Ike and Nixon Combine Puts Team on Job

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The Eisenhower-Nixon combination with which the Republicans finally won in 1952 looks very much this week like a team which is ready to run again. Or, maybe, like a team which already is running. President Eisenhower is on a three-state, eight-speech swing through New England, an undisciplined political venture into areas where Republican fences need some glittering repair. Vice President Richard M. Nixon is in the news as having discovered that he will be able, after all, to attend the convention of the politically hot National Association for the Advancement of Colored People in Atlantic City Sunday. Pretty Mrs. Patricia Nixon had booked the vice president for Sunday some time ago. When the NAACP invitation arrived, Nixon thought he had better keep the date made by his wife. It is fair to assume that someone had a long conversation with the vice president who was conspicuously present at the convention of the most powerful organization of colored voters in the United States. Of such moves the game of politics is made. The shift in 1956 of millions of northern Negro voters to the Democratic ticket was a major factor in making the Republicans a minority party in this country. One of the main objectives of Republican strategists is to regain the Negro vote, it is the balance of power in any close election in all northern industrial states. It was not by chance that Nixon changed his mind about the NAACP convention. Mr. Eisenhower may not be kissing babies, but he began his New England swing with a chicken barbecue in Rutland, Vt., which is almost as good. He will visit Maine and New Hampshire and work in a week-end of fishing before returning to Washington. There is friction within some state Republican organizations in New England, notably in New Hampshire.

SINGAPORE, June 23 (AP)—Chinese students from Indonesia threatened national Broadcasting company correspondent Jim Robinson today when he shot some pictures of them about the Dutch vessel Tjiwaangi. "We've really had another (Chinese) bomb," Robinson told the United Press in relating his experience. Robinson, United Press manager for Southeast Asia, was fatally beaten by mobs while covering recent riots in Singapore. Hostility Known Robinson said the student leaders did not protest when he shot pictures of them from the upper deck. But when he went down to the lower deck he encountered more students who became hostile immediately. While many of them screamed at Robinson and his companion, a public relations officer, one of the students drew a knife and threatened the correspondent. Robinson said he could not understand what the knife-wielder was muttering, but he realized the crowd "meant business." He said he left the ship quickly. Robinson said he was not aware that Chinese students from Indonesia could be as hostile as those in Singapore. Local news photographers who went to the docks today returned without getting any pictures.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23 (U)—Police armed with rifles patrolled rooftops near the War Memorial Opera house today after an unidentified man warned Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov would be shot.

The information was received yesterday at 2 a. m. (PDT) in a telephone call. The man refused to give his name. He said only that he had been talking with another man who said he would shoot the Russian.

Rifles were immediately rushed from the arsenal at the hall of justice, where police headquarters are located, and placed in the hands of many of the 45 officers guarding the United Nations conference area.

Officers took up positions along the rooftops overlooking the Opera house courtyard, ready to guard Molotov when he arrived for the afternoon session at 3 p. m.

However, Molotov decided to remain at his rented mansion in Hillsborough after arriving at an elaborate luncheon to delegates from Turkey, Afghanistan, Greece and Ethiopia, as well as the observer from Finland.

Police finally concluded the telephone tipster was a crank, and they decided to maintain the rooftop patrol for the remainder of the U. N. meeting—just in case.

Nippon-Style House Ready For U. S. Bid

PORTLAND, Ore., June 23 (U)—A Japanese style pre-fabricated house will be offered for sale to home shoppers next fall, a west coast architect said yesterday.

The house will have a raised jaunting platform where the living room furniture usually goes, a sleep-er on the floor on a pagoda-type overhang and a black-trimmed green exterior.

"It couldn't have happened 10 years ago," said Chris Chone, the Los Angeles architect who designed the house.

He claims young couples are all set to start dreaming about vine-covered oriental bungalows. Sitting on the floor on the jaunting platform not only cuts down the furniture bill, he pointed out, but it fits right with the Japanese living that has become a part of the American way of life.

