head:

Caused the worst traffic jam on Lake Shore drive in years.
Braves Traffic
Drove what not even the bravest Chicagoans would dare attempt—walk across Lake Shore drive in defiance of speeding rush hour traffic.

Plastered U. S. Steel officials who didn't know whether the distinguished communist would be allowed to tour the company's huge south side plant.

Held a running interview along the Lake Shore with a Russian-speaking reporter, giving his opinion on the smelch of Chicago's stockyards. Molotov cocktails, and the nationwide civil defense alert.

Caused an uproar of a different sort when his train rolled into Omaha, Neb., early today.

From 50 to 25 displaced persons from Lithuania and Latvia were waiting in the predawn darkness carrying placards reading "Molotov go to Hell instead of to San Francisco" and "communism soaked with blood of Lithuanians."

Molotov and his party of diplomats, bound for the United Nations meeting at San Francisco, apparently were keeping off their Chicago walk. They didn't make an appearance, but a few Russian bodyguards peeked from the darkened windows.

2 Killed, 3 Hurt In Plane Smash

NAGOYA, Japan, June 17 (AP)—A U. S. Sabre jet crashed into a row of Japanese houses near here today, killing the pilot and a 16-year-old boy and critically injuring three other Japanese, fifth air force headquarters said.

A spokesman said the Sabre was coming in for an instrument landing on a flight from Chitose air base, North Japan, to nearby Kamaki air base.

The Sabre missed the runway by about one-fourth mile and crashed in flames into five houses, completely destroying one.

The air force said the dead 16-year-old boy and three Japanese hospitalized with critical injuries—a 10-month-old baby, a 63-year-old woman and a man—all were in the destroyed house.

Interview Set

NEW YORK, June 17 (AP)—For the first time since the cold war began, a top-ranking Russian official has agreed to go on a nationwide television program and submit to give-and-take questioning by American newsmen.

The Columbia Broadcasting system said yesterday Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov had accepted an invitation for a public questioning about east-west relations on June 26.

If only low grade ore is available, Riddle said, it might be possible to ship it for processing to a new mercury smelter being constructed near Weiser.

U.N. on Tenth Anniversary, Can See One Big Conviction: It Is Here to Stay

By United Press
Born of the World War II marriage of communism and democracy, its youth blighted by the cold war, the United Nations faces the future with one conviction—it is here to stay.

Its 10-year history has been largely a record of strife and dissension, of efforts—too often unsuccessful—to make peace and of fruitless attempts to ease the tension between Russia and the west.

Now Russia appears to be executing an about-face. It has made peace with Austria. It has made overtures to the western-backed German Republic and with an outward show of friendliness, it has agreed to next month's "summit meeting" of the big four chiefs of state.

The question arises: If Russia is sincere and the cold war eventually is ended, what is the role of the U. N. in the future? Secretary General Dag Hammarskjold's answer is this:

"To the extent that countries succeed in an attempt at world-wide cooperation, the U. N. automatically gets back very close to the center of things. The U. N. is something unavoidable."

And if all the good fellowship is nothing more than a Russian ruse, the U. N. still will hold center stage in continuing efforts to keep the peace of the world.

U. N. diplomats point out that the cry that it was designed as a super-organization was created not to make but to keep the peace.

Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, Nobel prize-winning architect of the Palestine peace, has observed:

"Except in Korea, it has been able to keep nations fighting rather than shooting, and even in Korea there surely would have been far more and far wider shooting had there been no U. N."

The U. N. will continue to be the "town meeting of the world," the universal forum in which all sides can be heard and the meeting place affording an opportunity for opposing diplomats to meet face-to-face and explore the possibility of agreement.

A highlight of the U. N.'s past history was the chance meeting of Dr. Philip Jessup of the United States and Jacob A. Malik of Russia in the security council lounge which led to the lifting of the 1948 Berlin blockade. In these informal talks, Jessup and Malik found a common ground for the agreement which ended the siege.

In its tumultuous 10 years, the U. N. largely has lived down the cry that it was designed as a super-organization. Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge, Jr. dismisses that charge thusly:

"It is not a world government. It cannot impose a tax of any kind. It cannot draft a single soldier. Its charter specifically prohibits intervention in domestic matters. Your representative at the U. N. is called an ambassador by act of congress—for the simple reason that he
