## Health Secretary Blamed for Shift in Responsibility

WASHINGTON, June 21 (AP)—Senator Neuberger, D., today called for a re-examination of the responsibility for the shift in responsibility over the polio vaccine. He referred to Mrs. Schaefer's recent statement that federal law puts the responsibility for the vaccine on Surgeon General A. Acheson.

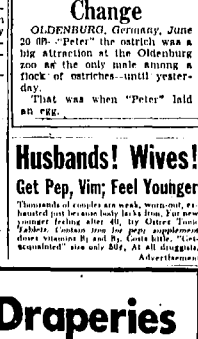

**Elections Due In Viet Nam; Reds Prosper**

SAIGON, Indochina, June 21 (AP)—It has been nearly a year since the Geneva cease fire ended the eight-year-long "dirty war" which France fought and lost in Indochina.

It will be only another year before, under the Geneva agreement, elections will be held to determine whether the entire state of Viet Nam shall come under communist rule or shall remain free.

At Geneva, the state of Viet Nam was split at the 17th parallel of latitude.

The northern part went under the domination of communist rebel chieftain Ho Chi Minh. The southern half remained free.

In the months that have passed since the truce was signed, silent mysterious "waxy bearded" Ho has consolidated his rule. He has strengthened his army in men and material and stamped out all opposition.

He has sent his agents across the 17th parallel to intimate to the Southern Viet Namers that they will be smart if they vote for him in next year's election. He is ready for an election at any time.

But "free" Southern Viet Nam is a country divided against itself. The last months have seen only squabbles among conflicting interests, a bitter civil war and a steady disintegration of the administrative structure.

Most dangerous threat to the survival of Southern Viet Nam is the profound disagreement between France and the United States on what policy to pursue.

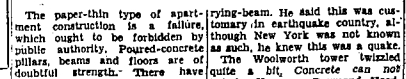

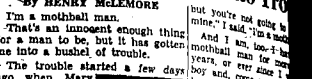

YUGOSLAV CHESS GAME

When Soviet officials ruled out any ties with the Soviet-sponsored Warsaw pacts covering defense and economic relations with Kremlin satellites, they perhaps spoke the decisive word on the Yugoslav-Russian conference.

First reactions to the communique issuing from the parity between Marshal Tito and top Soviet leaders were that Tito had scored an important triumph. He had resisted the new Russian embrace and thereby maintained his independence.

Furthermore, he extracted from the Russians an agreement that internal matters, whether economic, political or ideological, are strictly the concern of individual countries. This amounted to putting Moscow's stamp of approval on what the world for seven years has called "the brand of communism known as the Soviet model."

Reservations were voiced in some quarters, however, when it was noted that Tito and the Russians managed to express agreement on certain foreign policy issues—a U.N. seat for Red China, recognition of the "legitimate rights" of Peiping to the island of Formosa, a German settlement within the framework of the European security system (minus America).

Then a key Communist spokesman disclosed that at Warsaw a new association was formed to coordinate all action of Communist lands from the East German border to the Pacific shore of the Red Chinese mainland.

Under this setup, the Soviet union would in theory not be fully dominant but only "first among equals." In other words, the satellites would be accorded a measure of independence they have not so far known.

Some observers felt that Russia's acceptance of Tito's independence was related to this new approach, that it was in effect a demonstration to the satellites that Moscow means to allow more independence.

Some commentators, however, never had any real hope of winning Tito back to its fold. They argued that the Russians merely sought to use his show of independence to their own advantage—as here suggested—and at the same time to compromise him in Western eyes.

But, whatever may Moscow may make with the satellites out of the Soviet visit to Belgrade, Yugoslavia is now best kept as it is. It does not intend to be compromised in Western eyes if it can help it.

BRITISH CORRESPONDENT'S OPINION

"While you have been right on some things," Freedman told the Democratic leaders, "we were more right than you on Russia. We believe that there is an essential difference between Russia and other dictatorships."

Unfortunately, nobody in the audience thought to ask the speaker to elaborate on this. It is frequently difficult to explain what basic difference it makes whether a country achieves totalitarianism and atheism overnight or over a long period of time.

