SAN FRANCISCO, June 25 (AP)—Soviet Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov Saturday expressed regret for the shooting down of an American naval plane in the Berings straits last Wednesday and said Russia was willing to pay one-half the damages. The Soviet foreign minister disclosed his position in a memorandum which he handed to Secretary of State John Foster Dulles at a hurriedly-arranged meeting. Dulles immediately informed President Eisenhower by telephone and said he would discuss the matter further with the President when they both are in Washington on Monday. Dulles told Molotov that the offer to pay 50 per cent of damages fell short of what the United States had requested.

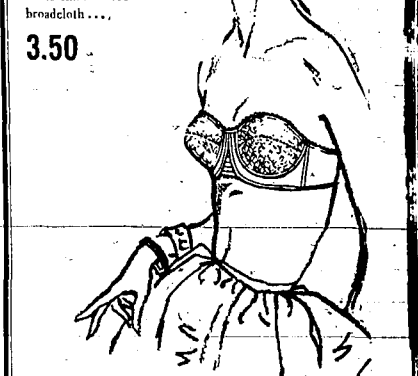

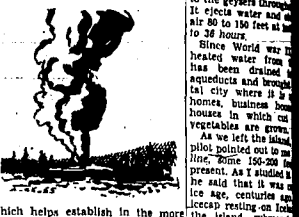

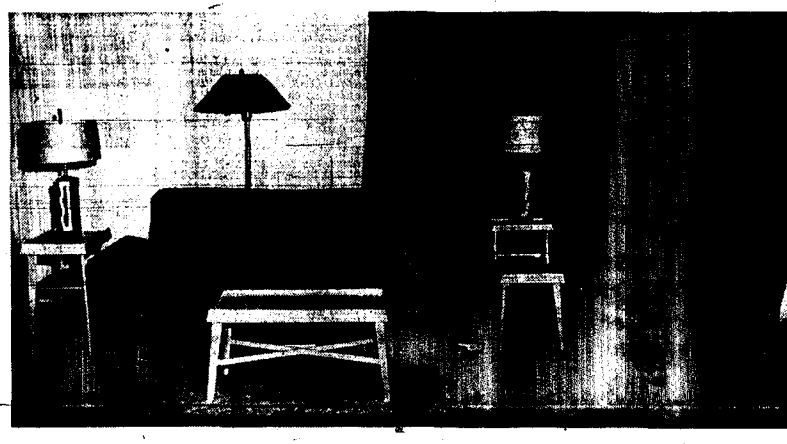

"Spending Like Topsy Sailor," Asserts Kimberly Man of Debt

Editor, Times-News: Some weeks ago you had a cartoon in your issue titled "Pantastic Equilibrium" showing a scale in balance with the national debt on one side and the wealth of the U. S. on the other. There was a statement that the yearly interest cost to taxpayers was 3 1/2 billion dollars. The federal debt is 276.5 billion dollars. The bonds covering this debt bear an interest of 4 1/2 percent. Three and one-half billion is only a little over one per cent of 276.5 billion. The interest the taxpayers pay on the 276.5 billion debt is eight billion dollars a year. Some 20 years ago the federal debt was only 18 billion. Now the yearly interest alone is half that amount. It's promised to stop the squandering and balance the budget. He has done neither. He is proposing new and more costly spending programs and continuing the hard-uns on the old ways.

"Spending like a drunken sailor" has no meaning, any more. He is an old-timered banker. It's spending like Uncle Scaless Sam now. The sailor at least had the anti-fighting spirit of the anti-taxpayer only has the satisfaction being the goat that's being bled to death through taxes.

T. F. Man Sees 'Profit Angle' In 'Furor Over Zoning' Plan

Editor, Times-News: It has been said, and rightfully so, that we should not overlook the good sections of the zoning ordinance merely because of the opposition to the sections which would set up business districts in our fine residential areas. In our fine residential areas, when it was found that those of us who oppose these business districts are opposed to the entire report. This is not true. I personally have urged the enactment of good zoning laws as far back as 1944. Not very much was done, nor was very much heard of until some one thought they could see a profit in setting a business district down in the center of our fine residential areas. When it was found they could not legally do this, it was decided to rewrite our city zoning ordinances so that it could be accomplished. If there had been no profit angle all this furor over zoning would have never come up at all at this time.

Now let's make one thing crystal clear. We are not opposed to super-markets nor any other type of business. On the contrary, we believe super-markets are good for a community and we will even help to support those in the present controversy, provided they are built on our already ample, business districts and that no special zoning be created just for their benefit and profit; and thus to the detriment and the lowering of values in our residential areas.

It is our contention that if business areas are opened in residential areas the whole zoning plan will fall from the same cause that was brought about our present dilemma, which, in the past, allowed businesses to become established in residential areas. In the past, 10-15 years there have been several neighborhood grocery stores apply to the city for the right to expand beyond their present property lines. To do this such requests have been refused, and should continue to be refused. No business man should ask or expect special privilege laws to be enacted for his business which have been denied to his competitors, and which could, therefore, help put his competitors out of business.

