

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



Boise Beauty Will Carry Gem State Chances in Big Contest

BOISE, June 20 (AP)—Will an Idaho beauty wear the crown of "Miss America" for the first time in history when the girls line up on the boardwalk in Atlantic City next fall? That will depend entirely on a 19-year-old Boise lass—and her grandmother. Judy Vollen, the daughter of a Boise wholesale merchant who deals in beauty and barber supplies, took the "Miss Idaho" title Saturday night and earned the right to represent the state in the national pageant. More than 2,000 spectators crowded the Boise high school gymnasium to watch the 13 regional winners parade in bathing suits and evening gowns, display their cultural charms and match wits in a question and answer contest. Judy, a 114-pound blond who stands five feet four inches and measures 36 inches around the bust, 22 1/2 inches around the waist and 36 around the hips, got the nod from the five judges—three men and two women. Yvonne Kulik, Twin Falls—34-24-35—was runner-up. Miss Coeur d'Alene—17-year-old Claud Wright—finished third. The measure 36-25-37. The other two finalists were Lorla Carol Adgton, Council, and Lois Vaughn, Malad. The contestante voted Miss Coeur d'Alene "Miss Congeniality" of the group. Judy, a professional singer of hill-billy and western songs, was crowned queen by LaVonne Skelley, Nampa, "Miss Idaho" of 1955. With the crown she won a \$300 scholarship to College of Idaho, an expense-paid week-end at McCall, and a free

western song composed for the occasion. It's about her grandmother. She said she had been told by Lee Ann Meriwether of San Francisco, "Miss America of 1954—who came to Boise for the state contest—that the prospects look good for Idaho this year.

The judges, following rules laid down by pageant officials in Atlantic City, gave credit for poise, personality, intellect, talent and beauty of face and figure. Judy piled up points in the poise and intellect department when the judges asked the five finalists what person they most admired and would most like to interview. Three of the girls picked President Eisenhower, and the fourth chose actress Grace Kelly, but Judy responded, "since my mother is the greatest person I know, I would choose her." While most of the other girls played the piano or recited drama, Judy took a lead in the talent contest by strumming a guitar and singing a western spiritual ballad of her own composition, entitled "Thank All You Have to Do." Russia Envoy Sees Friends In Rich Home

HILLSBOROUGH, Calif., June 20 (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister Vyacheslav M. Molotov entertained guests yesterday in the shade of a large beach umbrella beside a sparkling swimming pool.
The Russian diplomat and his friends relaxed in a wicker garden chair, surrounded by the lush summer greens and the Soviet NKV secret agents who patrolled the perimeter of a four acre estate here. The hosts were representatives of two of Russia's elite military units: Stanislav Skrzyszewski, polish minister of foreign affairs, and Vsevolod David, minister for foreign affairs of Czechoslovakia.

Trips Strolls
After a 40 minute conference, the three men strolled along the grassy path toward the nearby three-story mansion which serves as headquarters for the Russian delegation during the 10th anniversary meeting of the United Nations in nearby San Francisco.
The three men paused for a moment at the door of the building, and then walked arm in arm down the driveway to the entrance of the estate.
A few police, chauffeurs and curious children from the well-to-do neighborhood—accustomed to the furive coming and goings of the grim-faced Russian delegates—were surprised to see the respected foreign minister step to the very

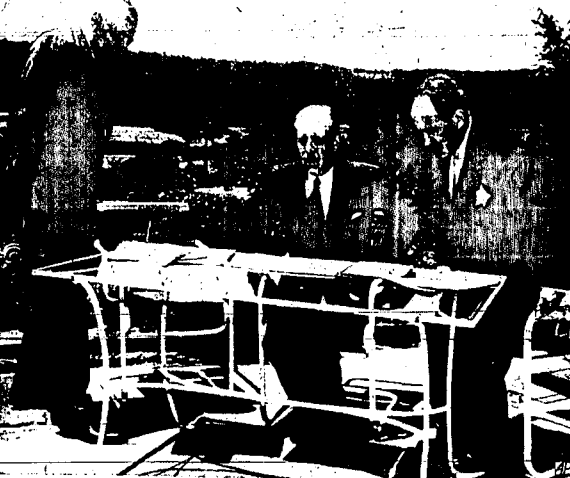

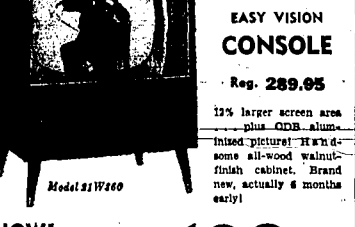

WASHINGTON, June 20 (Special)—Idaho's Rep. Hiram Budge commends the house action restoring to budget request level reclamation projects and investigations in Idaho which appeared in the committee report to the house.