U. S.-BRITAIN DIFFERENCES—Freedman's discussion of Eisenhower-Eden differences in the far east, he said, revealed that China, Korea, and Indochina, indicate that the two western nations are still far apart on this question. 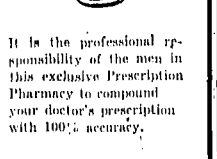

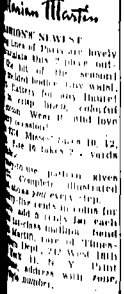

Bridges Goes Into Stand in Federal Trial

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21 (AP)—Labor leader Harry Bridges returns to the stand today for more questioning in the government's fourth attempt to deprive him of his American citizenship.

Bridges was called to testify yesterday in a surprise move that caused a flurry of outraged defense objections.

Bridges, head of the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's union, was on the stand for about 15 minutes, but the only thing that he was able to remember clearly was that he was not now and never had been a member of the communist party.

The government attorneys got definite answers to three of their questions: "Were you a member of the communist party?" were you a member of an organization which advocated the overthrow of the government by means of force and violence?" and "were you ever a member of a faction of the communist party?"

Bridges, wearing an air of boredom as he sat in the witness chair, answered all three queries with a "definite 'no'."

But when Assistant U. S. Atty. Lynn J. Gillard asked a number of questions regarding meetings held here in 1923 with known members of the communist party, Bridges gave answers of "I don't know" or "I don't know that I remember."

He denied unequivocally that he had ever been issued a card or ever paid dues or was even known by the name, Harry Dorgan. The government has said it would prove that Bridges joined the communist organization in late 1923 under the name of Harry Dorgan, using his mother's maiden name as a surname.

The government also said it would prove the union leader was a member of the party's "highest governing body" by 1924.

The government's suit charges Bridges (1) obtained his citizenship through fraud by denying any connection with the communist party; and (2) that he was a member of the party 10 years prior to his application for citizenship. He was a native of Australia.

The charges are the same as the ones used in his 1950 perjury trial when a jury found him guilty and was later overturned by the U. S. supreme court. The high court ruled that the statute of limitations had run out.

### Jury Verdict Goes Against 7 Big Firms

SEATTLE, June 21 (AP)—A federal court jury last night awarded a former service station operator \$240,000 in damages against seven of the largest oil companies in the nation.

George F. Moore had charged in the civil action that the big companies had agreed to refuse to sell him gasoline because he cut his price.

The suit, filed under federal anti-trust laws which provide for treble damages, had asked damages totaling \$720,000. The jury found Moore had suffered actual damages of \$80,000 and gave him three times that amount.

Named in the suit were Standard Oil of California, Tidewater Associated, Union, General Petroleum, Richfield, Texaco and Shell.

DeWitt Williams, attorney for Tidewater Associated, who claimed to be speaking for all the oil companies involved in the suit, said "definitely there will be an appeal."

The oil companies contended throughout the 3-month trial that there had never been an illegal agreement between them as Moore charged.

Arguments on another phase of the suit, a request that the big oil companies be enjoined to cease operating retail stations in western Washington, will start Thursday.

# Important to Every Telephone User in Idaho

Since May 1952, when we filed an application with the Idaho Public Utilities Commission for rate adjustments, lengthy hearings have been held. The rates we asked for were upheld, in effect, by one court decision but that decision was later reversed.

We are now asking the Commission for another review of our situation in Idaho; because if telephone rates are reduced to the June, 1952, level, we would be earning less than 3 per cent on our investment in the state.

Improvement and expansion of your telephone service depends upon our ability to raise money to carry on needed construction programs. In the period 1950-54, we spent over \$27 million in Idaho, and the 1955-56 program calls for \$50 million more. This money is not obtained from customers, but from savings put into our business by investors. People will not invest their money in a business that earns less than 3 per cent.

Our earnings were low when we asked for rate relief in 1952. Because we had to continue to add more and more plant at prevailing high prices and meet constantly increasing wage costs, the earnings did not improve until the present rates became effective.

As you probably know, the present telephone rates have been collected under bond-pending final disposition of the matter and refunds must be made. In the intervening three years, conditions have changed materially, and in the interests of our customers, employees, and those who have invested their money in our business, we have asked the Commission to review the facts as they exist today.