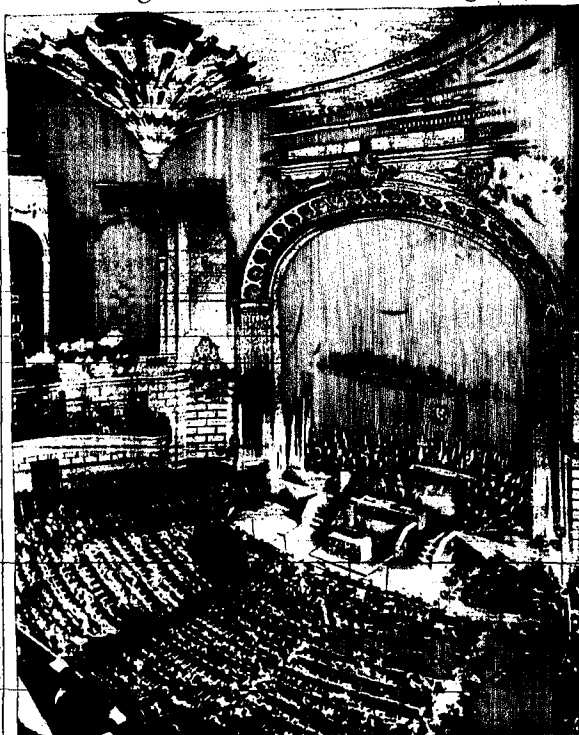

Cuts of Beef Get Spotlight In Food Mart

Skyrocketing prices of pork and lamb put beef in the spotlight again as the week's best buy for thrifty eaters.

Almost everywhere you'll find beef featured prominently on supermarket's lists of week-end specials.

While beef prices are generally about the same as last week, prices of pork and lamb are sharply higher. Prices quoted by one major food chain for center cut pork chops are up as much as 10 cents a pound in some cities; roast leg of lamb is up two to six cents a pound.

Frying chickens are up a little from last week in some cities, down in others.

To round out summer menus, the budget-conscious housewife can select golden corn from Florida (one big chain is offering five cents for 25 cents), or new crop potatoes from Virginia, the Carolinas or California.

Good Buys Tagged

Vegetables tagged as "outstanding buys" by U. S. department of agriculture food specialists include green cabbage, green beans, green radishes, green onions and green or yellow squash.

Salted greens listed as plentiful and cheap include lettuce, endive and escarole. Other vegetable bargains this week: Cucumbers, cauliflower, parsnips and rutabagas.

Fruits and berries from the southwest are coming to market in greater volume and at lower prices. Among the best buys are sour cherries—they're fine for stewing, or in cherry pie. Also more plentiful than last week are strawberries, peaches, plums and nectarines.

Drop Expected

California cantaloupes are moderately priced, they're expected to get still cheaper, however, in the week ahead.

Strawberries are still a top buy but the season is just about over. Blueberries are about as reasonable as they'll get this year. You won't find many Georgia peaches in produce counters this summer; the 1955 crop was heavily damaged by the ravages of the Georgia peach fly. Peaches now being offered were grown in California.

Hens are finding it difficult to produce in hot weather, so don't be surprised if you find egg prices slightly higher this week.

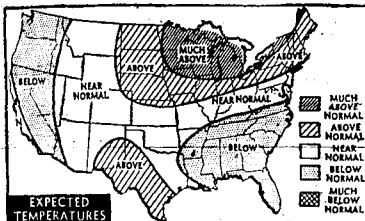

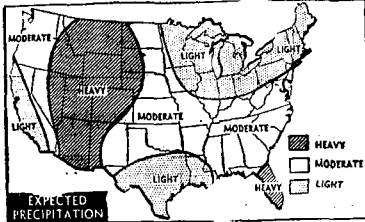

Plan of Pioneers Is Realized With Dedication of State Dam

ALBANY FALLS, June 23 (AP)—A modern-day drama of pioneer industry and planning, unfolded over an 18-year span, will end tomorrow with the dedication of the Albany Falls dam on the Pend Oreille river.

