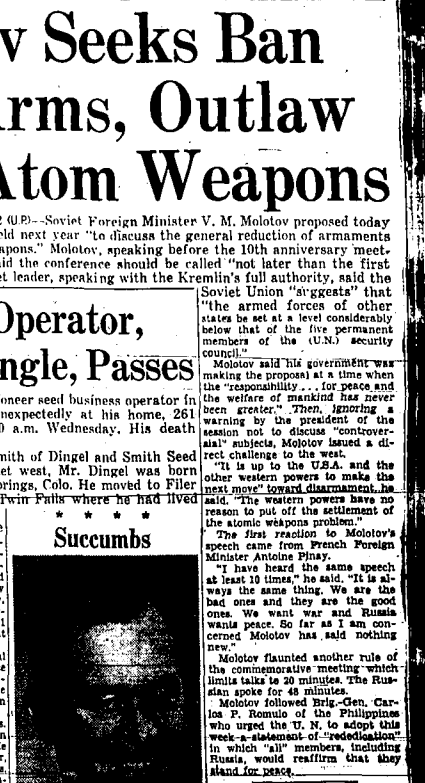

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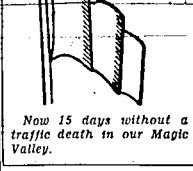

Homemade Telescope Tested Here

Man's Telescope Brings Moon Almost Near Enough for Sky Gazers to Touch

A telescope that makes the moon appear to be somewhat less than a foot length of 54 inches, or a 1,200 miles from the earth has been built in Twin Falls by Norman Herrett, manufacturing engineer. Working from specifications provided by "Mechanix Illustrated," a magazine for the mechanically minded, Herrett assembled the parts for the telescope and spent 18 hours grinding the telescope's mirror. Grinding a telescope mirror is a tedious process. By rubbing two pieces of glass together, with carborundum as an abrasive, one of the pieces eventually becomes convex and the other concave. The concave one is used for the mirror. To make a telescope mirror, you push the grinding glass five inches back and forth, rotate it one-eighth of a revolution at 2000 strokes and at the same time slowly walk around the grinding table. After two hours of this, the telescope mirror starts to get a concave shape. The objective is to give the mirror a focal length of 54 inches, or a curve whose radius is equal to 108 inches. After 18 more hours of grinding and polishing, you may, like Herrett, succeed. Herrett says that the cost of the telescope's materials came to about \$100. Through it, he reports, you can see the rings of Saturn and the moons of Jupiter. If you're a nosy sort of person, you can also keep tabs on your neighbors, because the telescope is so powerful you can see a nail on the roof of a building a mile away. Now that the telescope is complete, Herrett is offering its use to any clubs or groups interested in borrowing it. The provision is, however, that the organization borrowing the instrument spend one hour at the same time slowly walk around the grinding table. After two hours of this, the telescope mirror starts to get a concave shape.

Pro-German's Posing Raises New Hubbubs

LONDON, June 22—A 67-year-old author listed in both world wars on charges of pro-German sympathies unveiled himself today as the body of the new statue of Sir Winston Churchill. Gerald Hamilton said sculptor Oscar Reizenstein used his body from the neck down as the basis for the seated bronze figure of Churchill which was unveiled yesterday. "I must say the attention tickled my sense of humor," the controversial Hamilton said. "I mean no disrespect to Sir Winston," the sculptor said. "I don't know what I know now I would never have asked Hamilton to sit for me." Churchill was quoted in the Daily Express as asking, "couldn't they pick anyone else?" Thus the retired prime minister found himself in the second article of the year. The first came when an 80th birthday portrait by Sir Sutherland cracked criticism from other artists, critics and Churchill himself. The sculptor said Hamilton's body closely resembled Churchill's even if there were political differences which sent Hamilton into detention twice under wartime emergency regulations in World War I. He was interned as a friend of Sir Roger Casement, the Irish leader executed by England after being accused of leading in Ireland with arms from a German submarine to join the 1918 anti-British uprising. In 1941 Hamilton was detained for trying to arrange a separate peace with Nazi Germany.