"I was, of course, highly pleased to see that situation rectified," Budge said, "since no one on the committee felt Idaho should be excluded and no one could explain how the provision got in there."

The army engineers had told Budge that the exclusion of Idaho would have meant a loss to the state of studies costing \$228,000 which had been planned for the coming year.

"The house also restored flood control funds for the Marsh Creek-Portneuf area, which had been allotted \$500,000, by the administration and was subsequently cut out by the house committee."

"The completed house bill now goes to the senate appropriations committee for consideration and report to the full senate."

"Little trouble is expected there, since the senate is traditionally more liberal in public works appropriations than the house."

Rains, Winds Kill Children, Wreck Crops

By United Press

Flooding rains and ripping winds killed three children, ruined millions of dollars worth of crops, and punched their way eastward today.

The thunderstorms fell upon 15,000 square miles of country in the Texas panhandle and south plains last night and kept going early today. They spread eastward and northward, hitting Fort Worth and Waco in their later stages.

But the worst havoc was farther west. More than 50,000 acres of crops were destroyed, flooded-out farmers sought Red Cross aid near Amarillo, four major highways were closed, and a trail from Fort Worth to Denver, Colo., was running up to three hours late.

Death Enters

Death swept into a storm center at El Paso where 75-year-old Henry H. Kenney, his wife, and four children had taken refuge during a deluge of five inches rain in just one hour.

Kenney was killed by lightning under the storm cellar door and opened it to have a look. A wall of water swept in, drowning his small son and two daughters. Kenney was barely able to rescue his wife and another little girl.

Marshall, Tex., in a 110-mile stretch from Amarillo north to Lubbock emerged from their storm-battered houses today to see their cotton, wheat and sorghum crops pounded flat by hail, wind and rain.

Too Late to Plant

The farmers had already replanted their cotton twice. It was too late in the season to start again.

Winds reached near-hurricane force in the storm area. Hail and half-stones, stacked up six inches deep for two miles between Amarillo and Canyon, hit miles away from the storm center. In five inches to three inches elsewhere in the region.

Some of the entire families from their homes at Pleasant Valley, an Amarillo suburb, and Red Cross officials set up headquarters in a drug store to aid them.

Exhilaration of 1 Decade Ago Is Remembered at U. N. Now

WASHINGTON, June 20 (U. N.)—There was almost an exhilaration in those June days in 1945 at San Francisco when the United Nations was born. There was a sense of a new world born: a world of peace and brotherly cooperation.

The world of the U. N. is now 10 years old. It resembles very much the old world of hatreds, distrusts, wars and fears. Yet, while the U. N. has not worked perfectly, it has kept the peace.

This week its members' foreign ministers meet in San Francisco to celebrate the anniversary.

The U. N. is a meeting ground for the opinion of public to some extent they can influence each other for good through the pressure of world opinion.

The U. N. has helped to produce, as was intended, an international armed force to prevent war. There have been more wars, some of which the U. N. helped settle, but no major war.

Some optimists believe a big war has been prevented as long as the nations can meet, if only to revile each other. But if a big war begins, there would be no U. N. to help.

The U. N. has spread some feelings of cooperation and brotherhood among the health, education and agricultural programs of its various agencies.

It seems certain the world would be a different place if the United States, Russia and the U. N. had not existed.

That was done, through the alliances this country made with its partners in the United States, Europe and Asia. Russia also went outside the U. N. to make its communist alliance.

In 1945 the allies, in blood and mutual sacrifice, had won the Hitlerian war which ended in May. It did not seem far-fetched at the time to think they might, with less effort, stick together to keep peace.

Russia, in fact, has used the veto so many times to block what it didn't like, until now it has rendered the security council almost helpless whenever Russia wants to make it helpless.

And the United States, not knowing who the veto was used, wasn't giving the U. N. a blank check either. Both nations reserved the right to say no and block action on a subject issue before the security council.