George H. Roderick, assistant secretary of the army for civil and military affairs, will fly from Washington, D. C., to give the principal dedication address. Other speakers will include Brig. Gen. Emerson C. Itchner, deputy chief of the army engineers; Gov. Robert E. Smylie of Idaho; and Gov. Arthur B. Langlie of Washington.

The falls bear the name of Albert Fuller, a French-Canadian who settled near here in 1887. Old newspaper clippings say Poitrier's name was just too hard to pronounce, so he was known only by his first name, Alben.

This multi-purpose dam, built in the form of a "dam," has already stored and released each year since 1952, 1,153,000 acre feet of water for use as larger downstream dams in the Columbia river system, adding 500 million kilowatt hours to the northwest power pool—enough to supply electrically for the domestic need of a city nearly the size of Portland, Ore.

With the release of this energy, the dam began returning a portion of the \$1-million-dollar investment tied up in the sprawling structure located between Priest River, Idaho, and Newport, Wash. The dam's own 14,200-kilowatt generators will give Albany Falls a 42,600-kilowatt rating. One of the generators is already in place and a second will go on the line in conjunction with the dedication. The third generator is scheduled to be added in September.

Suit Is Filed for Work Claims on Work

BURLEY, June 23—A suit has been filed in district court here by D. D. Daniels for the Sun Valley Insurance Agency, Ketchikan, against George J. Nelson and Ruth Nelson. Daniels claims that during the time Nelson and his wife were partners with another couple in the Sawtooth club they hired him to do work for them for which he has not been paid.

Daniels is asking payment of \$2,051.90 plus interest since Oct. 31, 1953, on amount due to cover insurance, policies, accounting service, bonds and other miscellaneous services rendered.

The suit was filed by Lawrence B. Quinn, Twin Falls, attorney for Daniels.

Decision Near

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The senate interior committee may act today on one of the country's biggest public versus private power issues.

The committee is expected to recommend the federal government of a private company dam the Hells canyon reach of the Snake river.

Method Found On Recreating Primitive Cell

PARADENA, June 23 (AP)—A noted scientist of the California Institute of Technology says he has produced in a laboratory what may be duplicates of the first primitive cell life that appeared on earth.

Dr. Stanley Miller told a Pacific division meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science he created his duplicates by developing a mixture like the early earth's atmosphere and bombarding it with electricity for a week.

The Caltech scientist said his experiments have been submitted in a report to the Botanical Society of America.

Dr. Miller said that when the earth was a gaseous ball, slowly cooling and developing into a planet capable of supporting life it had an atmosphere composed of methane, ammonia, water and hydrogen.

States Theory

He stated that one theory as to the origin of life is that organic compounds that started in the form of plants life.

To investigate the theory, he said he exposed a mixture of gases similar to the earth's early atmosphere to electrical discharges for a week to determine if changes could be brought about by electrical action.

Dr. Miller said he found a startling series of events. At first, he said, he noted the formation of aldehydes and hydrogen cyanide, but later these compounds reacted with the water to form life sustaining amino acids.

Explains Experiment

"The experiment shows," he said, "that not only would the formation of organic compounds be easy, but that a significant fraction of the carbon on the surface of the earth would be in the form of organic compounds of the ocean."

He said these organic compounds probably were the forerunners of ocean cell life in the form of plants. Later, the plant life underwent other chemical changes and evolved into living mobile organisms, he added.

"It would also seem that a great many of these compounds formed would be those that are components of present living organisms," Dr. Miller stated.

Uranium Process Studies Underway

WASHINGTON, June 23 (AP)—The atomic energy commission says it is "promising" an economic method may be devised for extracting uranium from the lignite beds of North and South Dakota.

An AEC statement read to a house interior subcommittee yesterday said present information indicates "these deposits offer promise of becoming an important source of uranium."

The statement said the AEC is conducting studies in search of a satisfactory process for recovering uranium from such matter.

Man Electrocutted In Idaho Accident

SANDPOINT, June 23 (AP)—Robert L. (Bill) Wheeler, 39, Priest River, Ida., was electrocuted yesterday afternoon when he contacted a 2,400-volt power line about 14 miles west of here.