Total Eclipse

The moon blanked the sun over an estimated 1,276,000 square miles of the earth's surface. The streak of darkness started in the Indian ocean and raced at 24 miles a minute for 7,200 miles across Ceylon, Thailand, Indochina, and the Philippines into the Pacific ocean. Army Readies Giant "Swap" In New Plans

WASHINGTON, June 22—The largest overseas army movement in peacetime—ultimately involving Atlantic crossing for about 42,000 soldiers, wives and children—gets under way July 2. Army officials explained yesterday the first big scale rotation of forces, the simultaneous transfer of the first division from Germany to Ft. Riley, Kans., and the 10th division from Ft. Riley to Germany. It is "Operation Gyroscope." Operation is large. Involved is a tremendous swapping operation—including an exchange of all everything but wives. Many families of the first division are being rotated to Ft. Riley (and possibly even pets) for their opposites in the 10th division to take over on arrival in Germany. The soldiers of the infantry divisions will take with them only their rifles and clothing. Artillery, vehicle supplies, all of the tons of equipment of a division—will be left at Ft. Riley and in Germany with the selected divisional insignia changed to fit the new users. Operation Gyroscope is the army's name for the plan to rotate units overseas in cycles averaging 32 months. Under that plan the first and tenth divisions are "rotated" to the Pacific ocean. In the Philippines the longest totality was 7 minutes 4 seconds. (AP wirephoto)

# Monkey and Sloth Is Not Designated to Mankind

June 22 (U.P.)—In this place this week, the monkey and sloth are designated to mankind.

Dr. David Johnson, curator of the U.S. National Museum, Washington, D.C., has found 3,622 species of mammals on this planet.

Johnson, who was made up by George Engelmann, former curator of the U.S. National Museum, Dr. Benjamin Kellogg, and Dr. David Johnson, director of the Smithsonian Institution, have found that, numerically, there are more monkeys than there are men on the earth.

There are about 250 species of monkeys and sloths, and about 300 species of mammals in general.

Fifty kinds of monkeys were found only in the tropics.

Johnson found only one species of mankind among the 3,622 species of mammals. He described scientifically the monkey and sloth, and named them after these four sound words.

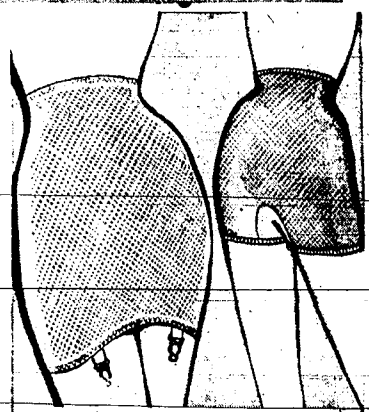

Use of Drugs Discussed at Medic Parley

SUN VALLEY, June 22—The ease of the administration of sedative and hypnotic drugs may be a widespread source of danger, Dr. Franklin E. Blount, Denver, told Idaho physicians here today.

"The extent of the problem of addiction of sedative and hypnotic drugs cannot be accurately determined," the speaker said. "But between 1923 and 1948 the production of barbiturates in the United States increased 400 per cent and the number of deaths in the country due to barbiturate poisoning has increased 200 per cent since 1940."

Although the use of these drugs under many conditions of crisis may be "life-saving in their action," often preventing untold suffering by a few hours' delay, relaxation and sleep, nevertheless, Dr. Blount asserted that serious consideration must be given to their too frequent use.

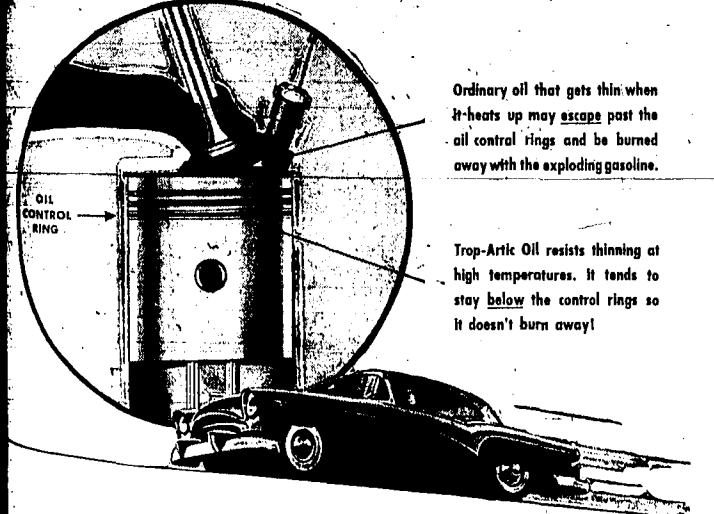

### Sunless Soil Nurtures Two Citrus Trees

**KELLOGG, June 22 (AP)—**Orange trees which sprouted from seeds dropped from a miner's lunch pail have survived for six years the hazards of existence 3,000 feet below the earth's surface and now stretch their limbs toward the artificial sky which casts the only light into their black "orchard."