German Chief Drafts Reply To Red Offer

BONN, Germany, June 20 (U. N.)—Chancellor Konrad Adenauer, assured of support from the western big powers in drafting today his answer to Russia's bid for friendship.

The West German leader was expected to accept the Soviet invitation to visit Moscow and discuss the possibility of a new treaty.

Sharing the chancellor's attention was the controversial West German rearmament program. Parliamentary plans for rearmament were planned to give a vigorous top-level push to the hurry-up program.

Adenauer returned to Germany last night after important talks with top American, British and French officials. He said the western big powers had achieved full unity of purpose for the crucial work ahead.

While he did not say so directly, Adenauer evidently was referring to the big four conference at Geneva next week when he plans for traveling to Moscow for talks.

Adenauer stopped in London yesterday with the British Foreign Minister Sir Anthony Eden. Earlier in the week he conferred with President Eisenhower and the big powers' foreign ministers in the United States.

Oets Green Light

During the week of the foreign ministers, Adenauer received the go-ahead for his Moscow visit to explore Russia's desires for relaxation of the Berlin blockade.

The West German reply to Moscow was expected to welcome the Soviet offer to establish full diplomatic, cultural and economic relations. However, it was expected also to press for clarification of certain points unanswered in the Soviet invitation earlier this month.

Among these was the question of Germany's status in the Soviet zone, estimated at more than 100,000. The Bonn government also wants assurance that conditions exist for recognition of the Communist East German regime as included in the Russian offer.

Nixon Speech Hints Keynote Of GOP Aim

WASHINGTON, June 20 (U. N.)—Vice President Richard M. Nixon has opened the keynote of the 1956 Republican presidential campaign with regard for a issue designed to arouse boiling Democratic anger.

Nixon's speech was a direct affirmative basis of the Republican campaign effort. Nixon would accompany that with an all-out attack on the Democratic party as a socialist and nationalizer of basic American institutions.

And that is the kind of campaign the Republicans will wage if—as expected—the party renominates the Eisenhower party in 1956.

President Eisenhower has indicated that Nixon would be satisfied in every way as a running mate.

That is the circumstance which imposes much importance of Nixon's speech and Detroit speech before the national convention of the Young Republican federation. The speech plainly was a warning to what Nixon will tell the voters in 1956, and the slant of his campaign will have considerable to do with the whole Republican campaign plan.

In 1956, Nixon told the young Republicans they should have a battle between those who would nationalize and socialize basic American institutions and those who would continue the American economic policies which have been put into effect by the administration and which have worked so well.

Seen as Challenge

That is not only a challenge to the Democratic party, but a public bid for conservative Democrats to break away from domination which Nixon has tried to bring, by city party leadership that is the weak spot in the Democratic front. Nixon intends to force the attack there.

The peace part of the campaign program depends, of course, on the maintenance of peace. Administration estimates, as of now, are that peace will be maintained well beyond the election.

Penicillin Use In Salk Shots Under Attacks

WASHINGTON, June 20 (U. N.)—Some polo vaccine makers are dropping the use of penicillin in Salk shots because of allergic reactions to the penicillin, the government reports.

Dr. William G. Workman of the national institutes of health revealed that these firms—he did not name them—were questioning other antibiotics as rapidly as research and testing permit.

Penicillin has been included in Salk vaccine to guard against infection by bacteria, but the amount is small—no more than 200 units to an average dose of vaccine—but it sometimes can cause complications.

Idaho Man Killed In Traffic Crash

SHELTON, Nebr., June 20 (U. N.)—A collision of two station wagons killed an Idaho man and injured his wife and three children.

The accident occurred near Shelton in central Nebraska. But the Idaho car was struck when another vehicle pulled across the center line of the highway.

Killed was Stanley R. Wall, 38, Boise. Mrs. Wall received a fractured jaw and their daughter, Linda, 6, had fractured ribs. But she was reported in critical condition.

Less seriously hurt were Sandra Jean Wall, 6, and Frances Golden Wall, 16. Four other persons were injured in the smashup.

Death Could Result

In persons who already have developed an extreme sensitivity to the drug, the minute amount in the vaccine could in some cases cause a severe reaction, possibly death. Where such sensitivity is present, a physician may advise against an injection containing penicillin.

In children who have not had penicillin previously the amount in the vaccine may be enough to produce an allergy of sensitivity. This might make it risky to use the drug a later illness when it might be vitally needed.