Regardless of what motivated the original writing of the zoning report, it contains much food for thought and the majority of the members of the zoning commission should be complimented for their sincere efforts. So by all means let's not drop the majority of the recommendations, which were excellent. By the same token let's eliminate that which will destroy the whole design.

Red Dangers Told Anew by Korean Chief

SEOUL, Korea, June 25 (UP)—President Byungman Rhee said today on the anniversary of the start of the Korean war that the communists are trying to win the world by negotiation and succeeding in some areas.

It was five years ago today that North Korean troops poured across the 38th parallel near Panmunjom in an act of aggression that brought instant denunciation by the free world and the United Nations into its first act.

Most of the United States troops which fought in the three-year war have returned home; only two U. S. divisions remain on guard along the demilitarized zone separating the communists and the anti-communists.

The Republic of Korea army, fourth largest in the world, filled in the gaps they left. It now has 20 fully equipped divisions and 10 in reserve, ready to fight once again should the Soviet-trained troops of the north march south again.

The United States today devalued its major port of Pusan. The supply job now will be handled directly by the reduced eighth army and the ROK army.

Communist China has reported the withdrawal of 13 divisions of its so-called "volunteers" from North Korea. Both Peking and North Korea marked the anniversary in radio broadcasts today and called the armistice which ended the struggle a "great victory."

One-Time Famous Aviatix Is Living Quietly After Limelight

LOS ANGELES, June 25 (UP)—Twenty-eight years ago a beautiful young woman thrilled the world with her attempt to become the first aviatix to span the Atlantic. She missed reaching Paris by 300 miles as she and her copilot made a crash landing in the ocean. But Ruth Elder became the "Miss America of Aviation" and made an estimated \$250,000 from personal appearances and movies.

Then came setbacks and six ill-fated marriages. Although she was one of the leading figures of the golden '20s, Miss Elder withdrew from the limelight in later years. At one point she chose to sever all connections with her glamorous past, even to dropping her given name and adopting that of a favorite aunt, "Susan."

Today at 50 she has emerged somewhat from that retirement, although stating emphatically she has no desire to live a gilded life of existence. Last year she became secretary to an aviation company executive and says, "I just love being a working girl."

At the same time she admits that being at a desk at the same time each morning is something new for her. But her job gives her the opportunity to talk flying with those in the business and she still loves to take a flight.

"A couple of years ago I thought going up in a jet would be a wonderful idea," she recalls. "Then I cooled off on the idea. But if the opportunity came up, I'd probably say 'certainly' and then be scared to death."

She had little fear on Oct. 11, 1927, when she attempted to fly the ocean, but her most vivid memory of that flight was the crash landing she and George Halderman made 38 hours later in the Azores, 300 miles from Le Bourget field, Paris.

"They brought their plane, 'The American Girl,' down on the crest of a wave near an oil tanker. It was an hour before the tanker could pick them up."

After her whirl in the movies, Miss Elder tried writing and later entered the advertising business. When her agency failed, she went through a series of marriages with

Lincoln Pool Fails to Earn State's Okay

SHOSHONE June 25—Swimming pool conditions for the city do not meet the approval of the state department of public health, according to announcement made this week by city officials after receiving a report from H. C. Claire, director of sanitation for the state. The report states the pool is not properly drained. It has no provisions for adequate and continuous disinfection of the water and since the water is taken from the city well, the temperature is too low. To be safe from germs, the letter from the health chief said, the water in the pool should be changed or re-circulated three or four times each day. The pool has not been filled this season because of cold weather. Large children and adults have been swimming in the river but the current is too swift and the water too deep for small children. If the present pool is opened, city officials say it may be restricted for use of smaller children with the deep portion filled in. 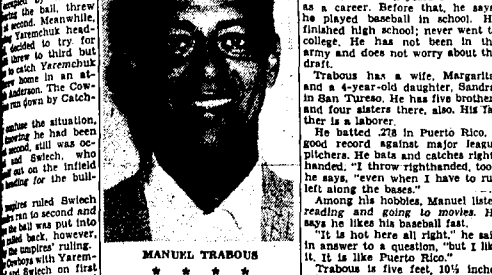

Dulles rejected the Molotov program in his talk.

The position of the western powers is being carefully explained to the representatives of the American republics and to the members of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization.

AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

Everyone wants to be happy. We all want to wake up in the morning, glad to be alive. We all want to walk through the hours of each day with a keener spirit, and to go to bed at night, thankful and content. This is a beautiful ideal.



It is well worth our striving for, but how often it is very hard to give the outward appearance of happiness. But being a minister, I am often troubled in mind. A bitter spirit and a frustrated soul. Why do we try to hide our true feelings from others? The psychologists say that it is usually because we are ashamed of them. They also say that the same false pride which produces these immature feelings also prevents us from mastering them. The sociologists say that we hide our inner feelings because we realize that if they were seen, we should seriously damage our public relations. Certainly all of these answers have some truth in them.