The two trees are growing on the 20½ level at the Bunker Hill and Sullivan mine here. Mine officials hope they will continue to grow even longer than the famed lemon tree which lived 15 years in the dark recesses of the old mine.

The seed for the largest orange tree, a four-foot leafy bush, was dropped prior to the labor strike of 1949. Seeds had been dropped in the mine many times before and no one thought another of the "lemon tree freaks" would sprout.

But, through the hard rock where the seeds had fallen, there soon appeared green foliage. Herman Heier, a shift boss, and James Allen, assistant foreman, found the sturdy little plant thrusting its way through the ground between track ties on the level. They transplanted it to a coffee can. It continued to grow and the plant was moved to a nail keg, then to a larger box.

Heier brings plant food in his lunch for the tree that has never seen the sunlight. Its sunshine is the light supplied by 10 bulbs of 100 watts each.

"Extra carried single worms down to put in the soil around the tree," Heier says. "They keep the earth from packing too tightly around the roots."

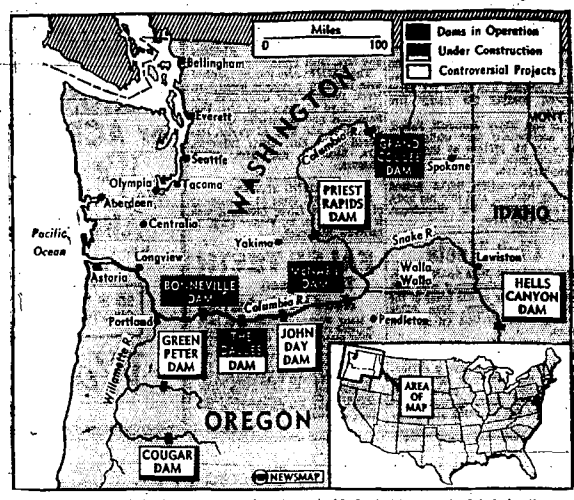
The old lemon tree lived 15 years without so much as a single ray of sunlight. It began to die a few years ago after it was moved from the 17th level to a spot where caretakers thought the air was better. It reached a height of eight feet and had to be pruned constantly because it reached the ceiling of its rickety tomb-like home.

One miner figures the tree died because it simply used up the life span of an underground existence.

"But it's nice to come down to the level every day and see evidence of life where you would never expect to find any, except for human beings," he says. "You might say there's some light, or hope, where none seems to be."

In times there may be other plants growing the tunnels of the big mines. There is no plant food in rock, but warm and humid conditions inside the mines make it possible for a seed to sprout. If the plant is cared for, it can reach full growth even though it is destined never to see the sun, a company biologist says.

### Power-Northwest's Biggest Headache



The Pacific northwest, for two decades considered a sort of hydroelectric wonderland, is facing the possibility that in five or 10 years its population and industry growth will surpass its power production. Instead of last winter's peak generating capacity of 7,750,000 kilowatts, the demand in the winter of 1954-55 will probably be 14 million kilowatts. So more dams will be needed to harness the Columbia river and its tributaries. In the last 20 years, congress has tossed two billion dollars into the region for federal projects. But this sort of federal aid is coming to a halt. Private power advocates want government out of the power picture, except where dams are built in "partnership" by the federal government and privately or local publicly owned utilities. The Eisenhower administration agrees with this view. This is a political issue which will get hotter as the 1956 presidential campaign nears. Maps showing the dam situation in the region. ### Man Watching Now Cited as Cause for Lower Efficiency

NEW YORK, June 22 (AP)—What really does the most to lower efficiency in the average business office—girl watching or man watching?

Would you get more work done if every white collar man were forced to wear overalls and a halloo'ing mask on the job?

I raise these questions only because my earlier campaign to put the American working girl in bloomers has fallen flat.