Wheeler, a lineman for the Pacific Power and Light company, was installing a three-phase circuit in the new Van Belle Lumber company mill at Triakis Ferry when the accident occurred. He had been employed by the company eight years.

Wheeler is survived by his widow and four children. The body is at Priest River.

Walkout Threats Made in France

PARIS, June 23 (AP)—Government workers throughout France threatened today to walk out July 1, joining a wave of recent strikes in which at least 35 persons have been injured.

The 12,000 shipyard workers in St. Nazaire whose violent outbreaks caused the casualties returned to work today, but steelworkers in Alsace, bus drivers in Bordeaux, crane operators in Marseille and factory workers elsewhere in the country were still on strike.

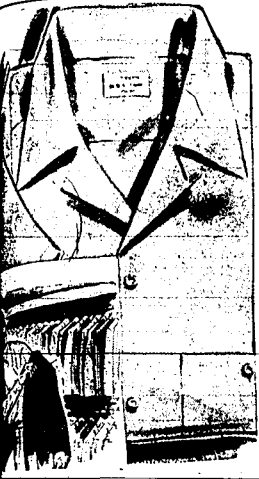

 NEW YORK, June 28 (U.P.) — The oddity almanac: An executive looking for a stenographer who can spell might do well to hire a deaf one.

As a matter of fact, many employers "now" are just that. They have found that office workers with hearing impairments have a large vocabulary and know how to use it because they learned to spell properly early in life.

The reason: Deaf children, not perturbed by distracting noises, develop a good visual memory of words and letters. Those with normal hearing often learn to spell the 66 basic sounds of English speech by ear instead of by sight.

The Americans' trip to Russia will coincide with a month-long tour of U. S. farmhands by a Soviet delegation.

14 Navy Vessels To Be Returned

BONN, German, June 23 (U.P.) — Fourteen small naval craft being returned to the United States by Russia are expected to arrive in Kiel July 1, the U. S. embassy said yesterday.

Under an agreement signed in Washington May 26 the Soviets are returning a total of six lend-lease submarines and 16 PT boats during July and August.

Communists Meet Is Almost Fiasco

By United Press
The "world peace assembly" in Helsinki, Finland, the biggest international communist meeting since World War II, was taking on overtones of a fiasco today.
Its opening date had to be postponed because the communists found it coincided with a U. S. atom-for-peace exhibit which would not have lived with their assertions that only the Soviet Union was interested in the peaceful use of atoms.
And it no sooner had started than anti-communist Finns plastered Helsinki with posters showing the communist "peace dove" dropping bombs on Helsinki.
An Indian team of "peace fighters" who tried to address Finnish workers at a suburban house construction project were thrown out by a forearm.
Communist party officials returned to "talk the foreman into order" and they, too, were ejected.

Red Problems Need Time for Proper Work

LONDON, June 23 (AP) — Russia needs time in order to deal with some pressing problems of its own. This fact emerges after an extensive survey of recent internal developments in the Soviet Union by experts in the West.
These experts believe that the current switch in Soviet foreign policy is due as much to difficulties at home as to the firmness of the West. Soviet government leaders seem to be confronted by a series of formidable internal problems which they need time to settle.
These problems may be listed as:
1. The unresolved struggle for power. The main thing about the Russian Communist party is that it has remained unopposed after the downfall of Premier Georgi M. Malenkov. This is attributed to the moderating influence of the army, which is now more powerful than ever before, and in the failure of any one man to gain supremacy.
2. The agricultural crisis. Russia's difficulties in producing enough food, publicly admitted by Communist party first secretary Nikita S. Khrushchev, have not yet been solved. Grandiose schemes including vast land reclamation projects have failed to bring victory in the fight for more grain and more cattle.
3. The industrial lag. The recent conferences which industrial bosses have held in Moscow have shown that Russia is falling behind in new techniques and scientific invention. Productivity in industry remains low. Low productivity is becoming a major national problem because of the shortage of labor. As the result of the conferences, Lazar M. Kaganovich has been named labor and wages boss and Vyacheslav Malyshev has been named head of a committee on new industrial techniques.
4. The coordination of economic plans and help for Red China. There are indications that the Kremlin plans to integrate its own and satellite economic systems in such a way as to give maximum aid to Red China in its industrialization campaign.
The most immediate of the four problems is the struggle for power within the Communist party. This struggle may be resolved before the next meeting of the all-Soviet union Communist party, due sometime next year.
The agricultural problem is a long range one. The latest time limit for the fulfillment of a target of 100 million tons of grain is 1960.
The problem of reorganizing Soviet science also is a long-term one. As for the industrialization of Communist China, the needs of that country are limitless.