For all of that most people are probably happy, not very happy. They go along from day to day, enjoying their friends, finding some pleasure in their work, taking time out for play and other activities in which they are interested. By turns everyone is laughing or serious, or both, and depressed at the circumstances of their lives prompt them.

A few people are truly happy most of the time. They have a common assortment of difficulties and disappointments like the rest of us. Their secret is in their emotional and spiritual maturity. They have outgrown self-pity and self-pride. Consequently they have the humility and love and faith to see and appreciate the goodness, truth and beauty which form so large a part of life.

Dr. William Lyona Phelps, of famous Yale professor and author, says, "The happiest person is the person who thinks the most interesting thoughts."

If this insight is true, and I am sure that it is, it means that happiness is not beyond the reach of anyone. We all can think interesting thoughts—if we will.

Where can we get interesting thoughts?

The whole realm of books is full of them. For centuries, men have put their most interesting thoughts into stories, essays, poetry. Books of history, philosophy, science and religion, throng with interesting thoughts. The finest books are terribly barren without books. Because of public libraries, no home is too poor to have this source of happiness in it. But, of course, it is the presence of books that fills men's minds with interesting thoughts, it is the eager reading of them.

We receive interesting thoughts from other people. This is especially true when we have the habit which children have of honestly asking questions and listening thoughtfully to the answers. One of the great services which the min-

His fantasies go underground in his mind. And they stay there, itching him mentally, for years and years.

In time they gradually grow smaller and smaller in scale. Haven't you? Can't you remember when you dreamed of running into a burning building and rescuing a beautiful lady? Or of robbing a great liner in mid-ocean and escaping by motor boat? Or of finding \$100,000 in the street?

Today none of those daydreams probably flicker through your head. They don't even make sense as daydreams after 40.

If the loveliest woman in the world leaves out of a window of a flaming dwelling, I'll merely stand there on the pavement and help her yell "help!" I know my limitations. I wouldn't run up a flight of steps now to rescue anything except my social security card—and it would have to be in terrible peril at that.

In middle age a man no longer pictures himself in his daydreams as a great hero or a great rascal. He realizes he no longer has the desire or energy to be either.

His dreams of glory come down to small daily dramas in which he sees himself mastering some ordinary social situation that has always frustrated him before.

For example, he has just got a hair cut. The barber holds up a perfunctory mirror and says, "Okay?"

For 200 times in a row in the past 20 years the victim has meekly murmured, "Uh-huh," and said, "But in his daydreams he suddenly rebels and says:

"No, it certainly isn't okay. Tony. You got it parted wrong. There are at least eight hairs too many on the top of my head. You've you to lift the sideburns, and you didn't. Want me to look like a sheep dog? Now get your scissors and the job right—for once!"

The abashed barber bends anew to his task. When he is finished, the little hero stems from his chair with a crisp, "That's better!" As he swaggers from the shop the other customers break into admiring applause.

I have two simple daydreams myself. In one I am cashing my paycheck and the bank teller asks, "Do you have any identification with you?"

Instead of fumbling through my pockets, I merely fix him with a pair of steel blue eyes and tell him proudly, "My job identification in this man's town, sonny."

He takes one hurried look—and cashes the check pronto.

In the other I go with a guest into one of the velvet rope restaurants. When the headwaiter smoothly asks, "Do you have a reservation, I tell him: "No, I have a reservation? Look mister, I don't even own an Indian. Now quit stalling—and show us a table."

Overcome by this bit of swift repartee the humbled head waiter drops his velvet rope and steers us to the best seats in the place.

In another version of this daydream I merely take out a Boy Scout knife, hack the rope to two, and stalk right by the head waiter as nearby guests look up and ask, "Who is he? Who is he?"

But, of course, this is probably the average man's most common daydream. He wakes up to find his home is finally paid for and doesn't need any repairs, his car is paid for and there isn't even a knock in the motor. He sits down to breakfast and neither his wife nor his kids hit him for money. He reaches in his pocket and is pleasantly surprised to find he still has \$10 left—and it's only two days till payday.

Man, that's real dreaming! Who'd rather be Davy Crockett?

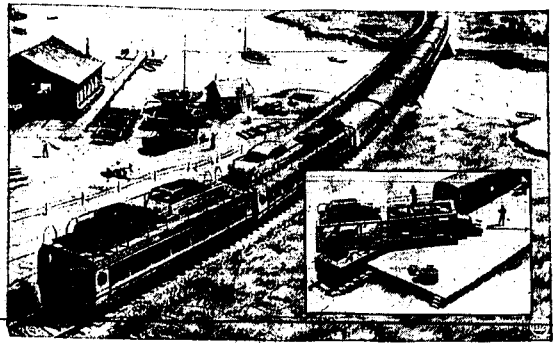