Why the campaign? Well, a survey showed that on an average day American men were wasting 20 million hours of company time doing nothing but daydreaming over the charms of their pretty girl co-workers.

My theory was that if all working girls were compelled to wear the same drab uniform, they would become so repulsive nobody would waste time looking. The suggested uniform: Black cotton stockings, old-fashioned black bloomers and a blue middie or highnecked blouse.

But it looks as if I got off on the wrong blooming foot.

You'd think it would be the office girls who'd raise a howl. Not at all. Many of these were quite attracted. It was the men who rebelled.

Typical complaint from a boss: "Why don't you shut your big mouth, Boyle? It has taken me 20 years to work up to a place where I can have an office of my own and a good-looking secretary. Quit talking like a wife, will you?"

An office supervisor remarked: "You're putting the car before the horse, son. There are more women than men in the average office today, and believe me most of them are man crazy."

"If men are wasting 20 million hours a day girl watching, then the girls themselves must be wasting 30 million working hours staring at-the-eyes-in-man watching."

I checked into this and—by golly—the supervisor was right. American's white collar men are getting downright frettful.

Every stenographer and secretary I talked to admitted (off the record, of course) that there was at least one man in her office she couldn't keep her mind and eyes from.

"What about a standard uniform for men office workers then—overalls or Bermuda shorts, plus blinders or halloo'ing masks?"

"In my opinion it wouldn't work," said a middle-aged secretary acidly. "To me most men look like they are wearing halloo'ing masks anyway, but in this civilization there is nothing you can do to make men repulsive—besides that, they are simply because there aren't enough of them to go around."

The case against putting office girls in bloomers was expressed most forcibly by Don Sauers, president of something called the American Society of Girl Watchers, Inc.

"I recommend that each American working girl be given a special income tax deduction of \$100 per year for cosmetics," he wrote. "And I suggest the hiring of one beautiful girl (for every 10 male employees) who has no talent for shorthand and who doesn't know a typewriter key from a piano key. Her sole assignment would be to stroll around the office adjusting Venetian blinds and tugging up dust tops."

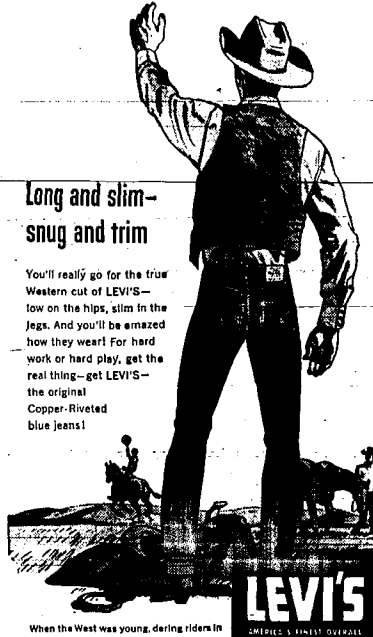

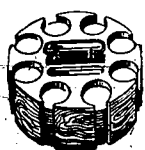

**Experts Plan Marine Trap For Monster**

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, June 22 (AP)—Scientists here are planning a giant marine trap to snare a monster from the ocean depths of Cook Strait.  
 They do not know exactly what they will catch.  
 "The possibilities are fascinat-  
 ing," says Prof. R. Richardson, head of the zoology department at Victoria university, Wellington.  
 Types unknown  
 "Sworn" statements by experi-  
 enced mariners indicate that there are at least four types of giant ocean creatures still unknown to man. Some people call them sea ser-  
 pents.  
 There are reports, going back to the 1700s, of occasional sightings along the shores of Cook Strait of giant squid, fearsome creatures with plate-sized eyes, bodies 10 feet across with 10 tentacles up to 25 feet long. With echo soundings taken a few years ago, the probable home of these giant squid was charted. This is a 6,000-foot deep canyon connect-  
 ing the Palliser bay end of the Strait with the Pacific ocean.  
 Turbulent Strait  
 Cook Strait is the turbulent stretch of water between the north and south islands of New Zealand.  
 The idea of a giant mousetrap was suggested to the New Zealand-  
 ers by marine scientists of the Danish research ship Galathea. The object would be to catch one of the monsters of the depths and

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### Solar Battery Now on Sale, Will Improve

CHICAGO, June 22 (AP)—The solar battery, long a pet of science-fiction writers, has become a commercial reality. You can buy one for \$25.