Nehru, Bulganin Mouth-Red-Line

MOSCOW, June 23 (AP) — Soviet Premier Nikolai Bulganin and Indian Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru called today for the surrender of Formosa to the Chinese Communists and the admission of Communist China to the United Nations.
Nehru then flew to Warsaw after declaring in a farewell statement "part of my heart" remains in Russia.
The two premiers, in a declaration of solidarity issued at the end of Nehru's history-making five-day visit to Russia, proposed a ban on the manufacture of atomic and hydrogen bombs and an end to experiments with the bombs and called for world disarmament.

Ship Putting Down Initial Phone Cable

CLARENVILLE, Nfld., June 23 (AP)—The laying of the world's first trans-oceanic telephone cable started yesterday. It is to stretch from a rugged fishing village across the Atlantic floor to Oban, Scotland.

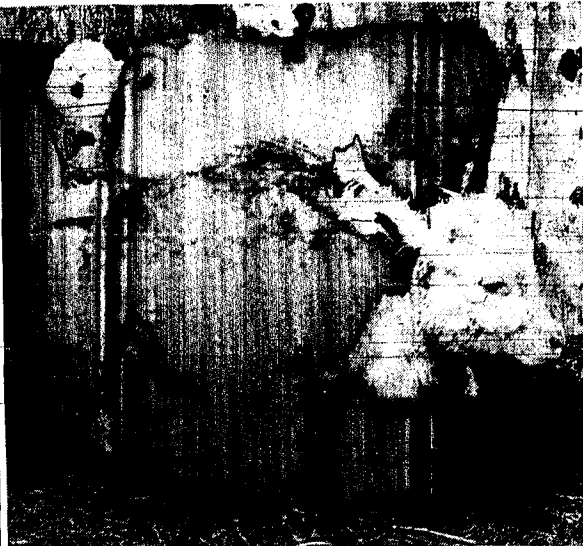
The Clarenville end of the cable, which will span 2,250 statute miles, was christened with sea water from Heart's Content bay, site of the first successful Atlantic telegraph cable landing here in 1858.

The 8,000-ton British ship *Monarch*, spinning the cable slowly out of her huge tanks, will reach Oban by the end of the summer, completing the west-to-east underwater telephone system.

This will link New York directly with London and add 36 extra telephone circuits to the present overseas shortwave radio system of 14 circuits, all dependent on weather. A second cable will be laid next summer from Scotland to Newfoundland to carry conversations from east to west. The over-all system, a 40-million dollar joint undertaking by the American Telephone and Telegraph company, the British postoffice, which operates the telephones in Britain, and the Canadian Overseas Telecommunications corporation, is expected to be in service by late 1958.

Eighteen telegraph cables now span the Atlantic. The new telephone cable marks the most important advance in international communications since 1927, when the first transatlantic telephone service was established via radio.

SEOUL, Korea, June 23 (AP)—Red North Korea's air force chief lost his job because one of his pilots flew a Russian-built MIG here for a \$100,000 reward in 1953. It was reported today. The communists replaced him with a Russian citizen.

The United Press learned from reliable South Korean air force sources that these facts were revealed to American intelligence officers by Capt. Lee Woon Young, one of two North Korean pilots who flew to freedom here Tuesday in their Russian-built Yak-18.

Capt. Lee revealed that the new head of the North Korean air force is Lieut. Gen. Han Il Moo, former high-ranking officer in the North Korean navy and a citizen of Soviet Russia.