Tells Dangers

Dr. Orval R. Withers, head of the allergy clinic at the University of Kentucky medical center, recently told the American association that penicillin in Salk vaccine would produce a new crop of persons sensitive to the drug.

He reported the case of a 7-year-old boy who, he said, broke out in hives, sickness, and developed a rash after receiving the Salk shot because of a penicillin-applied Salk shot.

One key government expert took exception to Withers' implied criticism of the vaccine. Frequent use of penicillin for minor ailments, he said, is doing a lot more to spread sensitivity to it than the minute amount in the vaccine.

Los Angeles Is Hurt by Strike

LOS ANGELES, June 20 (U. N.)—A strike against the Los Angeles Transit lines early today forced an estimated one million commuters to leave their homes by car and from work.

The walkout, called at dawn, was precipitated by a wage dispute between the city's largest transportation system and the AFL Transportation union.

The union sought a 20-cent hourly wage hike. The company offered a 14-cent yearly increase over a three-year period.

Effect of the strike were felt immediately in the sprawling Los Angeles metropolitan area. Free-ways were jammed at an early hour with motorists who normally took streets and buses. Thousands of persons were late for work.

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Wide Review For Security Project Eyed

WASHINGTON, June 20 (AP)—The senate government operations committee Saturday urged a "careful and comprehensive" review of the administration's loyalty-security program in a report which avoided any criticism of the program itself.

The report recommended that a bill be set up by a bi-partisan 12-member commission to review the study. The committee approved the bill by the unanimous vote of 10 of its members. Three others did not vote.

Report Released

The committee's report, made public Saturday, outlined the special powers and functions which would be given the proposed commission. But it carefully steered clear of commenting on criticisms of the loyalty-security program which were made in hearings on the commission proposal.

The report contained a one-paragraph statement on the "necessity" for reviewing the program: "The evidence before the committee shows that our security system has developed in a gradual and piecemeal manner over the past decade. It should receive a careful, comprehensive review by the representative bi-partisan commission proposed in this bill."

Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R. S. D., who was present but abstained in the 10 to zero vote for the commission plan, explained that he withheld his vote because he wanted assurance that the commission would not duplicate the work of a senate civil-service subcommittee. That subcommittee already has undertaken an investigation of the security program.

Ruling Promised For Distribution

BOISE, June 20 (AP)—Atty.-Gen. Graydon W. Smith said Saturday he expected to advise the Idaho municipal-league in about a week whether municipalities have legal authority to set up gas distribution systems or grant franchises to do so.

Smith received a copy of a resolution adopted by the league in its annual convention at McCall last week asking for an opinion on the matter.

He said he would rather not comment at this time on the request, also contained in the resolution, that he ask the governor to call a special session of the Idaho legislature if legal research showed that such authority did not exist.

But we'll always have one or two champions on pure merit, and the pleasure in seeing them get the laurel wreath and gold medal will surpass any satisfaction that could be gained from watching a whole slew of fake amateurs, out-and-out business men, in fact, be crowned.

A welcome home celebration to honor the Glenda or Yankess for beating the Yale or Stanford baseball teams in a best of seven series. If it did it would be a ludicrous thing. But you can bet that New Haven or Yale Alto would line the streets to hail the Bulldogs or Indian nines if they managed to upset the big leaguers. And there'd be a reason.

If the United States wants to meet Russia in athletics on Russia's terms, then by all means let them do it, but don't for heaven's sake let it have any connection with the Olympic games. Let the two mighty powers collide head on with paid, professional teams with the U. S. treasury betting the Kremlin treasury a million bucks on the outcome.

If we do play Russia's game in an attempt to win, you can kiss the Olympic games goodbye. It will be a battle of two titans, and will offer no possible excuse for others to join in.

And it would make the Olympic oath a profane oath, to say the least. I wonder if it's true, as so many Americans appear to believe, that if an amateur team is "beaten by a Russian team at Melbourne, the rest of the world will accept it as proof that this capitalistic nation is decadent, about to fall in a heap, and should be displaced. That's not for me, I can't see any such gullibility on the part of the world across the sea. If they go hook, line and sinker, they're crazy, and there is no use in sending any Marshall plan aid. They wouldn't know a piow from a sack of rice, a reactor from a helicopter for crop dusting.