Don't expect the sun-powered gadget to run your electric shaver. The battery hasn't reached that stage of development yet.

The solar battery, a silicon wafer about the size of a half dollar, was developed by Bell Telephone laboratories. It is being produced commercially by National Fabricated Products, Inc., of Chicago, under a Bell license.

"Actually we're producing the batteries as prototypes and selling them to various industries for experimental purposes," said M. E. Paradise, company president.

"We've got ideas on how to improve the battery. Now we want specific ideas on how and where it can be employed."

Representative Effertz said the little silicon wafer represents man's first successful effort in converting sunlight directly into substantial amounts of electricity.

In the not-too-distant future, improved versions may be used to power portable bench equipment for tests and perhaps military field telephones.

"The Bell system already is installing the batteries in Georgia to boost power during daylight hours on rural telephone lines."

And some scientists believe the day will come when solar energy, converted into electricity, will run factories and perform much of the world's work.

Activated by Sun Fred Pollak, National Fabricated Products sales manager, put one of the batteries on a window sill where the sun's rays could strike it. The needle of a meter promptly flicked over to register a current of 32 milliamperes.

"Not enough to run an electric motor," he conceded. "But an engineer was in here the other day with a water pump to a micro-relay and used it to actuate the starter of a 10-horsepower motor."

The company put its sample wafers on the market early this month. Since then it has received more than 500 inquiries from various industries and government agencies. Foreign governments, including India, Austria and several South American countries, have expressed interest.

"Grown" Ingots The company "grows" cigar-shaped silicon ingots at its semiconductor plant in suburban Emmett. The ingots then are skillfully sliced into thin wafers to give the proper atomic structure to each slice.

Bell Laboratories claims that the efficiency of the battery can be compared to that of the best gas-line engines.

Officials of National Fabricated Products believe the silicon material soon may be perfected to the point where it could be put on a rooftop to form a big solar battery which conceivably could power the household gadgets inside the house.

The state land board said yesterday through its local timber agent that it is powerless to act on Louges' request for cancellation of the sale because of a court ruling that a bid made at a public auction constitutes a sale.

It said Louges must either complete the sale or forfeit his down payment.

Louges bought the timberland near Orofino for almost \$5,000 over the appraised price. He said he thought he was buying an amateur stand which won't be sold until Friday.

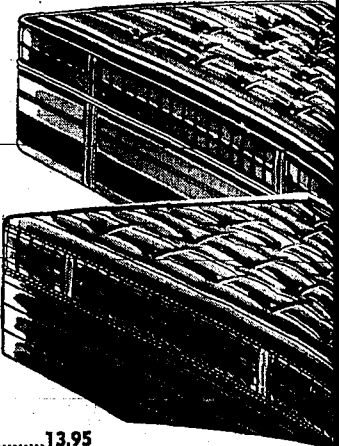

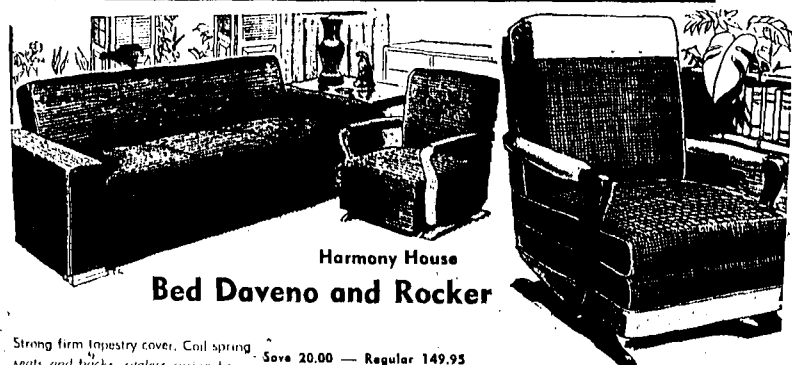

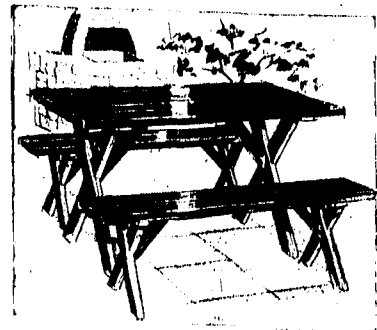
